RAMALLAH (Agencies): Israeli police raided Al-Aqsa Mosque in Jerusalem on Wednesday, leading to increased tensions in the Palestinian territories. According to reports, officers severely beat and arrested numerous worshippers injured around 50 people, and prevented ambulances from reaching the site. The Palestinian Red Crescent stated that its teams had dealt with 12 injuries during clashes near the mosque and outside the city walls. Additionally, three people were hospitalized, and 25 people with injuries were arrested but later released from Israeli detention centers. Al-Aqsa Mosque is the third-holiest site in Islam, and the Grand Mosque in Makkah and the Prophet's Mosque in Madinah are the holiest.

PALM BEACH (AFP/APP): Donald Trump offered a full-throated defense of his conduct Tuesday in his first public remarks since being charged over hush money payments to a film star, blasting the criminal prosecution as "an insult to our country." Hours earlier the 76-year-old former US president pleaded not guilty to 34 felony counts in a dramatic hearing in New York that transfixed the nation -- and began the countdown to the first-ever criminal trial of an American president. "I never thought anything like this could happen in America -- never thought it could happen," Trump told an audience of several hundred donors, political allies and other supporters after returning to Mar-a-Lago, his beachfront mansion in southern Florida.

Japan changes aid rules; to fund defence projects of friendly nations

"By enhancing their security and deterrence capabilities, OSA aims to deepen our security cooperation with the countries, to create a desirable security environment for Japan," a statement released by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on Wednesday said. The aid will not be used to buy lethal weapons that recipient countries could use in conflicts with other nations in accordance with the three principles that govern arms exports, according to the statement. Specific projects are expected to include satellite communication and radio systems for maritime surveillance, and preparations are underway for the tary might in Asia.

Dutch refinery to feed airlines' thirst for clean fuel

ROTTERDAM (AFP/APP): Scaffolding and green pipes envelop a refinery in the port of Rotterdam where Finnish giant Neste is preparing to significantly boost production of sustainable aviation fuel. Switching to non-fossil aviation fuels that produce less net greenhouse gas emissions is key to plans to decarbonise air transport, a significant contributor to global warming. Neste, the largest global producer of SAF, uses cooking oil and

animal fat at this Dutch refinery. Sustainable aviation fuels are being made from different sources such as municipal waste, leftovers from the agricultural and forestry industry, crops and plants, and even hydrogen. These technologies are still developing and the end product is more expensive. But these fuels will help airlines reduce CO2 emissions by up to 80 percent, according to the International Air Transport Association.

France's Macron begins China trip with Ukraine, trade on agenda


BEIJING (AFP/APP): French President Emmanuel Macron was due in Beijing on Wednesday for a visit in which he hopes to dissuade China from supporting Russia's invasion of Ukraine, while also forging closer ties with a crucial trade partner. Macron will look to stand firm on Ukraine during talks with his counterpart Xi Jinping and offer "another path" from the directly confrontational tone often heard from Washington, an official from his office told reporters before the three-day trip. The French leader's aims include preserving and rebalancing China's trade ties with Europe as well as safeguarding French interests in the Asia-Pacific region, where Paris sees itself as a player due to its overseas territories and military deployments. On the eve of his visit, Macron discussed his trip to China and support for Ukraine during a phone call with US President



Joe Biden, the White House said. The two leaders said they want China to help "accelerate" the search for a solution to the war, according to a French diplomatic source. The conversation showed the "common will of France and the United States to engage the Chinese to accelerate with us the end of the war in Ukraine and build a lasting peace", the source said. The US and French presidents also hope to "obtain from the Chinese a contribution to the global effort of North-South solidarity" and to build "a common agenda" on climate and biodiversity.





Wildlife Preservation

It would appear that the districts of Zhob and Qamardin in Balochistan have become home to illegal camps set up for hunting cranes, despite the bird's status as an endangered species. Time and time again, we have observed a conservational crisis present itself and despite passing legislation to counter it, we have been unsuccessful in discouraging such predatory practices for the long-term. It was the Chief Minister of Balochistan, Mir Abdul Quddus Bizenjo, who directed the authorities' attention towards the illegal hunting of cranes in the province. He complained about the lack of legal action against hunters and insisted that without such intervention, such biodiversity may be lost entirely. This is not a new phenomenon for Pakistan; just a few years ago, the Supreme Court (SC) outlawed the killing of the houbara bustard which is threatened with global extinction. Fines have been imposed for violations but at the same time, the government still sells permits to Arab royalty for hunting the bird. Similarly, experts have expressed concerns about the alarming decline of the snow leopard population in northern regions due to global warming, hunting and habitat destruction. The same threat is responsible for the dwindling populations of the ibex and markhor. Very evidently so, successful governments have failed to protect such vulnerable species from being endangered nor have they been able to enact policy measures that aim to eradicate illegal hunting. Pakistan is lucky enough to be located in a geographical location that enables it to foster different kinds of geologies at the same time. With this comes the added advantage of being home to rare species that not only attract international attention but open up opportunities for research, funding and conservation projects. A healthy ecology will undoubtedly prove to be a major benefit but the government must take the matter seriously first.

This article is not about the many pend- of the January 6 insurrection and his ing criminal investigations and indictments facing former President Donald Trump on local, state, and federal levels. These include a New York State investigation into tax evasion and the recent indictment charging him with falsifying records to cover up hush money payments to avoid scandal; a Georgia investigation into his efforts to pressure election officials to change the results of the 2020 vote count; and federal investigations into his repeated failure to comply with requests to return classified documents and his efforts to incite violence to subvert and overturn the results of the certification of the 2020 election. Instead, what has prompted this column was a recent article in an Israeli newspaper that posed the question "Does Netanyahu Hate Israel?" and went on to describe the many ways that the Israeli prime minister, in order to save himself from criminal prosecutions, is attempting to gut the country's judiciary. To build the Knesset majority he needed to secure his immunity, Netanyahu made concessions to far right and ultra-Orsocietal angst that has brought the country to its knees. This description of the Israeli leader putting his personal interests ahead of the country he leads is strikingly similar to Mr. Trump's behaviour since he began running for the Presidency in 2015, leading me to ask the question: "Does Donald Trump Hate America?" Mr. Trump's most fervent followers would answer: "Of course, he loves America. He's going to make America great again." But after examining his rhetoric and actions, especially those in recent days, one is left wondering exactly what America Mr. Trump is talking about. While nominally affiliated with and embraced by the Republican Party, Mr Trump clearly doesn't share that party's historic respect for law enforcement or the institutions of state. For example, he held his most recent campaign rally in Waco, Texas on the 30th anniversary of the deadly Waco shoot-out between federal law enforcement and a weaponized religious cult. That event has become a cause célèbre for far-right militias nationwide as an example of government overreach. The Waco rally began with a video of a choir comprised of inmates imprisoned for participating in the 6 January 2021 violent insurrection at the US Capitol. First,







J&J proposes US\$8.9bil settlement of talc cancer claims

NEW YORK (Agencies): US pharmaceutical giant Johnson & Johnson on Tuesday proposed a US\$8.9 billion settlement to resolve yearsold lawsuits claiming that its talcum powder products caused cancer. The New Jersey-based company said the proposed settlement, which needs the approval of a bankruptcy court, "will equitably and efficiently

resolve all claims arising from cosmetic talc litigation." J&J has been facing thousands of lawsuits over talcum powder containing traces of asbestos blamed for causing ovarian cancer. The firm has never admitted wrongdoing but stopped selling the talc-based baby powder in the US and Canada in May 2020. "The company continues to believe that

these claims are specious and lack scientific merit," Erik Haas, J&J's vice-president of litigation, said in a statement.J&J said the US\$8.9 billion would be paid to the tens of thousands of claimants over 25 years through a J&J subsidiary, LTL Management LLC, which was set up to address the claims and has filed for bankruptcy protection.

China's banking crackdown picks up pace with fresh probe

BEIJING (APP): Chinese authorities have launched a probe into the former chairman and party chief of state-owned China Everbright Group, the latest sign that the country's crackdown on corruption in the financial sector is picking up pace. Li Xiaopeng is suspected of "serious violations of discipline and law," the Central Commission for Discipline Inspection and the State Supervision Commission said in a one-sentence statement. The announcement came after the anti-graft body said last week it will start a fresh round of checks at more than 30

state-owned companies. As part of the inspection, they will also "look back" at five financial firms that had been previously targeted, including China Everbright Group. China's US\$60 trillion finance industry is being rocked by a clampdown that has become its most extensive since beginning in late 2021. It comes amid a broader push to rein in risks in the sector as policymakers seek to restore growth, manage the economic fallout of fraved ties with the US and step up their charm offensive with foreign business and private industry.

The move urged the World Trade Organization of the three nations in alignment to to scrutinise US-led technology export restrictions aimed at curbing its ability to make advanced chips, state television said on Wednesday. Chinese representatives told a regular WTO meeting this week that Japan, the Netherlands and the US should report their plans and subsequent measures to the body, which it urged to step up supervision on the matter, broadcaster CCTV said. On Tuesday, the commerce ministry said Beijing was seriously concerned about Japan's export curbs on chip-making equipment and called for it to cor-

curb chip exports to China "violates the fairness and transparency principles of WTO", CCTV said. Last week. without specifying China as the target, Japan had said it would restrict export of 23 types of semiconductor manufacturing equipment, a move in line with Washington's curbs announced last October. That came after the Netherlands said last month that it also planned to limit similar exports, such as those from ASML Holding NV, which dominates the market for lithography systems used to create chips' minute circuitry.



Embiid — one of the front-runners for the NBA's regular season Most Valuable Player award — produced a towering performance in a 103-101 victory in Philadelphia that all but extinguished second-placed Boston's hopes of winning the top-seeding in the East. the playoffs. Embiid finished with 52 points from 20-of-25 shooting while hauling in 13 rebounds and laying on six assists, while James Harden finished with 20 points. P.J. However, the third-placed Sixers were given a scare down the stretch, when they almost blew a 103-96 lead with just 10 seconds remaining to allow Boston to get back to within two points.


Ronaldo double keeps Al-Nassr on track for the title

Ukraine to buy 100 Rosomak armored vehicles from Poland

WARSAW (Agencies): Ukraine will acquire 100 eight-wheel-drive Rosomak armored modular vehicles from Poland for its armed forces, Polish Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki announced during a visit to the Polish plant that makes the vehicles. "The Ukrainian Army will buy from us 100 units of the Rosomak, which is produced in Siemianowice 1 skie. Rosomaks are top-shelf combat vehicles," Morawiecki said in a Facebook post on April 1. Ukraine will pay for the vehicles with the use of the funds it has obtained from the Europe-

India orders Army communications satellite



NEW DELHI (Agencies): India is buying a 29.63 billion rupees (U.S. \$360.52 communications satellite, dubbed GSAT 7B, for its Army. Currently, the service is using 30% of the communications capabilities provided by the GSAT 7A, a satellite designed for the Air Force. A Defence Ministry statement issued March 29 said the government awarded the satellite contract to state-run NewSpace India Ltd., a commercial arm of the national space agency, the Indian Space Research Organisation. The launch of the 5-ton geostationary satellite is to take place in three and a half years. As prime contractor, NewSpace India is to source numerous parts, subassemblies and systems from domestic small- and medium-scale enterprises as well as startup companies to promote the country's private space industry. The satellite will considerably enhance the Army's capabilities by providing mission-critical, beyond-line-of-sight communication for troops and materiel, the ministry said. The satellite will operate at both X band and Ku band frequencies, and is meant to improve communication connectivity to provide network-centric warfare capabilities. The GSAT 7B will also help the Army enhance its surveillance of contested border areas with China and Pakistan. The satellite is also expected to provide integrated communication for the Navy and Air Force. It will comprise two units, one of which will operate in space and the other on the ground.

US gains military access to Philippine bases close to Taiwan and South China Sea



on Monday identified the locations of four new military bases the US will gain access to, as part of an expanded defense agreement analysts say is aimed at combating China. The four bases include three on the main island of Luzon, close to Taiwan, and one in Palawan province in the South China Sea (SCS). The US has stepped up efforts to expand its Indo-Pacific security options in recent months, amid mounting concerns over China's aggressive territorial posturing throughout the region. The new locations, opened up under the 2014 Enhanced Defense Cooperation Arrangement (EDCA), will allow the US to rotate troops to a total of nine bases throughout the Philippines, including on the strategically important Balabac Island close to Chinese installations in the South China Sea. "These new locations will strengthen the interoperability of the United States and Philippine Armed Forces and allow us to respond more seamlessly together to address a range of shared challenges in the Indo-Pacific region, including natural and humanitarian disasters," said deputy Pentagon press secretary Sabrina Singh during a briefing Monday.

The official Syrian Arab News Agency (SANA) quoted local sources as saying that the US convoy had included "60 army trucks loaded with containers of weapons, ammunition, advanced armored vehicles, 40 oil-stealing tanks," adding that it had entered Syrian territories through the "illegal Al-Waleed border crossing." "The convoy, coming from the US bases in Iraq, headed to the Syrian town of Al-Yarubiyah," the sources said, noting that the convoy had ultimately "settled in the Syri-



an Jazira region." The sources pointed out that the American supplies were meant "to support the Syrian Democratic Forces - known as "Qasd" - on one hand, and to arm its affiliated groups in Homs' Jazira and At Tanf bases." The latter, SANA reported, is where the US carries out attacks on state infrastructure, as well as sites belonging to the Syrian Arab Army.

Global Pharma: FDA says India firm linked to US eye drop deaths broke safety norms



MARYLAND (Agencies): The Indian manufacturer of eye drops linked to three deaths and serious infections in the US violated several safety norms, the country's top regulator has said. Cryptocurrency surges as Musk changes Twitter logo to 'meme dog'

PARIS (AFP/APP): A meme-inspired cryptocurrency's price jumped on Tuesday after Elon Musk changed the bluebird logo of Twitter to a dog associated with the digital token, despite the mogul being sued over his previous promotion of the coin. Musk bought Twitter in October last year for \$44 billion and has since slashed the workforce, introduced paid-for accounts and reinstated banned users including former president Donald Trump. His decision to change the



logo to a Shiba Inu dog, whether permanent or another short-lived joke, caused the price of dogecoin to surge by more than 25 percent, from below \$0.08 to more than \$0.10.

OPEC+ production cuts likely to lift oil prices above \$100 a barrel

SINGAPORE/SEOUL (Agencies): The OPEC+ group's surprise additional production cuts could push oil prices back toward \$100 a barrel, tighten the market and encourage refiners to diversify supplies, analysts and traders said. Oil prices jumped more than \$4 a barrel on Monday after the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and their allies including Russia announced further production cuts of about 1.16 million barrels per day from May through the rest of the year. The pledges will bring the total volume of cuts by the group known as OPEC+ since November to 3.66 million bpd according to Reuters calculations, equal to 3.7 percent of the global demand. OPEC+ had been expected to hold output steady this year, having already cut by 2 million bpd in November 2022. Rystad Energy said it believed the cuts will add to tightness in the oil market and lift prices



above \$100 a barrel for the rest of year, possibly taking Brent as high as \$110 this summer. UBS also expects Brent to reach \$100 by June, while Goldman Sachs raised its December forecast by \$5 to \$95. Goldman said strategic petroleum reserve releases in the US and in France, due to ongoing strikes, as well as Washington's refusal to refill its SPR in the 2023 fiscal year, may have prompted the OPEC+ action. An official at a South Korean refiner said the cut was "bad news" for oil buyers and OPEC was seeking to "protect their profit" against concerns of a global economic slowdown.

UK airport scraps 100ml liquid rule with scanners



LONDON (Agencies): London City Airport has scrapped the 100ml liquid limit by using high-tech scanners which also allow electronics to be kept in hand luggage at security. Travellers can now carry on up to two litres of liquid, and toiletries no longer have to be put in separate bags. It is the second UK airport to use this technology in all its security lanes, after Teesside introduced it in March. The government has set a June 2024 deadline for most UK airports to install the machines. London City Airport has brought in the C3 scanners which takes high-resolution 3D images of bags. Passengers at other airports currently have to remove items such as tablets, laptops and liquids from hand luggage for security checks. The current rules were introduced in November 2006, at the end of a ban on liquids in the cabin, when British police said they had foiled a plot to blow up as many as 10 planes using explosives hidden in drinks.

UN says Afghan women staff blocked from work by Taliban



UNITED NATIONS (AFP/APP): The Taliban have extended a ban on women working for NGOs to the United Nations' mission throughout the country, a UN spokesman announced Tuesday calling such an order "unacceptable." The United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA) had said earlier in the day that UN women employees had been blocked from work in eastern Nangarhar province. "UNAMA received word of an order by the de facto authorities that bans female national staff members of the United Nations from working," spokesman for the secretary-general, Stephane Dujarric, told reporters, adding that the UN had heard "from various conduits that this applies to the whole country." The UN had so far been exempt from a December Taliban order for all foreign and domestic NGOs to stop women personnel working across the crisis-stricken nation. Dujarric said no written order had yet been received, but that the UN was to hold meetings with the Taliban on Wednesday in Kabul to "seek some clarity." For UN chief Antonio Guterres. Duiarric said, "any such ban would be unacceptable and frankly, inconceivable." "This is the latest in a disturbing trend undermining the ability of aid organizations to reach those most in need," he added. After the ban announced last year, several NGOs suspended their entire operations in protest, piling further misery on Afghanistan's 38 million citizens, half of whom are facing hunger according to aid agencies.
