## Iran, Pakistan Open Border Marketplace, Power Transmission Line

ISLAMABAD (VOA/Agencies): Leaders of Iran and Pakistan jointly inaugurated a marketplace and a power transmission line along their shared border Thursday in a significant move aimed at boosting regional trade and energy cooperation. Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi and Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif addressed a ceremony in a live broadcast from the Iranian side of the more than the 900-kilometer border between the two countries. Raisi said the project had set the stage for Tehran and Islamabad to expand their economic and energy exchanges. The transmission line would export 100 megawatts of Iranian electricity to Pakistan's border province of Baluchistan. The impoverished, natural resources-rich region already imports 100 megawatts of low-cost power from Iran. "We are fully prepared to further deepen our relations with our neighboring country Pakistan in the energy sector," the Iranian president said. Islamabad's foreign exchange reserves have rapidly declined as the

The marketplace opened by the two countries Thursday links Iran's southeastern city of Pishin to Pakistan's southwestern city of Mand. It is one of the six border markets the two counties are jointly constructing.

Raisi said the facilities would help create jobs and boost bilateral "retail trade" to help thousands of households on both sides of the remote, poverty-stricken regions.

## US issues warning to North Korea

WASHINGTON (Agencies): The US State Department has said a potential North Korean satellite launch would violate international restrictions placed on the DPRK. The statement came after North Korean media revealed that Kim Jong-un had visited a facility where a spacecraft is being developed. During a press briefing on Wednesday, US State Department deputy spokesman Vedant Patel said the launch would breach "multiple UN Security Council resolutions" on North Korea's ballistic missile program, which also cover rockets used for spacecraft. "We have been very clear that we urge the DPRK to refrain from further threatening activity and call on Pyongyang to engage in serious and sustained diplomacy," Patel said. "In terms of actions, we of course continue to have a number of tools at our disposal to hold the DPRK accountable. You have seen us take those steps and we will continue to do so." The United States currently maintains a raft of sanctions on North Korea and has threatened new penalties in the past over weapons tests. Pyongyang has insisted on its right to develop its military capabilities, arguing that its weapons - including its nuclear arsenal - are for defensive purposes, and has cited what it sees as an aggressive US military posture on its border. On Tuesday, Kim met with scientists, technicians and senior officials as he inspected the country's first military reconnaissance satellite. The North Korean leader approved an unspecified "future action plan" in preparation for the launch, according to the Korean Central News Agency. While unveiling the craft last month, Kim claimed the project was the "most crucial primary task" for the DPRK's armed forces, and said the satellite would be ready to go into orbit sometime in the coming weeks. "The successful launch of a military reconnaissance satellite is an urgent request... and the government's top policy priority to strengthen our national defense capabilities," Kim said after the inspection, adding that North Korea would continue to advance its space program. Tensions between Washington and Pyongyang have soared in recent months, with the DPRK carrying out a flurry of weapons tests in retaliation for several rounds of joint US-South Korean wargames. North Korea has repeatedly condemned such exercises as rehearsal for an invasion, though the United States insists the drills pose

# Indian Navy uses US-Origin P-8 Poseidon to help Chinese PLA Navy trace sunken vessel

On 17 May, Indian Navy's US-origin reconnaissance aircraft P8I Poseidon helped in the search and rescue (SAR) of a sunken Chinese fishing vessel in the Southern Indian Ocean Region at the request of the Chinese PLA Navy. "In a swift humanitarian action on 17 May, Indian Navy deployed its Air Maritime Reconnaissance assets in the Southern Indian Ocean Region approximately 900 Nm from India. in response to sinking of a Chinese Fishing Vessel Lu Peng Yuan Yu 028 with 39 crew onboard", said Commander Vivek Madhwal, Spokesperson of the Indian Navy. All 39 crew of the Chinese vessel are reportedly missing since then. P8I aircraft carried out multiple and extensive searches despite adverse weather and located multiple objects possibly belonging to the sunken vessel, Asian rivals were not 'abnormal.'

As an immediate response, search & rescue equipment was deployed at the scene by the Indian aircraft (P8I) at the request of PLA (N) ships closing the area, Indian Navy's Spokesperson said. Chinese fishing vessel was about 267 nm from the strategically important Diego Gracia base of the UK and US armed forces in Southern IOR. The accident site of the Chinese vessel was south of the Maldives and about 900nm from the Indian coast. The move is intended to facilitate cross-border transfers of local goods via Russia's largest port on the Pacific Ocean. It will come into effect in June and will provide China's northeastern provinces of Jilin and Heilongjiang with access to the sea port. The new route will help save shipping time and costs to deliver goods to China's southern provinces, as well as promoting domestic trade and revitalizing northeast China's aging industrial base, according to Liang Haiming, the dean of Hainan University's Belt and Road Research Institute. The inclusion of the Russian port in China's trading system also reflects deepening economic ties between the two countries, which have shown continuous growth in recent years, analysts say. It has continued to grow in the first quarter of 2023, with both exports and imports surging at double-digit pace, according to data from the General Administration of China.

More bodies were found on Thursday after almost every river flooded between Bologna and the north-east coast 115km (70 miles) away. Some





PESHAWAR (APP): All Pakistan Fruit ic changes on agriculture and horticulture sectors. In a press statement issued here on Thursday, Waheed Ahmed, Patron-in-Chief of PFVA said that the production capacity of mangoes in Pakistan is around 1.8 million tons, however due to the effects of climate change, it is feared that the production is expected to decrease by 20% thus be limited to 1.44 million tons. Waheed guessed that due to long winter and delayed arrival of summer, mango production is decreasing and the ability to fight diseases in mango orchards is also diminishing. It merits a mention here that last year early heat wave caused by global warming affected around 50 percent of mango production, slashing the export target of mango from 1,25,000 tones to 90,000 tonnes. Mango crop is directly affected by changing weather patterns, he added and urged that research institutes and provincial agriculture departments shall provide resources and awareness to mango farmers to avert the negative impact of the climate change. He stat-

ed that the target of export of mangoes for this season has been set at 125,000 M.tons and if this is achieved, Pakistan will earn foreign exchange of US\$ 100 million. Export of mangoes will commence from 20th May 2023. Gulf countries, Iran, Central Asian & UK countries are major buyers of Pakistani mangoes. Other important markets include Europe, Canada, USA and Japan. Increase in cost of export due to reduction in production coupled with quality issues linked with climatic effects along with increase in freight, packaging and transport costs is a major challenge for mango exports. Along with this, ongoing deteriorating law and order issues in the country, political instability and disruptions in delivery may also affect exports, Waheed feared. In Pakistan, 70% of mangoes are produced in Punjab, while the share of Sindh in total mango production is 29% & KPK's share is 1%. Patron in Chief PFVA informed that 50% of mangoes are exported from Pakistan by sea, 35% by land and 15% by air.

Furmade by the university syndicate. The decision, which was based on a recommendation by the government, involved the withdrawal of the Disparity Reduction Allowance (DRA) at a rate of 15%. The employees were deeply concerned by the syndicate's action and questioned the authority of the senate in denying the approved allowance without any legal grounds. The university syndicate, acting in accordance with the KP government notification FD(SO) SR-1) 1-1/2-022 DRA dated 12-04-22, had unanimously adopted the recommendation of the Finance and Planning Committee (F&PC) during their meeting on 21-05-2022. The DRA was granted using the university's own resources as prescribed by the government. However, to the dismay of the employees, the senate disapproved the decision, causing significant confusion and distress among the university workforce. The employees strongly condemned the senate's actions, highlighting the fact that the syndicate is the sole authority responsible for granting allowances under section 9-xii P26 of the model statutes. They raised valid concerns about the legality of the senate's decision, as the approved DRA, granted in accordance with the government's notification, was arbitrarily

opposition to the recent decision thermore, the employees questioned the rationale behind denying the same allowance to university employees in the province during a period of severe inflation. They emphasized that the DRA had been approved and disbursed based on the government's directives and utilizing the university's own resources, as clearly stated in the notification. Despite eight dissenting opinions, the syndicate, in its 50th meeting held on 17th May 2023, approved the withdrawal of the DRA, which had already been disbursed for a year. In response. the employees demand an immediate restoration of the Allowance for the Reduction of Disparity (ARA). They assert that once an allowance is approved and disbursed, it cannot be arbitrarily withdrawn. In a plea to the Governor and Chancellor, the employees of the University of Malakand request a review of the senate and syndicate's decision and urge the restoration of the DRA. They stress the importance of ensuring justice among employees within the province. Failure to address these concerns may lead to an escalation of protests, which would adversely impact the university's peaceful working environment. The employees sincerely hope that their voices are heard, and that the university administration, along with the relevant authorities, takes prompt action to rectify this unjust situation.

#### Maternity Leave Bill

Monday's National Assembly session saw members pass eight bills of substantial impact. An important one among them was the Maternity and Paternity Leave Bill, 2020. This legislation has been in the works for years, with its draft first passed by the Senate in 2020. The vote on Monday means that the bill is now applicable in federal territory and sets the precedent for provinces to follow suit on implementing similar legislation within their jurisdiction. The bill allows for paternal leave and the formalization of maternal leave as well. Mothers can now take up to six months on the first birth, with leavers of four and three months for the second and third children. Additionally, and importantly, this law also covers paternity leave and allows for the father to take three onemonth leaves for the duration of the service during times of childbirth. This is the first time paternal leave has been given legal protection, which is an important step for any policy of labour welfare to be guaranteed. Naturally, the law only covers federal territory for now, which means that only companies working and operating in Islamabad have to implement these rules. But with landmark laws like this, setting a precedent through the federal government often leads to a spillover in provinces as well. With no real legislation taking place in any provincial government for now, it will of course take time for this law to spill over. It is important to recognize the role of both parents in the childbirth process, both in terms of societal norms and economic and practical concerns. It is positive to see the state recognize this.

# Arrest without warrants in a Constitutional Democracy? – By Dr Farid A Malik

rights are the cornerstone of every constitution in the civilized world. When Zulfikar Ali Bhutto took charge of what was left of the Quaid's Pakistan, he talked about the police brutalities faced by his party and self. He even talked about the marks on his back of the brutal Lathi charge that he had had to endure. As the chief architect of the 1973 unanimous constitution, he ensured inclusion of about 20 clauses covering fundamental human rights like freedom of speech, movement, confinement etc. Article 25A declared literacy as a right of the citizen to be provided by the state. The chain of arrests without warrants in the land of the pure clearly indicates serious cheating of the agreement between the rulers and the ruled. In the 1990s there was a worldwide movement for quality. An ISO 9000 based Quality Management System (QMS) was being implemented. There were very few experts in the field. Despite my technical workload, I decided to use my practical experience in QMS Development for the benefit of the local industry. My friend Dr Kamran Moosa and myself spearheaded the quality movement in the country. During this peak period, I was invited to speak at the Civil Services Academy located on Walton Road. The Director General asked me an interesting question. In his words; " Dr Sahib almost all segments of the society are either non-performing or corrupt. Why do you target the bureaucracy as the root cause of the problems faced by the nation?" My reply was spontaneous: "As you have the power of the pen and control the files and paperwork. Has any bureaucrat ever tried to rationalize the system to introduce customer/ service orientation?" There was no answer. Yes, like the constitution guarantees human rights, every QMS is built around customer satisfaction. The Japanese were the first to adopt this approach after humiliation and defeat in

Freedom and fundamental human to emerge as the second largest economy of the world after the USA. Why are we being robbed of our freedom? Why are the constitutional guarantees blatantly violated? Recently Mr Justice Shahid Kareem of the Lahore High Court declared that the 1860 Law of Sedition, enforced under Section 124, as unconstitutional. The bold move by the Judge should have triggered a crusade of cleansing the constitution of the draconian colonial-era and Martial Law regulations and acts but so far no one seems concerned. Now that arrests have started to intimidate dissent it is time to plan a counter offensive to restore the spirit of the original document passed unanimously by the genuinely elected representatives of the people in 1973, 50 years ago. The 'colonial state' continues to operate under the Government of India Act 1935 despite the enforcement of the Constitution in August 1973. A long time back I had an interesting experience while visiting my cousin in London. We went to a pub where a dispute arose between my cousin and the cashier. While we had tendered a £50 note the cashier insisted it was £5. To resolve the issue we went to a nearby Police Station. On our complaint, a constable accompanied us back to the pub. When we reached there he stood outside and requested me to inform the cashier. I remember his words; "Without warrants I cannot enter a public place ". So the case was resolved outside as the constable had to follow the law of the land. In the Islamic Republic of Pakistan the police can enter at will any time of the day. Recently they were shown jumping over the gate of the house of PTI leader Jamshed Cheema while they were told that he was not at home, only maids and minor children were in the house. It looked like an invasion of enemy territory. While Imran Khan was in court in Islamabad his house in Zaman Park came under attack. Cranes were used to break open the main entrance of his dwelling. Perhaps for the first time the

affluent Zaman Park saw such a savage invasion. Servants were rounded up. The gardener in the house next door of Aitzaz Ahsan was also arrested. My student, Barrister Hassan Niazi, who happens to be nephew of IK and a great activist was arrested in Islamabad, then taken to Quetta. From there he landed in Karachi from where he was bailed out to appear in Naushera. Our constables seem to be above the law of the land. Several PTI leaders and workers are currently in police custody. Ali Zaidi, the President of PTI Sindh, was fighting to be bailed out and so was ex-minister Ali Amin Gandapur who has now been handed over to the Punjab Police for remand. Both have since got bail. According to inside information even the police seem apologetic as their arms are being twisted by the mighty and powerful. Even they realize that major reforms are needed to restrict rampant abuse and excesses under 'Police Gardi'. My late father Nazir Ahmed Malik strongly believed that "It's a game of stamina". Without resilience and fight back there can be no change. Petitions are being filed in Human Rights Commissions all over the world to check the current human rights violations in the land of the pure. The right approach is to make a list of all the colonial-era draconian laws and have them expunged by Parliament. As the enemy is within the solution also lies inside. Internal problems call for internal solutions, not external. Yes, stamina is needed for this marathon that should have started long ago. The system of governance and the constitution need a major clean-up for the presevation of human freedom. Like the bobbies of Britian the thullas of Punjab have to be contained. Arrest without warrants in the 21st century is barbaric, which must be stopped. The elected legislators have homework to do for which they need to build stamina which has been missing since the launch of 'Operation 1985'.

The run-off election will be held on May 28. Until then, the fate of Turkey hangs in the balance. The country, which has borne the brunt of a major catastrophe this year, will have to wait at least two more weeks before its future is known. At the end of the recent round, Erdogan had won 49.5pc of the vote while the opposition parties had won 44.89pc. The Turkish election is just one among many tests for electoral institutions around the world. With the global economy in a state of flux, the seemingly unstoppable conflict between Russia and Ukraine. growing hazards of climate change and ing Trump's votes. Fox News agreed post Covid economic woes, a large part of the global population is confronting difficult choices at the ballot box. Even beyond the actual choices between parties and candidates, the very nature of democratic institutions appears to be in question. For instance, in the US, where democracy once seemed unassailable, doubts regarding voting machines, the allegiances of electoral officials and corruption exposés involving supreme court judges are all suggesting major problems ahead. This is because the legitimacy of elections relies on proce-

When the voting public believes that the polls are fair, the people selected are seen as the legitimate and rightful rulers and lawmakers of a country. One example of how elections can lose their legitimacy among significant swathes of the population was evident in the last US presidential elections. The fact that former president Donald Trump did not accept the election results and that he and his followers continue to believe that the election was 'stolen' from them translates to a crisis of legitimacy that will be difficult to resolve even when the next electoral cycle begins. One small victory against the power of the losers who are attacking the legitimacy of the polls was witnessed recently when Dominion — the maker of voting machines — sued the pro-Trump Fox News for saying that its poll equipment had rigged the 2020 elections by stealto pay nearly \$8 million in reportedly the largest settlement in a public defamation case in the US. The ruling in the civil trial agreed with Dominion that the news outlet's claims were false. In making them, they were found to have defamed Dominion. This does not mean that the legitimacy crisis in one of the most advanced democracies in the world has been resolved. Millions of Trump supporters in the US continue to believe that Trump was the real winner of the election. This belief is very likely to cause considerable upheaval when

the next electoral cycle begins. Not only is there a risk that Trump supporters will disrupt the process, there is also a possibility that the near-coup attempt that took place on Jan 6, 2021, will be renewed if Trump (who is likely to be the Republican nominee once again) loses a second time. Add to this the recent revelations of how a US supreme court justice allegedly manipulated his political connections, and you have a near-certain crisis ahead. If things are so dire in advanced democracies, the disarray in our neck of the woods is even messier and more complicated. Whenever an orderly transfer of power is replaced by something else, even when it is a no-confidence motion undertaken by parliament, the legitimacy of the system itself is brought into question. Add to this the successive appeals to and decisions taken by the Supreme Court and another dose of uncertainty is poured into the mix. In recent days, this uncertainty has been reflected in the arrest of former prime minister Imran Khan by the government and then his release on the orders of the Supreme Court. Monday's sit-in (now called off) by the PDM outside the Supreme Court further reflects the ongoing tension and the fact that various electoral actors are once again calling into question the legitimacy of whichever branch of government issues decisions or directives against their interests.

## Deutsche Bank to pay US\$75mil in Epstein victim's suit

NEW YORK (Agencies): Deutsche Bank will pay US\$75 million to settle litigation alleging the German lender financially benefited from supporting Jeffrey Epstein's sex trafficking scheme, according to a report Wednesday. The settlement concerns an unnamed defendant who launched a proposed class-action suit in November 2022, alleging Deutsche Bank did business with Epstein while knowing he



used funds in the account to support sex-trafficking activity, the Wall Street Journal said Wednesday. The Journal, citing people familiar with

the matter, said Deutsche Bank did not admit wrongdoing. A Deutsche Bank spokesperson declined to comment. Deutsche Bank benefited financially by supporting Epstein's "sex trafficking organisation to successfully rape, sexually assault and coercively sex traffic Plaintiff Jane Doe 1 and the numerous other members of the Class", said the original complaint, which was filed in US court in New York.

#### Australia's unemployment climbs, reducing rate-hike pressure

SYDNEY (Agencies): Australian unemployment unexpectedly increased in April as employers cut jobs — led by full-time roles — reinforcing the case for the Reserve Bank to stand pat at next month's policy meeting. The currency and government bond yields declined as the jobless rate climbed to 3.7% from an almost 50-year low of 3.5%, Thursday's data showed. The economy shed 4,300 positions following two bumper months of hiring, compared with a forecast 25,000 gain.

In remarks to reporters after meeting the executives, including from Intel Corp and Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co, Kishida said the G7 leaders would discuss stabilising supply chains in their talks in the city of Hiroshima.



Executives from Micron Technology Inc, IBM Corp, Applied Materials and Samsung Electronics, among others, also met Kishida. Micron said in a statement that it would bring ex-

treme ultraviolet (EUV) technology to Japan to produce advanced memory chips and it expected to invest up to ¥500 billion (US\$3.70 billion) in 1-gamma process technology over the next few years, with close support from the Japanese government. The company is also poised to get about ¥200 billion in financial incentives from Japan to help it make next-generation memory chips in the country, Bloomberg News reported on Wednesday.

## US FTC expands probe into pharmacy benefit managers

NEW YORK (Agencies): The US Federal Trade Commission said it had sought information from two privately held companies that negotiate drug rebates on behalf of pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) as part of its probe into how PBMs affect pricing of prescription drugs. The two companies, Zinc Health Services and Ascent Health Services, are group purchasing organisations,



that negotiate after-market discounts or rebates with drug manufacturers on behalf of PBMs and hold the contracts that govern those rebates. Zinc

Health negotiates rebates for CVS Health Corp and Ascent Health for Cigna Group's Express Scripts unit and Prime Therapeutics, which is a privately held PBM, the FTC said on Wednesday. PBMs act as middlemen and negotiate rebates and fees with drug manufacturers, create lists of medications that are covered by insurance, and reimburse pharmacies for patients' prescriptions.

Hinduja, known by his initials SP, was suffering from dementia and his family said he had "passed away peacefully this morning." He was chairman of the eponymous



business group which owns public companies in India with interests in banking, chemicals, software and

commercial vehicles. Hinduja and his younger brother Gopichand, 83, topped the Sunday Times Rich List in 2022 for a fourth time, with an estimated net worth of £28.5 billion (US\$36 billion) that includes property worth millions in central London. "It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of our father." Hinduja's daughters Shanu and Vinoo said in a statement.

#### Siemens profit triples on orders boost, hikes outlook

FRANKFURT (Agencies): man industrial conglomerate Siemens raised its outlook for 2023 on Wednesday after second-quarter profits nearly tripled on higher orders. Between January and March, the group booked a net profit of €3.5 billion (US\$3.8 billion), up from €1.2 billion euros year-on-year. 



## Global stroke deaths expected to rise to nearly 5mn by 2030: Study

ISLAMABAD(APP): The number of deaths worldwide from ischemic stroke increased from 2 million in 1990 to more than 3 million in 2019, and is expected to increase to nearly 5 million by 2030, according to a study. Ischemic stroke is caused by a blockage of blood flow to the brain and is the most common type of stroke. "This increase in the global death toll of ischemic stroke along with a predicted further increase in the future is concerning, but ischemic stroke is highly preventable," said Lize Xiong, from Tongji University in Shanghai, China. "Our results suggest that a combination of lifestyle factors like smoking and a diet high in sodium along with other factors such as high blood pressure and high body mass index can lead to an increased risk of stroke," Xiong added. The study was published in the medical journal Neurology. For the study, researchers analysed data from the Global Health Data Exchange, from 1990-2019. As the world population grew, the global number of ischemic stroke deaths increased from 2.04 million in 1990 to 3.29 million in 2019, Medical Daily reported. However, the stroke rate decreased from 66 strokes per 100,000 people in 1990 to 44 strokes per 100,000 people in 2019. "This decrease in the stroke rate likely means that the overall increase in the number of strokes worldwide is mainly due to population growth and ageing," Xiong said. Researchers found that seven major risk factors including smoking, a diet high in sodium, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, kidney dysfunction, high blood sugar, and high BMI contributed to the higher number of strokes. Researchers then used the database to predict the number of deaths for 2020-2030. They found that the death toll for ischemic stroke is expected to increase further to 4.9 million in 2030. When researchers factored in the risk factors, they predicted that the overall number of deaths from stroke could reach 6.4 million if these risk factors are not controlled or prevented. A limitation of the study was that quality and accuracy of disease data from some countries cannot be guaranwas about to be arrested. 

## President Alvi urges politicians to resolve issues with sagacity patience

ISLAMABAD (APP): President Dr Arif Alvi Thursday said sanity should prevail and political issues should be resolved with sagacity and patience and focus brought back to economic problems facing the nation. The president, in a interview to a private television channel, said political instability would create problems for Pakistan, however, it was a good omen that politicians were not ready to impose emergency. He said action should be taken against the persons involved in the incidents of May 9. "I was aggrieved over the incidents of May 9. To a question, he said he was in support of the Pakistan Army, democratic forces and the people of Pakistan. He said politicians should hold talks and elections should be held to reduce problems in the country. Elec-

marked. He recalled that Pakistan suffered damage after the martyrdom of Benazir Bhutto and the violence only subsided after Asif Ali Zardari raised the slogan of "Pakistan Khapay". Dr Alvi was of the view that the national discourse was focused on other issues at a time when the national economy was in bad shape, inflation was breaking back of the poor and more than 20 million children were out of school. He said the world was watching the situation in Pakistan in a year when the government would have to present its case for the Generalised System of Preferences (GSP+) before the European Union. He advised that harmony should be created among institutions. "When institutions are destroyed it is difficult for nations to survive and move forward." The president said in important cases, the Supreme Court judges should have acted with unanimity so that people would have listened to them and the nation would have a clear direction to follow.
