CPEC hydropower project achieves dam capping in Pakistan

BEIJING (Agencies): Pakistan's Suki Kinari Hydropower project under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) achieved dam capping on Monday, as China and Pakistan vowed to jointly accelerate the construction of the CPEC as this year is its 10th anniversary. The capping of the concrete dam on the Kunhar River marks the substantial completion of the main structure of the dam and will advance the construction progress of the power station in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province, said the China Gezhouba Group Co, which is investing in and implementing the project. As one of the first batch of priority projects under the CPEC, the facility is the largest overseas greenfield hydropower project financed by a Chinese company so far. With total investment of about \$1.96 billion, the project will generate some 3.21 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity annually, significantly optimizing Pakistan's energy structure and effectively easing its energy shortages, Gezhouba said in a press release. Egypt, Saudi, Iran account for 90% of global executions, says Amnesty

CAIRO (Agencies): Egypt executed 24 people in 2022 and was the fourth highest executioner worldwide, according to a new report by the advocacy group Amnesty International. However, executions did reduce significantly in the country, down from 83 the previous year. The top executioner was China, which executed thousands, followed by Iran which put to death more than 576 people and Saudi Arabia which executed 196. Executions in Saudi Arabia tripled from the previous year, the highest number recorded by Amnesty in three decades. Executions in Egypt, Saudi and Iran accounted for 90 per cent of all known executions. In Iran, executions increased by 83 per cent. Earlier this month, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights denounced the "deeply alarming" high number of executions carried out this year in Iran, which is averaging more than ten executions per week. Amnesty's report reveals that there was a spike in the number of people executed worldwide at 53 per cent, but also that several countries had taken "decisive steps away from the death penalty in 2022."

WHO warns against bias, misinformation in using AI in health care

GENEVA (Agencies): The World Health Organization called for caution on Tuesday in using artificial intelligence for public healthcare, saying data used by AI to reach decisions could be biased or misused. The WHO said it was enthusiastic about the potential of AI but had concerns over how it will be used to improve access to health information, as a decision-support tool and to improve diagnostic care. The WHO said in a statement the data used to train AI may be biased and generate misleading or inaccurate information and the models can be misused to generate disinformation. It was "imperative" to assess the risks of using generated large language model tools (LLMs), like ChatGPT, to protect and promote human wellbeing and protect public health, the U.N. health body said. Its cautionary note comes as artificial intelligence applications are rapidly gaining in popularity, highlighting a technology that could upend the way businesses and society operate.

The clean-up of oil spills in Nigeria's person for Shell's Nigerian unit, Shell Petroleum Development Company of Nigeria Limited, told Reuters that Shell was not privy to the final report and could not comment on its findings. Eni, for its part, attributed the oil spills in the Niger Delta to sabotage, oil theft to feed illegal refineries, and illegal exports. Still, Eni has moved to remedy all spills, a spokesperson told Reuters. According to the report of the Bayelsa State Oil & Environmental Commission, there are "strong reasons to believe that the official statistics significantly and systematically over-state the number of leaks caused by sabotage while downplaying those attributable to other causes."

It was seen as a blow to India's standing in the international community as it prepares to hold G-20 meetings across the country, including in Indian-occupied Jammu and Kashmir. 
France issues arrest warrant for Lebanon Central Bank chief for failing to attend legal hearing

PARIS (Agencies): French prosecutors have issued an international arrest warrant for Lebanon's Central Bank Governor, Riad Salameh, after he failed to appear at a court hearing amid a series of legal cases against him. According to the news agency, Reuters, which cited anonymous sources close to the case, Salameh failed to show up at a hearing in the French capital, Paris, where an investigative magistrate was reportedly set to indict him over charges involving fraud and money laundering. The 72-year-old Central Bank chief - who has held his position for three decades and is blamed by many for being the architect of Lebanon's current and ongoing economic crisis - is suspected by investigators of misusing public funds and amassing a network of assets across Europe through the use of fraudulent

financial systems. Pierre-Olivier Sur. Salameh's lawyer, told the news agency that the Bank chief did not show up to the summons because they were sent to him too close to the day of the hearing. The sources also told it that the French prosecutors decided to issue the international arrest warrant instead of simply issuing a fresh summons. "By having notified the summons less than 10 days before the scheduled date of the interrogation, the rules were not respected", the lawyer said. "The summons is therefore null and void." Insisting that the warrant is a legal violation and the decision was taken based on "double standards" and "presumptuous ideas", Salameh revealed that he intends to appeal it, with his defence attorneys and assistant having reportedly sent an objection to the Lebanese judiciary over the French case.

Radio Pakistan's attack: Rare hand written dramas scripts with catalogs, songs disks burnt to ashes

PESHAWAR (APP): By attacking Ra-floor with piles of ashes scattered all dio Pakistan's building on May 10, the miscreants have deprived millions of listeners of the rare famous Pashto and urdu songs of the renowned musicians and singers besides destroying handwritten dramas scripts authored by famous writers. Besides destruction of official records and equipment, the original hand written famous dramas scripts authored by renowned writers and famous Pashto and Urdu songs disks songs sung by Ghazal mestro Ahmad Khan, Khyal Muhammad, Mashooq Sultan and Rafique Shinwari were also burnt to ashes during violent mob attack on the national broadcaster on May 10. Habibun Nabi, Program Manager, Radio Pakistan Peshawar told APP on Tuesday that the original rare handwritten Pashto and Urdu dramas' scripts authored by famous writers Hamaza Khan Shinwari, Dr Muhammad Azam Azam, Younas Qayasi, , Arbab Abdul Wakeel, Hamayun Huma, Sahir Afridi, Begium AR Daud, Zaitoon Bannu and Syed Rasool Rasa were destroyed by the rioters. He said scripts of hundreds of rare dramas along with catalogs and books on different topics were also put on fire by violent mobs after they burnt the Radio Pakistan's central library located on its third

around the building. Besides around 15-2000 historic books, the masterpiece literary books of the renowned Sufi poet Rehman Baba and freedom fighter Khushal Khan Khattak were also torched. Habibun Nabi said the rare picture of renowned broadcasters Abdul Jan Magmoom and Aftab Ahmed, who announced Pakistan's independence day at midnight of August 13-14, 1947 in Pashto and Urdu besides Qari Muhammad, who recited Holy Quran respectively, was no more. As the financial year draws to a close, concerns are mounting over the new budget being drafted. The current situation is particularly tense due to the finance minister's decision to not seek input from the business community. This has sparked fears that the upcoming budget will be overly strict and heavily influenced by the International Monetary Fund (IMF). While business leaders have submitted proposals, the PDM government has given no indication of holding consultative sessions. Under normal circumstances, this lack of engagement with stakeholders would be highly condemned. It is essential to involve all relevant parties in the budget-making process since it directly affects them and the wider economy. Unfortunately, we do not have that luxury at present. The uncertainty surrounding the budget's shape means that much of it will likely be dictated by the IMF. If the budget were being made independently, Dar would have held meetings with industry leaders well in advance. While it is regrettable that we find ourselves in this position, we must work with the reality at hand. We urgently need the IMF's cash injection and cannot afford to refuse any further decisions or conditionalities, especially as their requirements have been met for this long. The government must implement the major adjustments being proposed in the budget within a short period of time. Moreover, any subsidies or interventions must not conflict with the IMF's directives, no matter how well-targeted they may seem. Despite concerns raised by the business community about the IMF dictation potentially exacerbating the economic crisis, we must face this bitter reality. June 9th is fast approaching, and only time will tell what effects and reactions will emerge around the budget. It is worth noting that the current political situation has impacted the IMF's perception and could potentially lead to delays in receiving the tranche, further adding to our worries.

Why soft power counts – By Maleeha Lodhi

THE debate continues over the value For Nye, smart power is the capacity and role of soft power in the conduct of foreign policy. It has long been acknowledged that international perceptions are consequential to a country's standing and even its geopolitical clout in global affairs. The evidence is compelling that when soft power is deployed as an integral part of a country's diplomatic strategy, it pays rich dividends by building trust and influence. This, in turn, helps that country to more effectively promote its foreign policy goals. States that earn respect from their conduct benefit from a soft-power effect that enhances their global reputation. In a recent article in the Financial Times, the well-respected journalist Janan Ganesh disputed this and claimed that the "once influential concept looks dated in a world where hard power counts ever more". He cited the example of countries such as Australia and South Korea, who had long relied on the projection of cultural attraction to build their reputation, but were now turning to hard power as a result of "the exigencies of sharing a region with China.' That meant returning to increased defence spending and loading up on the "lethal kit". From this, he concluded that the world today is witnessing "if not the end of soft power as a useful concept, then a brutal exposure of its limits". Softassets, he also wrote, can neither replace nor rival hard ones. But soft power was never envisaged to replace hard power. It was always seen as supplementing hard power in a country's strategy. It is, after all, one among a range of tools for a country to deploy in pursuit of its goals. It is not an either-or choice. American scholar Joseph Nye, who introduced the notion of soft power, defined it as the ability to shape the preferences of others and achieve outcomes through "attraction" rather than coercion or economic incentives. True that he counterposed soft power, "the power of persuasion and co-option," with the "power of coercion" represented by the hard power of military and economic strength. But by introducing the concept of "smart power", he sought to correct the misperception that soft power was enough on its own

Arguing that a rigid approach can be counterproductive, he offered the example of several countries that successfully followed smart strategies. In his influential book, The Future of Power, he cited the case of China, where leaders invested in soft power and efforts to make the country more appealing to accompany the increase in its military and economic power. In fact, the conduct of big, middle and small powers today indicates that they all seek to complement their hard power resources by deploying soft power assets, which together help to enhance their clout and enable them to engage more effectively in international diplomacy. This doesn't at all signify "the end of soft power." A country's reputation and positive image continues to count and play a key role in the battle for influence. Global powers that possess substantial military and economic strength integrate soft power in their strategies, and spend generous resources on this as it helps to expand their influence. China today is engaging in vigorous soft power projection. Its recent mediation of rapprochement between Saudi Arabia and Iran has increased its soft power. It is also stepping up efforts to shape the global narrative. Western nations have of course been successfully doing this for a much longer time. Countries such as Singapore and Qatar have also used soft power to secure significant weight at the global level; this has helped reinforce their economic strength. In fact, soft power assets are especially useful for small and middle countries, providing them the means to project their influence and increase their international outreach and standing in a crowded global environment. For them, being 'liked' becomes a force multiplier, encouraging cooperation from the international community and often enabling them to punch above their weight. The Global Soft Power Index 2023, put together by the London-based company, Brand Finance, places Singapore and Qatar at number 21 and 24 out of 121 coun-

tries evaluated in several metrics of soft power. The US is ranked number one (although it slipped in rankings during Donald Trump's presidency due to his unilateralist and disruptive policies). China is at number five and Canada at number seven. Pakistan has consistently figured among the bottom half of countries in these rankings, and is at 84 in the latest report. Pakistan incurs reputational damage by being seen to be perpetually in crisis, which hardly creates positive international perceptions of the country. But crisis isn't all there is to Pakistan. Every country has strengths and weaknesses. So does Pakistan. In fact, the country has many soft power resources. But successive governments have paid little, if any, attention to identifying them, much less incorporating them systematically into its international diplomacy. Given Pakistan's longstanding international 'image' problem, in part due to mischaracterisations but also because of on-ground realities, it is all the more essential for it to undertake soft power efforts to correct misperceptions, and, more importantly, to project its positive socioeconomic attributes and rich heritage of arts, civilisation, music and culture. This involves the country defining itself so that others, including its adversaries, do not misrepresent it or seize the narrative to its disadvantage. Today, narratives at the international level are shaped in large part by soft power strategies, especially as a hyperconnected and multipolar world offers unprecedented opportunities to influence multiple actors across the world beyond governments. But our policymakers remain shy of changing how we conduct our diplomacy when 'nation branding' is deemed to be so essential. There is no reason for Pakistan not to do better in the Global Soft Power League by raising its diplomatic game. For this, it is necessary in the first instance for our officials to acknowledge the importance of soft power, identify the country's soft power resources, and then imaginatively incorporate them in our foreign policy strategy and diplomacy.

The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa Guddu and Sukkur was recorded as 61,300, 62,200, 44,000 and 13,400 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 29,900 cusecs of water released at Nowshera and 15,700 cusecs released from River Chenab at Marala.

Sargodha achieves 64 pc wheat target



Pepe's rise has sparked renewed investor interest in memecoins as a whole, with overall trading volumes jumping to US\$2.6 billion in the first week of May from US\$408,000 the week before, data from Dune Analytics data shows. "Memecoins just flare up on occasion, and it'd historically hap-

"It's almost like if the market is not moving up fast enough, traders find these smaller tokens to trade with." Indeed, the latest memecoin frenzy comes as bitcoin's 2023 rally stalls. The No 1 cryptocurrency has slid 6% since mid-April to US\$27,416. Pepe, which trades for fractions of a cent, was down 60% from its May 5 peak on Monday, though still boasts a market cap of almost US\$740 million. This makes it the third-largest memecoin after dogecoin and shiba inu, both born as internet jokes referencing a Japanese dog breed, which command more than US\$10 billion and US\$5 billion of the market respectively.





FBI should never have investigated Trump – report



HOUSTON (Agencies): Special counsel John Durham concluded that the FBI should never have launched a full investigation into former US President Donald have reported. Over the weekend, Trump's campaign and its alleged ties to Russia during the 2016 presidential election, according to a report compiled over a three-year period which was released Monday. "We conclude that the (Justice) Department and FBI failed to uphold their important mission of strict fidelity to the law in connection with certain events and activities described in this report," Durham wrote. Durham, a Trump-administration appointee, said the FBI used "raw, unanalyzed, and uncorroborated intelligence" to launch the "Crossfire Hurricane" investigation into Trump and Russia. In contrast, he said the agency used a different standard when weighing concerns about alleged election interference regarding Democratic opponent Hillary Clinton's campaign. "Neither U.S. law enforcement nor the intelligence community appears to have possessed any actual evidence of collusion in their holdings at the commencement of the Crossfire Hurricane investigation," Durham continued. Despite his findings of the FBI's wrongdoing, the special counsel did not recommend any new charges against individuals or "wholesale changes" regarding how the FBI handles politically charged investigations.

US-made Patriot missiles destroyed in hypersonic strike – Moscow

MOSCOW (Agencies): A precision strike by a Russian hypersonic Kinzhal missile has destroyed a Patriot air defense system in Kiev, the Defense Ministry in Moscow reported on Tuesday. The Ukrainian government previously claimed that Kinzhal missiles had been intercepted by the US-made weapons platform. The Russian military did not provide further details about the strike, which was the first time Moscow claimed to have hit the longrange system supplied to Ukraine by its Western backers. Kiev reported that it had withstood a massive missile attack by Russian forces on Monday night. The Ukrainian mili-



tary claimed to have intercepted six Kinzhal missiles, in addition to various other aerial targets. The Russian ministry confirmed the attack in a daily briefing on Tuesday, stating that it had used long-range precision weapons to hit military targets, including "Ukrainian troops positions and places of storage of munitions, weapons and military hardware delivered from Western nations."

A spokesperson said: "Hotels are not, and were never designed to be, suitable long-term accommodation for Afghans resettled in the UK. "Where available, the government will continue to make offers of suitable housing, which we strongly encourage Afghan families to accept.

Singapore loosens egg-freezing rules amid record low birth rates



SINGAPORE (APP): The age limit for women seeking to freeze their eggs will be 37, rather than the initially announced 35. Singapore has further relaxed its restrictions on women freezing their eggs, raising the age cap for the procedure from 35 to 37, the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Social and Family Development announced on Monday, with the new regulations set to take effect in July. The move comes as Singapore's birth rate has dropped to just 1.05 babies per woman, the lowest ever recorded for the city-state since it began keeping track over six decades ago. The replacement fertility rate – the number of babies needed to maintain a population at a constant level - is 2.1 births per woman. At the same time, the median age of first-time motherhood in Singapore has jumped from 30.3 in 2013 to 31 in 2020. The government explained that its decision was informed by international and local evidence showing the success rate of the procedure for women up to 37 years old to be "relatively stable" and claimed to have taken into account the desire of women to extend their fertile years due to "personal circumstances," such as not being able to find a suitable partner. The new rules will apply to both women seeking to freeze their eggs and egg donors. Only legally married couples may use their eggs to procreate. Singapore only began allowing single women to freeze their eggs for non-medical reasons last year, opening the door to women aged 21 to 35 who wanted to preserve their eggs until they were legally married to do so. Women hoping to raise children outside of marriage or in same-sex relationships cannot legally freeze their eggs. Previously, the procedure was restricted to women suffering from medical conditions that impacted their fertility, such as ovarian cancer.
