US braces for nuclear strike in Ukraine

NEW YORK (Agencies): President Joe Biden's administration is preparing for a possible nuclear attack in Ukraine by wiring the country with a network of sensors that can identify the origin of any atomic strike, the New York Times has reported. The sensors would be able to detect the radiation from either a dirty bomb or a nuclear weapon, the outlet said on Friday, citing Washington's National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA). "In part, the goal is to make sure that if Russia detonates a radioactive weapon on Ukrainian soil, its atomic signature and Moscow's culpability could be verified," the newspaper said. The network of radiation sensors is being deployed "throughout the region" and would be able to "characterize the size, location and effects of any nuclear explosion," according to a NNSA unit called the Nuclear Energy Support Team (NEST). The unit is reportedly working with Ukraine to install the sensors, train workers, monitor data and warn of dangerous levels of radiation. NEST added that data from the sensors

BBC chairman resigns



after row over loan to

LONDON (Agencies): The chairman of Britain's BBC on Friday resigned following a report that found he breached the government's code for public appointments over a loan. Richard Sharp was recommended for the job in fall 2020 because he assisted - to a "very limited extent" - then-Prime Minister Boris Johnson secure a loan, according to the report by barrister Adam Heppinstall. Sharp was investigated over his appointment to the iconic broadcaster's helm, when he was reported to have helped facilitate an £800,000 (\$995,000) loan guarantee for Johnson, weeks before he was appointed the BBC chair by Johnson. The report also told how Sharp communicated to Johnson that he wanted to apply for the BBC chairman role in November 2020 but that Sharp would not be independent of the prime minister if he was appointed. BBC Director-General Tim Davie thanked Sharp for his service to the BBC and the "drive and intellect" he brought: "Working with him over the last two years has been rewarding and Richard has made a significant contribution to the transformation of and success of the BBC.'

Barker to head US Army electronic warfare office

WASHINGTON (Agencies): A U.S. Army shop for everything electronic warfare and battlefield situational awareness is getting a new leader. Brig. Gen. Ed Barker was named the new boss of the Program Executive Office for Intelligence, Electronic Warfare and Sensors, or PEO IEW&S, according to an announcement from the Pentagon. Barker has served as the office's deputy since July 2021. He will succeed Mark Kitz, who has held the job as the program executive officer since May 2021. The announcement made no mention of Kitz's next move.

The transition is expected to take place "sometime this summer," a PEO IEW&S spokesperson said.

RISALPUR (APP): Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Friday said the whole nation stood behind its armed forces like a solid rock and it would continue to do so in future to defeat the evil designs of anti-Pakistan forces. I have an unwavering belief that our armed forces will always live up to the expectations of the people in future as well," he said in his address at the passing out parade of cadets at the Pakistan Air Force's Asghar Khan Academy here. The prime minister congratulated the graduating cadets, their parents and the faculty on the most memorable moments of their lives. PM Shehbaz said over the last two decades the nation had been tested by a combination of challenges such as terrorism, extremism and militancy. "The manner in which our armed forces, including the air force, police and intelligence community have risen to the challenges and neutralized the threats to our national security is simply outstanding." He lauded the PAF leadership for making the Pakistan Air Force a truly professional, progressive and high-tech organization. Meltdown: 2023 looking grim for Swiss glaciers



Geneva (AFP/APP): This year is already shaping up to be another bad one for glaciers in the Swiss Alps, with the snowpack covering them around 30 percent below the 10-year average, according to the scientist tracking their decline. Every year in April, when the snowpack reaches its peak, the Glacier Monitoring in Switzerland (GLAMOS) organisation surveys around 15 glaciers. "This year, the conditions are quite similar to 2022 which had record ice losses. Once again, we have very little snow," GLAMOS chief Matthias Huss told AFP. "It's not as dramatic in every region as it was in 2022, but we're still well below average," the glaciologist said, referring to snowpack cover. "There are even regions with a deficit of up to 50 percent" below the 10-year average for the depth of snowpack covering the surface of the glaciers. "The preconditions for the coming summer are therefore bad, as it stands. But we cannot say if we will once again have a record melt during the summer," as that will depend on the temperatures over the coming months. The snowpack is doubly important for glaciers because the fresh snowfall not only feeds them but also provides them with a protective layer in the summer sunshine. For the first time this year, snowpack measurements were made on a glacier located at around 4,100 metres (13,450 feet) above sea level. "We had zero centimetres of snow depth. There was really nothing there at all. It was surprising," said Huss. The situation is "serious for the glaciers when even at 4,000 metres there is no snow towards the end of winter". to the UN's World Meteorological Organization (WMO), the past eight years have been the warmest on record and the average temperature of the planet in 2022 was 1.15 degrees Celsius warmer than the 1850-1900 average. In the European Alps, glaciers melted to a record degree last year due to low winter snowfall, Saharan dust settling on the surface in March and then heatwaves between May and early September. The situation was particularly dramatic in Switzerland, with the glaciers having lost 6.2 percent of their ice volume. Huss is struck by how quickly the glaciers are shrinking. "2022 was an absolute record. And what strikes me is that now, at the end of winter, we once again have a situation that is very particular," he said. The WMO says the game is already up for glaciers and there is no way to stop them melting further unless a way is found to remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. The disappearance of glaciers is "symbolic of climate change", said Huss. He noted the effects they will have on humans in the short term -- ranging from natural hazards, loss of tourism -- and in the longer term, as they supply rivers and hydroelectric power plants. Much of the water that flows into the Rhine and the Rhone, two of Europe's major rivers, comes from the Alpine glaciers. But Huss has not lost all hope. "If we manage to limit global warming to 1.5C or 2C, we could still save about a third of the volume of the Alpine glaciers," he said. "On the other hand, if climate change exceeds 4C, there will be an almost total loss of gla-


Russia sacks deputy defence minister sanctioned by West over Mariupol - report

MOSCOW (Reuters): Russian Colonel ble for the "inhuman" siege of the shat-General Mikhail Mizintsev, who was sanctioned by the West and dubbed the "Butcher of Mariupol" for his role in deputy defence minister, according to a military blogger and a leading news website. Mizintsev orchestrated the siege of the Ukrainian city of Mariupol in the early months of the war last year. In September, he was appointed deputy defence minister in charge of logistics and supplies. Imposing sanctions against Mizintsev last June, the European Union referred to him as the Butcher of Mariupol and said he was responsi-

tered Ukrainian city, which Russia says it is now rebuilding. His departure was reported by a Russian military blogger, the Ukraine war, has been removed as Alexander Sladkov, and by the RBC news site. Neither offered an explanation for why he had apparently been removed. He said that no other security force is capable to perform such a specialized duty. Furthermore, he said that the budget for the current financial year has already been allocated, which could not be diverted to other matters. He held the PTI chairman Imran Khan responsible for the prevailing political turmoil in the country and said that instead of national interest, the politics of Imran Khan is revolving around his personal interests and is bent on pushing the whole country towards anarchy for that purpose.



Declining E-commerce

The e-commerce industry in Pakistan is facing significant challenges due to the country's economic conditions. A new report has mentioned these challenges and details the state of business-to-consumer commerce in the country. The cost of business and living has declined to disastrous levels, and companies are struggling to maintain sales and grow. As a result, the expected growth rate for e-commerce operations has become muted due to a continuous depreciation streak. Pakistan's e-commerce market already lagged well behind comparable economies, and its market size was the lowest in peer groups. Unfortunately, at a time like this, the market has taken a further hit due to the country's economic misfortune. Funding for e-commerce startups was on an upward trajectory, and the sector's investments were increasing, but these numbers are now affected. It may take years to recover once hit. Last year, Daraz's CEO, the largest player in Pakistan's e-commerce market, mentioned that the company has been in a loss for consecutive years of operations and was far away from breaking even. Building and capturing a market requires years of growth, expenses, and investment. Now, with the situation getting worse, market leaders like Daraz may face further complications. Additionally, there has been a decline in e-commerce transactions in the first half of this fiscal year and a dip in total e-banking value, which is a significant concern. It is due to low trust of consumers in electronic payment systems, presenting an opportunity to work towards investing in e-transactions. However, any improvements to current systems cannot work when citizens are facing a price hike, food crisis, and general mounting pressures of the economy. Money needs to circulate for a thriving e-commerce environment, but the current economic conditions are not conducive. Unemployment is on the rise, and retailers are struggling with operations. The outbreak of civil war in Sudan is a ally pitch them against each other. Of sad story of two out-of-control Generals at odds with each other, both trying to convince us all this is merely a continuation of the people's revolution that overthrew the dictatorship of Omar Al-Bashir in 2019. It is, of course, a huge lie and there are plenty circumnavigating the world today. Sadly, if not predictably, ordinary Sudanese were never allowed to carve out a political landscape that could introduce a functioning democracy into one of Africa's largest countries. I have spent many happy times in Sudan, over the years, with a group of peace activists who were developing a grass-roots-upwards-solution to Khartoum's problems in Darfur. Western sceptics dismissed our work. as we focussed on trying to bring peace to Darfur under the leadership of Lord Nazir Ahmed who, despite his recent fall from grace, should be acknowledged for the sterling work he did as he brought warring factions, tribal elders and leaders together to try and broker peace. Little did we know, at the time, General Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, so-called Janjaweed militia fighting rebels in Darfur, Later, he became head of a paramilitary militia established by Bashir, who sought to fragment military power in order to control it. The President would have succeeded in his military mind games as well, if Dagalo had proved to be the loyal soldier Bashir thought he was. However, in what proved to be a serious miscalculation, Dagalo turned on the President and overthrew him in 2019. By this time, ordinary Sudanese had taken to the streets in their tens of thousands to reclaim their country. The military was persuaded to go back to the barracks and stay there - and it did work, but only for a while. Patience, not being a military characteristic, soon dwindled and the soldiers mounted a second coup in 2021, which snuffed out the fledgling democracy of the people. As the dust settled, that left Dagalo's paramilitary militia and power being challenged by the State army, led by General Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan. We are told Al-Burhan's attempt to overpower his rival by absorbing his fighters into the regular forces initiated today's violence. Now we see pitched battles between warring military factions across Khartoum, as well as in the vast desert region of Darfur which has divided families, causing a war between the Army and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF)

The US is fine with China's economic success, as long as it's on Washington's terms

Recently, US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen made her first remarks on US economic engagement with China in nearly two years. She rejected the idea that a war between the US and China is "increasingly inevitable," that there is "no reason to fear healthy economic competition with any country," and that "China's economic growth need not be incompatible with US economic leadership." Yellen also said that the primary goal of the US is always to safeguard its "national security" and thus it's not really out to hamper the rise of China or its economy. But actions speak louder than words, and her comments come on the back of the US attempting to cripple China's entire semiconductor industry, forcing third-party countries to abide by those restrictions as well, adding numerous Chinese companies to its trade-restrictions entity list, using allegations of forced labour to opportunistically undermine certain Chinese industries and, of course, maintaining broad Trump-era tariffs on Chinese exports to the US.

It might be asked, what form of economic engagement is there to be had? Because the rhetoric, hyperbole and extremity from Washington could not be less conducive to an economic relationship with China, what with terms such as 'decoupling' being thrown around, and the existence of an entire US congressional committee purely to produce anti-China legislation. The Biden administration, for that matter, is so sensitive to appearing 'weak' on much of US policy concerning Chi-

China, that it will capitulate to any popular trend that gains enough political clout, such as calls to ban the popular TikTok app. The US is so wrapped up on its protectionist, America First doctrine that it cannot be seen to be making concessions. And, looking at Yellen's choice of words, we see the "catch" - China is only permitted to grow on the condition that it accepts "US economic leadership" - in other terms, the US' political, economic, and military dominance. This isn't about reaching a consensus or agreement between the two parties; it is about Washington unilaterally imposing its demands on Beijing and requiring that it step down from certain ambitions. This is classic Western imperialism when it comes to China. Economic engagement with China and its massive market is great, provided that it is the Americans who are setting the terms and reaping the profits. The idea of the Chinese asserting their own sovereign rights and interests is not an option. For the purposes of a historical comparison, the British had their own economic 'engagement' with China in the 19th century. The Opium Wars were about bringing China to heel and forcibly opening up its market so that the UK could exclusively benefit from it. Today, the US wants to benefit from the Chinese market, but only if the terms are favourable for American companies and capital, and is therefore attempting to force capitulation. This is why so

na is devoted to try and destroy or contain the bulk of China's own high-end industries and companies. For example, the US does not want China to develop its own commercial passenger jets, such as the C919; it wants Beijing to rely eternally on Boeing. It does not want China to develop its own microchip-making capabilities, as this will undermine the US control over the industry. You get the picture. The US had little issue with China dominating low-end cheap manufacturing that makes trivial and unimportant goods such as throwaway plastic hotel combs or nail clippers. That's the kind of economic engagement Washington wants, where the balance of profits is in its favour, but the burden of consumer and labour exploitation is on the Chinese.

Finally, it might be worth noting that the US does not tolerate any economic competitor, even among allied states. Hence it has shown little remorse for the destruction and deindustrialization of the German economy, or when it crippled Japan with the 1985 Plaza Accord. The only acceptable China to the US is a weak China, that serves no purpose other than to be a cash cow from which all profits, incentive and talent are vacuumed home. China sees this as completely unacceptable, akin to a new 'Century of Humiliation' and this is why no 'economic truce' is possible if it is predicated on China's surrender to American terms.

Technology in mental health care — By Ayesha Irshad Mian

WITH the world becoming increasingly aware of the snowballing mental health (MH) crisis, there has been a corresponding rise in digital-based solutions designed to respond and scale the delivery of care. A recent WHO report shows that one in eight people worldwide suffers from mental health disorders; this prevalence is almost double that of diabetes and more than that of cardiovascular disease. In addition, people with chronic illnesses and co-morbid anxiety, and/or depression not only have a lower quality of life than those without concomitant MHDs, they are also likely to die five to 10 years earlier.

In a recent op-ed, former SAPM Zafar Mirza detailed the morbidity cost and DALY (disability-adjusted life years) specifics for MHDs in Pakistan. Reports of deaths by suicide feature almost daily in news reports, and there has been an increase in opinion and analysis pieces on the topic. The magnitude of MHDs in Pakistan is accentuated by multiple social drivers including poverty, unemployment, political instability, lack of education, violence, etc. MH-specifuniform policy, to the dearth of basic health literacy and a trained workforce. Most people with MH problems don't seek professional help due to the inability to recognise symptoms, lack of evidence-based services and referral systems, cost implications, prior experiences of unsatisfactory care, etc. By necessity, the period spanning Covid-19 saw the increased use of digital support services in healthcare delivery. Resultantly, a potential proof of concept was provided that would make MH services more accessible to the people, by lowering costs, eliminating travel, increasing outreach, and improving schedule flexibility. Pakistan saw a rise in tech-based interventions in the MH space. These include, but are not

Covid, mental health apps connecting end users to health professionals, and GPs providing telehealth services, using a hub and spoke model. Recently, the government proposed a similar intervention to provide free consultation services. The MH app Humraz pledges to improve the quality of life for those with MHDs. This recent initiative, as others before it, is welcome. New interventions mean that there is increasing awareness; knowledge and edification almost always push the needle in the right direction. This also opens the door to a collaborative discourse on policy, strategic directions, resource mapping, priority setting and defining the values and guiding principles for interacting with technology. However, as with any other new tool entering the utility space, we recommend caution and a deep understanding of the contextual macro and microcosm before we tout it as a solution for all problems. The mental health context: As things stand, Pakistan has around 600 trained psychiatrists and fewer than 500 psychologists, mostly concentrated in urban centres. This amounts to one psychiatrist for evic reasons span from the absence of erv 10.000 adult patients and less than eight child and adolescent psychiatrists for about four million children suffering from MHDs. There are a few counselling training programmes, some accredited by international bodies, with varying levels of supervisory oversight. There is no central credentialling body for therapists. There are over 100 medical schools but most provide very little quality training in MHDs. This means that often the graduating generalists (GPs) and other specialists, who are the gateway to MH referrals, have limited knowledge of MHDs. Quality trained professionals are spread thin between the responsibilities of providing clinical care, teaching, training, advocating and conducting research. Direly needed public health interventions also often fall by the wayside due to lack of policy,

collaborative action and a unified strategic response. Faith healers and other traditional health providers often fill the gap and provide 'care' to patients. Digital solutions in healthcare: Using digital solutions for the provision of health services necessitates due diligence and oversight in ethical, evidence-based and high-quality care. Globally, frameworks and guidelines in healthcare delivery models have been developed to ensure relevant and applicable engagement with AI and digital technology. New programmes, using digital interfaces, must follow these principles to ensure quality of care, minimise harm to patients and respect values and priorities. Any digital intervention must also include provider education and training in the use of the new modality; in-person and online clinical care are different beasts and often require differing skill sets and ethical foundations. Digital MH services in Pakistan: In the complex backdrop described above, digital solutions for mental health care delivery in Pakistan must be well-researched. Adding new-age services to a scarcity landscape, without buffering and buttressing the system, may prove more catastrophic than beneficial. When there is such stark trained work force shortage, is there transparency on end providers? What are the processes being used to measure and ensure ongoing quality? Are we measuring patient usage, satisfaction and outcomes? As we create demand for mental health care, do we have a trained and credentialled supply of quality management? These are just a few questions. Pakistan's MH landscape requires a comprehensive and strategic approach that includes, amongst other priorities, a legal and policy framework, innovative training and regulation structures, and health literacy and advocacy interven-



Oil Updates — Prices head for another monthly decline as weak US data weighs

LONDON (Agencies): Oil prices were heading for another monthly decline on Friday after disappointing US economic data and uncertainty over further interest rate hikes weighed on the demand outlook, according to Reuters. Brent crude futures for June were up 42 cents, or 0.5 percent, at \$78.79 a barrel by 9:46 a.m. GMT while the more actively traded July contract was down 1 cent at \$78.21. Brent is set for its fourth straight monthly fall. Brent



prices retraced earlier losses after data showed the euro zone returned to growth in the first quarter, albeit only modestly and more slowly than expected. US West Texas Intermediate crude lost 15 cents, or 0.2 per-

cent, to trade at \$74.61 a barrel and is set for its sixth straight monthly decline. Data on Thursday showed that US economic growth slowed more than expected in the first quarter. Investors are worried that potential interest rate hikes by inflation-fighting central banks could slow economic growth and dent energy demand in the United States, Britain and the European Union. The US Federal Reserve's next policy meeting is over May 2-3.

Yen slumps to 9-year low vs euro after BOJ maintains ultra-low rates

SINGAPORE (Agencies): The Japanese yen fell to a nine-year low against the euro on Friday after the Bank of Japan left its ultra-easy monetary policy unchanged even as it scrapped a pledge to keep interest rates low, according to Reuters. The euro briefly rose to its highest level against the yen since December 2014 at 149.50. It was last up 1 percent at 148.98 yen with expectations the European Central Bank will hike rates again next week also BOJ said it would maintain ultra-low

BBC chairman Sharp resigns after Boris Johnson loan row

LONDON (Agencies): BBC chairman Richard Sharp resigned today after an independent report found he breached rules for public appointments in relation to a loan for then prime minister Boris Johnson. Sharp said he had agreed to a request to stay on until the end of June to give the government time to find his successor. The country's public appointments watchdog has been investigating the way in which Sharp was selected by the



government to chair the broadcaster in 2021. The report found that while he did breach the government's code for public appointments by failing to

disclose a potential conflict of interest, it was also the case that a breach did not necessarily invalidate his appointment. But Sharp said staying until the end of his four year term would be a distraction from the broadcaster's "good work". "I have decided that it is right to prioritise the interests of the BBC," Sharp said in a statement. "I have therefore, this morning, resigned as the BBC chair to the secretary of state and to the board."

Sudan conflict threatens supply of key soft drink ingredient

NEW YORK (Agencies): Sudan's eruption into conflict has left international consumer goods makers racing to shore up supplies of gum arabic, one of the country's most sought-after products and a key ingredient in everything from fizzy drinks to candy and cosmetics. About 70% of the world's supply of gum arabic, for which there are few substitutes, comes from the acacia trees in the Sahel region that runs through Africa's third-largest



country, which is being torn apart by fighting between the army and a paramilitary force. Wary of Sudan's persistent insecurity, companies dependent on the product, such as communications.

Coca Cola and Pepsico, have long stockpiled supplies, some keeping between three-to-six-months worth to avoid being caught short, exporters and industry sources told Reuters. However, prior conflicts have tended to be focused in far-flung regions such as Darfur. This time, the capital Khartoum has been brought to a standstill in the fighting that broke out on April 15, paralysing the economy and disrupting basic

WASHINGTON (Agencies): The US economic activity, remained resilient, growing at a 3.7 percent annual pace, the fastest such rate in nearly two years. Spending on goods, in particular, was solid: It rose at its fastest pace since the second quarter of 2021. Economists had been expecting overall GDP to grow at a 1.9 percent pace in the January-March quarter. Behind much of the quarter's weakness was a sharp reduction in business inventories, which subtracted roughly 2.3 percentage points from overall growth. Companies typically slash their inventories when they anticipate a coming downturn.

OSLO (Agencies): Norway plans to nationalise most of its gas pipeline network when many existing concessions expire in 2028, the oil and energy ministry said today, to tighten control over key infrastructure. Norway has become Europe's largest supplier of gas, following a drop in Russian gas flows, which it supplies via a network of pipelines stretching some 9,000km. The ministry said today it was sending a letter to licensees "signalling the state aims to make use of the right of repatriation at the end of the license period". TOKYO (Agencies): Sony reported record full-year sales of ¥11.5 trillion (US\$88 billion) today, attributing the "significant" increase to growth in the gaming, music, film and image-sensor sectors. The revenue figure was the largest ever for the Japanese conglomerate, beating the last financial year's record of ¥9.9 trillion (US\$73 billion). A weaker yen and strong gaming hardware sales helped boost sales, along with "higher revenues for anime streaming serof Japanese cartoon streaming giant Crunchyroll, Sony said. The compa-



ny's net profit for the year to March was \forall 937.1 billion, up 6.2% year on year and beating a forecast of ¥870 billion. 

Qatar to host 2027 World Cup in men's basketball

DOHA (Agencies): The International Basketball Federation (FIBA) picked Qatar to host the 2027 edition of its marquee men's World Cup. It did not say whether there were any other bidders. Doha will stage all games in the 32-team event, FIBA said, citing upgraded subway and public transport networks that were completed for the men's soccer World Cup played last November and December. "With all of the teams playing in the same city, fans can plan everything far in advance and enjoy a unique experience since all venues are within 30 minutes of each other," the Switzerland-based governing body said. "Additionally, all venues to be used for FIBA's flagship men's event are already constructed, while widely used green technologies will help in delivering the FIBA Basketball World Cup 2027 as a carbon-neutral event." The No. 89-ranked Qatar team will

LONDON (agencies): Human line judges will be replaced by an electronic calling system on a full-time basis on the ATP Tour from 2025. The ATP, which is the men's governing body, said the move will "optimise accuracy and consistency" in events. Some tournaments have already scrapped human line judges, including the majors at the Australian Open and US Open. "This is a landmark moment for our sport, and not one we've reached without careful consideration," said ATP chairman Andrea Gaudenzi. "Tradition is core to



tennis and line judges have played an important part in the game over the years. "That said, we have a responsibility to embrace innovation and new technologies." The electronic calling

system has been widely adopted since the Covid-19 pandemic when tournaments looked to minimise human interaction. It will be implemented across all surfaces on the ATP Tour, although the four Grand Slam tournaments continue to make their own decisions. Wimbledon, played on grass, and the clay-court French Open have been reluctant to remove human judgement. While Wimbledon allows players to challenge decisions using the Hawk-Eye system, the French Open has so far refused to introduce technology assistance.



Tens of thousands fleeing Sudan, as spectre of ethnic clashes, hunger looms: UN

UNITED NATIONS, (APP): Civilians ating new humanitarian challenges, in Sudan, including scores of internally displaced people and refugees, are scrambling for safety and suffering the disastrous consequences of the violence there, as many aid operations have been forced to pause, UN humanitarian officials said on Friday. The UN refugee agency (UN-HCR) said that tens of thousands of refugees from South Sudan, Ethiopia and Eritrea living in the country have fled the fighting between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in the Khartoum area. The newly displaced have found shelter in existing refugee camps further east and south, cre-

Spain, Portugal smash April temperature records

Madrid (AFP/APP): Mainland Spain and Portugal have broken temperature records for April, officials said on Friday, as both nations wilt in an unusually early heatwave that has raised the risk of wildfires. The mercury hit 38.8 degrees Celsius (101.8 degrees Fahrenheit) in the airport in Spain's southern city of Cordoba on Thursday, beating a previous record of 38.6C in the eastern city of Elche. national weather office AEMET said. This "provisional data" must still be confirmed, a process that can take several days, a spokesperson for the agency told AFP. The highest temperature for all of Spain in the month of April, however, was recorded in 2013 in the Canary Islands off the northwest coast of Africa when the mercury hit 40.2C. In neighbouring Portugal, temperatures in the central town of Mora reached 36.9C on Thursday, breaking the record of 36C set in April 1945 in the northeastern town of Pinhao, weather agency IPMA said. While temperatures started dropping in Portugal on Friday, the scorching heat persisted in much of Spain with the mercury reaching 36C in Cordoba. The unusually early heatwave has been driven by a mass of very hot and dry air coming from Africa. The scorching temperatures have prompted warnings about the high risk of wildfires and worsened drought conditions that have already led some farmers in Spain not to sow seeds this year.

Iran President to visit Syria next week - senior source



TEHRAN (Agencies): Iranian President, Ebrahim Raisi, will visit Damascus next week, a senior regional source close to the Syrian government told Reuters on Friday. The visit will be the first by an Iranian president to Syrian President, Bashar Al-Assad, since war broke out in Syria in 2011. With military help and economic support from both Iran and Russia, Assad was able to turn the tide of the conflict and regain control of most of his country. The senior regional source told Reuters that a warming of ties between Saudi Arabia and Iran, as well as a thaw in Arab States' isolation of Syria, had payed the way for the visit. The Syrian daily, Al-Watan, which is close to the government, reported that Raisi's visit would last two days and would be capped by a string of agreements, particularly on economic cooperation. Iran has previously provided lines of credit to Damascus and imports phosphate from Syrian mines. This month, regional sources revealed that Iran had secretly brought weapons and other military equipment to Syria by disguising the transfers as part of the relief effort following the devastating February earthquakes in Syria and Turkiye.

"We're concerned that the intercommunal violence is going to increase and that we might have some situations which will repeat in relation to what we had a couple of years ago," in a region which has already experienced severe conflict and displacement, he said. UNHCR stressed that Darfur pres-

ents "a myriad of pressing protection issues", highlighting that a number of sites hosting internally displaced people have been burned to the ground, while civilian houses and humanitarian premises have been hit by bullets. Concerns over the region are shared by the UN rights office (OHCHR), which warned on Friday of a "serious risk" of violence escalating in West Darfur as the hostilities between the RSF and SAF have triggered intercommunal violence. OHCHR spokesperson Ravina Shamdasani said that in El Geneina, West Darfur, "deadly ethnic clashes" have been reported and an estimated 96 people have been killed since 24 April.

WHO to assist Pakistan on Monkeypox

ISLAMABAD (APP): The World Health Organization (WHO) has been working and investigating with the Government of Pakistan on Monkeypox, as the situation is still evolving. In a statement on Monkeypox, the WHO said that it will assist the government of Pakistan as per their requirement, especially in lab testing, Points of Entry and provision of testing kits. Meanwhile, the NIH, provincial health departments and Border Health Services at all Airports, District Health authorities at Islamabad and provinces have been advised to ensure surveillance through laboratory diagnostics, contact tracing, rapid identification of suspected cases and clusters of infections as well as the source of infection in order to provide optimal clinical care, isolate cases to prevent further transmission, identify, manage and follow-up contacts to recognize early signs of infection, identify risk groups for infection and

for severe disease, protect frontline health workers, and tailor effective control and prevention measures. According to an official of the Ministry of National Health Services, as there is no evidence of localized transmission of Mpox as of now in Pakistan, the risk of the international spread of disease from Pakistan remains low. The World Health Organization (WHO) does not recommend any restrictions on trade on the currently available information regarding Mpox outbreaks. In Pakistan, since May 2022, a total of 22 samples from suspected cases were referred from different parts of the country, and PCR tests were carried out at NIH for the Monkeypox virus. The first case has been confirmed by NIH from travellers who arrived recently in Pakistan and have been isolated at the Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS) hospital along with others who are being investigated.

US Fed admits to failings in Silicon Valley Bank oversight

Washington (Agencies): The US Federal Reserve called for greater banking oversight while admitting to its own failures in a widely-anticipated report published Friday into the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank (SVB) last month "Following Silicon Valley Bank's failure, we must strengthen the Federal Reserve's supervision and regulation based on what we have learned," Federal Reserve vice chair for Supervision Michael Barr said in a statement accompanying the report. Barr said SVB's management failed to adequately manage risk prior to the bank's swift collapse, while Fed supervisors failed to take forceful enough action after they had identified issues at the Californmian high-tech lender. SVB's failure on March 10 after taking on too much interest-rate risk caused shock waves throughout the banking sector, and led to the failure of another regional US requirements, and stress-testing.

Concerted efforts by regulators on both sides of the Atlantic in the days that followed SVB's collapse appear to have reduced the banking turmoil and lowered volatility in the financial markets. The report found that the Fed "did not appreciate the seriousness of critical deficiencies in the firm's governance, liquidity, and interest rate risk management," as SVB's assets more than doubled in size between 2019-2021 in the middle of a high-tech boom. In response, Barr said the Fed will look at strengthening banking supervision to ensure the Fed could more quickly identify risks and vulnerabilities. The Fed will also look to strengthen the regulatory framework for banks and consider toughening the rules around interest-rate risk, liquidity and capital

UAE's first gaming resort to cost \$3.9 bn: operator

Dubai (AFP/APP): The United Arab Emirates' first gaming resort will open in four years and cost \$3.9 billion to build. US casino operator Wynn has said, unveiling new details of the project. The resort in Ras Al-Khaimah, one of the UAE's seven emirates, will feature "exceptional entertainment and gaming amenities", Wynn Resorts said on its website. Gambling is generally prohibited under Islamic laws in the oil-rich Gulf state. But Ras Al-Khaimah's tourism development authority last year announced a new body to regulate "integrated resorts", including gaming facilities. Preliminary construction work has begun on Wynn Al Marjan Island, set on a man-made and hotel-studded promontory, Wynn Resorts said Thursday in a statement. The resort, with 1,500 rooms, 24 dining and lounge areas, spa facilities, "high end" shopping and nightly laser and



light shows, will open in early 2027, Wynn said, revising an earlier schedule of 2026. Artists' impressions of the site, about an hour's drive from the commercial hub of Dubai, showed a brown-gold high rise towering above a beach area and circular marina, as well as a luxuriously appointed lobby. "We have spent the past year meticulously programming and concepting Wynn Al Marjan Island, carefully considering its unique location," Wynn Resorts CEO Craig Billings said in the statement. Wynn operates casinos in Las Vegas and Boston as well as Macau, a Chinese territory close to Hong Kong.
