'Special' service: Declassified Guantanamo court filing suggests some 9/11 hijackers were CIA agents

WASHINGTON (Agencies): An explosive court filing from the Guantanamo Military Commission - a court considering the cases of defendants accused of carrying out the "9/11" terrorist attacks on New York - has seemingly confirmed the unthinkable. The document was originally published via a Guantanamo Bay court docket, but while public, it was completely redacted. Independent researchers obtained an unexpurgated copy. It is an account by the Commission's lead investigator, DEA veteran Don Canestraro, of his personal probe of potential Saudi government involvement in the 9/11 attacks, conducted at the request of the defendants' lawyers. Two of the hijackers were being closely monitored by the CIA and may, wittingly or not, have been recruited by Langley long before they flew planes into the World Trade Center buildings.

Of the great many enduring mysteries of the 9/11 attacks still unresolved over two decades later, perhaps the biggest and gravest relate to the activities of Nawaf al-Hazmi and Khalid al-Mihdhar in the 18 months leading up to that fateful day. The pair traveled to the US on multi-entry visas in January 2000, despite having repeatedly been flagged by the CIA and NSA previously as likely Al Qaeda terrorists. Mere days before their arrival, they attended an Al Qaeda summit in Kuala Lumpur, during which key details of the 9/11 attacks are likely to have been discussed and agreed. The meeting was secretly photographed and videotaped by Malaysian authorities at the direct request of the CIA's Alec Station, a special unit set up to track Osama bin Laden, although oddly, no audio was captured. Still, this background should've been sufficient to prevent

Pentagon chief grilled over leaks

PENTAGON (Agencies): US Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin has said he was not made aware of a major leak of classified intelligence documents until more than a month after they first appeared online, raising questions about the government's response as the Pentagon and Justice Department scramble to determine the origin of the breach. Speaking at a Tuesday press briefing alongside Secretary of State Antony Blinken, Austin took an aside to address the document leak, which has dominated headlines since they were picked up by US media last week. Stressing that the government takes the disclosures "very seriously" and had ordered an "urgent cross-department" probe, the Pentagon head also revealed that he was first briefed on the leaks on the morning of April 6 - weeks after the sensitive files first appeared online.

Four soldiers killed in firing at Indian military base

NEW DELHI (Agencies): Four army personnel were killed in a firing incident at a military station in the Indian border state of Punjab early on Wednesday, officials said, adding that a search for the shooters was in progress. An unknown number of shooters were at large at the Bathinda military station and had ammunition on them, a defence source told Reuters, declining to be named citing the sensitivity of the matter. The incident was "not a terror attack", and took place in a canteen, a senior police official in Punjab, S.P.S. Parmar told.

In a 2003 interview with investigators in Riyadh, he claimed his meeting with Hazmi and Midhar was a coincidence - he heard them speaking Arabic, realized they couldn't speak English, and decided to assist them out of charity. The Bureau reached a very different conclusion - Bayoumi was a Saudi intelligence operative and part of a wider militant Wahhabist network in the US, which handled a myriad of potential and actual terrorists, and monitored the activities of anti-Riyadh dissidents abroad. What's more. Encore judged there to be a 50/50 chance he had advanced knowledge of the 9/11 attacks before they happened, and so did the Saudi government.

- Why was it hidden?

Those bombshell facts remained hidden from public view until March 2022, when a trove of FBI documents was declassified at the request of the White House. The newly released Guantanamo Military Commission filing sheds even further light on Bayoumi's contact with Hazmi and Midhar - and in turn, the CIA's keen interest in them, their activities throughout their stay in the US, and of interest in an FBI probe of poten- refusal to disclose their presence to



Based on a review of classified information held by, and interviews with representatives of, the FBI and Pentagon, the content strongly suggests that the CIA obstructed official investigations to conceal its penetration of Al Qaeda. That's the judgment of four separate, unnamed FBI agents interviewed by Canestraro who worked on investigations into the 9/11 attacks. The most incendiary charges were leveled by a Bureau agent referred to in his report as 'CS-23', who had "extensive knowledge of counterterrorism and counterintelligence matters." CS-23 recounted how the CIA repeatedly lied and stonewalled the FBI in its investigations into Bayoumi. For example, while Agency officials claimed to possess no files on him when asked by Operation Encore representatives, CS-23 knew for a fact this was a "falsehood," and the CIA maintained several operational files on Bayoumi, amounting to an extensive paper trail. Furthermore, CS-23 was certain that the CIA used its liaison relationship with the Saudi intelligence services to attempt to recruit Hazmi and Midhar, and circumvent laws prohibiting the Agency from conducting spying operations on US soil, by using Riyadh as a go between. This account was backed up by another FBI investigator, 'CS-3,' who further claims that Bayoumi setting up bank accounts and renting an apartment for the two hijackers in San Diego "was done at the behest of the CIA." 'CS-IO' concurred that this arrangement was "highly unusual," and made it "nearly impossible for [Alec] Station to develop informants inside of Al Qaeda from its base several thousand miles from the countries where Al Qaeda was suspected of operating." Despite such tantalizing leads, CS-23 claims senior FBI officials suppressed further investigations into the CIA's relationship with Bayoumi and the recruitment of Hazmi and Midhar, and Bureau representatives testifying before the joint Senate and Congressional inquiry into 9/11 were instructed not to reveal the full extent of Saudi involvement with Al-Oaeda.

For their part, CS-3 stated that before they and their colleagues were interviewed by the joint inquiry, CIA officials within Alec Station told them not to cooperate fully with investigators and they were looking to "hang someone" for 9/11. Canestraro does not make any conclusions as to why the CIA concealed vital information from the FBI prior to the attacks, which potentially could have prevented their execution, and why the Bureau subsequently played along with the Agency's coverup. Although one answer is provided by the unusual nature of Alec Station's setup. Namely, that far from infiltrating an Al Qaeda cell to avert terrorism, the Agency was seeking to influence and direct its activities in order to cause terrorism, outside standard recruitment channels. China says Taiwan heading for 'stormy seas' under President Tsai



BEIJING/TAIPEI (Agencies): China said on Wednesday that President Tsai Ing-wen was pushing Taiwan into "stormy seas" after Beijing held military exercises in response to Tsai's recent meeting with U.S. House Speaker Kevin McCarthy in California. Tsai said the overseas trip, which included the meeting with McCarthy in the US and stops in Guatemala and Belize, showed the world Taiwan's determination to defend freedom and

democracy. The trip infuriated Beijing, prompting days of military drills designed to show it could forcefully retake control of the self-ruled island, which China claims as its own. China views Tsai as a separatist and has rebuffed repeated calls from her for talks. Tsai says she wants peace but that her government will defend Taiwan if it is attacked. "Tsai Ingwen brought danger to Taiwan. Tsai Ing-wen almost completely sided the United States, pushing Taiwan into stormy seas," China's Taiwan Affairs Office (TAO) spokesperson Zhu Fenglian said on Wednesday. Zhu said the drills around Taiwan were "a serious warning against the collusion and provocation of Taiwan independence separatist forces and external forces".



Prices of vegetables, fruits on increase

One vendor while talking to APP said that the rates could not be reduced because of the main sellers of vegetables and fruits and instead of taking action against small vendors, the officials of the district administration let the main wholesalers without any check. "How can we

sell vegetables and fruits if we purchased such items at high rates," he questioned. He said despite the rates of the various items including fruits and vegetables issued by the district administration, the whole sellers sell food items at high rates. Energy Conservation

The government's recent initiative to reduce energy consumption in residential, commercial, and industrial buildings is a positive step. However, the implementation of the Rs45bn energy efficiency and conservation project, which aims to save over Rs540bn per year, needs to consider the different income levels of households and businesses. Pakistan has one of the highest shares of energy consumption for buildings globally, with residential buildings consuming three-quarters of the total energy used by the entire sector. Energy usage in this sector can be significantly reduced through the deployment of energy-efficient appliances and the implementation of climate-conscious building design. This will require changes in building bylaws, land-use regulations, and incentives for the production of energy-saving equipment at affordable prices. While the objective of the project is essential, a short-to-medium-term plan must be implemented to address the defective transmission and distribution system, leading to massive wastage of electricity. Aggressive adoption of solar and wind energy can also bring down overall consumer costs. Encouraging rooftop solar and maximising the use of sunlight can make energy affordable and reduce the population's dependence on fossil fuels, cutting greenhouse gas emissions. Therefore, the government needs to take these measures to reduce fossil fuel imports, lower energy prices for residential and industrial consumers, and achieve the objectives of the project.

Private sector-led recovery

Time and again one has pointed out to create a more open and competitive that one of the principal shortcomings in Pakistan's economic recovery strategy is the failure of its successive governments to involve the private sector constructively and to harness its true potential in unlocking the country's growth potential. Needless to say, that growth, which is private sector investment driven not only tends to be sustainable over longer terms but also ensures that the benefits accruing from the outcome are equitably spread over wider platforms, as compared to any targeted governmental initiatives. So, when anyone refers to developing a consensus-based charter-on-economy in general terms what he/she also needs to consciously supplement in the recipe is that regardless of who governs Pakistan, the focus has to be on ensuring a private sector-led growth; meaning, the apple cart in the marketplace is not allowed to be disturbed owing to regime changes, if any, or due to any sudden urge on the part of the bureaucracy to expand its market footprint. A cursory glance over the last three decades and it becomes quite clear that almost all economic turnarounds during this period have been spearheaded by the respective national private sector players through unleashing free-flowing juices of entrepreneurship and innovative operational management, thereby in turn allowing the country to compete successfully in the international arena. Naturally, the state always has a big role to play in this and without which such a composite competitive drive is simply not achievable. Over the previous writeups one has referred to various private sector-led growth examples mainly from the South Asian region and therefore, just to demonstrate how today in essence this has become a sort of fit-forall cum generic formula on sustainable and responsible growth, one would like to point out on how (a non-South Asian country) Vietnam using the same model has progressed economically in leaps and bounds, since adopting it wholeheartedly from the mid to late 1990s onwards. Mind you Pakistan and Vietnam are very similar demographically where while Pakistan has twice the population of Vietnam, it also has twice the land area, making the two almost identical in per capita opportunity index primarily driven by land mass to population ratio. Vietnam's significant export and economic growth per se between 1986 and 2023 can be attributed to a number of factors, but none so important as the one on economic liberalization: In 1986. Vietnam began implementing economic reforms, which included liberalizing trade & investment policies to see to it that majority of the economic activity is undertaken by the private sector and

economy, which enabled businesses to grow and expand while the government just made sure that only the right type of investment came in: one that helps exports and ensures import-substitution; one that helps employment generation and not otherwise; and one that transfers technology and skills to the country. As we know, Pakistan ignored these aspects and is paying the price for this today. Also, unlike ours, the successive Vietnamese governments have been perhaps the most prudent in choosing their trade agreements, both bilateral and unilateral. In its bid to access new markets. Vietnam signed some of the most clever cum smartly negotiated free trade agreements with other countries in the post-WTO era. Such as the ASE-AN Free Trade Area (AFTA), the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP), and the European Union-Vietnam Free Trade Agreement (EVFTA). These agreements opened up new opportunities for Vietnamese businesses to export their goods to other countries while at the same time seeing to it that the country presented itself as an ideal ground for global outsourcing (meaning exports for Vietnam). Sadly, no such luck here! Another aspect of its success has been that it has consistently managed to keep its labour costs down: Vietnam has a large workforce, and labour costs were deliberately kept low compared to other countries in the region in particular and in Asia in general. This made Vietnam an attractive location for foreign investors, who then set up manufacturing facilities in the country to take advantage of the lower labour costs. Pakistan also started out well, but populist policies and a virtually absent skill-imparting program along the way never allowed us to graduate to be counted amongst destinations of choice where investors enjoy, both lower wages and skilled labour to produce high-value products.Investment in infrastructure and the fact that Vietnam (like us) enjoys a strategic location helped tremendously. Vietnam's location in Southeast Asia makes it an ideal gateway to other markets in the region. This helped Vietnamese businesses to expand their reach and access new customers. Regrettably, the low-hanging fruits of regional trade are still largely untapped in South Asia. At the same time, significant investments in infrastructure, including roads, ports, and airports, helped Vietnam to facilitate the movement of goods and reduce transportation costs, making it easier for businesses to export their products. Overall, its export growth has been driven by a combination of economic liberalization, access to new markets, low labour costs, a strategic location, and investment in infrastructure.

Israel is in a downward spiral of self-destruction

The sight of Israeli police storming the holy mosque of Al-Aqsa with their boots and batons, beating worshippers amid clouds of tear gas, was appalling. Hundreds of Palestinians were bound and driven away like cattle in the most

Yes, the holy month of Ramadan is here and what everyone was warning about happened in the worst possible way. "Everyone" includes the Israeli media, the Israeli government, the Israeli security forces, the Palestinians, the Arab states, the Europeans and the Americans, who all anticipated a wave of violence during the fasting month, not least because it coincides with the Jewish Passover (and, this year, Easter). Jewish settler groups announced that they were going to celebrate Passover in Al-Aqsa Mosque, where thousands of Muslims will be spending their days and nights in various acts of worship.

One of the reasons for the Aqaba Summit between the Israelis and the Palestinians on 26 February was to de-escalate the tension in the occupied West Bank prior to Ramadan starting. Representatives from Jordan, Egypt and the US also took part. The US proposed a plan to de-escalate and stop Palestinian resistance in the West Bank. According to the US State Department, the Joint Communique following the meeting in Agaba on 26 February said that Israel and the Palestinian Authority reaffirmed the necessity of committing to de-escalation on the ground and to prevent further violence: Israel committed to stop discussions about any new settlement units for four months and to stop the authorisation of any settlement outposts for six months; and the historic status quo at the holy sites in Jerusalem is to be upheld and unchanged in word and practice, with an emphasis on the Hashemite Kingdom's custodianship and special role in this regard The five countries met again in Sharm El-Sheikh on 19 March as agreed in Aqaba, and reiterated almost the same points, but this time

with more emphasis on Ramadan. ministry budgets to fund the Nation-"They emphasised the necessity of both Israelis and Palestinians to actively prevent any actions that would disrupt the sanctity of these sites, inter alia during the upcoming Holy Month of Ramadan, which coincides with Easter and Passover this year," said the second Joint Communique.

However, on the ground, Jewish religious Zionists had another view. Reports from the holy city noted that the Returning to the Mount Movement was distributing flyers in the Old City calling on Jews to take a lamb to the "Temple Mount" (Al-Aqsa Mosque complex) for the pre-Passover sacrifice. The movement offered about \$700 for anyone arrested there with a lamb and \$8,240 for a successful sacrifice.

These groups have been storming Al-Aqsa on a frequent basis under the protection of the Israeli police, and have performed some of their rituals inside the mosque, while its lawful owners are treated as criminals without any rights. The settlers have been empowered now that one of their number. Itamar Ben-Gvir. is a member of Israel's coalition government. Far-right extremist Ben-Gvir is National Security Minister, and is encouraging such action by the settlers. He has been given the green light to form a so-called "National Guard", which will, in effect, be a settler militia funded by the occupation state. Most of his supporters come from non-Ashkenazi Jewish communities on the "social-economic periphery". Many come from the ultra-Orthodox community, especially from a settler gang called "the hilltop youth". He used to defend them in court as a lawyer, so there are no prizes for guessing who will form the core of the new militia Ben-Gvir publicly welcomed the members of two major settler gangs, La familia and La hava, who are mainly Mizrahi (Oriental) and Sephardi Jews, to join the force "to fight terror and nationalistic crimes, as well as enforcing public order." It is expected to consist of some 2,000 officers. Several Israeli cabinet members are opposed to having a 1.5 per cent cut in their

al Guard.

A number of prominent Israeli political and security figures, such as opposition leader Yair Lapid, Police Commissioner Kobi Shabtai, former Police chief Moshe Karadi and lawmaker Ofer Cassif, oppose the creation of the militia. Media reported Karadi as saying that it is dangerous to grant a politician such power and suggesting that Ben-Gvir could use the force "to stage a coup".

Israel is now being attacked from within and beyond its still undeclared borders. Rockets are falling from Gaza in the south, Lebanon in the north and Syria in the north east, while almost every day there are angry Palestinians who are ready to die and take as many as Israelis as possible with them. The occupation state which was busying itself in preparation for a devastating strike on Iran's nuclear facilities does not seem to be able to grasp what is happening. It looks very much like it is in a downward spiral of self-destruction. With everything else that is going on in Israeli politics, on the streets and in the army and other state agencies, how will Israel be able to fight Iran and indulge itself in a potential regional war? The notion of the external enemy which used to unite Israelis behind the government isn't working this time. With each security incident, Israel is becoming more divided and weaker. Even so-called solutions such as Ben-Gvir's National Guard will have a negative effect on the state.

By imposing Jewish control over Al-Aqsa Mosque, Ben-Gvir hope to redefine Israel's priorities, redirect its politics and restructure its identity in a way that brings Mizrahi and Sephardi Jews, as well as other disenfranchised groups, from the periphery to the centre. In other words, he wants to dismantle Israel as a European Ashkenazi Zionist project and reassemble it as a Sephardi/Mizrahi Jewish project. In this sense, perhaps unwittingly, Ben-Gvir may be seen as the antithesis of Israel as we know it, which makes him a living nightmare for the Zionist state and its allies



West Texas Intermediate traded above US\$81 a barrel after rallying by 2.2% on Tuesday. Shipments from Russia have weakened after Moscow vowed to reduce production, according to tanker-tracking data. In the Middle East, meanwhile, pipeline flows from Iraq's semi-au-



tonomous Kurdistan region remain halted. The industry-funded American Petroleum Institute reported that crude holdings at Cushing, Oklahoma, contracted by 1.4 million barrels last week, according to

people familiar with the data. If confirmed by government figures later on Wednesday, that would be a sixth consecutive drawdown. Crude has rebounded from a 15-month low hit in March after Opec and its allies cut output, US crude holdings declined, and traders stuck to the view that Chinese demand will pick up. The gain on Tuesday came ahead of US consumer price data that'll shape investors' expectations for the Federal Reserve's next move, and appetite for risk.

Emerson Electric nears US\$8bil deal for National Instruments

TEXAS (Agencies): Industrial conglomerate Emerson Electric is in advanced talks to acquire National Instruments Corp in a deal that could value the measurement equipment maker at about US\$8 billion, people familiar with the matter said on Tuesday. Emerson prevailed over other companies that participated in the sale process, including Fortive Corp and Keysight Technologies Inc, with an offer of about US\$60



per share for National Instruments, the sources said. The deal could be announced as soon as this week, the sources said, cautioning that the talks could fall apart at the eleventh hour. The sources requested ano-

nymity as these discussions are confidential. Spokespeople for National Instruments, Emerson, Fortive and Keysight did not immediately respond to requests for comment. National Instruments launched a formal sale process in January after Emerson threatened to challenge its board if it did not engage in deal negotiations. Emerson dropped its hostile bid once the auction for National Instruments got underway.

Theranos founder Holmes heading for prison

SAN FRANCISCO (Agencies): Fallen US biotech star Elizabeth Holmes is to begin serving prison time this month after a judge denied her request to remain free while appealing her fraud conviction. In a ruling Monday night denying a motion by Holmes, US district court judge Edward Davila wrote that it is unlikely her appeal will succeed. "The court does not find that she has raised



a substantial question of law or fact that is likely to result in reversal or an order for a new trial of all counts," wrote Davila, who presided over Holmes's trial. Holmes was sen-

tenced to just over 11 years in prison for defrauding investors with her Silicon Valley start-up Theranos. She is scheduled to begin serving her time in prison on April 27. She was convicted of four felony fraud counts in January 2022 for persuading investors that she had developed a revolutionary medical device, until the company flamed out after an investigation by The Wall Street Journal.

Switzerland refuses to freeze more Russian assets – official

BERN (Agencies): The Swiss government will not block more Russian assets – apart from the funds already frozen - due to a lack of evidence they fall under sanctions, Director of the State Secretariat for Economic Affairs (SECO) Helene Budliger Artieda said in a Tuesday interview in the German newspaper Neue Zürcher Zeitung. Her comments came in response to earlier claims by US Ambassador to Switzerland Scott Miller, who criticized SECO last month for not doing enough to implement sanctions against Russia, saying that Bern could



block a further 50 to 100 billion Swiss francs in Russian assets and use them to help restore Ukraine. "The figure of 50 to 100 billion francs was initially circulated as a possible estimate of Russian funds under [Swiss] management, but it was not an estimate produced by Switzerland. Not all Rus-

sians are subject to sanctions – only a small minority," Budliger Artieda told Swiss francs (\$8.3 billion) worth of Russian assets since the EU imposed sanctions on Moscow in connection with its military operation in Ukraine. According to the SECO chief, the blocked funds equate to around "a good third" of the €21.5 billion (\$23.4 billion) frozen across the European Union, but further asset freezing would require evidence that the funds were connected with sanctioned entities or individuals.





What we know so far on the leaked Pentagon documents



WASHINGTON (AP): It's been less than a week since news of highly classified military documents on the Ukraine war surfaced, sending the Pentagon into full-speed damage control to assure allies and assess the scope of the leak. The information on scores of slides has publicized potential vulnerabilities in Ukraine's air defense capabilities and exposed private assessments by allies on an array of intelligence matters, raising questions about whether the leak will erode allies' trust in sharing information with the U.S. or impact Ukraine's plans to intensify the fight against Russia this spring. Overall, the leaked documents present a "very serious risk to national security," a top Pentagon spokesman told reporters Monday. This is a look at what the documents are, what is known about how they surfaced, and their potential impact.

The classified documents — which have not been individually authenticated by U.S. officials - range from briefing slides mapping out Ukrainian military positions to assessments of international support for Ukraine and other sensitive topics, including under what circumstances Russian

President Vladimir Putin might use nuclear weapons.

Trudeau Foundation leadership resigns over China-linked donation



OTTAWA (Agencies): The leadership of charitable foundation named after former Canadian prime minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau has abruptly resigned over scrutiny of a donation with alleged ties to Beijing. The Trudeau Foundation said on Tuesday the "political climate" surrounding the 2016 donation "made it impossible to continue with the status quo". It returned the donation last month. The sudden resignation comes as Canada grapples with allegations of election meddling by Beijing. The charity, a scholarship organisation created to fund doctoral researchers, was founded over two decades ago in memory of former prime minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau, Justin Trudeau's father. Justin Trudeau, who became Canada's prime minister in 2015, has no involvement in the organisation. In February, the Globe and Mail newspaper, based on anonymous sources, reported that two wealthy Chinese businessmen gave C\$200,000 (\$148,000; £120,000) to the foundation, a payment allegedly orchestrated by Beijing. While the money was recently refunded, politics around the donation and wider concern over Chinese interference put "a great deal of pressure" on the foundation's volunteer board and CEO Pascale Fournier, said the organisation in a statement. announcing their resignation.

Mexican immigration agency chief to be charged in fatal fire

MEXICO CITY (AP): Mexico's top immigration official will face criminal charges in a fire that killed 40 migrants in Ciudad Juarez last month, with federal prosecutors saying he was remiss in not preventing the disaster despite earlier indications of problems at his agency's detention centers. The decision to file charges against Francisco Garduño, the head of Mexico's National Immigration Institute, was announced late Tuesday by the federal Attorney General's Office. It followed repeated calls from within Mexico, and from some Central American nations, not to stop the case at the five low-level officials, guards and



a Venezuelan migrant already facing homicide charges in the case. Anger initially focused on two guards who were seen fleeing the March 27 fire, without unlocking the cell door to allow the migrants to escape. But President Andrés Manuel López Obrador said earlier Tuesday that they didn't have the keys.

Theranos Founder Elizabeth Holmes to go to prison end of April



CALIFORNIA (Agencies): Theranos founder Elizabeth Holmes will report to prison at the end of the month after losing a bid to remain free while she appeals against her convictions. Holmes was sentenced to over 11 years in prison for defrauding investors in her blood testing startup. A federal judge on Monday said Holmes failed to prove her appeals process would lead to a reversal of her case. She is scheduled to go to prison on 27 April. Holmes had said Mexico during her trial.

Myanmar military airstrike: More than 100 people feared dead

NAYPYIDAW (Agencies): More than 100 people are feared to have been killed in Tuesday's airstrike by the Myanmar military, one of the deadliest so far in the civil war. Survivors told the BBC they have collected at least 80 bodies, but expect the toll to rise further. The United Nations has condemned the attack, which targeted a village in the north-western Sagaing region. The military has increasingly used air strikes against their opponents since seizing power in February 2021. The spokesman for the military junta, General Zaw Min Tun, told state television, "yes, we launched the air strike". Abortion pill opponents urge US appeals court to allow ban

NEW YORK (Agencies): Abortion opponents on Tuesday urged a U.S. appeals court to allow the suspension of Food and Drug Administration's approval of the abortion pill mifepristone, in a case with potentially far-reaching impact on how the government regulates medicine. In a filing with the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, lawyers for groups and doctors who oppose abortion and challenged the FDA's more than two decade-old approval of the drug said a government request to stay the suspension was "extraordinary and unprecedented" and should be denied. The abortion opponents' requests came one day after the U.S. Department of Justice urged the appeals court to put U.S. District Judge Matthew Kacsmaryk's April 7 order voiding the FDA's approval on hold through the appeals process.



Kacsmaryk, a Texas judge appointed by former Republican President Donald Trump, had issued only a seven-day stay. The groups and doctors are led by the Alliance for Hippocratic Medicine, which was formed last August. It is not clear when the 5th Circuit will rule on extending the stay. Mifepristone is the first pill in a two-drug regimen for medication abortions used in more than half of all U.S. abortions. Several states have announced plans to stockpile mifepristone or the other drug, misoprostol.

Trump lawyer seeks monthlong delay in trial over rape claim



NEW YORK (AP): An attorney for Donald Trump is seeking a one-month delay in the trial regarding a columnist's claims that Trump raped her in a department store dressing room in the 1990s, contending that his client's right to a fair trial depends on a "cooling off" period following the former president's indictment and arraignment. The trial was set for April 25. In a letter Tuesday to Judge Lewis A. Kaplan, attorney Joseph Tacopina cited "the recent deluge of prejudicial media coverage" surrounding Trump's arrest and court appearance in arguing for a delay. The former president was charged March 30 with 34 felony counts related to allegations that he paid hush money to an adult film star, Stormy Daniels. The civil case before Kaplan was brought against Trump in November by E. Jean Carroll, a columnist who says the wealthy real estate developer raped her in early 1996 after a chance meeting at the Bergdorf Goodman department store. Trump has repeatedly and emphatically denied the allegation. A jury will be asked to decide whether the rape occurred and if Trump defamed Carroll with his comments. A temporary state law that took effect last year allows adult rape victims to sue their abusers, even if attacks happened decades ago.

Cuba lifts ban on cash deposits in US dollars at banks



Havana (Agencies): Banks in Cuba will again accept cash deposits in US dollars after a ban prohibiting the practice was surprisingly lifted on Monday. Cubans had been unable to deposit dollars in cash into their accounts at banks and other financial institutions for almost two years. The Cuban government brought in the ban in 2021 citing "continuing difficulties caused by the ongoing US embargo". The move comes among the worst economic crisis to hit Cuba in decades. Cubans are facing shortages of food, medicines and petrol which have led to long queues forming at shops and petrol stations. The resolution by the Central Bank of Cuba (BCC) was published in Cuba's Official Gazette on Monday and is effective immediately. It does not mention Cuba's current economic problems but rather cites the recent increase in tourism and the "gradual recovery of the service industry and the productive sector" as the reasons behind the lifting of the ban.


