
PM chairs consultative meeting of ruling alliance on constitutional, legal matters

ISLAMABAD (APP): A high-level consultative meeting of the ruling alliance held here Wednesday evening with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in chair discussed the country's overall situation and the future strategy on constitutional and legal matters. The meeting, after consultation on their already stated stance of holding general elections in the country on the same day under the caretaker governments, unanimously decided to convene a meeting of the leaders of ruling alliance after Eidul Fitr so that the ongoing national process of consultation with all political parties within and outside the Parliament could be taken to the next stage and reach a consensus to finalise the procedure in that respect. The meeting clarified that with the constitution of a committee by the prime minister, the process of consultation within the ruling parties for holding elections was al-



ready underway whereas the meeting between PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari and PDM chief Maulana Fazlur Rehman was also part of that process. German union calls for new rail strike Friday

BERLIN (AFP/APP): German transport union EVG on Wednesday called for a strike as workers demand higher wages to cope with high rates of inflation, the latest industrial action in Europe's largest economy. Rail workers across the country will walk out on Friday between 3:00 am said in a statement. Management "alone" were responsible for the new strike action for failing to engage in "constructive" wage negotiations, EVG's deputy chairwoman Cosima Ingenschay said in the statement. The union represents 230,000 workers across some 50 transport companies, including national rail operator in October.

China to build up supercomputing capacities



BEIJING (Xinhua/APP): China plans to build a supercomputing internet by the end of 2025 to connect powerful computers across the nation and effectively tap into their joint computing power to promote innovation and socioeconomic growth, China Daily reported Wednesday. It quoted a statement from the Ministry of Science and Technology at a work meeting and said that after decades of efforts, China's supercomputing sector is among the global front-runners, effectively supporting the nation's science and technology innovation, social development, and digital economy. However, with the rise of big data, artificial intelligence, and a new generation of information technology, society needs more computing power than ever, the statement said. adding that the purpose of the supercomputing internet is to organize local computing centers into a more coordinated system on a national scale.

No 'magic wand' for Ukraine – UK

LONDON (Agencies): It is unlikely that the conflict with Russia will end this year, the British defense secretary has said. The conflict between Russia and Ukraine will likely continue into next year, UK Defence Secretary Ben Wallace said on Tuesday. "I'm optimistic that between this year and next year, I think Ukraine will continue to have the momentum with it and a position of strength," Wallace told reporters during a trip to Washington, DC, as quoted by the New York Times. Wallace warned, however, that "there is not going to be a single magic-wand moment when Russia collapses." The UK has been one of Kiev's main backers, supplying the country with heavy weapons, including Challenger 2 tanks. Britain has trained 10,000 Ukrainian soldiers, according to the Defence Ministry, and pledged to train 20,000 more this year. For the past several months, Kiev has been outspoken about its planned counteroffensive, but has not publicly revealed the time- plans for the counteroffensive.

Water rationed in Catalonia as drought



L' Espluga de Francolí (AFP/APP): For months, residents of L'Espluga de Francoli have been saving water in bottles and foregoing showers to cope with long hours of daily water rationing as northeastern Spain suffers one of its worst droughts in decades. While this small Catalan town has suffered supply problems for years due to the depleted state of its water table, the current drought has made things worse. Every night between 10:00 pm and 7:00 am, domestic water supplies are switched off in this town of 3,600 residents, which lies 100 kilometres (60 miles) west of Barcelona. "We keep water in bottles so we can brush our teeth and wash our faces in the morning," said Maria Gonzalez, a 24-year-old nursing assistant. "At night, we either shower at work or at the gym or else we heat water in pans (to wash at home), like in the olden days," she said.

Mexico condemns US 'interference' in drug war



IMF Loan Delayed

Pakistan is in dire need of financial reassurance as the country continues to grapple with an ongoing economic crisis. The IMF loan, which has been a point of negotiation and contention for the past year, is critical to avoid the risk of sovereign debt default. However, hopes of an early release have been further dashed as the IMF stated on Saturday that Pakistan must still provide "necessary financing assurances" before talks can be concluded. Despite assurances from lending countries such as China, UAE, and Saudi Arabia, there is still a pressing question of securing confirmation for the remaining \$6 billion in loans that Pakistan urgently needs to bridge until June and avoid default. Foreign banks have been hesitant to extend fresh financing due to Pakistan's junk credit rating, and it may take another four to six weeks of negotiations to reach a stable stage. However, given this current trajectory, there can be no guarantee on any expected time-frame. This delay has already resulted in significant economic losses for Pakistan, and the market is growing increasingly nervous. The Pakistani rupee dropped by 6 percent against the US dollar in the beginning of March, largely due to the larger-than-expected interest rate hike. The frustration in Islamabad is palpable, as Pakistan has been earnestly requesting flexibility from the IMF on the staff-level agreement. Despite concerns over fiscal leakages and unresolved issues, the IMF maintains that the deal must be ratified by the executive board and prior actions must be completed before internal guarantees can be affected. For individuals living in Pakistan, this ongoing financial crisis has far-reaching consequences. The delay in the IMF loan has exacerbated economic turmoil in the country, resulting in uncertainty and instability. Businesses are struggling, and job opportunities are scarce, leaving many families facing financial hardship. There is a growing sense of urgency as Pakistan's ability to handle the delay in securing the necessary funds is reaching its limit. Immediate financial reassurances are needed to stabilise the economy and prevent further hardship for individuals and businesses in the country.

Our finance czars - By Dr Niaz Murtaza

FINANCE czars are often the top on debt. Overall, the PML-N czars regime honchos after prime ministers and play key roles in national progress. How have our czars done? I look at four czars who served for at least one year after 2008: Shaukat Tarin (two years in two stints), Hafeez Shaikh (five years in two stints), Ishaq Dar (five years in two main stints) and Miftah Ismail (a year in two stints). We first had Tarin and Shaikh under PPP, followed by Dar and Ismail. We then had Shaikh and Tarin again, but in reverse order, and Ismail and Dar again (in reverse order too). This odd merrygo-round was broken by a few short eras of others. Thus, our many ills and few gains since 2008 have come mainly from these four. Shaikh has a PhD in economics from Boston University, and Ismail a doctorate in public finance from the prestigious Wharton School. Both have worked at IMF and have the strong global economic credentials needed for the job (but with a neoliberal bent). Dar and Tarin only have business degrees and national job records. However, the real test is their more guts, sincerity and flair in advowork as finance ministers. Their short cating reforms on the job, but more so stints make such a review hard. Exogenous factors and other public officials affect economies too, especially bevond the fiscal realms of finance czars. But fiscal policies affect the whole economy. Our czars usually control trade, investment, and even monetary and exchange rate policies informally. So, I isolate their role from exogenous factors in not only the fiscal sector but also in the areas of sustainable, equitable growth and reforms. Shaikh in both stints had to contend with the worst exogenous factors (2008 crisis, 2010 floods, terrorism, electricity crisis, high oil prices, Covid-19, etc.). Dar saw terrorism and electricity crises in his first stint and the Russia-Ukraine war, floods, and Tarin's economic mess (which he exacerbated) in his second. Miftah Ismail inherited economic messes from Dar and Tarin. The latter had bad exogenous factors in his first stint but received a recovered economy in 2021. Going by key indicators until 2022, Ismail does the best, followed by Dar, Shaikh and Tarin on GDP. Dar does the best, followed by Ismail, Shaikh and Tarin on inflation, and also on fiscal issues, followed by Ismail, Tarin and Shaikh. Shaikh does the best on external deficits, followed by Dar, Ismail and Tarin. Both Ismail and

do better, but this status will change once the full 2023 data is in. Also, the exogenous factors here explain some of the variances; a conclusive verdict based on data alone is hard to give. So, we must review their policies. The seventh NFC Award and BISP came under Tarin, but were not his ideas. Ehsaas came under Shaikh, but was not his brainchild. CPEC was Dar's work, but it hasn't lived up to its promise. Ismail and Shaikh mended broken economies partially. So, it is hard to list many big pluses for any, which is why we have fumbled economically under them (the pre-2008 eras had their own issues). The only area where one can clearly rank them is on avoiding harm. While Dar and Tareen are responsible for the larger crises, Ismail and Shaikh mended them. This brings us back to my starting point credentials. The two with the best ones caused the least harm. But both were dumped by the PML-N and PTI for the two who did the most harm. Ismail has shown in his writings later. He ranks as the best among the four for me. Dar and Tarin ran elitist economies, with the state favouring unproductive, rentier classes. The other two favour reforms, but neoliberal ones; where the state plays no major economic role, good or bad, beyond giving macroeconomic stability, rule of law and a 'free' economy. But that model globally results in crises and inequity. We need neither type of state, but one that mixes the East Asian developmental model igniting progress, with the Scandinavian welfare one to ensure good incomes for the vast majority that can work and safety nets for the few who can't Nothing in his writings shows that Ismail embraces such ideas. However, he seems open to debate, and it is worth nudging him onto this path. At the end of the day, though, one needs not only an able finance minister, but also able ministers for investment, trade, industry, planning, climate change, poverty alleviation, health, education, etc. The only way a team even remotely resembling a dream team can attain power soon until the grassroots parties expand is if the PDM follows the Congress model, where family patriarchs run parties and appoint able persons to govern.

Lula's China trip proves Latin America is no longer the 'backyard' of the US – By Oliver Vargas

Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula This visit marks the beginning of a da Silva has just returned from his highly anticipated and successful trip to China, generating optimism and enthusiasm for an enhanced role for Latin America as it emerges from the shadow of the US. Chinese President Xi Jinping's welcoming ceremony was the first sign the trip would be a success for everyone involved. As he and Lula walked down the red carpet. China's military band played a rendition of 'Novo Tempo', an '80s Brazilian song associated with the protests against the US-backed dictatorships of that time. Behind closed doors, 15 bilateral agreements and memoranda of understanding were signed, including investment deals, research and development plans, food standards, state news agencies, technology transfers, and cooperation on building the seventh China-Brazil Earth Resources Satellite (CBERS). The meeting built upon years of strategic partnership. China displaced the US as Brazil's largest trade partner in 2009, and the event was about deepening that process. However, the most interesting facet of the visit was the tone of the public statements by both leaders, as it went beyond diplomatic niceties and showed a clear commitment from both countries in taking on a leadership role that will challenge the years of Washington's unipolar dominance. "I wonder every night why all countries are forced to do their trade backed by the dollar. Why can't we do trade backed by our currency?" said Lula at an event in Shanghai. The conflict in Ukraine was also on the agenda, and Lula made it clear that the US funneling billions of dollars worth of weapons to the Kiev regime was escalating, rather than calming, the conflict. He commented, "It is necessary that the United States stop incentivizing the war and begin to speak about peace. The European Union needs to start talking about peace."

much closer relationship between Latin America and those challenging US dominance on the international stage. Once Lula returns, the next big item on the agenda will be a visit from Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov, who will be embarking on a Latin America tour in which he'll also visit Venezuela, Cuba, and Nicaragua. Lavrov's visits will be an opportunity to discuss areas of common interest for Russia and Latin America, such as trade, investment, energy, and defense. He will also attempt to strengthen cultural ties at a time when Washington is promoting xenophobia against Russians and Russian culture globally. The success of Lula's China trip will clearly put an extra spring in the step of the Latin American governments that will be receiving Russia's official delegation this week. The win-win cooperation possible with China and Russia stands in clear contrast to the arrogant finger-wagging and interventionism on offer from the US. However, Latin America is not a passive participant in the process of building a multipolar world. The region is taking on leading roles in the process. Former Brazilian president and Lula ally, Dilma Rousseff – who is also the victim of a US-backed coup is starting her new role as chief of the BRICS development bank in Shanghai, a crucial coordinating role for Brazil, China, Russia, India, and South Africa, as well as for a possible 'BRICS plus' expansion to include more emerging economies in the Global South. - Backlash from the US

Washington has tried to court Lula ever since he was elected president. Brazil is the largest economy in Latin America, so it would be unwise not to do so. The State Department has issued official condemnations of the right-wing rioters that attacked the Brazilian congress with the aim of preventing Lula from assuming office, its statements in support of 'Brazilian democracy' was perhaps an attempt to communicate that the US would not work to undermine

Lula's presidency, as they had done against other leftist presidents from Bolivia to Venezuela. For that reason, Washington has not formally responded to Lula's China trip and upcoming official meeting with Lavrov. Nevertheless, the cottage industry of pro-US 'analysts' and 'commentators' have been weighing in and setting a narrative that Lula was scoring an "own goal" by reaching out to China and Russia. The Argentina-based website Infobae, one of the largest right-wing digital media outlets in the region, ran a piece entitled 'Lula's trip to China risks becoming a goal against Brazil'. The author questions China's intentions by saying, "Brazil, one of the richest countries in the world in terms of raw materials and natural resources, has everything to be a power on its own, without the help of any other foreign power. But to do so, it must overcome the corruption of its politicians and submit its management to strict scrutiny." The same outlets that decry the nationalization of industry and celebrate free trade deals with the US have suddenly taken a hardline "third-worldist" and isolationist turn. Others are warning Brazil of drawing the ire of Washington. Oliver Stuenkel, who writes for Americas Quarterly - an outlet funded by Western oil corporations - recently said, "The more Lula talks about Ukraine during this visit in China, which in Western perception is not a neutral actor, the greater the risk that Brazil will be seen in Europe and the United States as an actor closer to Russia than to them." Perhaps being "an actor closer to Russia" and closer to China will prove to be a more fruitful path for Latin America. Being an actor closer to Washington has resulted in unequal trade deals, coups, invasions, and much more. Lula's China trip shows that another, more equal relationship is possible. Lavrov's Latin America tour will be a fantastic opportunity for Latin America to build on this

SEVERAL experts who should know have expressed their considered opinion that the constant company of certain animal species leaves an indelible mark on an individual. And when one expresses this thought, it is not merely ephemeral. Some experts even go so far as to aver - somewhat uncharitably one is constrained to add - that persons who live too closely around certain animals ultimately end up resembling them. Over the ages, man has been rather close to the horse and vice versa. That phenomenon may explain how certain internationally known personalities have been remarked as having developed definite equine attributes over a period of time. And one might add, this certainly is no empty utterance. One cannot miss it. All one has to do is keep looking around with one's eyes - and mind - open. And while on this subject, why confine one's attention merely to the equine species? There are divers other inter-species resemblances that one can hardly help noticing. To quote just one example, one has often come across persons – in public life, no less – who exhibit specific reptilian attributes of sorts; particularly in the way their tongues have the ten-

dency to dart in and out of their mouths every time they open them. No offence meant, but one can hardly help wondering whether they also possess other characteristics peculiar to reptiles! Personal observations apart, literature through the ages has run riot in so far as man's relationship with the rest of the species on the planet is concerned. While describing, a character in one of his books, the inimitable P. G. Wodehouse wrote, "He looked more like a parrot than most parrots do". How is that for a loaded comment? Wodehouse was, of course, being facetious as was his wont, but one would not class his remark as entirely flippant. It is not at all unusual for humans to have an uncanny resemblance to members of other species. Some would do so physically others in mannerism and still others in their very nature. Drawing of parallels by writers and some historians, therefore, can hardly be termed inapt. Field Marshal Rommel was popularly known as the "desert fox" and not without justification. Similarly, a person may be described as 'slimy as a serpent' or perhaps 'slippery as an eel'. Rodents are particularly popular animals in the writers' quest for homologues. A particularly low category of person, for instance, gets the epithet of a 'rat'. Being called a 'dirty rat' would be tantamount to adding insult to the injury. The devastating role played by "moles" in the field of espionage need hardly be over-emphasized. In the contemporary world, where kiss-and-tell books are very much in the vogue, publishers and writers can hardly be faulted for wanting to garner a chunk of the hot millions. Can one blame writers and publishers, then, for being constantly on the look out for moles? Those interested in history will no doubt have read all about the exploits of 'King Richard of the Lion Heart'. A person, thus, may be praised as been 'lion-hearted' or - on the other end of the spectrum - possessing the heart of a chicken. Rather tough on chickens that, you will agree! The poor peacock has to suffer the ignominy of being considered the embodiment of vanity. Insects, surprisingly, have had the best press of the lot. The ant is constantly extolled by all and sundry as being an exemplary worker. The bumblebee has received top billing as one that is ever so busy!



Meta prepares another round of companywide layoffs

CALIFORNIA (Agencies): Meta Platforms Inc is set to commence companywide layoffs on Wednesday as it restructures teams and works toward founder Mark Zuckerberg's goal of greater efficiency. The Facebook parent company notified managers to prepare to announce job cuts on Wednesday, via a memo seen by Bloomberg News. It indicates Facebook, WhatsApp, Instagram and Reality Labs - which houses the firm's virtual reality efforts



and Quest hardware — will all be impacted. The move is part of a cost-cutting push that will eventually whittle away 10,000 positions at the company, as announced by Zuckerberg in March.

A further round of cuts is set to follow in May. Meta already cut about 13% of its workforce, or about 11,000 jobs, in November. It also extended a hiring freeze through the first quarter, which has been punctuated by job and cost cuts by other Silicon Valley businesses. Zuckerberg's comments have suggested that the company would aim to become leaner and rebalance its ratio of technologists and engineers to business and administrative staff.

China drafts plan to boost recovery, consumption growth

BEIJING (Agencies): China is formulating plans to boost the recovery and expansion of consumption, the state planner's spokesperson Meng Wei said on Wednesday, signalling officials are worried about weak demand despite a sharp rebound in retail sales. China's economy grew at a faster-than-expected pace in the first quarter, as businesses and consumers came out of crippling pandemic disruptions, although headwinds from



a global slowdown point to a bumpy ride ahead. The National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC) pledged to promote a sustained recovery in consumption. "Currently, we are

working on drafting documents on the recovery and expansion of consumption, mainly focusing on key areas such as stabilising big-ticket consumption, enhancing service consumption and expanding rural consumption," said Meng. Meng, at a news conference, also mentioned stabilising automobile consumption, which was a "big part" of supporting consumption, by promoting new energy vehicles to rural areas.

Disney poised to cut thousands of jobs next week

CALIFORNIA (Agencies): Walt Disney Co plans to start cutting thousands of jobs next week, including about 15% of the staff in its entertainment division, people familiar with the matter said. The cuts will span TV, film, theme parks and corporate positions, and affect every region where Disney operates, said the people, who asked not to be identified because the details aren't public. Some affected workers will be notified as early as April 24. The company declined to



comment. Disney said in February it planned to eliminate 7,000 positions from its workforce of more than 220,000, part of an overall strategy to shave US\$5.5 billion in annual costs.

The cuts are coming across the company, the people said, including at Disney Entertainment, which was created in a restructuring this year as home to the company's movie and TV production and distribution businesses, including streaming. As part of that restructuring, chief executive officer Bob Iger moved to restore authority to creative executives. He elevated key lieutenants including Alan Bergman and Dana Walden, the co-chairmen of Disney Entertainment.

Australia sets new pollution rules to boost EV uptake

SYDNEY (Agencies): Australia said on Wednesday it would introduce new standards targeting vehicle emissions to boost the uptake of electric cars, as it looks to catch up with other developed economies. Just 3.8% of its cars sold in Australia last year were electric, well behind other developed economies such as Britain and Europe where electric cars made up 15% and 17% of sales, respectively. The new national electric vehicle strategy will introduce a fuel efficiency standard



that will outline how much pollution or specifically, carbon dioxide – a car will produce when running, energy minister Chris Bowen said in a news conference. "Fuel-efficient and electric vehicles are cleaner and cheaper

to run - today's announcement is a win-win for motorists," Bowen said in a statement. Details would be finalised in the coming months, he added. "Fuel efficiency standards would require more affordable electric vehicles to be sent to Australia," he said. Apart from Russia, Australia was the only developed country to either not have or be developing fuel efficiency standards, which encourage manufacturers to supply more electric and no-emission vehicles

Musk touts new moderation policy to reassure advertisers

MIAMI (Agencies): Twitter head Elon Musk on Tuesday attempted to reassure wary advertisers by hyping up the site's newly introduced content moderation policy against hateful material. Speaking at a meeting in Florida, the controversial billionaire outlined new rules, first announced Monday, to limit the reach of tweets that do not conform to the platform's guidelines. "If somebody has something hateful to say, it doesn't mean he should have a microphone," the self-described freespeech absolutist told gathered jour-



nalists. "He still should be able to say it, but it needs to be not them pushing it on people," he added. Under the new policy, unveiled in a blog post titled "Freedom of Speech, Not Reach," Twitter will soon begin tagging posts whose visibility has been limited. The

labels will "bring a new level of transparency to enforcement actions", the blog post said. "Tweets with these labels will be made less discoverable on the platform. Additionally, we will not place ads adjacent to content that we label." Since purchasing the so-called bird app in a rollercoaster US\$44 billion deal last year, Musk has sharply reined in content moderation on the platform, allowing the return of many users who had been banned for posting tweets that incite hate or spread misinformation.

Ping An calls for strategic review in HSBC battle

HONG KONG (Agencies): HSBC Holdings Plc's largest shareholder has kept up the pressure on the bank to revamp its business as it called for a "strategic restructuring" of the lender, just weeks before its annual shareholder meeting. Ping An Insurance Group Co publicly called for the creation of "a separately listed Asia business headquartered in Hong Kong", in a statement Tuesday. "It is necessary for HSBC to push for structural reform to fundamentally address HSBC's underlying market competitiveness issues, improve performance, enhance value and accel-



erate growth opportunities in Asia." The more than 2,000-word statement offers the most detailed insight yet into Ping An's stance on HSBC and underlines the increasingly fractious relationship between Europe's largest bank and one of its most important investors.

Tesla cuts EV prices again to under US\$40,000

AUSTIN (Agencies): Tesla Inc has cut the price of several of its models yet again in a further sign chief executive officer Elon Musk is willing to sacrifice the electric carmaker's profitability in the face of rising interest rates that may dent consumer demand. The Austin, Texas-based the price of its Model Y long-range all-wheel drive model will decrease by 9.1% to \$49,990 while the price of the Model Y performance will drop by 8.5% to \$53,990. Dollar regains footing as Fed's outlook weighed

TOKYO (Agencies): The dollar steadied on Wednesday after it seesawed with bond market volatility as investors scrutinised US economic indicators, Federal Reserve commentary and corporate earnings for clues about the path for interest rates. The dollar index – which gauges the greenback against six major peers ticked up 0.11% to 101.83 in Asian trading, following a 0.36% slide on Tuesday that reversed the 0.54% rally of the session before. The wind might be at his back. But Heartbreak Hill will still be there. The historic route from Hopkinton to Boston's Back Bay isn't going to change, and that was the biggest problem for the two-time Olympic gold medalist who set a world record on the flattest of the major marathon courses and broke 2 hours in a completely controlled environment. "I can't



win every time," he told reporters a day after his slowest marathon ever and just his third loss in a major race to go with 12 victories. "I was feeling good.



Fox settles Dominion lawsuit for \$787.5 million over US election lies



WILMINGTON (Agencies): Fox Corp. and Fox News on Tuesday settled a defamation lawsuit by Dominion Voting Systems for \$787.5 million, averting a trial putting one of the world's top media companies in the crosshairs over its coverage of false vote-rigging claims in the 2020 US election. The settlement, which legal experts said was the largest struck by an American media company, was announced by the two sides and the judge in the case at the 11th hour. The jury had been selected earlier in the day and the trial poised for opening statements in Wilmington, Delaware. Dominion had sought \$1.6 billion in damages in the lawsuit filed in 2021. Dominion CEO John Poulos called the settlement "historic." "Fox has admitted to telling lies about Dominion that caused enormous damage to my company, our employees and our customers," Poulos said in a statement. "Truthful reporting in the media is essential to our democracy," Poulos said.

What is 'Arcturus' COVID-19 Variant Detected in 22 Countries So Far?



NEW YORK (Agencies): The Covid subvariant, one of hundreds to spawn from the Omicron variant of the SARS-COV-2 virus, doesn't seem to be more lethal than the others, but health officials are watching as it slowly spreads around the world. More infectious virus variants tend to displace less infectious competitors and become the dominant cause of infection. The World Health Organization (WHO) has designated the new coronavirus subvariant XBB.1.16 as a "variant under monitoring, but so far isn't sounding the alarms. Because of its mouthful of a name, the subvariant is better known as "Arcturus," following a semi-official subvariant naming scheme derived from mythological characters that the WHO has not yet adopted. Outside of COVID-19 virology, Arcturus is a red giant star found in the constellation Bootes, and the fourth-brightest star in the night sky as seen from Earth. Its name in Ancient Greek means "Guardian of the Bear." The subvariant was first detected in January.

- More Infectious, No More Deadly Although it has emerged as a distinct subvariant of Omicron, a WHO-named COVID-19 variant that was first detected in late 2021 and has been the dominant variant globally for nearly 16 months, Arcturus doesn't seem to be too different from its parent virus.

"We haven't seen a change in severity in individuals or in populations, but that's why we have these systems in place. It has one additional mutation in the spike protein, which, in lab studies, shows increased infectivity as well as potential increased pathogenicity," she added. In other words, it's a bit more infectious than Omicron, but not by much, and the symptoms don't seem to be any worse than Omicron. Work by Japanese doctors suggests it might be 1.2 times more infectious than Omicron. There hasn't been a detected increase in deaths related to Arcturus, either.

Qatar and UAE in process of restoring diplomatic ties

DOHA/DUBAI (Agencies): Qatar and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) are restoring diplomatic ties and reopening embassies, officials said on Tuesday. The step comes more than two years after Arab states ended a boycott of Doha. "At present, the activation of diplomatic ties, which will include the reopening of embassies, is under process between both countries," a UAE official said in a statement in response to a question from Reuters. Qatar's international media office, in a statement, confirmed that "work is underway to reopen the respective embassies as soon as possible." "Regarding the opening of embassies between the two countries, I think it will be in the coming weeks," Oatari foreign ministry spokesperson Majid Al-Ansari told a briefing. A Gulf official said embassies were expected to reopen with new ambassadors in their posts by mid-



June. A fourth source said diplomatic relations would be fully restored within weeks. The restoration of ties comes amid a broader regional push for reconciliation with Iran and Saudi Arabia agreeing last month to re-establish relations after years of hostility, which threatened instability in the Gulf and stoked the war in Yemen. Several Arab countries, including Saudi Arabia and Egypt, have moved to end a decade-long isolation of Syria, which had been boycotted over its crackdown on protests in 2011 — violence that led to a protracted civil war.

Canada public servants stage massive strike



Ottawa (AFP/APP): A third of Canada's public servants set up pickets at hundreds of sites across the country Wednesday demanding cost-of-living raises and telework flexibility in one of the largest strikes in the nation's history. After months of negotiating with Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's government, the Public Service Alliance of Canada (PSAC) said it had failed to reach a deal by the deadline it had set for late Tuesday. More than 155,000 public servants went on strike, hitting picket lines at more than 250 locations across the country, according to PSAC. Canada last saw a strike of this size in 1991. In Ottawa, New Democratic Party leader

Jagmeet Singh, whose small leftist faction usually backs Trudeau's Liberals but not in this case, marched with picketers outside parliament and Trudeau's office. Crystal Warner, picketing in Montreal, called the government's wage offers "offensive." "They're not keeping in line with even inflation," she lamented. All around her, picketers blew whistles and waved flags, as one of their leaders, Francis Snyder, told AFP that they're "ready to stay as long as it takes." Mona Fortier, president of the Treasury Board that overseas government workers, told reporters in Ottawa the two sides "are still at the table negotiating and hopefully we'll make some progress today."

US-made kamikaze drone hits Russia – media

UAV has reportedly been used in an attack on Belgorod Region. Ukrainian forces have allegedly used a US-made unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) in an attack on Russian territory for the first time, the Mash and SHOT outlets reported on Tuesday. A Switchblade drone, produced by the American AeroVironment company, reportedly flew into Russian airspace from Ukraine before downing in Russia's Belgorod Region, bordering Ukrainian territory. The UAV fell just around 500 meters away from the border without inflicting any damage or casualties, local news outlets said. Neither Mash, nor SHOT provided any photos or video from the alleged drone crash site and the Russian military has not yet commented on the incident. The Switchblade is a miniature kamikaze drone capable of dive-bombing targets. It can weigh up to 15 kilograms and has

MOSCOW (Agencies): A Switchblade a length of between 49 and 130 centimeters depending on the modification. The US has supplied Kiev with some 700 Switchblade drones, as well as 1,800 Phoenix Ghost kamikaze drones. Russia has repeatedly witnessed Ukrainian drone attacks, particularly in its regions bordering Ukraine, amid the ongoing conflict between Moscow and Kiev. Some Ukrainian attacks also targeted regions deeper inside Russia. In March, one of three people as an explosives-laden UAV hit a town in Tula Region located south of Moscow, some 250km away from the nearest border with Ukraine. In December 2022, Ukrainian UAVs attacked Dyagilevo and Engels military airfields located 500km (310.6 miles) and 700km (435 miles) from Ukrainianheld territory, respectively. Three servicemen were killed and two aircraft received minor damage, the Russian Ministry of Defense said at the time.

India population to surpass China mid-year



New Delhi (AFP/APP): India is set to overtake China as the world's most populous country by mid-year with almost three million more people, UN estimates showed on Wednesday. India's population will be 1.4286 billion compared to China's 1.4257 billion at mid-year, the United Nations Population Fund's State of World Population report showed. The number of people in China shrank last year for the first time since 1960, when millions starved to death under the disastrous agricultural policies of former leader Mao Zedong. Many have blamed the slowdown on the soaring cost of living as well as the growing number of women going into the workforce and seeking higher education. Beijing ended its strict "one-child policy", imposed in the 1980s amid overpopulation fears, in 2016 and started letting couples have three children in 2021. China faces a looming demographic decline as birth rates plunge and its workforce ages.

Beijing:Twelve held after Beijing hospital fire kills 29



Twelve people have been detained by police for questioning after a hospital fire in Beijing killed at least 29, most of them patients. The fire, among the deadliest in recent years, broke out in Changfeng Hospital at about 13:00 local time on Tuesday. Angry and concerned relatives rushed to the hospital hours later, only learning of the fire from local news reports. "Seven or eight hours have passed and I didn't even receive a call," one relative told China Youth Daily. Many said they spent the night trying to locate loved ones. Those who were rescued have now been shifted to other hospitals for treatment. Speaking at a press conference on Wednesday, officials said a preliminary investigation showed that sparks generated during renovation works had ignited paint stored on site. Among those detained are the director and deputy director of the hospital, as well as the head of the firm overseeing the renovation works. Footage on social media showed patients jumping out of windows to flee as dense smoke billowed out of the building. A talking drone urged trapped patients to "stay calm and wait [to be] rescued". Some were seen balancing on external air conditioning units as they waited to be rescued. Local media reported that firefighters evacuated about 70 people and put out the flames within an hour of arriving. But relatives of those who were being treated at Changfeng were furious with the hospital management. They said even eight hours later, hospital officials were unable to provide the names of those who had been injured or had died.
