Sunak says UK's 'golden era' with China is over



LONDON: British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said on Monday that the so-called "golden era" of relations with China was over, saying Beijing's systemic challenge to Britain's interests and values was growing more acute. In his first major foreign policy speech, Sunak said Britain's approach to China needed to evolve and Beijing was "consciously competing for global influence using all the levers of state power". "Let's be clear, the so-called 'golden era' is over, along with the naive idea that trade would lead to social and political reform," Sunak said in London's financial district, a reference Chinese police. 

Rights of refugees

The essence of refugeehood is that obligation of a refugee to a country an individual is left without the protection of his or her state. Refugees are those migrants who migrate from one state to another to escape persecution. In public international law and the Westphalian system, a state is responsible for the protection of its citizens. However, those who are not protected then migrate and seek sanctuary in another state. The 1952 refugee convention defines a refugee as "someone unable or unwilling to return to their country of origin owing to a well-founded fear of being prosecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion." The UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UN-HCR) was created in 1950 by the UN General Assembly and given a remit that covered the protection of refugees worldwide. One year after the creation of the UNHCR, the refugee convention was adopted by the UN. The convention of 1951 was aimed ternational law, which is binding on at resolving the post-World War II all states. It has been stated that the crisis. This means that only those affected by the events in Europe before 1951 will be considered refugees for the convention. However, the convention has been extended beyond those limitations by the 1967 protocol to refugees from all around the world. The convention is also supplemented by other international instruments, including the ICCPR (1966), the convention on the rights of the child (1989), the convention against torture, and the (ICERD). There are also regional instruments that relate to refugees, for example in Latin America there are several relevant international treaties. Similarly, the convention and its optional protocol were further stressed by the world conference on human rights held in Vienna in 1993, and has been repeatedly affirmed by the general assembly, which stated and complemented the convention and its protocol as "the cornerstone of the international system for the protection of the refugees". The convention also consists of a list that contains certain obligations which apply to both state parties and refu-

to conform to law and measures of public order. According to Article 3, the state must apply conventions to refugees without discrimination. Refugees should also be provided with the same favourable treatment as accorded to their nationals to practice their religion (Article.4). The list of the rights given to refugees in the convention goes on to ensure that they are equally treated as nationals of the state. Article 33 gives us one of the important principles of the convention which is non-refoulement. According to A.33, refugees must not be forced to return to their home country once they have entered the receiving state. The importance of the convention can be seen from the fact that the non-refoulement principle has been reflected in several universal and regional human rights instruments. It is now recognised as a general principle of customary instate practice in refugee content. However, looking at the other side, the principle was contentious at the time of the drafting of the convention, and it also remains today. This is because governments were concerned that they were under an obligation to allow an unlimited number of persons to claim status as refugees once they crossed a national border. Moreover, considering the statistics of refugees around the world, there are millions of refugees internally and outside of their countries. According to the UN-HCR, some 2.6 million Afghan refugees live in more than 70 countries around the world. A majority of around 95 percent are hosted by just two countries, the Islamic Republic of Iran and Pakistan. Recently these Afghan refugees are being made to return to Afghanistan because of the increased burden they are causing to these already developed countries. This act of forcing refugees out of the host countries clearly shows the violation of the principle of non-refoulement. Now according to UNHCR, the refugee crisis in South Sudan is the world's fastest growing.

Cyber crimes need strong mechanism

CYBER crime is a criminal activity whcih either targets or uses a computer, a computer network or a networked device. In a broader definition, any crime done with the help of a computer and a network is known as Cyber crime. Cyber crimes are increasing with every single day in every country including in Pakistan. Most cyber crimes are committed by cyber criminals or hackers who want to make money. However, occasionally cybercrime aims to damage computers or networks for reasons other than profit. There are three major categories of cyber crimes which include crimes against people, crimes against property and crimes against government. Email, WhatsApp, Instagram, Twitter and Facebook are the most frequently used means in cyber crimes. With the advent of 5G and 6G technologies, the digitization and automation have become continuous, thus there has been a proportional increase in nity of a natural person, malicious the number of cybercrimes. Cyber security ventures estimate that, by 2025, cybercrime will cost the world a mammoth 10.5 trillion USD per annum. Cyber crime increases 83% in Pakistan as recently told during the meeting of the Standing Committee on Information Technology and Telecommunication. A major portion of Pakistan's cybercrime legislation has been influenced by foreign cyber crime legislation. It is divided into 43 categories that deal with various forms of cyber offences in Pakistan. The Electronic Transactions Ordinance (ETO) 2002 was first enacted IT-related legislation in Pakistan and still in the field. How-

The existing law dealing with cyber crime is the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act, 2016 ("Act"), being applicable to every citizen of Pakistan wherever he may be and to every other person who is stationed in Pakistan for the time being. This law provides a comprehensive framework for all forms of cybercrime including internet crimes, unauthorized data access (hacking), credit card fraud, child pornography and solicitation, glorification of offence, hate speech, unauthorized issuance of SIM card, tempering of communication equipment, making, obtaining or supplying device for use in offence, violation of digcode, cyber bullying, cyber stalking, spamming, spoofing, online intellectual property infringements, Identity theft electronic forgery and electronic fraud and cyber terrorism. Cyber criminals in Pakistan may face a variety of sanctions prescribed under sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26 of Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act, 2016. The offences and punishment is depending on the crime and can range from six months to ten years with fine up-to five million rupees or both. The regulations of these laws are applicable to everyone in Pakistan who commits cybercrime, regardless of country of citizenship. Presently, Federal

Investigation Agency (FIA) serves as a cyber law enforcement agency under Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act, 2016. Though as per section 29 of Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act, 2016, the federal government was required to establish a new law enforcement agency as the investigating agency for the purposes of investigation of offences under PECA Act 2016, but such agency has still not been established, which resultantly hampering the spirit and mandate of law. For the time being, FIA has been designated as investigating agency under PECA law, which in the present modern circumstances, lacks the capacity and resources to handle, investigate and to conclude successfully prosecution of these most advanced technological offences, resultantly, despite have stringent laws, the implementation is weak and the Cyber crimes are increasing day by day. Further, though National Cyber Security Policy has been approved by the federal government in 2021 for data safety and privacy of local users with the mandate to have a central body to oversee implementation, remove bureaucratic hurdles and to carry out capacity building for changing landscape of cyber threats but there is no significant headway and the points pledged in policy are awaiting for implementation. Thus there is a need to immediately establish a new agency as proposed in Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act by providing them with the best forensic laboratories and to recruit those persons in the agency who would be experts for investigating cyber crimes. 

The most-active wheat contract on the Chicago Board of Trade (CBOT) rose 0.5% to \$7.84-3/4 a bushel, as of 0434 GMT, after dropping on Monday to

Japan PM wants defence budget to reach 2pc of GDP by 2027

TOKYO: Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida has told his cabinet to increase defence spending to 2% of GDP by 2027, up from a longstanding level of around 1%. Kishida announced the plan to his defence and finance ministers late Monday, as Japan overhauls its defence and security strategies to address growing threats from China as well as the changing geopolitical landscape after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. In August, the defence ministry submitted a \$40 billion budget request, but the figure will not be



finalised until the government completes updates to several defence policies. "We'll take budgetary measures to increase spending on defence and other outlays to 2% of current GDP

by 2027," Defence Minister Yasukazu Hamada told reporters after talks with Kishida. Japan's defence spending has been set at around 1% of GDP or less for decades, but Kishida's Liberal Democratic Party has signalled plans to boost that figure closer to the NATO standard of 2%. Growing pressure from China, including military exercises and the presence of boats around islands disputed with Japan, as well as Russia's invasion of its neighbour, have helped build support for increased spending. (Agencies)

Russia discusses 'gas union' with Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan

possible "gas union" with Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan to support shipments between the three countries and to other energy buyers, including China, senior Russian officials said on Tuesday. Russian deputy prime minister Alexander Novak, who mentioned shipments to China, provided no details of the plan. Meanwhile, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said the details of the agreement were yet to be discussed, but the key idea was coordinating supply plans. He cited the example of northern Kazakhstan which imports gas from Russia and where the Astana government is considering building a pipeline to provide the region with Kazakh gas. Russia, at the same time, is increasing production in nearby eastern Siberia, he said, tries. (Agencies)

MOSCOW: Russia is discussing a hinting that Kazakhstan could avoid spending "tens of billions of dollars" on pipelines by committing to Russian imports. Kazakh president Kassym-Jomart Tokayev's spokesman said on Tuesday Russian president Vladimir Putin proposed such an idea in a meeting with Tokayev on Monday. He provided no details. While Russia is a major natural gas exporter, Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan produce roughly as much as they consume. However, both pipelines mostly pump gas from Turkmenistan, while Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan have never reported any transit shipments of Russian gas to China or any other coun-

Pakistan receives \$500m from AIIB: finance ministry

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has received fallouts of economic crisis. The de-\$500 million from the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB), the Ministry of Finance stated on Tuesday. "Government of Pakistan has today received \$500 million from AIIB. The funds are deposited with the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) and will augment our reserves," the ministry said in a post on its Twitter handle. KARACHI: Pakistani rupee declined by 16 paisas to settle at Rs224.11 against the US dollar Tuesday during trading in the interbank market. On Monday, the value of the rupee fell by a paisa to Rs223.95 against the greenback. Meanwhile, the rupee's spot was seen to be dropping by two paisas on Friday. The rupee marked losses of around 11 paisas to Rs223.92 against the US dollar during interbank trading. The depreciation run for the rupee against the US dollar began on Wednesday, after experiencing a brief upswing a day before. With economic instability, the rupee has lost consecutively five sessions in the interbank market, but remained within the level of Rs223. (Agencies)

S&P Global lowers 2023 growth forecast

LONDON: S&P Global Ratings lowered its 2023 growth forecast for emerging economies on Tuesday. citing persistent pressures from the Russia-Ukraine conflict, a lingering Covid-19 pandemic and tight monetary policy conditions. The ratings agency now projects real gross domestic product growth of 3.8% next year, down from its previous forecast of a 4.1% expansion. "The downward revision to growth comes from all EMs (emerging markets) excluding China and Saudi Arabia, with most economies poised to expand below their longer-run trend rates," it said, adding that forecasts for 2024 and 2025 remain broadly unchanged, averaging at 4.3%. Asian markets rise after calm night in China

BEIJING: Asian equities rose, and the dollar weakened Tuesday as China avoided another night of protests after a weekend of unrest across the country fuelled uncertainty in the world's number two economy. The gains were led by a rally in Hong Kong and Shanghai, with property firms enjoying a much-needed surge on the back of moves to ease funding restrictions on troubled developers. However, sentiment was tempered by warnings from top Federal Reserve policymakers that US interest rates would rise further and could go higher than initially thought to fight inflation. (Agencies)

Irish regulator fines Facebook €265m over data breach

DUBLIN: Ireland's data privacy regulator imposed a €265 million fine on social media giant Facebook today, bringing the total it has fined parent group Meta to almost €1 billion. The penalty resulted from an investigation, started last year, into the discovery of had been scraped from Facebook between May 2018 and September 2019, and made available online. Facebook was also ordered to make a range of corrective measures. Meta said it had cooperated fully with the investigation by Ireland's data privacy commissioner (DPC) and made changes to its systems during the time in question, including removing the ability to scrape



a collated set of personal data that its features in this way using phone numbers. Today's fine is the fourth the DPC has levied against one of Meta's companies. It is Meta's lead privacy regulator within the European Union, and has 13 more inquiries into the social media group outstanding. 

US rejects China's objections to South China Sea mission

BEIJING: The U.S. Navy on Tuesday dismissed Beijing's protests against a "freedom of navigation operation" conducted near a Chinese-held island in the South China Sea. The latest incident drew renewed attention to one of the world's potential military hotspots. In an unusual move, China's Navy 7th Fleet refuted objections to Tuesday's mission, calling it "the latest in a long line of (Chinese) actions to misrepresent legitimate US naval operations and assert its excessive and illegitimate maritime claims." . South China Sea. China claims almost all of the territory. The Navy said China's far-reaching maritime claims pose a

serious threat to freedom of navigation and overflights, free trade and unhindered trade, and freedom of economic opportunity for South China Sea riparian countries. "As long as some countries continue to claim and enforce limitations on rights that exceed their authority under international law, the United States will continue to defend the rights and freedoms of the sea guaranteed to all," it said. The Navy said Tuesday its guided missile cruiser USS Chancelorsville "asserted navigational rights and freedoms in the South China Sea near the Spratly Islands, consistent with international law." China called the action illegal and said it had mobilized naval and air forces to issue warnings and drive the ship away. "The actions of the US military have seriously violated China's sovereignty and security, which is another ironclad testimony to its pursuit of navigational hegemony and militarization of the South China Sea, (Agencies)

Iran acknowledges 300 dead in unrest

TEHRAN: An Iranian general acknowledged that more than 300 people have been killed in the unrest surrounding nationwide protests, giving the first official word on casualties in two months. That estimate is considerably lower than the toll reported by Human Rights Activists in Iran, a U.S.-based group that has been closely tracking the protests since they erupted after the Sept. 16 death of a young woman being held by the country's morality police. The activist group says 451 protesters and 60 security forces have been killed since the start of the unrest and that more than 18,000 people have been detained. The protests were sparked by the death of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini, who was detained for allegedly violating the Islamic Republic's strict dress code. They quickly escalated into calls for the overthrow of Iran's theocracy and pose one of the most serious challenges to the ruling clerics since the 1979 revolution that brought them to power. (Agencies)

Suitcase murder suspect extradited to NZ

WELLINGTON: A 42-year-old woman has been extradited from South Korea to New Zealand, where she is to appear in court charged with murdering two children whose remains were found in suitcases sold at auction. New Zealand police said that "three police officers travelled to South Korea to transport the woman", who arrived at Auckland Airport in the afternoon and was taken to Manukau Police Station. Seoul's justice ministry said that key evidence in the case had also been handed to New Zealand officials. "We hope that the truth of this case, which has received worldwide attention, will be revealed through a fair and strict judicial process in New Zealand," said an official in Seoul. The suspect is due to appear in court on Wednesday, a police spokesperson said. "She will be held in custody overnight when she will then be expected to appear in the Manukau District Court on two charges of murder," police added.

World's largest volcano erupts in Hawaii

HAWAII: The world's largest active volcano burst into life for the first time in 40 years, spewing lava and hot ash Monday in a spectacular display of nature's fury by Mauna Loa in Hawaii. Rivers of molten rock could be seen high up on the volcano, venting huge clouds of steam and smoke at the summit on Big Island, and sparking warnings the situation could change rapidly. Pressure has been building at Mauna Loa for years, according to the United States Geological Survey, which reported the eruption could be seen from 45 miles (72 kilometers) away, in the town of Kona the west coast of Hawaii's main island. The eruption, which began shortly before midnight Sunday, was initially contained within the caldera—the concave area at the top of the volcano-but vulcanologists said Monday lava was now escaping from cracks in its side. "The eruption of Mauna Loa has migrated from the summit to the Northeast Rift Zone where fissures are feeding several lava flows," the USGS said on its website. (Agencies)

Smog engulfs New Delhi as winter pollution worsens

India's capital New Delhi on Tuesday as air pollution worsened with the setting in of winter, shooting up concentrations of fine particles in the air three times above the acceptable limits. The world's most polluted capital city struggles to breathe easy every winter as cold temperatures and calm winds trap pollutants closer to the ground. "As the minimum temperature is dropping, gradual fog occurrence during early morning hours is likely to increase, leading to the deterioration of air quality index (AQI)," said

NEW DELHI: Thick smog engulfed the federal government's System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting and Research (SAFAR) in a daily bulletin. The AQI in parts of the city shot up above 400 on Tuesday, which is classified as the 'severe' category of air pollution, according to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB). The level of fine particles measuring 2.5 micrograms or PM2.5 was 180 micrograms per cubic metre of air as of 10am in the Delhi National Capital Region, CPCB data showed, three times above the 24-hour acceptable limit of 60 micrograms per cubic metre of air. Australia rejects Unesco endangered status for Barrier Reef

SYDNEY: Australia said Tuesday it plans to lobby against UN plans to add the Great Barrier Reef to a list of endangered Unesco World Heritage sites. Conservation experts working with the UN warned on Monday that the world's largest coral reef would be added to the list of endangered World Heritage sites. The Great Barrier Reef, on the northeastern coast of Australia, has been on Unesco's World Heritage List since 1981. But if the UN decides to designate the reef as endangered, it puts the Australian government on notice that the site could be removed from the



World Heritage list altogether. Australia's Environment Minister Tanya Pibersek said that there was "no need to single the Great Barrier Reef in this way" and that her government will lobby against adding the reef to an endangered list. (Agencies)

BANGKOK: A Buddhist temple lagers are worried that they canin Thailand has been left without monks after the clerics who served there all tested positive for methamphetamine and were immediately defrocked, a local official said Tuesday. UK to alter internet rules plan after free speech outcry

LONDON: The British government Critics had expressed concern that firms to remove internet content that is harmful but legal, after the proposal drew strong criticism from lawmakers and civil liberties groups. The U.K. on Tuesday defended its decision to water down the Online Safety Bill, an ambitious but controversial attempt to crack down on online racism, sexual abuse, bullying, fraud and other harmful material. Similar efforts are underway in the European Union and the United States, but the U.K.'s was one of the most sweeping. In its original form, the bill gave regulators wide-ranging powers to sanction digital and social media companies like Google, Facebook, Twitter and TikTok.

has abandoned a plan to force tech a requirement for the biggest platforms to remove "legal but harmful" content could lead to censorship and undermine free speech. The Conservative government of Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, who took office last month, has now dropped that part of the bill, saying it could "over-criminalize" online content. The government hopes the change will be enough to get the bill through Parliament, where it has languished for 18 months, by mid-2023. Digital Secretary Michelle Donelan said the change removed the risk that "tech firms or future governments could use the laws as a license to censor legitimate views." (Agencies)

Divorces drop, marriages rise after pandemic in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR: Marriages in Malaysia rebounded in 2021 as divorces fell further, indicating that Malaysian couples may be more hesitant about separating after the coronavirus pandemic. A total of 214,943 marriages were registered last year, a 15% increase compared to 186,297 in 2020 when marriage plans were disrupted by the pandemic, according to the Malaysian Department of Statistics. The total number of di-

vorces fell 7.1% to 43,934. Non-Muslim marriages declined 4.7%, with the number of inter-ethnic marriages increasing 11.7%, making up almost 8% of total marriages. Muslim divorces dropped 16.4%. Malaysia joined Australia and Singapore in the increasing trend of marriage rate last year, as brides increased to 47.4 per thousand from 44.6, with grooms rising to 45.8 per thousand. (Agencies)

Three Palestinians killed by Israeli fire

JERUSALEM: Three Palestinian men were killed by Israeli fire during separate incidents in the occupied West Bank, the Palestinian Health Ministry said Tuesday. They were the latest deadly incidents in a mounting surge of Israeli-Palestinian violence and soaring tensions, less than a week after a bombing in Jerusalem killed two Israelis. The official Palestinian news agency Wafa reported that clashes erupted between Israeli forces and residents north of the city of Hebron in the West Bank. The Israeli military said soldiers shot at Palestinians who hurled rocks and improvised explosive devices at the forces operating in the town. The army said the Palestinians also shot at the troops, and two army vehicles got stuck due to mechanical issues. The Palestinian Health Ministry identified the man killed near Hebron as Mufid Khalil, 44, and said at least eight other people were wounded by live fire in the incident. (Agencies)

UAE's Moon mission ready for launch

ABU DHABI: The United Arab Emirates' Rashid Rover, the first Emirati mission to the moon surface, has been integrated onto a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket for its historic launch on Wednesday. The four-wheel rover has undergone its final integration process with the launch vehicle - the Hakuto-R Mission 1 lander which will launch from a spaceport at the Cape Canaveral Space Force Station in Florida at 12:39 pm UAE time. Residents across the UAE will be able to watch the launch online which will be streamed live by SpaceX. It marks the UAE's first Moon mission, with more rovers to be developed in the future. The Rashid rover - built by Emirati engineers from the UAE's Mohammed bin Rashid Space Centre (MBRSC) - is to be sent to regions of the Moon unexplored by humans. (Agencies)

EU updates drone rules against malicious use

BRUSSELS: The European Commission today updated drone rules in a bid to boost a fast-growing commercial market while measures to tackle the malicious use of drones will be adopted in the near future. Drones are increasingly used in agriculture, environment, surveillance, urban planning, security and warfare, raising concerns about noise, safety and privacy. According to analysts, the United States, Israel, China and Turkey are the world's top four producers of drones. "We believe that if our strategy is implemented properly, the drone market could be worth €14.5 billion (RM21 billion) by 2030. It could also create 145,000 new jobs in the European Union," Transport Commissioner Adina Valean told a news conference. The Commission said measures to tackle the malicious use of drones are needed because they are vulnerable to hacking and misuse. (Agencies)

Number of Muslims in UK up 44% in a decade

LONDON: The Muslim population of the UK has risen 44 percent in a decade, according to the latest census figures published by the Office for National Statistics. Of the country's total population, 6.5 percent — 3.9 million people — are adherents of Islam. Meanwhile, the second most common ethnic group in the UK is now "Asian, Asian British or Asian Welsh," making up 9.3 percent of the population.

In figures showing that the UK has diversified apace since the last census in 2011, London is now twothirds ethnic minority, while other major cities such as Leicester, Luton and Birmingham have become home to "minority majorities," driven by significant increases in Asian communities from Pakistan, Bangladesh, India and East Africa. The census is a survey of trends across the UK that is undertaken every 10 years to provide as accurate a picture of the makeup of the country as possible. (Agencies)
