# Turkiye gains nuclear status with delivery of first nuclear fuel to Akkuyu Power Plant: President

ANKARA (Agencies): Turkiye's first nuclear power plant, Akkuyu, has been officially granted nuclear facility status with the delivery of the first nuclear fuel to the plant site, President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said on Thursday, Anadolu News Agency reports. "With the delivery of nuclear fuels by air and sea to our power plant, Akkuyu has now gained the status of a nuclear plant," Erdogan said during his virtual address to the first nuclear fuel delivery ceremony. Turkiye has risen to the league of countries with nuclear power in the world, albeit after a 60-year delay, he added. An inter-governmental agreement for the plant in southern Mersin province was signed between Turkiye and Russia in May 2010. The plant's ground-breaking ceremony was held on 3 April, 2018, after which construction started on the first unit. Stressing that there are 422 nuclear reactors in operation in the world, and 57 of them are still under construction, Erdogan said the EU gets 25 per cent of its electricity from nuclear sources. "Last year, the European Commission accepted nuclear energy as 'green energy' and eliminated the hesitations on this issue. With Akkuyu, we made our country a part of these developments," he added. "Like many important projects, Akkuyu was realised with a financing model that does not burden

## Intel posts largest quarterly loss in company history as chip sales collapse



San Francisco (AFP/APP): Intel on Thursday posted a massive fall in sales for the first quarter of 2023 because of a steep drop in the demand for semiconductors -- or chips -- that power personal computers and smartphones. Intel's revenue fell 36 percent to \$11.7 billion in the three-month period and the semiconductor giant posted a loss of \$2.8 billion, its biggest ever for a quarter. Rising prices, a global chip glut and poor demand for hardware also punished Intel's rival Samsung, which earlier on Thursday reported its worst quarterly profits in 14 years. The loss and sales collapse was slightly less catastrophic than expectations, but the stock still lost about two percent in post-session trading. Intel is one of the world's leading semiconductor makers that makes a wide range of products, including the latest generation chips along with Taiwan's TSMC and South Korea's Samsung. It was also affected by falling demand for chips that power data centers and is struggling to compete with Nvidia for the semiconductors that undergird ChatGPT-style generative AI, a major new and chips-hungry sector for the industry. The chips industry, which also powers technology such as smartphones and cars, is well-known for its volatility, with demand and supply see-sawing with the dips and rises in the world economy. Its central role in the global supply chain became clear during the height of the Covid pandemic. Lockdowns and health restrictions diminished production out of Asia, leaving surging demand for chips unmet just as everyone turned online for work, shopping and entertainment. Semiconductors have also become a political pawn between the US and China, with Washington urging allies to stop supplying China with cutting edge chips, further destabilizing the sector.

## World's highest railway bridge to open in Indian-administered Kashmir soon

NEW DELHI (Agencies): The bridge over the Chenab River, taller than the Eiffel Tower, will provide all-weather connectivity with the valley.

In the middle of the mighty Himalayas in Indian-administered Kashmir lies the world's highest railway bridge. The bridge over the Chenab River 1,315-metre-long (4,314 feet) and 359-metre-high (1,177 feet) from the bed of the river - will link the remote region with India's vast railway network by providing all-weather connectivity. At the peak of the winter, a large part of the disputed region is cut off from the rest of India. The bridge, taller than the Eiffel Tower in Paris, lies between the villages of Bakkal and Kauri in Reasi district of the southern Jammu area of Kashmir. The country's antitrust regulator said on Wednesday that Microsoft's commitment to offer access to Activision's multi-billion dollar "Call of Duty" franchise to leading cloud gam-

## 8 ex-India navy officers accused of spying on Qatar for Israel

DOHA (Agencies): Eight former Indian naval personnel are currently facing trial in Qatar on charges of espionage. They are accused of gathering intelligence on Qatar's secret project to acquire high-tech submarines manufactured in Italy, which are designed to be difficult to detect by adversaries. According to the Print, legal proceedings against the officers began on 29 March, with the next hearing scheduled for May. The eight were working for a company called Dahra Global Technologies and Consultancy Services, which was described as a "local business partner" of Qatar's defence and other agencies. They were arrested back in August



2022, although no official charges were brought at the time, it was widely suspected that they were spying on behalf of Israel. An intelligence source was quoted by the Print as saying: "We've tried hard to convince our counterparts in Doha that India and its nationals were not involved in hostile intelligence operations against the emirate."

## Spectacular' Roman camps discovered in Arabian desert could change history




RIYADH (Agencies): Archaeologists using Google Earth have made a 'spectacular' find of three Roman military camps in the Arabian desert that could change understanding of the region's history. The discovery, by University of Oxford researchers, identified three Roman fortified camps spread across northern Arabia. Laid out in the traditional 'playing card' shape, the camps may be evidence of a previously unknown military cam-

paign linked to the Roman takeover of the Nabataean Kingdom in 106 CE, a civilisation centred on the city of Petra, located in Jordan. The surviving Roman history argues the transfer of power was a peaceful event at the end of the reign of the last Nabataean king. 'We are almost certain they were built by the Roman army, given the typical playing card shape of the enclosures with opposing entrances along each side,' said Dr Michael Fradley, who led the research. 'The only notable difference between them is that the westernmost camp is significantly larger than the two camps to the east.' Oxford's Dr Mike Bishop, an expert on the Roman military, said: 'These camps are a spectacular new find and an important new insight into Roman campaigning in Arabia.

#### Sudan Conflict

The uptick in violence in Sudan since April 15 has led to growing concern in the international community. The lull in fighting between the forces of RSF chief Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo and the army allowed for numerous states such as the US and the UKL to pull out their citizens amid rising fears of more violence in the coming days. While foreign nationals might have the option to return home, Sudanese citizens are under grave threat from the fighting as shelling has been reported even in the capital city of Khartoum. Sudanese citizens had only managed to get out from under the yoke of a brutal dictator in 2019 and were forced between two warning military groups since 2021. The biggest threat for the Sudanese citizens apart from the violence remains access to healthcare, with reports of hospitals being used as bases and health workers under threat. The international community must look to bring both sides to the table and at least agree on a code of conduct that keeps the citizens safe and allows access to basic services and needs.

On a larger level, however, the Sudanese crisis of governance is predicated on the aims of individuals to gain power and keep democracy at bay. This is not acceptable. The people of Sudan deserve a government that represents them, especially after engaging in a struggle that just recently overthrew a longstanding dictator. The international community must not endorse the actions of either side in this conflict, considering the power that both individual leaders of the forces have. There needs to be an end to rising to power on the back of armed conflict. Free and transparent elections are needed to chart a path forward. But for now, the greater concern remains the violence and the effect this will have on an already impoverished country.

dation from the previous week, it was 1970s have criticised more than once a piece by Bilal Gilani in The News. The executive director of Gallup Pakistan, Gilani has written more than once on this subject, as have others, but he seems to have a far better grasp. The issue is the changing nature of Pakistani politics, the polarisation and the role of the youth (perhaps, I shouldn't call it 'an issue').

Identifying this new mobilisation, he explains that from 2013 onwards, Pakistani youth have been increasingly participating in the electoral exercise. He puts it down to two main factors: the expansion of social media and the proliferation of education, leading to a more aware, more politicised youth. While the point about social media has been made time and again, it would be worthwhile to quote Gilani on the latter: "Before 2002, there were less than 200,000 undergraduate students in universities across Pakistan. By the end of that decade, there were more than two million. Similarly, within these two decades, the average years of education that a Pakistani child could expect to receive rose from less than three years to almost eight years. Unlike ever before in our history, at least 85 per cent children have been to school at some have adopted in 1985 or which seems point in their lives." Gilani then goes on to argue how this has created the present conflict in the country, where this youth feels the status quo is preventing them from reaching their goals. And second, that this generational conflict is also causing fissures within institutions. Insightful writings allow the rest of us to use them as a springboard. And it was no different with Gilani's piece. While he argues for the need for a larger, broader dialogue to engage the youth, he also argues for reform of the political system and it is this latter, which we may need to focus on. For, as he too points out, the present political system, set in place decades ago, is near collapse — to put it gently. Set in place after the Zia coup, it aimed in some ways to stem the popular mobilisation, which had led to the rise of the PPP. But a coup, especially in Pakistan, cannot stop political activity altogether. And therefore, the political processes set in place by the military regime tried to counter the popular mobilisation by a state patronage system. In this system, the earlier strongmen who enjoyed control through their landholdings for instance, now turned brokers who managed the state patronage for their voters and supporters. And to a large extent, in Punjab, this became the class which formed the basis of the

IF there was one reading recommen- had witnessed the mobilisation of the the introduction of money, including the use of development funds, which overshadowed the place of ideology in politics during the 1980s. But that was the whole point - it was meant to blunt ideology and popular mobilisation. 'Electables' were born, who used access and influence in the shape of 'thana, katchery' and state employment, to win over votes. In addition, the 'development' model meant local projects created jobs as well as a share in public largesse for those who would pay back in kind when politicians ran electoral campaigns or needed other favours. It is this model which explains a number of myths or assumptions about the PML-N and its supporters, such as the 'khata hai toh lagata bhi hai' or the idea that the party's voter would not attend rallies or join agitations but turn out to vote on election day. This model stayed dominant for decades and also allowed the specific manner in which the Musharraf regime managed the 2002 election - where an entire party was more or less hijacked to form the king's party (only to revert to its original leadership post 2008). This was not a strategy that Zia could possible now. However, over time, this model has become less effective, as the number of voters is growing and the stunted economy means that state patronage simply cannot offer more. The development budget cannot stretch infinitely; it is perhaps shrinking in real terms. The situation is no different with employment in the state sector. According to Gilani, older parties cannot recognise the youth's estrangement; they perhaps can but their political model cannot afford to address this estrangement. The PTI sees this and offers a solution in vague terms of advancement for all; this is also reflected in its flagship health card programme, which is universal rather than designed in a way to limit it in a manner in which the beneficiaries can be chosen. This is also why the PTI's promise of local government had proved popular — in a political system limited to the national and provincial assemblies, the politically ambitious youth had limited avenues of growth as electables and their families tend to dominate party tickets. A fully empowered LG system could open doors. But those who are part of the status quo have resisted it, creating the tensions between the traditional electables who joined PTI and the par-

## US 'Very Confident' Ukraine Has What It Needs For Counteroffensive - And China is paying a cost for its support of Russia's aggression, U.S. Europe Command says. – By Patrick Tucker

teroffensive it is expected to begin within weeks, the leader of U.S. European Command told lawmakers on Wednesday. "Over 98 percent of the combat vehicles [the United States has recently promised Ukraine] are already there, Gen. Chris Cavoli said at a hearing of the House Armed Services committee. "I am very confident that we have delivered the materiel that they need and will continue a pipeline to sustain their operations as well." That statement comes after a series of leaks revealed Pentagon leaders' concerns that the counter-offensive could fall short of expectations and that Ukraine was on the verge of depleting key artillery stockpiles. Lawmakers also grilled Cavoli and Celeste Wallander, assistant defense secretary for international security affairs about why Ukraine wasn't getting more military aid more quickly, such as F-16s and especially cluster munitions. On fighter jets, Wallander reiterated a familiar line: They aren't a top priority. "Western modern aircraft is about eighth on the list" of Ukraine's pressing war needs, she said. "We have focused resources on the highest priority capabilities, and that has been Air Defense Artillery and armor." On the possibility of giving cluster munitions to Ukraine, Cavoli described them as "a very effective munition. It's very effective against mixed targets of personnel and equipment, especially when those targets are gathered into dense formations." But neither the Pentagon or the White House have responded publicly to Ukrainian requests for cluster shells. When one lawmaker pointed out that dense formations of mixed targets is a good characterization of the Russian forces around Bakhmut right now, Cavoli responded that the characterization was accurate. "It happens on most battlefields when one force goes on to the offense. So, as a strictly military matter, it is a useful and very effective munition.'

Chinese support for Russia's war in Ukraine has helped the Kremlin conhas cost Beijing, Cavoli and Wallander told lawmakers. China's diplomatic, political, and moral support for Russia "appears increasingly to be an uneven bromance...in which Russia could become the junior partner, but it is nevertheless a dangerous development or development of significant concern," Cavoli said. "Our European allies have spotted this, have noticed this, andwith the encouragement of the United States and their own observations—are taking significant actions to limit the increasing influence and malign influence where it exists of the PRC inside Europe," he said. Wallander agreed. For years, the United States had been warning allies, particularly in central Europe, that trade agreements with China were more trouble than they are worth, given the way China uses loans to extract political concessions. Many countries in Europe who made up the so-called 17+1 mechanism were still open to establishing trade and financial ties with China. But China's support for Russia's war has hurt the appeal of Chinese investment. "We have seen a change. Three of the countries [Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia] who've been members of the 17 + 1 arrangement by which China was seeking to build those kinds of dependencies through trade investment have actually...quit that structure, recognizing the challenges that China poses, the vulnerabilities that it seeks to create, and successfully often creates through technology, through problematic investment contracts, through acquisition of companies, imports. And so there is a greater awareness among European countries that, even as they trade with China, that they need to not allow themselves to become vulnerable to coercion," she said.

- NATO's reinforced eastern flank Just before Russia's expanded invasion in February 2022, the United States was already moving more forces into Eastern Europe. Now, the U.S. has "just shy of 20,000 deployed service personnel who are not normally stationed in Europe [deployed] forward in Europe,"

Ukraine has what it needs for the countinue to launch attacks, but that support Cavoli said. "We have all of the Army V Corps headquarters formed. We have two division headquarters, and we have five brigade combat teams" in places like Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Slovakia. He said his command also has a "large amount in Poland and each of the three Baltic countries": Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. Cavoli also serves as Supreme Allied Commander of Europe. In that capacity, "I have over 40,000 troops turned over to my command right now. And nations are prepared to add more with regard to what else we can do to help Ukraine," he said. The ascension of Finland into NATO will provide the alliance with new capabilities, Cavoli noted. "Finland brings a large army at full mobilization, 280,000 ground troops. [It] brings a very competent Navy, brings a large and growing Air Force. They're in the process of acquiring 64 F-35 [joint strike fighter aircraft] which will create 250 fifth-generation fighters across the northern three Scandinavian countries," he said. Cavoli said the alliance is also working to better integrate those countries into a unified air defense regime. "We are in year three of a five-year special security cooperation initiative for integrated air and missile defense in the Baltics," he said. "The first phase of that was to lav down the communications networks, and the secure communications necessary. That's been done. We're now in the phase where we lay out more sensors and importantly, integrate those sensors. We're doing pretty well with that. Phase three will be the last year of the five-year plan, and that is to put actual weapons systems in separately from that." When NATO leaders gather in July in Lithuania, Cavoli expects to discuss a "special air defense plan that will help us drive forward the rest of the Baltic Iand program." When asked if that was enough to meet the current threat, he responded: "We're resourced against the requirement we have right now. Should the situation change we're prepared to







## Vitamin D levels may affect body's response to cancer treatment: Study

ISLAMABAD (APP): Vitamin D levels pared with 36.2 per cent in the group may be key in determining the human body's response to anti-cancer immunotherapy, especially among people with advanced skin cancer, according to a study. The findings, published online in the peer-reviewed journal CANCER, showed that for patients with advanced melanoma, it may be important to maintain normal vitamin D levels when receiving immunotherapy medications called immune checkpoint inhibitors. Vitamin D has many effects on the body, including regulation of the immune system. To see whether levels of vitamin D might impact the effectiveness of immune checkpoint inhibitors, the team analvsed the blood of 200 patients with advanced melanoma both before and every 12 weeks during immunotherapy treatment. A favourable response rate to immune checkpoint inhibitors was observed in 56.0 per cent of patients in the group with normal baseline vitamin D levels or normal levels obtained with vitamin D supplementation, com-

with low vitamin D levels without supplementation, Medical Daily reported. Progression-free survival -- the time from treatment initiation until cancer progression -- in these groups was 11.25 and 5.75 months, respectively. "Of course, vitamin D is not itself an anti-cancer drug, but its normal serum level is needed for the proper functioning of the immune system, including the response that anti-cancer drugs like immune checkpoint inhibitors affect," said lead author Lukasz Galus, from Poznan University of Medical Sciences, in Poland, "In our opinion, after appropriately randomised confirmation of our results, the assessment of vitamin D levels and its supplementation could be considered in the management of melanoma." Melanoma is a disease in which malignant (cancer) cells form in melanocytes (cells that colour the skin). Melanoma can occur anywhere on the skin. Unusual moles, exposure to sunlight, and health history can affect the risk of melanoma.

NEW YORK (Agencies): Boeing reported a bigger-than-expected quarterly loss Wednesday due to quality control problems that have limited commercial plane deliveries and lifted costs in its defense program. The company reported a loss of \$425 million, compared with \$1.2 billion in the year-ago period. But Boeing affirmed its full-year outlook for operating cash flow, a key metric,

and for 737 plane deliveries in 2023. The company's revenues came in at \$17.9 billion, up 28 percent from the year-ago period and topping analyst expectations, but under the level of the pre-pandemic 2019 first quarter. Shares rose on the report. "We are progressing through recent supply chain disruptions but remain confident in the goals we set for this year, as well as for the longer term," said

Chief Executive Dave Calhoun. 



## Veto responsible for non-resolution of Kashmir, Palestine issues: Pakistan says in UNGA's debate

UNITED NATIONS (APP): Pakistan has told the UN General Assembly that it considers the veto power vested in the Security Council's five permanent members an important issue that needed to be tacked as part of the 15-member Council's reform to make it more effective. Speaking in a debate marking the first anniversary of the 193-nation Assembly's landmark resolution that requires



the permanent members — Britain, China, France, Russia and the U.S. - to justify the use of veto, Ambassador Munir Akram said the Security Council has been paralyzed by the strategic rivalries of its permanent members and the exercise of the veto. "It is precisely for this reason that longstanding disputes such as Kashmir and Palestine could not be resolved," the Pakistani envoy said, adding that the vetoes in the Council have prevented and hindered the implementation of UN resolutions.

## Global warming made Horn of Africa drought possible: report

Paris (Agencies): A devastating drought centrated on the three areas worst hit that has struck the Horn of Africa could not have occurred without global warming, according to a new report released on Thursday from an international team of climate scientists. "Human-caused climate change has made agricultural drought in the Horn of Africa about 100 times more likely," said a summary of the report by the World Weather Attribution (WWA) group. "The ongoing devastating drought would not have happened at all without the effect of greenhouse gas emissions," it added. Since late 2020, countries in the Horn of Africa - Djibouti, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, Somalia, South Sudan and Sudan — have been suffering the worst drought in 40 years. The extended drought has led to the deaths of millions of heads of cattle and wiped out crops. The WWA study con-

by the drought: southern Ethiopia, Somalia and eastern Kenya. While climate change had little effect on total annual rainfall in the region, "higher temperatures have significantly increased evaporation from soil and plants, which has made dry soils much more likely", according to the 19 scientists who contributed to the WWA report. "Without this effect, the region would not have experienced agricultural drought, when crops and pastures are affected by dry conditions, over the last two years," the summary added. "Instead, widespread crop failures and livestock deaths have left more than 20 million people at risk of acute food insecurity." The WWA said that, for its rapid analysis, "scientists looked at changes in rainfall in 2021 and 2022 in the affected region, covering southern Ethiopia, southern Somalia and eastern Kenya". "They found that climate change is affecting the rainfall periods in opposite ways. The long rains are becoming drier, with low rainfall now about twice as likely, while the short rains are becoming wetter due to climate change," it added. "This wettening trend in the short rains has been masked recently by the La Nina weather pattern, which reduces rainfall in the short rains." Joyce Kimutai, a Kenyan climatologist who contributed to the report, told AFP: "It is time we act and engage differently. Central to this process is to transform and enhance the resilience of our systems. "We need to innovate across and throughout food systems, improve collaboration, involve vulnerable groups, make the best use of data and information, as well as incorporate new technologies and traditional knowledge."



WASHINGTON (AFP/APP): US President Joe Biden and his South Korean counterpart Yoon Suk Yeol warned North Korea it would face a nuclear response and the "end" of the leadership there if Pyongyang uses its arsenal. Speaking at the White House after Oval Office talks during only the second state visit so far in the Biden presidency, the two leaders said the US security shield for South Korea was being strengthened in the face of the nuclear-armed North's ag-

dictatorship in North Korea attacks the South or the United States, the response will be devastating. "A nuclear attack by North Korea against the United States or its allies... will result in the end of whatever regime were to take such an action," Biden told reporters at a joint press conference with Yoon. Yoon said his priority was to secure peace through the "superiority of overwhelming forces

and not a false peace based on the goodwill of the other side." "In the event of a North Korean nuclear attack," he said, Washington and Seoul have agreed to "respond swiftly, overwhelmingly and decisively using the full force of the alliance including US nuclear weapons." A military honor guard and hundreds of guests massed outside the White House where Yoon and his wife, Kim Keon Hee, arrived for a day of pomp and ceremony.

## Out of gas in orbit? This US space company is here to help



COLORADO SPRINGS (Agencies): The US company Orbit Fab is aiming to produce the go-to "gas stations" in space, its CEO tells AFP, hoping its refuelling technology will make the surging satellite industry more sustainable -- and profitable. The solar panels typically attached to satellites can generate energy for their onboard systems such as cameras and radios, but can't help the orbiting objects adjust their positions, explains Daniel Faber, who co-founded the company in 2018. "Everything always drifts, and so very quickly, you're not where you needed to be -- so you need to keep adjusting, which means you need to keep using up propellant," he tells AFP at the space industry's annual gathering in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Satellites' lives are therefore limited by how much fuel they can carry along with them -- at least for now. "If you can refuel satellites in orbit," Faber says, "you can stop them having to be thrown away" -a model he describes as "crazy" due to their high cost to manufacture and launch.

His company envisions sending several large tanks into orbit, each containing up to several tons of fuel. Then smaller, more easily manoeuvrable vessels will shuttle back and forth between the tanks and satellites -- like robotic pump attendants. Asked what the risks associated with operating such a system in orbit are, Faber is candid: "Everything you might imagine." But he reassures that with lots of testing on the ground, and in orbit, "it's going to be safe." Like cars, satellites hoping to receive additional propellant from Orbit Fab will have to have compatible fuel ports.

## Brazil court suspends Telegram app in neo-Nazi probe

RIO DE JANEIRO (AFP/APP): A Brazilian court on Wednesday ordered the countrywide suspension of messaging app Telegram after its parent company failed to provide data sought by authorities on neo-Nazis operating on the network, officials said. The move came after a spate of violent school attacks, at least one of them linked to exchanges on a group with anti-Semitic leanings. Justice Minister Flavio Dino said the court had fined Telegram a million reais (about \$198,000) per day for "not complying" with an ongoing probe into neo-Nazi activity on social networks, and ordered the "temporary suspension of (its) activities." "There are groups called 'Anti-Semitic Front' and 'Anti-Semitic Movement' acting in those networks, and we know that this is at the core of violence against our eastern state of Espirito Santo.

It was just another day in the life of Myanmar's premier snake removal squad, prising pythons and cajoling cobras from dangerous entanglements with the human world before returning them to their natural habitat. Stuffed into the sacks were three months' worth of work, rescued from homes and apartments around Yangon and cared for at the monastery until they are fit for release to the wild. "I love snakes because they are not deceitful,"



Shwe Lei told AFP at the snake shelter run by the group, a python entwined around her body. "If you acknowledge their nature, they are lovely." Her mentor Ko Toe Aung, a burly 40-yearold who said he has been hospitalised seven times since he started catching snakes in 2016, was more prosaic.

## Sudan's army and RSF say ceasefire extended but fighting goes on

KHARTOUM (Agencies): The Sudanese army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) have agreed to extend their ceasefire amidst ongoing violence in the capital Khartoum and the western Darfur region. In the final hours of the repeatedly broken three-day truce, due to end at midnight (22:00 GMT) on Thursday, the army said it would extend the ceasefire "for an additional 72 hours" following mediation efforts by Saudi Arabia and the United States. On Thursday, warplanes patrolled over the capital's northern suburbs as fighters on the ground exchanged artillery and heavy machinegun fire, witnesses told the AFP news agency. The previous ceasefire has not stopped the fighting, but created enough of a lull for tens of thousands of Sudanese to flee to safer areas and for foreign nations to evacuate hundreds of their citizens by land and sea. Together, the army and the RSF toppled a civilian government in an October 2021 coup but are now locked in a power struggle that has derailed an internationally backed transition to democracy and is threatening to destabilise a fragile region. The army claims it controls most of Sudan's regions and is defeating a large RSF deployment in Khartoum, where some residential areas have turned into war zones. Despite a partial lull in fighting since the first 72-hour ceasefire began, air attacks and anti-aircraft fire could be heard on Thursday in the capital and the nearby cities of Omdurman and Bahri, witnesses and Reuters journalists said.

#### Biden to make landmark visit to Papua New Guinea



PORT MORESBY (AFP/APP): Joe Biden is set to become the first sitting US president in at least a century to visit Papua New Guinea, Foreign Minister Justin Tkatchenko said Thursday, revealing plans for a brief but symbolic trip. Biden plans to stop at Port Moresby in May as he travels between a G7 summit in Japan and a Quad summit in Sydney, Australia, the foreign minister said. "He is coming on the 22nd, in the morning, and will be here for three hours only," Tkatchenko said, adding that talks were expected to focus on the economy, security and climate change. Biden's trip may put the finishing touches on a US-Papua New Guinea Defence Cooperation Agreement that would allow more joint training and the development of security infrastructure. The presidential trip is a nod toward Papua New Guinea's rapidly growing strategic importance. A series of US secretaries of state have visited in the past, including Hillary Clinton and then US vice president Mike Pence in 2018, who stepped in when then-president Donald Trump cancelled his attendance at a regional summit. According to State Department records, which date back to Theodore Roosevelt's administration in 1901, no sitting US president has visited Papua New Guinea.


