
Russia launches large-scale attack on Ukraine's military-industrial facilities

MOSCOW (Agencies): The Russian military has launched a large-scale missile attack against Ukraine's military industry, disrupting production of weaponry and munitions, the Defense Ministry said on Monday. "Tonight, the Russian Armed Forces of the Russian Federation launched a group missile attack with long-range precision weapons, air and sea based, on the military-industrial complex of Ukraine," the ministry said during its daily media briefing, adding that "all assigned targets were hit." While the Russian military did not specify which locations had been targeted exactly, Ukrainian media reported strikes in Kiev, Sumy and Dnepropetrovsk regions. The latter has apparently experienced the worst, with a massive explosion reported on the outskirts of the city of Pavlograd. Unverified footage circulating online shows the aftermath of the strikes near the city. The attack apparently also caused a massive secondary explosion, followed by multiple lesser blasts. Available footage shows numerous columns of white smoke at the location, typically

emergency services, the explosions in Pavlograd damaged and destroyed up to 80 residential homes and about two dozen multi-story buildings. Emergency services have also acknowledged damage to an unspecified "industrial facility" in the area without revealing its exact nature. In recent days, both Russia and Ukraine have seemingly ramped up long-range attacks against each other, with the uptick in military activities coming ahead of the long-advertised Ukrainian counteroffensive. Moscow has claimed the destruction of several command posts used by the Ukrainian military, and has reported striking groupings of Ukrainian reserves. Kiev' for its part, has ramped up shelling of residential areas of Russia's city of Donetsk, as well as other border regions, inflicting multiple civilian casualties. Ukrainian forces also carried out an attack on an oil deport in Crimea, with the spokeswoman for the Ukrainian military's southern command, Natalya Gumenyuk, confirming the strike came in preparation for Kiev's counteroffensive.

Dollar being 'gradually abandoned' - IMF boss

NEW YORK (Agencies): The managing director of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) has said the US dollar is gradually losing its status as the world's main reserve currency. Speaking on Monday, Kristalina Georgieva noted that there is no viable alternative among global currencies to replace the greenback in the near future. "There has been gradual shift away from the dollar, it was 70% of reserves, now it is slightly under 60%," Georgieva stated at the 2023 Milken Institute Global Conference in Beverly Hills, California. According to the IMF chief, the euro can be viewed as the biggest competitor to the dollar, while the British pound, the Japanese yen and the Chinese yuan "play a very modest role." She stressed that the leading factor for trust in the currency of this or that country is the strength of its economy and the depth of its capital markets. "And if you are thinking of an alternative in a world in which we may migrate to central bank digital currencies massively... and there I don't see an alternative, as a surprise to IMF analysts.



I don't see it coming anytime soon,' Georgieva said. Georgieva highlighted the major shocks of the past few years - the Covid pandemic, the Russia-Ukraine conflict and the spike in interest rates after years of loose monetary policy - calling them "a series of unthinkable events." She explained that the rapid transition from low to high interest rates has exposed vulnerabilities in the financial sector, and that the high exposure of the US banking sector to the crisis has come

US tracking another mystery balloon – media

WASHINGTON (Agencies): Pentagon does not consider the object that flew over Hawaii a threat yet, anonymous sources said US Navy sailors recover the 'Chinese spy balloon' off the coast of South Carolina, February 5, 2023 © PO1 Tyler Thompson/US Navy via Getty Images. The US military has been tracking another flying object over the Pacific Ocean, NBC News reported on Monday citing three unnamed US officials. What was described as a "mysterious balloon," had flown over Hawaii and is currently headed towards Mexico. What exactly the object may be, or who it belongs to, was not clear, the anonymous officials told NBC. Its flight path over the islands did not take it over any "sensitive" military areas. The Pentagon has been tracking the object since "late last week," and the military believes it poses no threat to air traffic or US national security. The suspected balloon does not appear to be maneuvering, or sending out any signals, according to one official. The US is still working on identifying the object and its owner. The military reportedly does not believe it is Chinese in origin at this time. Word of another balloon in US airspace comes almost three months after the American military shot down a "Chinese spy balloon" off the coast of South Carolina.

UN Peacekeeping marking its 75th anniversary with photo exhibit in New York

UNITED NATIONS (Agencies): United Nations Peacekeeping Monday launched a special photo exhibition at UN Headquarters in New York to honour the service and sacrifice of uniformed and civilian peacekeepers as it marks its 75th anniversary. The exhibit is part of a year-long global campaign, under the theme 'Peace Begins with Me', which seeks to demonstrate the powerful impact of UN Peacekeeping and its partners on the lives of millions of people caught up in catastrophic conflict, a UN press release said. Featuring a curated collection of peacekeepers in action from the very first deployment of military observers to the Middle East in 1948 through to the 12 missions operating today, the images document the complex and diverse work performed by peacekeeping personnel in some of the world's most fragile political and security situations.

China calls for UN Security Council reform

BEIJIng (Agencies): Beijing's top diplomat argues that developing countries, especially those in Africa, should be better represented in the body. China's top diplomat has called for developing nations to have more of a say at the UN Security Council. Wang Yi's remarks came a week after Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov made a similar suggestion, saying Western powers are overrepresented in the key international body. During a meeting with Kuwait and Austria's ambassadors to the UN, Tareq Albanai and Alexander Marschik, on Saturday, Wang said: "The reform of the Security Council should uphold fairness and justice, increase the representation and voice of developing countries, allowing more small



and medium-sized countries to have more opportunities to participate in the decision-making of the council." The official, who is responsible for foreign affairs in the Chinese Communist Party's central committee, added that "historical injustices against Africa" should be redressed. The Chinese diplomat made his remarks ahead of talks on reforming the Security Council, with Kuwait and Vienna presiding over the negotiations.

3D printed fish set to hit the market



Around a third of global stocks are currently overexploited, analysts say If a trip to the lake with your fishing rod just isn't an option, an Israeli company has created a method of 3D bioprinting your very own 'fresh' fish - which, it says, will be ready for cooking immediately. Stakeholder Foods has developed a 3D printed grouper fish fillet from stem cells, which are then processed via bioprinting technology into a fish-like shape. The product,

which was created in conjunction with Umami Meats, mimics the taste and texture of natural fish, and it could be on supermarket shelves later this year. "In the coming months, we intend to announce our plans for bringing this world-class cultivated fish to the market," said Mihir Pershad, CEO of Umami Meats at a tasting event in Israel last week, via The Telegraph. "In the first tasting, we showcased a cultivated product that flakes, tastes and melts in your mouth exactly like excellent fish should," he explained. The development of the technology could have myriad benefits, particularly as it pertains to food scarcity - but also to the global issue of overfishing. Marine experts have estimated that around one third of global fish stocks are currently being overexploited.

"The Security Council's Taliban sanction committee approved our request this (Monday) afternoon," the Pakistani envoy to the UN told APP. Muttaqi is subjected to a travel ban, asset freeze and arms embargo under Security Council sanctions. In a letter to the committee, Pakistan's Mission to the UN requested an exemption for



FM Muttaqi who is to travel between May 6-9 "for a meeting with the foreign ministers of Pakistan and China." Last month, the Security Council committee allowed Muttaqi to travel to Uzbekistan for a meeting of the foreign ministers of neighbouring countries of Afghanistan to discuss urgent peace, security, and stability matters.following day.

Labour Day; A national tribute to workers of Pakistan By Fakhar Alam

honeybee in wheat harvesting, Rafique Khan (40), a poor labourer of Nowshera district was seen asking his co-workers to accelerate the work and complete it before sunset on Wednesday. Unaware of the International Labour Day observed on May 1, in many countries including Pakistan with enthusiasm, the motivated labourer was assisted by his elder son Sadiq Khan and three others in wheat harvesting in his native village Dheri Ishaq at tehsil Pabbi. Known as 'Lala G', Khan obtained a wheat harvesting project that included wheat cutting, threshing and storage of the commodity. He was working against the clock to complete it before the heavy rainfalls predicted by the Met Office for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. "I wake up early in the morning for cutting of standing wheat on five acres on paid contract i.e., per 200kg wheat or Rs8,000 per acre while its threshing has separate charges," he told APP. "Following the death of my father, Haji Muhammad Zaman, I discontinued my education after matric

PESHAWAR (APP): Busy like a and started different labour jobs including wheat harvesting, fruits selling, transport and bricks kiln, besides opening a small general store at my village to meet the household, health and education expenses of my seven-member family in the wake of skyrocketing price hike," said Rafique. "I closed my small general store after it was severely damaged by the last year's devastating floods in River Kabul and also sold my rickshaw to return all the loans obtained for my shop business," he told with grief. Enjoying tea under a Shisham tree with his fellow labourers before starting threshing of wheat in the afternoon, he said, "We prefer wheat harvesting these days due to high profit margin as compared to other labour jobs." "Purchasing of own tractor-thresher was my dream but could not materialize it due to financial constraints," he added. He urged the government to give interest-free loans to labourers so that they may establish their own businesses. Like Rafique and Sadiq, hundreds of thousands of workers were engaged in different labour

works including wheat harvesting, construction, transport, bricks kilns and tree plantations in KP and were contributing to the country's development. 1st May 1was a significant day to remember and pay glowing tributes to all those labourers, who worked for the economic prosperity, and development of the country and sacrificed their lives for Pakistan. Like other 80 countries in the world, International Labour Day was also observed in Pakistan to pay homage to the services of the labour class. Every year, Labour Day was observed in memory of Chicago workers, who were killed by police while striking for an eight-hour workday in 1886. In Pakistan, May 01 was officially declared as a public holiday after its inclusion in the first labour policy in 1972. "The policy led to formulation of a social security network, old age benefit schemes and workers welfare fund while the 1973 constitution ensured all rights to labour class," said Syed Noman Bukhari, senior lawyer of trade and labour laws and member of Peshawar High Court Bar Association

said Pakistan was a member of the International Labour Organization (ILO) after its independence in 1947 and had protected all rights of the labourers including the right of union and jobs in the 1973 constitution. He said Pakistan had ratified 36 ILO conventions of which eight were important, thus empowering labourers of all rights. The Labour and Culture Department KP spokesman said that several housing projects were launched for the labourers. He said 2,056 flats at Labour City Regi Lalma Peshawar for registered industrial workers were constructed. Funds had been allocated for sanitation, water and street lights in Mardan Labour Colony. Ikhtair Wali Khan, PML-N KP spokesman and former MPA said the minimum labour wage had been increased to Rs25,000 per month, whereas the federal government had planned to send around one million skilled labourers abroad for employment this year. 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Lakki Marwat Protests

On Saturday, a big peace rally was held in the Lakki Marwat city following the three terror attacks on the Pakistan Army installations here on Thursday night. Tens of thousands of people took to the streets to record their protest against the ever-deteriorating law and order situation as they carried banners and black and white flags, raising slogans against lawlessness and in favour of peace and harmony. This is not the first time these demands have been made; the residents of these areas have suffered a lot and their anger is understandable. People from all walks of life joined the protest, including political workers of all parties, civil society, lawyers and students. As per reports, on Friday, the Olasi Pasawon Lakki Marwat gave a call for the protest after terrorists attacked a local college where the army is camped. During the protests, the participants also passed a resolution on this occasion to name the Kargil Chowk as Aman Chowk as they made it clear to the government and everyone that no military operation will be tolerated. It is important to remember that Lakki is one of the most volatile districts in K-P since the fall of Kabul to Taliban after the withdrawal of US forces from Afghanistan. Furthermore, the residents of these areas have suffered in multiple iterations of the war on terror. The displacement, economic hardship, and ethnic discrimination faced by the residents has understandably made them wary of kinetic operations. The residents claim that they are willing to offer sacrifices for the restoration of peace, but they won't leave their houses in case the government decides to launch a large-scale operation against terrorists. This is of course a delicate situation, and the state needs to listen with an open mind and heart. These residents have suffered immensely, not just as a result of the war on terror, but also because of neglect. The region is considered to be lucrative because of underground gas and oil reserves, but little attention has been paid to the poor road infrastructure and lack of other facilities above the ground. Even earlier during the year, residents had asked the government to take notice of broken roads and the unavailability of basic amenities of life in the region. The growing frustration is palpable and the state needs to work overtime to assuage concerns and rebuild trust with the residents of these troubled areas.

Corporal punishment: For whose benefit? — By Khalil Ahmed Dogar

APRIL 30th is marked as International Day to End Corporal Punishment across the world. In the modern world it is astonishing to think that there's a need to dedicate an entire day to tell 'humans' no to physically beat up their children. However, reality is harsh because only one out of seven children across the world is legally protected from corporal punishment, the most common form of violence against children. In geographic terms, only 65 countries out of 199 have legally outlawed all forms of corporal punishment, including in homes. Plethora of scientific research has proven that use of physical force to 'educate' or 'correct' a child serves no purpose. On the contrary it has served short-term and long-term physical and mental brella because corporal punishconsequences. Yet corporal punish- ment in these institutions remains ment is daily happening for many children and it is widely accepted as the inherent right of parents and must also be monitored for strict guardians, elder siblings, teachers, religious tutors, and employers (unlawful). Corporal Punishment is a global concern and therefore has been recognized by the United Nations as a serious threat to the dignity and wellbeing of children. United Nations Convention on the Rights of Child Article 37 proscribes corporal punishment. Article 19, advises the governments to take judicial, directorial, societal and educational steps to curb corporal punishment. Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Goal: 16.2 'Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions', Goal 3: 'Good Health and Well-being', Goal 4: 'Quality Education', all aim towards eradication of corporal punishment from society. Despite these commitments, Pakistan is still among the 134 countries struggling to eradicate corporal punishment. In Pakistan, all the subdivisions have outlawed corporal punishment in education institutions through legislation or notifications. However, implementation remains negligent due to conflicting nature of the laws, delayed institutional mechanism and inadequate resource allocation.

bition of Corporal Punishment Act (2016) were made 5 years later but no one has cared to explain why. There is a dire need to bring uniformity in laws for effective enforcement of a total ban prohibition of corporal punishment throughout the country. Any law which allows teachers and guardians to physically punish a child in the name of 'so called' best interest of the child must be repealed. Another effort required in legislation is to set the age of childhood to 18 years as it is internationally recognized. The complaint mechanisms under all laws must be clear and efficient. The federal and provincial governments must also show concrete results in bringing religious schools under mainstream education umunnoticed. Subsequently, child labour and child domestic labour punishment against the culprits indulging in such heinous acts. The need for improvement in teachers' training and strengthening School Management Committees (SMCs) has often been highlighted by educational experts. When it comes to child rights, the simple advice for the government is "Deliver what is promised". The Rules of Business of Islamabad Capital Territory Prohibition of Corporal Punishment Act 2021 are the latest instalment of the state's promise to safeguard its children. Swift resolving of complaints, using technological aids, providing confidentiality and shelter, all sound sweet on paper but must be implemented in letter and spirit. The above recommendations are required before Pakistan can move on to the next step that is to end corporal punishment at homes. Monitoring the households isn't possible in a society like Pakistan therefore awareness remains the only tool. However, if the state makes concrete efforts the circle of violence will shrink and eventually everyone will realize that corporal punishment is for nobody's benefit.

International paid research by HEC: An achievement or a great loss and threat to the economy?

Pakistan's Higher Education Commission (HEC), established in 2002, has been struggling to maintain higher education standards in the country. The HEC's promotion and tenure criteria for faculty includes publishing in international journals, which was intended to promote quality research that meets global standards. However, this has led to neglect of local research journals and a lack of support for them, hindering the development of a research culture within Pakistan. Additionally, the HEC's focus on international publications has also caused a brain drain. The impact of these issues on the economy is significant, and there is a need to address these challenges and move towards a more balanced approach that supports both international and local research. To overcome these challenges, it is imperative that the HEC takes decisive action to promote local research journals and provide the necessary support for their development. A possible solution could be to encourage the faculty of each university to launch their own journal and to publish in these

country's economy and finance the education system while promoting research for industries in Pakistan like, what is done in other countries. Moreover, the HEC needs to revise its promotion criteria to strike a balance between international and national publications, with greater weightage given to national publications. By taking such steps, HEC can support a beneficial research culture within Pakistan and improve the overall education sector. Although it may take a decade or more, but will ultimately strengthen Pakistan's research and help to achieve global standards. It is worth noting that publishing in international journals is indeed a financial burden for researchers. As a modern trend, almost all international journals require authors to pay publication fees depending on the journal's prestige and impact factor. This can lead to a significant loss of resources and funding for the country's economy. However, publishing in international journals also has its benefits, such as reaching a global audience, but such publications should only be allowed

However, the HEC's latest data reveals that only 16,137 research papers were published in international journals through the NRPU projects in 2020 only. (Source: http://nsp.hec. gov.pk/nrpu reports/2019 20 NRPU Completed Projects.pdf) Regarding the impact factor of advanced countries, it is not accurate to say that it is solely due to Pakistani researchers. However, Pakistani researchers do contribute to the overall body of knowledge in their respective fields, the same impact can be claimed while publishing at national level and widely available for citation to rest of the world. Overall, there needs to be a wise balance between publishing in international journals and promoting local research journals. HEC should take concrete steps to support both avenues of research and provide the necessary resources for their development, which can contribute to the overall development of the country. Based on the information available in the Web of Science database, only the top 5 paid journals (out of thousands) in terms of the number of publications by Pakistani authors in the last 5 years (2017-2022) with the data of paynig publication fee are listed here: Now, an average person can also comprehend how we are being wisely utilized for the benefit of others, while we claim to serve our country and conduct research to strengthen our economy. I hope that the HEC being, a highly esteemed organization will reevaluate its strategy of wasting public money on international paid journals and shall focus on promoting national journals, starting by tomorrow. 

The water level in River Jhelum at Mangla Dam was 1121.75 feet, which was 71.75 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet. The inflow and outflow of water was recorded 49,900 cusecs and 45,000 cusecs respectively. The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa , Guddu and Sukkur was recorded as 54,700, 49,800, 36,800 and 9.100 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 34,200 cusecs of water released at Nowshera and 11,900 cusecs released from River Chenab at Marala.

Bid to smuggle 265 flour bags foiled

RAWALPINDI (APP): The Food Department Rawalpindi and district police here on Tuesday foiled a bid to smuggle 265 flour bags. 

Pressure has been mounting on HSBC since its largest shareholder, Chinese insurer Ping An, called for the bank to break up its business as part of a "strategic restructuring" to unlock shareholder value.

IMF raises Asia's economic forecast on China recovery, warns of risks

RIYADH (Agencies): The International Monetary Fund raised Asia's economic forecast on Tuesday as China's recovery underpinned growth, but warned of risks from persistent inflation and global market volatility driven by Western banking sector woes. The reopening of China's economy will be pivotal for the region with the spillover to Asia seen focused on consumption and service-sector demand rather than investment, the IMF said.



"Asia and Pacific will be the most dynamic of the world's major regions in 2023, predominantly driven by the

buoyant outlook for China and India," the IMF said its regional economic outlook report. "As in the rest of the world, domestic demand is expected to remain the largest growth driver across Asia in 2023." Asia's economy is expected to expand 4.6 percent this year after a 3.8 percent increase in 2022, contributing around 70 percent of global growth, the IMF said, upgrading its forecast by 0.3 of a percentage point from October.

Saudi National Bank's Credit Suisse holding to convert to 0.5% of UBS

DUBAI (Agencies): Saudi National Bank's almost 10% shareholding in Credit Suisse will convert to approximately 0.5 percent of UBS following the merger of the two Swiss lenders, a bourse statement said on Monday. Saudi National Bank, Credit Suisse's top shareholder, said the carrying value of its investment in the troubled Swiss lender was SR1.3 billion (\$346.63 million) on March 31, a decline of almost 70 percent during the



first quarter. "SNB's shareholding in Credit Suisse of 9.88 percent will convert into a shareholding in UBS of approximately 0.5 percent upon completion of the merger," the bourse statement said. On Dec. 31, 2022, the

value of SNB's investment in Credit Suisse had declined by approximately 20 percent, the statement said. It then posted an additional fall of almost 70 percent during the first three months of 2023. In March, Fitch Ratings said the UBS takeover of Credit Suisse would have a neutral impact on SNB's A- rating, due mainly to the limited contribution of the Credit Suisse investment to its group asset portfolio of less than 0.5 percent of total assets.

Morgan Stanley plans to cut another 3,000 jobs

NEW YORK (Agencies): Morgan Stanley is planning to cut more jobs after reporting a drop in profit during the first three months of the year, US media reported on Monday. The bank aims to trim its headcount by nearly 4% this quarter after ending March with more than 82,000 employees, according to the reports. The US investment and financial services giant said in a recent earnings report that its profit dropped 20% in the first three months of this year amid a slowdown



in mergers and acquisition advising. The global financial institution at the end of last year trimmed about 2% of its staff or some 1,600 positions, CNBC reported at the time. The new round of cuts is expected to involve about 3,000 jobs. Word of more layoffs at Morgan Stanley came as JP-Morgan Chase's takeover of First Republic resolved the fate of the last major bank caught up in recent upheaval. The sector still faces a weakening economy and challenges from higher interest rates. Ever since the March collapse of Silicon Valley Bank ignited fears of widespread failures among midsize banks, the industry has been operating under a cloud of uncertainty.

US judge declares mistrial in Apple-Masimo smartwatch fight

SACRAMENTO (Agencies): A US judge in California on Monday declared a mistrial in Masimo Corp's potential billion-dollar smartwatch trade secret lawsuit against Apple Inc after jurors failed to reach a unanimous verdict, multiple media outlets reported. The jury in federal court in Santa Ana could not determine whether Cupertino, California-based Apple misused confidential information from Masimo related to the

BP back in Q1 profit after Russia's exit setback

giant BP on Tuesday posted net profit of US\$8.2 billion for the first quarter, which compared with a record loss a year earlier as it ended operations in Russia. In the first three months of 2022, BP recorded its biggest quarterly loss after tax, at US\$20.4 billion, as Moscow's invasion of Ukraine caused its exit from Russian business. BP had booked a year ago a pre-tax charge of US\$25.5 billion after abandoning its 19.75% stake in energy group Rosneft, ending more than three decades of investment in Russia. That wiped out the positive effect of surging energy prices that were driven by tight-

Mercedes taps F1 team to keep up with Tesla

BRIXWORTH (Agencies): Mercedes-Benz has plugged its Formula One team into the engineering process to build vastly more efficient mass-market electric vehicles (EVs), slashing development times by a quarter or more as it jump-starts efforts to keep pace with Tesla. F1 technology has always eventually bled over into mass-market vehicles. But Mercedes F1 collaboration to build more efficient EVs faster is unprecedented because it embeds that racing mindset and technological expertise directly in product development. After decades of leadership in combustion-engine technology, legacy carmakers



like Mercedes have lagged Tesla in electric vehicles. Mercedes' F1 team can help it get back in the race, said Steven Merkt, head of transportation solutions at TE Connectivity, a major autos supplier. "Nobody feels the pressure more than Mercedes to be innovation leaders here," Merkt said. "They've got to push it out or they're no longer Mercedes."

Alibaba's faded rally signals grim outlook ahead

SHANGHAI (Agencies): It took only four weeks for optimism around Alibaba Group Holding Ltd's breakup plan to fizzle. Restoring it will likely be an uphill battle. Alibaba's American Depositary Receipts are now 2.3% below where they were before the e-commerce firm announced its overhaul plan last month, wiping out as much as 20% in gains. Investors had originally hoped that a split into six units would boost the empire's value and increase chances of listing those units publicly. That would reverse woes faced after the sudden halt of Ant Group's IPO in 2020 amid Beijing's concerns about



influence. But as US-China geopo litical tensions flare, some are starting to backtrack on their earlier enthusiasm. Concerns about broader weakness in sentiment for Chinese equities, coupled with questions about the potential initial public offering pipeline and a lack of growth catalysts, are also weighing on the stock's outlook.


Chong Wei, Lin Dan inducted into BWF Hall of Fame

Hudson, who has been in Qantas' executive ranks for nearly three decades, will remain in her role as chief

US climber dies on Everest



(Agencies): climber has died on Mount Everest, his expedition organiser said Tuesday, the first foreign death on the highest mountain in the world this season. The 69-year-old mountaineer was on an acclimatisation rotation at around 6,400 metres (21,000 feet) when he died on Monday. "He was feeling unwell and passed away at Camp 2. Efforts are underway to bring (back) his body," Pasang Tshering Sherpa of Beyul Adventure told AFP. Sherpa said bad weather was hampering the recovery efforts. Beyul Adventure is a local partner of US-based expedition organiser International Mountain Guides. "It is with deep sorrow that IMG reports the death of one of our Everest 2023 team members at Camp 2," IMG chief Eric Simonson said in a statement on the company's website. "We can confirm that this event was not the result of a climbing accident or route condition that would be of potential impact or safety concern to any other teams on the mountain." The spring Everest climbing season had a tragic start last month with the death of three Nepali climbers. The trio were crossing the treacherous Khumbu icefall as part of a supply mission when a block of glacial ice fell and swept them into a deep crevasse. Nepal has issued 466 permits to foreign climbers, and since most will need a guide, more than 900 people will try to summit this season, which runs until early June.

Europe's produce at stake in Spain's water war



TOTANA (Agencies): Spanish farmer Juan Francisco Abellaneda's salads and watermelons fill the shelves of European supermarkets winter and summer. But maybe not for much longer. The tap that turned the arid semi-desert of southeastern Spain into Europe's market garden may be about to be turned off, threatening the intensive farms that feed much of the continent. Spain is the EU's biggest producer of fruit and vegetables and almost half of its exports are grown by farmers like Abellaneda, the crops irrigated by huge transfers of water from the River Tagus hundreds of kilometers (miles) to the north. But with climate change hitting Spain hard, and three-quarters of the country at risk of desertification, the government has decided to limit the flow of the dwindling waters of the Tagus to the southeastern Levante. The level of the Iberian peninsula's longest river has been dropping dangerously, to the point that in some places it is possible to cross its dried-up bed by foot in summer. Just like Egypt's shrinking Nile and the Tigris in Iraq, the right to draw on the waters of the Tagus-which crosses into Portugal before flowing into the Atlantic—has become a political hot potato. The debate is getting even more heated in the run up to regional elections later this month, with the intensive agriculture that is a pillar of the Spanish economy called into question.

Hollywood writers to strike as studio talks collapse

LOS ANGELES (Agencies): Thousands of Hollywood television and movie writers will go on strike Tuesday, their union said, after talks with studios and streamers over pay and other conditions ended without a deal. The strike means latenight shows could immediately grind to a halt, and television series and movies scheduled for release later this year and beyond may face major delays. Writers Guild of America (WGA) board members "acting upon the authority granted to them by their memberships, have voted unanimously to call a strike," the organisation tweeted. Studios' responses to its demands had been "wholly insufficient given the existential crisis writers are facing," the writers' union said. It came after the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers cut costs due to economic pressures.

Australia targets Big Tobacco in crackdown on vaping

SYDNEY (Agencies): Australia announced a sweeping crackdown on vaping Tuesday, accusing tobacco companies of hooking the next "generation of nicotine addicts" by deliberately targeting teenagers. Billed as the country's largest anti-smoking reforms in a decade, Australia will ban single-use disposable vapes, halt imports of non-prescription versions, and restrict how much nicotine e-cigarettes may contain. Australia has long been at the vanguard of attempts to stamp out smoking, and in 2012 became the first country to introduce "plain packaging" laws for cigarettes -- a policy since copied by France, Britain and others. But in recent years, Australia has struggled to contain the explosion in recreational vaping, particularly among teenagers. "Vaping has become the number one behavioural issue in high schools. And

it's becoming widespread in primary schools," Health Minister Mark Butler said. "Just like they did with smoking, Big Tobacco has taken another addictive product, wrapped it in shiny packaging and added flavours to create a new generation of nicotine addicts." People will still be allowed to use vapes, with a prescription, as a tool to help them quit cigarettes. "Vaping was sold to governments and communities around the world as a therapeutic product to help long-term smokers quit," Butler said. "It was not sold as a recreational product -- especially not one for our kids." Butler also announced Australia will hike taxes on tobacco sales by five percent each year over the next three years. Heavy taxes on tobacco mean Australia already has some of the most expensive cigarettes in the world -- with a pack of 25 selling for around Aus\$50 (US\$33).

WASHINGTON (Agencies): The White House on Monday announced a May 11 end to Covid-19 vaccine requirements for travelers to the United States and for government employees across the world's biggest economy. "Today, we are announcing that the administration will end the Covid-19 vaccine requirements for federal employees, federal contractors, and international air travelers at the end of the day on May 11, the same day that the Covid-19 public health emergency ends," a statement said. More than a million people died from Covid-19 in the United States. However, the White House noted that the pandemic had been all but stopped, leading to the government lifting restrictions dating back from when the disease was ravaging entire communities and forcing crippling economic shutdowns. "Since



January 2021, Covid-19 deaths have declined by 95 percent and hospitalizations are down nearly 91 percent. Globally, Covid-19 deaths are at their lowest levels since the start of the pandemic," the statement said. According to the White House, "vaccine requirements bolstered vaccination across the nation, and our broader vaccination campaign has saved millions of lives." While demanding proof of a Covid vaccination for foreigners boarding US-bound flights mirrored the practice of many countries, the domestic government vaccination mandates sparked sometimes fierce political backlash at home.

Final portrait: Zimbabwean banker cashes in with tombstone art



HARARE (Agencies): Pick a portrait of yourself, have the picture hand-carved on a gravestone of your own design - and pay for the monument before you die. That is how a former banker in Zimbabwe, Tafadzwa Machokoto, found an unusual formula for making a hugely successful business. Four years ago, the 35-year-old holder of a computer science degree quit a job with a leading bank, joining the army of Zimbabweans trekking to neighbouring South Africa in search of a better life. A year later, after a not-so-rosy stint, he returned to live in Rugare, a rundown district of the capital Harare where the big business is making tombstones. Competition in the funeral sector is ferocious, and Machokoto - pardon the pun - quickly learned that he had to think outside the box. His idea: have artisans delicately chisel portraits of the dead on tombstones. "We need to remember our loved ones not only by their name but also by their face," said Machokoto, flanked by a mason carving a portrait into black granite at a roadside yard. He and business partner Brian Haruperi offer people options for designing their own tombstone, choosing a portrait they want, crafting the epitaph and paying for the service before they pass on. Engraved portraits of the dead are a common sight in graveyards in Europe and elsewhere, though they are usually etched by laser. For a similar idea to work in Zimbabwe, the pair had to pitch hand-crafted labour and overcome entrenched traditions and taboos. Funeral styles in this southern African nation are often conservative, and it is typically the responsibility of the bereaved - not the deceased - to choose the monument.

US may risk debt default as early as June 1':Yellen



WASHINGTON: The United States could run out of money to pay its financial obligations -- risking a catastrophic default -- as early as the start of June, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said Monday, as policymakers tussle over raising the debt ceiling. Last week, the Republican-led House of Representatives voted to lift the national borrowing limit, but only with drastic cuts as they sought a showdown with President Joe Biden, a Democrat, over what they see as excessive spending. Republicans were determined to muscle the Limit, Save, Grow Act through the lower chamber of Congress to strengthen their position in negotiations with Biden, who has refused to agree to spending cuts. But the act has no chance of becoming law as it is opposed by Democrats controlling the Senate and White House.

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
