Imran Khan disqualified

ISLAMABAD: Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) on Friday disqualified Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) Chairman Imran Khan in Toshakhana case. A four-member bench headed by Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Sikandar Sultan Raja announced the unanimous decision. In the decision, it has been said that Imran Khan is no longer a member of the National Assembly, adding that he submitted a false affidavit and has been involved in corrupt practices. The electoral watchdog declared Imran Khan's National Assembly seat as vacant. ECP further added that Imran Khan is no longer 'Sadiq and Amin' and legal action should be initiated against him. On September 19, the ECP had reserved its verdict in the Toshakhana case moved by Pakistan Democratic Movement (PDM), seeking disqualification of Imran Khan for alleged foul play related to Toshakhana gifts. Barrister Ali Zafar and Barrister Gohar Ali Khan represented the PTI chairman as defence lawyers in the case hearing. A five-member ECP bench headed by the CEC heard arguments before reserving its decision. The Toshakhana case was brought before the electoral watchdog last year after the Pakistan Information Commission (PIC) had accepted an application on the matter and had directed the Cabinet Division to provide information about the gifts received by then-prime minister

With the Conservatives all but facing a wipe out in the next national election according to opinion polls, the race is on to become the fifth British premier in six years. US, Japan to conduct 'Keen Sword' major military drill TOKYO: Japan and the US will con-

duct a joint military exercise from Nov 10, the Japanese Defence Ministry said today, as countries in the region and beyond are increasingly wary of China's growing military might and assertiveness. The drill, dubbed Keen Sword, takes place biennially around Japan. Some 36,000 personnel, 30 vessels, and 370 aircraft from Japan's self-defence forces and the US military will participate in this year's exercise, which will run till Nov 19. "By demonstrating Japan's and the United States' strong will and coordination, we aim to contribute to defending Japan and securing peace and safety of the region." Japanese defence minister Yasukazu Hamada told reporters. Besides the two Pacific allies, Canada will be dispatching two vessels, while Australia and Britain will each send one warship to the drill, the ministry said. Locations of the field training include Japan's southwestern islands including Tokunoshima, which is closer to Taipei than to Tokyo. At a Communist Party meeting that started on Sunday, Chinese president Xi Jinping called for accelerating China's plans to build a world-class military and said his country would never renounce the right to use force to resolve the Taiwan issue. Polio eradication: A long way to achieve target

PESHAWAR: Being pushed on a wheelchair by his father, Abid Khan used to visit playground near his home on a daily basis to watch children playing different games to get amused but he could not play by himself as he fell prey to polio virus in his childhood and paralyzed for life. Whenever football or cricket balls come close to the wheelchair of Abid, a resident of village Dheri Ishaq in Nowshera district, he unintentionally tries to catch it but sometimes falls from in this effort and his father support him to settle down again in his chair. Sadden for his son, Abid's father Jamsheed Khan said that he feels so sorry for his 30-year-old son because he could not play like a normal child and always looks for others' support. "Polio virus affected my son at age of three-year, when he took him to doctor due to high fever, vomiting and constant pain where he was diagnosed with polio, he recalled. "The doctor said Abid could not walk for entire life as both of his legs were affected by polio virus," the sadden father said, adding he had been

practicing to bring his son to the playground for the last 25 years on his request by leaving work in fields ahead of time. Like Abid, polio virus continued attacking the under five years children in the country where 20 kids were paralyzed this year for entire life. According to Emergency Operation Centre (EOC), KP Health Department, all these 20 positive cases were detected in KP's southern districts including 17 in North Waziristan, two in Lakki Marwat and one in South Waziristan. As many as 139 cases were reported during 2011 in Pakistan including 23 from KP, 33 from Sindh, 73 from Balochistan, one in Giligt Baltistan (GB) and nine in Puniab. In 2012, polio cases were slashed to 38 including 27 in KP, four each in Sindh and Balochistan, one from GB, and two from Islamabad. Further reduction in cases had been witnessed during 2013 with 28 cases in Pakistan including 11 from KP, 10 from Sindh and seven from Punjab. The country had witnessed a sharp increase in polio cases in 2014 after deduction of 127 cases in-

22 from Balochistan and seven from 27, 2021. However, the report of 20 Punjab. In 2015, a total of 38 cases were detected in the country including 17 in KP. 12 in Sindh, seven in Balochistan and only two from Punjab. As many as 18 cases reported including eight each from KP and Sindh and two from Balochsitan in 2016. One case was detected in KP, two in Sindh, three in Balochistan and one each from GB and Punjab during 2017. Likewise, two cases detected in KP, one in Sindh and three in Balochistan during 2018. However, significant increase in polio cases were witnessed in the country with record 134 cases including 80 in KP. 30 in Sindh, 12 each in Balochistan and Punjab during 2019. As many as 82 cases reported in Pakistan including 20 in KP, 22 in Sindh, 26 in Balochistan and 14 in Punjab in 2020. Once in spotlight in world for being a country of polio virus reservoir following reports of about 20,000 cases per year in early 1990, there was a great hope that Pakistan was going to be declared a polio free country after a report of one cluding 68 from KP, 30 from Sindh, case from Balochistan on January

cases this year from KP had showed that wild polio virus (WPV-I) was still circulating in Lakki Marwat and Waziristan districts and its eradication was imperative to save children from permanent disabilities. Senior children specialist, Government Satellite Hospital Pabbi Nowshera, Dr Riaz Khan said polio was highly contagious disease that mostly invades the nervous system of malnutrition children and spreads through feco-oral route. Talking to APP, he said one in 200 infections leads to permanent paralysis and its victim even can't move parts of his body and even caused death. He said over 100 million children were immunized every year before their first birthday and about 24 million under one-year age i.e. 20 percent were deprived of vaccine due to various reasons including refusal. Terming anti-polio vaccine is safe option, he said the vaccines prevent two to three million deaths every year and can save additional two million children subject to improvement of global coverage. 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PM For Climate Justice

In the context of devastation caused by climate change in Pakistan, PM Shehbaz Sharif has said that "we want climate justice, not compensation", In other words, he wants to make it clear to the world that Pakistan is under threat from climate change effects in the future as this change is going to take place just because of much carbon emission globally. The UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres, seems to be so sensitive in this regard that in his address to the UNGA 77th session, he mentioned that he himself saw one-third of Pakistan submerged in floods, and carbon emitting countries are clearly behind this happening here, Pakistani must be helped to overcome this big challenge. Similarly, PM Shehbaz made it clear in an interview with a British newspaper that we do not use the word compensation. But we are only demanding climate justice because we are aware of the destruction caused by climate change, saying another country may become victim to this change tomorrow and we do not want that to happen in future. The PM added that Pakistan is not trying to reschedule its external debt, but it needs money for major projects like reconstruction of roads, bridges and other infrastructure in flood-affected areas, as floods caused a loss of US\$30 billion, for which the support of the international community is required. We are in a state of war. What we received after the flood is far less than what we need. The PM's speech expressed concern that serious problems may arise if there is political instability. In the first week of this month, the UN issued a new appeal for aid to Pakistan, in which the estimate of the required aid was increased from US\$18 million to US\$81 million. However, the verbal promises made by various countries have not been fulfilled so far, as more tents, medicine, and food needed to help the families displaced by flood. Unfortunately, the gap between demand and received aid is widening over time. Pakistan will seek additional funds from wherever possible. The French President has promised to host a donors' conference to increase financial aid to Pakistan, which is likely to be held in Paris in November. It should be expected that Pakistan will get some more external support as a result of this conference. It should be kept in mind that the help of others cannot be the means of a country's complete recovery from the crisis. It is important to rely on hard work, determination and strength to overcome the difficulties.

The brewing crisis in education

The state-run school in the suburburden kids with academic rigours. ban Australian town where I was attending a yearlong training course had asked parents of aspiring students, especially the international students, to meet the teaching staff. Our concerns were addressed and gueries answered. The school had no uniform; however, kids were encouraged to wear a loose track-suit that could be acquired new or second-hand from the local store. All three kids were to pay an annual fee of fifty Australian dollars. Kids were not required to buy textbooks, notebooks and other items, as these were school-supplied. They were not given any home work. Teacher would explain the lesson using one set of textbooks, kept in his/her custody, on the white board. Students would thereafter do their exercise on loose sheets of paper, which would subsequently be filed in their respective subject folders, and left in their lockers. Each class would have a games' period. Small kids were expected to play in the sand, kept purposefully in the school yard. I tried adopting the above model while commanding the Hyderabad Division in the Army-run school in Badin for one year; and in spite of parents' initial reservations, the results were good. Kids unencumbered with heavier school bags, stressful school routine, tiring homework and a daunting learning environment did well comparatively. The same was suggested to the KP government, but generally such suggestions hit at privileges, vested interests and never see the light of the day for 'other' reasons. One is aghast at seeing the school kids of these times. The little souls have no time to play. Over-ambitious school syllabi, teachers with mostly perfunctory skills and interests, and the consequent compulsion of attending the evening 'tuition academies' have literally made life miserable for children all across the country. In one of the biggest rackets of our times, the same teachers who would not satiate a kid's knowledge curiosity in the classroom would be more diligent in these tuition academies. Kids run in between rigorous school routine and longer commute to the evening academies; and hardly have time to play or enjoy themselves. On weekends, these exhausted souls oversleep, get on with their cell phones or prepare a project. Over-ambi-

They would demand flawless academic performance, perpetually pester kids for more marks, and encourage them to compete headlong in a vicious pseudo-academic environment. The emphasis has shifted to getting more marks, rather than getting educated. Schools and tuition academies are all excessively commercialised and geared to maximise their profits in an unholy alliance with the relevant industry and official mafias. Where is this obsession with more marks taking us? Anybody's guess. A recent interaction with some instructors at one of the Military academies revealed that our youngsters have weaker bones. If the tougher physical standards required of the Military are so inadequate, one can conjecture the overall physical standards of our society. Kids' over-indulgence in social media has hit the remaining nails in the gloom-box of contemporary education. Although one can still see some outdoor sports in rural Pakistan between late-afternoon and evening; cities are mostly dead zones due to lack of adequate facilities. Plato, in his famous 'Theory of Education', considers education a means to achieve individual and social justice. He considers that individual justice can be attained once individuals nurture their abilities fully. Justice to him is akin to excellence, which is virtue. Plato groups knowledge development into three tiers: self-knowledge, knowledge of one's job, and knowledge about 'the Idea of the Good'. According to Plato, the main function of education is 'not to put knowledge into the soul', but to exploit the latent individual and group talents by correctly directing these towards right objects. He advocates equal educational opportunities as basis of social justice and does not support commercialisation of education. The great sage 'was against the practice of buying knowledge', which he considered a 'heinous crime'. In elementary education, emphasising grooming of children in healthy environment, implanting 'truth and goodness', Plato initially recommends teaching literature (mostly story-telling), and poetry. His second suggestion is music. and third arts. Following a 10-year phasing, he emphasises physical education mostly for the first 10 years, implying a gymnasium and a playground in each school. Examcontinuing education from those forming part of workforce. Those passing were to continue education for another 10 years, studying apart from body and mind, subjects like mathematics, astronomy, geometry and dialectics. He also recommends history, science and moral education. Plato believed knowledge acquired under compulsion is transitory. Exam at the age of 30, much harder, served as elimination test. Elimination at each stage filled occupational ranks. Qualified students were to receive another 5-year advanced education in dialectics. Those passing had to study another 15 years for practical experience in dialectics. And at the mature age of 50, those qualifying were to be entrusted with the ultimate task of governance.

The above discourse identifies two correctable errors in our educational philosophy - the neglect of education's true purpose i.e. individual and societal improvement through excellence; and our obsession with form and format through misplaced diligence that takes fun out of the whole process, contributing to weak bodies and weaker minds. West generally validates the consequences of new social normals much before us. So a recent study (Richard V Reeves's new book, Of Boys and Men) finds 'men are struggling', in the US and worldwide. They are struggling in the classroom. They are struggling in the workplace (around 10 million American men are out of labour force). Men are also struggling physically, as close to 75% cases in the 'deaths of despair' category (suicide, drug overdoses, etc) are men. Over-competition is responsible for student-suicides in Korea and Japan before the yearly entry level exams.

It is about time the whole gamut of education and social upbringing was looked into. Pressure needs to be taken off our kids allowing them more leisure time. Competition be weaned away from obsession with marks and jobs, towards social harmony, maturity and perfection. Syllabi need to orient towards individual and group well-being. Imparting education should come back to its noble moorings of knowledge dissemination and grooming of the soul, rather than greed and money-making. The system needs an urgent reboot — now.

The defendant's lawyer Babar Awan argued that Swati used his constitutional right to freedom of expression. He asked if Swati's statement incited mutiny in the armed forces. (APP)



India fines Google US\$162m for abuse of Android platform

NEW DELHI: India's competition regulator on Thursday ordered Alphabet's Google to change its approach to its Android platform and fined the US tech company 13.38 billion rupees (US\$161.95 million) for anti-competitive practices. The Competition Commission of India (CCI) said Google leveraged its dominant position in markets such as online search and app store for Android, to protect the position of its apps like Chrome and YouTube in mobile web browsers and online video hosting. CCI also restricted Google from certain revenue-sharing agreements with smartphone makers, noting that such practices helped Google to secure exclusivity for its search services "to the total exclusion of competitors". Adidas shoes going unsold as demand weakens

BERLIN: Adidas AG warned that unsold goods are piling up as consumer demand weakens across China and western markets, prompting a fresh profit warning from the sneaker maker. The German company lowered its forecast for this year's operating margin to 4% from 7%. Full-year revenue will grow at a mid-single-digit rather than mid to high-single-digit

rate, Adidas also said. The company's shares fell 6.6% in pre-market Frankfurt trading and are down by more than half this year. Shares of rival Puma SE fell 5.2%. The warning extends a run of bad news from Adidas as chief executive officer Kasper Rorsted prepares to step down in 2023 after a tumultuous six-year tenure. (Agencies)

Dubai Islamic Bank sets up green financing framework

DUBAI: Dubai Islamic Bank is planning to finance environmental and social projects under a new Sustainable Finance Framework published on Friday. The framework will allow the lender to issue green and sustainability-linked Islamic bonds and loans to fund projects in renewable energy, clean transport, green buildings and wastewater management as well as support job creation and affordable housing, a statement said. Investor demand for ESGlinked financing has surged and interest has picked up in the Gulf and wider Middle East, with increasing opportunities to invest in projects linked to sustainability and energy transition. The next two major climate change conferences, COP27 and COP28, will be held in Egypt and the United Arab Emirates respectively. Issuance of green bonds also allows borrowers from the region to diversify their investor base. (Agencies)

BEIJING: Taiwan's Foxconn said on Friday that production at its major China iPhone factory remains normal despite ongoing Covid restrictions. The electronics manufacturer said Covid curbs have had "little impact" on business at its Zhengzou plant, in China's Henan province. The Zhengzhou campus, which assembles Apple Inc's iPhone and has about 300,000 workers, banned all dining in the plant and required workers to take their meals back to their dormitories on Wednesday, a notice posted on the factory's official WeChat account showed. The new measures follow Zhengzhou's latest outbreak recording a total of 196 Covid cases since October 8, and come as Foxconn's factory is ramping up production of the latest iPhone 14 models. Apple did not immediately respond to a Reuters request for comment. (Agencies)

Footwear exports increase 27.07pc in Q1 FY23

ISLAMABAD: The footwear exports witnessed an increase of 27.07 percent during the first quarter of fiscal year (2022-23) as compared to the exports of corresponding period of the last year. Pakistan exported footwear worth US \$48.972 million during July-September (2022-23) against the exports of \$38.540 million during July-September (2021-22), showing growth of 27.07 percent, according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). In terms of quantity, the exports of footwear also increased by 68.86 percent by going up from 4,052 thousand pairs to 6,842 thousand pairs, according to the data. Among the footwear products, the exports of leather footwear rose by 28.68 percent as it surged from \$32.185 million last year to \$41.417 million during the current year. The canvas footwear exports of the country stood at \$ 0.250 million during the current year against \$ 0.023 million during last year, showing an increase of 987.33 percent. (APP)

Asian fast-food giant Jollibee eyes doubling sales in 5 years

MANILA: Jollibee Foods aims to double its business in the next five years by aggressively growing in the US and China, the company's president and CEO told Nikkei Asia, as the Philippine fast-food group famous for its Chickenjoy and Jolly Spaghetti plots a post-pandemic expansion. Ernesto Tanmantiong said in an interview that one of Asia's most famous restaurant chains planned to have 10,000 branches in its network by 2027 compared with close to 6,300 as of end-June. The plan would come on top of further acquisitions that the company might make, Tanmantiong said. Over the past five years, Jollibee has taken over foreign chains such as Smashburger and The Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf in the US, and the Milksha bubble tea brand in Taiwan. (Agencies)

With supermarket cashiers paid more than most teachers, thousands have joined the protests since the beginning of September, with human chains formed around schools across the country. Last Friday students burned letters threatening teachers with dismissal near the interior ministry, which has been put in charge of education by nationalist premier Viktor Orban, who restricted the right to strike in February. Another mass protest is planned for Sunday. Budapest high school teacher Katalin Torley was sacked along with four of her colleagues last month for refusing to teach classes in protest at low pay and severe restrictions on the curriculum, which critics say is biased toward Orban's conservative and nativist agenda. Torley, who has taught French for 23 years, told AFP her sacking had been "very painful teaching is the most important activity of my life. I am very attached to the pupils". (Agencies)

According to the World Health Organization, Lebanon is the latest phase of a rampaging outbreak that began in Afghanistan in June - then spread to Pakistan, Iran, Iraq and Syria. In Syria itself more than 13,000 suspected cases have been reported. including 60 deaths, according to the Syria office of Doctors Without Borders (MSF). Cholera is typically spread through contaminated water, food or sewage. It can cause severe diarrhoea and dehydration – which can kill if left untreated. Most cholera cases in Lebanon have been in the camps, among the roughly 1 million Syrians who have taken refuge over the past decade from the conflict in their homeland, according to caretaker Health Minister Firass Abiad. 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Indonesia demands skull, jewellery back from the Netherlands

AMSTERDAM: The Indonesian government is demanding artworks, natural historical objects, and complete collections back from the Netherlands. A Dutch newspaper has reported that a list has been sent to the Education, Culture, and Science Ministry in July. The objects on the list have been designated as looted art by Indonesia, thus the country is now demanding them be returned. It is not only individual masterpieces involved in the petition, but also en-

tire collections, such as the Dubois collection that is exhibited in Leiden's Naturalis Museum. The collection consists of about 40,000 fossils. The masterpiece is a skull of the so-called Java man.L, excavated in 1891 by the Dutch researcher Eugène Dubois. The skull was of crucial scientific importance in researching human evolution. Indonesia also wants the reins of Diponegoro's horse sent back to the country. Diponegoro led a Javanese revolt against Dutch colonial rule.

The Lombok Treasure is also on the list. According to the Rijksmuseum, most of it was returned in 1977 but Indonesia says the museum in Leiden still holds precious stones and gold and silver jewellery. A commission will determine whether the items on the list are defined as looted objects. The ministry has confirmed that it has received a request for restitution from Indonesia. An independent committee will now review the list of requests. (Agencies)

France to double police presence on streets by 2027

PARIS: France's Interior Minister Gérald Darmanin said Friday that the government plans to double police presence on the streets across the country by 2027. "Under the leadership of the President of the Republic (Emmanuel Macron) and the Prime Minister (Élisabeth Borne), we have taken resolute measures against crime," he said in a Twitter message in which he indicated that the presence of the Police and the Gendarmerie on French streets and public transport will be increased. Thus, he explained that about 8,500 positions will be created and recalled that robberies with

violence have decreased by 21 percent compared to September 2021, while violence in public transport has decreased by about 20 percent compared to the previous year. "I would like to point out the obvious, when a gendarme or a police officer asks a vehicle to stop, it should be done. My first trip as minister was to bury gendarme Mélanie Lemee, hit by a driver in Lot-et-Garonne," he lamented. The budget of France's Interior Ministry has risen this year to more than 21 billion euros, so 10,000 jobs have been created for police and gendarmes, according to government data. (Agencies)

Swedish PM to visit Turkey to unblock NATO bid

BRUSSELS: Sweden's new Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson said Thursday he was ready to head to Ankara to urge Turkey to back bids by Sweden and Finland to join the NATO alliance.

"I have already sent a signal to the Turkish government that we are prepared to go to Ankara immediately," Kristersson said, as he arrived for an EU leaders' summit three days after taking office. "I will do that as soon as it is suitable for them as well of course, so I'm very prepared for that." Kristersson said he aimed to show Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan that Sweden and Finland "actually do what we promised" to fulfil a deal with

Ankara to clear their path into NATO. Sweden and Finland earlier this year tore up their long-standing policies of non-alignment in the face of Russia's war on Ukraine and launched their bids to join the US-led military alliance. The move has received strong backing from the vast majority of the alliance's members but Erdogan has stalled the process over accusations the Nordic neighbours are havens for Kurdish militants hostile to Ankara. Twenty-eight of NATO's 30 allies have so far ratified the accession of Finland and Sweden -- leaving only Turkey and Hungary to sign off before they officially join the group. (Agencies)

Rohingya refugees face backlash in Bangladesh

KUTUPALONG: Rohingya refugee Noor Kamal found a sympathetic welcome in Bangladesh when he fled the soldiers rampaging through his village. But five years later, the hostility he now faces has left him pondering a dangerous return home. Much has changed in the time since he and 750,000 other members of the stateless Muslim minority group escaped neighboring Myanmar, the survivors of a horrific crackdown now subject to a United Nations genocide probe. Back then, thousands of Bangladeshis, outraged by the anti-Muslim violence across the border, trekked across the country to distribute food and medicine to the shell-shocked arrivals. But public attitudes have hardened after years of fruitless efforts to negotiate a safe return for the Rohingya, with media outlets and politicians regularly condemning refugees as drug runners and terror threats. UK opposition MP resigns over sexual misconduct case

LONDON: British lawmaker Christian Matheson resigned today after an independent panel said he breached parliament's sexual misconduct policy for making "unwanted and unwelcome" advances towards a junior staff member. The House of Commons' Independent Expert Panel (IEP) said the complaint was made in May 2021 by a young woman from Matheson's parliamentary team, who

alleged he had behaved inappropriately towards her on a number of occasions, each involving sexual misconduct. The report said Matheson, who belonged to the opposition Labour Party, accepted he had blurred the boundaries between employer and employee and been too 'fatherly' and 'friendly', but that he denied that he was sexually motivated at any time. Iranian security forces killed at least 93 people who had gathered at the same location on September 30, Oslo-based group Iran Human Rights said. Zahedan, the capital of Sistan-Baluchistan province, is one of the few Sunni-majority cities in predominantly Shia Iran. (Agencies)

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




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
