## Scientists use AI to discover new antibiotic to treat deadly superbug

LONDON (Media): Scientists using artificial intelligence have discovered a new antibiotic that can kill a deadly superbug. According to a new study published on Thursday in the science journal Nature Chemical Biology, a group of scientists from McMaster University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have discovered a new antibiotic that can be used to kill a deadly hospital superbug. The superbug in question is Acinetobacter baumannii, which the World Health Organization has classified as a "critical" threat among its "priority pathogens" - a group of bacteria families that pose the "greatest threat" to human health. According to the WHO, the bacteria have built-in abilities to find new ways to resist treatment and can pass along genetic material that allows other bacteria to become drug-resistant as well. A baumannii poses a threat to hospitals, nursing homes and patients who require ventilators and blood catheters, as well as those who have open wounds from surgeries. The bacteria can live for prolonged periods of time on environmental services and shared equipment, and can often be spread through contaminated hands. In addition to blood infections, A baumannii can cause infections in urinary tracts and lungs. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the bacteria can also "colonize" or live in a patient without causing infections or symptoms. Thursday's study revealed that researchers used an AI algorithm to screen thousands of antibacterial molecules in an attempt to

#### Former Israeli soldier returns key to Al-Aqsa Mosque after 56 years

TEL AVIV (Agencies): A former Israeli soldier handed back a key Thursday for a gate of Al-Aqsa Mosque in occupied East Jerusalem after stealing it 56 years ago, Anadolu reports. The Islamic Endowments Department in Jerusalem published a video showing its director general Sheikh Azzam Al-Khatib receiving the key from the man, identified as Yair Barack. In the video, Barack said he was part of the Israeli battalion that fought on the East Jerusalem front, adding that many of his comrades died during the fighting in 1967. "I arrived at the Al-Mughrabi Gate (in the western corridor of Al-Aqsa Mosque)...and when I looked at the left side, I found a key. I don't know why I put my hand on it and took it," he said. "I put the key in my pocket, and since then. I've had it in my possession," he added. Barack said that after 40 or 50 years, he began feeling uncomfortable that the key was still with | likely "in the near term," he said. I wished I didn't do it, which is occupying Jerusalem," he said. Israel occupied East Jerusalem during the 1967 Arab-Israeli War. It annexed the entire city in 1980 in a move never recognized by the international community.

"We had a whole bunch of data that was just telling us about which chemicals were able to kill a bunch of bacteria and which ones weren't. My job was to train this model, and all that this model was going to be doing is telling us essentially if new molecules will have antibacterial properties or not," said Gary Liu, a graduate student from MacMaster University who worked on the research. "Then basically through that, we're able to just increase the efficiency of the drug discovery pipeline and ... hone in all the molecules that we really want to care about," he added. After scientists trained the AI model, they used it to analyze 6,680 compounds that it had previously not encountered. The analysis took an hour and half and ended up producing several hundred compounds, 240 of which were then tested in a laboratory. Laboratory testing ulti-

otics, including abaucin. The scientists then tested the new molecule against A baumannii in a wound infection model in mice and found that the molecule suppressed the infection. "This work validates the benefits of machine learning in the search for new antibiotics" said Jonathan Stokes, an assistant professor at McMaster University's department of biomedicine and biochemistry who helped lead the study. "Using AI, we can rapidly explore vast regions of chemical space, significantly increasing the chances of discovering fundamentally new antibacterial molecules." he said. "We know broad-spectrum antibiotics are suboptimal and that pathogens have the ability to evolve and adjust to every trick we throw at them ... AI methods afford us the opportunity to vastly increase the rate at which we discover new antibiotics, and we can do it at a reduced cost. This is an important avenue of exploration for new antibiotic drugs," he added.

# Russia will not achieve military victory in Ukraine: General Mark Milley

WASHINGTON D.C. (Agencies): Russia will not achieve a military victory in Ukraine, top US officer General Mark Milley said Thursday, while also cautioning that Kyiv is unlikely to force out all of Moscow's troops anytime soon. His comments underlined forecasts that the war in Ukraine is set to drag on, with neither side positioned to win a clear-cut victory and no negotiations currently taking place. "This war, militarily, is not going to be won by Russia. It's just not," Milley told journalists after the conclusion of a virtual meeting of dozens of countries that support Ukraine. Russia's original strategic objectives, including overthrowing the government in Kyiv, "are not achievable militarily, they're not going to be done," Milley said. ## South Korea approves Ukraine arms transfer: WSJ

SEOUL (Agencies): South Korea has a press briefing later on Wednesday. agreed to send hundreds of thousands of artillery shells to Ukraine under a "confidential arrangement" with the United States, the Wall Street Journal about-face for Seoul, which has been reluctant to authorize lethal aid to Kiev. Under the reported agreement, South Korea will first ship the munitions to the US, which will then forward them on to Ukraine, sources told the Journal on Wednesday. Seoul and the Pentagon have so far declined to confirm the transfer, though both acknowledged ongoing talks for the shells. However, South Korean Defense Ministry spokesman Jeon Ha-kyu said there were "inaccurate parts" in the WSJ report during Washington, a close ally.

## Oath Keepers leader gets 18 years for US Capitol riot

WASHINGTON (Agencies): A federal judge in Washington, DC sentenced Oath Keepers leader Stewart Rhodes to 18 years in prison on Thursday, calling him an ongoing threat to the US. It was the longest sentence yet in the matter of the January 6 riot at the US capitol, and the first on charges of seditious conspiracy. "You, sir, present an ongoing threat and a peril to this country, to the republic and to the very fabric of our democracy," Judge Amit Mehta told Rhodes at the sentencing. "You are smart, you are compelling, and you are charismatic. Frankly, that is what makes you dangerous." Rhodes replied that he was a "political prisoner" and that he felt like the lead character in Franz Kafka's 'The Trial,' whose guilt was foreordained. "My goal will be to be an 'American



Solzhenitsyn' to expose the criminality of this regime," he told the court. Prosecutors sought at least 25 years, describing the January 2021 riot as a "brazen attack" that threatened the "most important and vulnerable part of American democracy." Mehta agreed with their claim that Rhodes had been a leader of the "insurrection" and agreed to classify his actions as terrorism, which drastically increased the length of the sentence.

#### Russia Belarus signs nuclear arms deal

MOSCOW (Agencies): Moscow and Minsk have sealed an agreement on the deployment of Russian tactical nuclear weapons in Belarus. Explaining the need for the move, Russian Defense Minister Sergey Shoigu cited a recent increase in the number of NATO maneuvers involving weapons of mass destruction. Shoigu and his Belarusian counterpart, Viktor Khrenin, on Thursday signed off on documents stipulating the terms of the deployment and storage of the Russian weapons. The Russian minister emphasized that the move had come in response to the "acute escalation of threats and activities by NATO joint nuclear missions." He noted that the agreement involves "non-strategic nuclear weapons" and is in accordance Russian minister revealed.





#### Census Concluded

Interim data of the seventh census of Pakistan has been released, showing the total population count close to 250 million. This of course is not the final number as the report is provisional, but it accurately reflects the population jump that the country has made in the last few years. However, there have been countless complaints of deliberate and inaccurate counting, resulting in a few key areas-like Karachi-being underrepresented. Such claims are worth investigating and the government should provide all the reassurances that are necessary but at the same time, to call taint the whole process is rather unfair, especially considering that no proof of malpractice was given. According to the provisional data released, Punjab's population was recorded at 127,474,802, Sindh's at 57,931,907, Balochistan's 21,977,474 and Islamabad's at 2,359,422. Chief Commissioner Naeem Zafar assured the public that the system used for the census is accurate and all data received was transparent. He further claimed that in response to complaints of under-reporting, the government extended the deadline for the census five times amid a political crisis that made matters much worse. The already tedious process was prolonged, and extra resources were used to ensure that an accurate picture of Pakistan's population is reported. It would be a shame if all this was rendered useless for ulterior motives. However, reservations about the census still persisted, especially when it came to Karachi. As the country's largest city, it reported a one percent reduction from its last population count which stood at 15.85 million. These are troubling figures that might point towards a problem, given that the economic hub of the country is prone to migration by eager individuals looking for job opportunities. Perhaps in such cases, the government should open an investigation and consider the possibility of recounting since under-reporting implications are severe-i.e. underfunding, poor resource management and stagnant development. Historically, Sindh has always also had complaints of misrepresentation, so any complaint that it has in this regard should be accommodated to avoid future political tensions as well. But to render the whole process inaccurate and faulty would be an injustice to the efforts put towards the cause.

## High time for a 'Hajj Express' for Israeli Muslims

With the Hajj being only a month away, Saudi Arabia has a chance to take the high road with Israeli Muslims and sidestep the obstacles in their efforts to normalize relations. Riyadh is hereby called upon, for the first time, to allow direct flights for Muslim pilgrims from Israel. The Hajj, one of the five pillars of Islam, is an annual pilgrimage to Makkah, Islam's holiest city, that Muslims must conduct at least once in their lifetime if they are physically and financially able. The centerpiece of the trip is the circumambulation of the cube-shaped Kaaba, a black stone structure that, according to the Qur'an, Abraham built as the metaphorical house of God. More than 2 million Muslims — some 6,000 of whom are Israelis — make the journey each year, though Riyadh significantly restricted such visits during the first three years of the COVID-19 it has dropped limits on visiting this year. Yet, until now, pilgrims from Israel, as from the Palestinian territories, have had to travel to Makkah through third countries, incurring surcharges and hassle. With Donald Trump and Joe Biden being the latest US presidents to have flown directly between Israel and Saudi Arabia in recent years, and the Kingdom now routinely allowing Israeli airliners to overfly its territory en route to other destinations, a "Hajj Express" is timely and solutions need to be found for Israeli Muslims to make it easily implementable. After all, Qatar admitted direct flights from Tel Aviv for World Cup fans. Surely Saudi Arabia can be no less accommodating for the Muslims who make up 18 percent of Israel's population. Yair Lapid, who served as Israel's prime minister from July to December of 2022, is on record as saying he secured an understanding for future direct Hajj flights during his term. When Saudi Arabia opened its airspace for Israeli flights to other countries last summer, Lapid said it was the "first official step in normalization with Saudi Arabia." But unlike Lapid, Riyadh has never given an on-the-record confirmation to allow direct flights, which by default raises questions on the hope for

discussion," said Israeli Foreign Minister Eli Cohen in early May. "I cannot tell you if there is any progress. But with that, I am optimistic that we can advance peace with Saudi Arabia." Obstacles remain, however. The Kingdom's China-brokered renewal of ties with Iran has strained its relations with Israel and may have weakened Riyadh's appetite for normalization. The right-wing policies of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu have also angered the Kingdom. Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman told the Arab League Summit last week that he remains committed to "establishing an independent state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital." Such territorial concessions constitute a nonstarter for the Israeli government. Recent unconfirmed American media reports, and Israeli ones months before pandemic. The Kingdom now says them, have suggested that, on top of finding a solution for Palestinians. Saudi Arabia has requested that the Biden administration greenlight the domestic enrichment of uranium on Saudi soil as part of a civilian nuclear program in exchange for normalization with Israel. Washington is loath to take such a step because enriched uranium could also be used for a nuclear weapons program. Riyadh also wants the Biden administration to guarantee the sale of American offensive weapons systems to the Saudis - a demand that faces stiff resistance in Congress. So, if the Kingdom now withholds consent for direct flights from Israel to Saudi Arabia, it would be a setback for those normalization efforts, not merely a continuation of the status quo. It is hard to see what the Saudis would gain from that. One way to support the arrangement would be to include Palestinians in the deal. Israel might also consider earmarking its southern Ramon Airport for the flights. After all, Ramon is significantly closer to the Kingdom than Ben Gurion Airport, making for cheaper routes. ## A day long gone

SOMETIMES one wants to simply write about events long past. Out of sheer 'boredom' with current events or perhaps because it is so difficult to make sense of what is happening — the reason can be one or many. And for some reason, I have been reading up on Black Friday. Not the one the Western world associates with sales but an earlier one back in 1910. Perhaps before sales were a 'thing'. It was at a time when women in Great Britain still did not have the right to vote. And many thought this is how the world was meant to be — that as their sons and husbands would exercise the right, the women behind them would find expression too. But some of them expected more. They wanted the right to vote and were promised a limited right to do so by a government which then reneged on its promise. And on this particular Friday, they walked on to parliament in London and decided to force an entry. There were 300 of them; it is said they were confronted by policemen in even greater numbers, many of whom had not dealt with women protesters before. The confrontation is said to have lasted hours. The women were beaten, assaulted, thrown about and the policemen and bystanders were said to have behaved equally brutally. In fact, the protesters alleged policemen in civilian clothing were part of the crowds who too mistreated them. Black eyes and bleeding noses were common. The day ended with the arrest of over 100 women and four men — it shows what the problem was or rather who was seen to be the problem. However, all of them were released without any further inquiry or actions. The decision to let everyone go had been made by the then home secretary, Winston Churchill, and it was alleged back then that this decision was made only because, had the matter gone any further, the police brutality

would also have been highlighted. There has also been a lengthy backand-forth about whether or not the government ordered the police to behave in this heinous manner with the protesters. But the women did testify to what happened on that day and those testimonies exist to this day. "Several times constables and plain-clothes men who were in the crowds passed their arms round me from the back and clutched hold of my breasts in as public a manner as possible, and men in the crowd followed their example ... My skirt was lifted up as high as possible, and the constable attempted to lift me off the ground by raising his knee. This he could not do, so he threw me into the crowd and incited the men to treat me as they wished." Another testimony read: "One policeman ... put his arm round me ... saying as he did so, 'You have been wanting this for a long time, haven't you'." A disabled woman had her wheelchair damaged so she could not move. She had been forced to a side street and was assaulted. And despite the appearance on the front page of a newspaper of a picture in which a woman protester was lying on the ground, with policemen standing over her, the press in general was not sympathetic to the women. The latter were criticised for violence, while the police force was covered with empathy. Later, two women even died, and there were fears their deaths were linked to the injuries they received that day. And the violence had its impact on the women, the suffragettes. They backed down, and stopped participating in the movement. Others became wary of demonstrations and preferred quick actions such as breaking windows which would allow them to make a rapid exit before the police arrived. But it seems as if using violence, especially sexual violence, to deter women from play-

ing a more active role in public life and politics is a tactic still around. Some months ago, Zubeida Mustafa, a senior op-ed writer for this paper, wrote of how police behaved towards the inhabitants of a colony who were resisting the demolition of their homes so a road could be widened. "The last straw came when they started hauling up the demonstrators, and in their haste to wind up the show, they physically picked up three minor girls - tearing off the hijab of one of them and dumped them in the police van. They were allegedly taken to the Nazimabad thana. That itself was a violation of the rules: they should have been taken directly to the Liaquatabad women's police station, where they were eventually sent after having been brutalised the whole day at the Nazimabad thana. "It was heart-wrenching to hear the account of how they [the womenl were thrashed on their thighs, scratched and bitten on their faces while attempts were allegedly also made by booted law enforcers to attack their private parts. They were made to clean the toilets and offered urine when they asked for drinking water. They were let off a little before midnight, when community leaders came to their rescue." This extract is from a piece she wrote last December. But I digress. I was writing about an event long gone. However, such is the absence of intellectual rigour in journalists that we tend to flit from event to event. But Black Friday had been on my mind because it does remind us of the long journey of women and the violence they suffered and continue to suffer to get equal rights. Equal rights to vote and perhaps to protest and be treated even more brutally than male protesters. Because even the right to protest unsettled the men in power.

# Super Tax: What The State Giveth, The State Taketh Away – By Muhammad Umair Zeb I'l Tax Analyst

The measure may address immediate solvency concerns but if reforms are not done, there will be no golden goose to cull in future. On the face of it, the move makes sense: the continuation of the IMF programme remains critical for the country's external solvency, and to avoid a potential default scenario — thereby making it essential that tough decisions are taken, even though they may not be feasible in the mid- to long-term. Pakistan's 100 largest businesses have opposed the continuation of the super tax and voiced their concerns about the imposition of up to 7.5% income tax on their retained profits. They issued a stark warning to the govrisks and its impact on the business environment. Representatives from the country's business chambers and the Pakistan Business Council (PBC), on Tuesday, shared their taxation proposals and expressed apprehensions about the current economic situation during a meeting with the Senate Standing Committee on Finance. The committee proceedings reaffirmed the widespread belief that the deteriorating economic conditions have se-

verely affected businesses, leading to closures. Pakistan's industrial sector is already burdened, paying approximately 56% of total taxes despite its 20% share in the economy. Umair Zeb, The Tax analyst added that fiscal policies were already skewed against the manufacturers and the sector cannot bear the additional tax burden in the upcoming fiscal year. The PBC strongly opposed the government's decision to continue the up ernment about the increasing default to 10% super tax, which was initially intended to be levied for only one year. However, according to Section 4C of the Income Tax Ordinance, the super tax will continue beyond the tax year 2022. Umair Zeb, urged the government to focus on tracking non-filers of income tax returns by restricting their use of credit cards and reinstating the requirement to present Computerised National Identity Cards (CNICs) for purchases. The

Tola, proposed imposing an income tax of 5% to 7.5% on the accumulated profits (distributable reserves) of listed and non-listed companies. The RRMC estimates that this measure could generate Rs338 billion in taxes in one year. The Commission recommended imposing income tax rates of 5% for listed companies and 7.5% for non-listed companies on their distributable reserves. This tax on reserves would serve as an advance tax on dividends that companies will pay to shareholders in the future. It would be adjustable against the tax levied on the actual distribution of dividends. The concept of advance tax on dividends already exists in the Ordinance for Controlled Foreign Companies Umair Zeb, The Tax expert added his view that the corporate tax needs to be lowered to incentivise more investment and more corporatisation. Pakistan has had a lost decade where per capita income has largely stagnated, and we now have a recurring solvency crisis every three years — if reforms are not done, things are only going to get worse, and there will be no golden goose to cull at that point.







Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 43,500 cusecs of water released at Nowshera and 24,600 cusecs released from River Chenab at Marala.

#### Germany slips into recession with negative first quarter

BERLIN (Agencies): Germany fell into a recession around the turn of the year, official figures published Thursday showed, as Europe's largest economy contracted by 0.3% over the first three months of 2023. The negative growth figure was revised down by the federal statistics agency from an initial estimate of zero percent. The poor performance was the second consecutive quarter of negative growth, following a 0.5% con-



traction in the last three months of 2022, as Germany battled an energy crisis unleashed by Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The dwindling of energy

supplies from Russia following the outbreak of the war sent prices soaring, stoking inflation and weighing on the economy. The impact of higher prices was felt particularly by consumers in the first quarter of 2023, according to Destatis, as they reined in spending on items such as food and clothing. Germany, which had long been heavily reliant on Russian energy imports, was left particularly exposed following the Russian invasion.

## S'pore's travel boom shields economy from recession

SINGAPORE (Agencies): Singapore is confident that a rebound in travel that's boosting the services sector will help the island's economy avoid a recession this year despite a darkening global outlook. Authorities retained their forecast for gross domestic product growth to range between 0.5% and 2.5%, with the actual expansion seen likely coming in at the midpoint. The ministry of trade and



industry also published on Thursday final estimates for the first quarter. which showed GDP declined an annualised 0.4% from the previous three

months, better than the 0.7% drop estimated earlier. "We do not expect a technical recession this year," said Yong Yik Wei, MTI's chief economist. "Given the downside risks and the weakening outlook, we cannot rule out the possibility that there could be some quarters of negative Q-o-Q growth this year. But again, that's not our baseline," she said, referring to the sequential performance.

#### Fitch warns US debt standoff could hit credit rating

WASHINGTON (Agencies): Ratings agency Fitch put the US on notice that its perfect credit rating could be jeopardised if the White House and Republican opposition fail to overcome their impasse on raising the nation's borrowing limit, a week before a key deadline. Fitch placed the country's AAA-ranked credit on "rating watch negative" - a debt limit" ahead of a looming deadmove it said "reflects increased political line. #### Nvidia shares surge 21% as sales forecast jumps

NEW YORK (Agencies): Nvidia Corp on Wednesday forecast second quarter revenue more than 50% above Wall Street estimates, with the company saying it is boosting supply to meet surging demand for its artificial intelligence chips, which are used to power ChatGPT and many similar services. Shares of Nvidia, the world's most valuable listed semiconductor company, jumped as much as 21% to a record-high US\$370 in ex-



tended trade. Nvidia's surge after the bell increased its stock market value by nearly US\$150 billion to more than US\$900 billion, extending the Silicon Valley company's lead as the

world's most valuable semiconductor firm. The artificial intelligence boom has helped Nvidia become the fifth most valuable US company by market value. Nvidia has strained to meet demand for its AI chips, with Tesla CEO Elon Musk, who is reportedly building out an artificial intelligence startup, earlier this week telling an interviewer that the graphics processing units (GPUs) are "considerably harder to get than drugs."

#### Deutsche, Citi admit anti-competitive activity in UK probe

LONDON (Agencies): Deutsche Bank and Citigroup admitted anti-competitive activity by exchanging sensitive information on UK government bonds between 2009 and 2013, Britain's anti-trust watchdog said, as it provisionally found five banks in breach of competition rules. HSBC, Morgan Stanley, and Royal Bank of Canada, meanwhile, have not admitted any wrongdoing over the alleged sharing of information in one Britain's Competition and Markets

Speaking at the Qatar Economic Forum in Doha he claimed will discourage investment in hydrocarbons and could result in energy shortages in the EU over the coming decade. ## Moody's outlines Russia's role in global economy

MOSCOW (Agencies): Russia's economic pull in the Eurasian Economic Union (EEU) remains strong despite geopolitical tensions and Western sanctions, according to Moody's. The rating agency, however, noted that growing uncertainty is undermining Moscow's role as a major diplomatic player and economic hub. According to the report, the conflict in Ukraine has led Central Asian countries to reassess their trade routes, export mar-



kets, and investment sources, as they seek to diversify. This could boost regional economic growth and transform labor markets, Moody's wrote. The conflict has repercussions on the

world stage, especially in the ex-Soviet Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) nations, it added. #### Russia and Iran to increase use of own currencies in trade

TEHRAN (Agencies): Russia and Iran have reached an agreement to boost the use of their respective national currencies in settlements as a push toward de-dollarization gains momentum in bilateral economic relations, Iranian media reported on Wednesday. The head of Russia's Central Bank Elvira Nabiullina has held a meeting with her Iranian counterpart Mohammad Reza Farzin



as part of her visit to Tehran where the Asian Clearing Union (ACU) summit is taking place. "I had a good and productive meeting with my Russian colleague Elvira Nabiullina," Farzin wrote on Twitter after the meeting, adding: "We both advocated a serious consensus on the development of currency relations between [our] countries, on the basis of which we prepared a road map. Part of this operational plan is the use of national currencies in bilateral relations and the strengthening of the system of bilateral settlements."

#### Saudi Arabia's merchandise exports rise 4.4% to \$28bn

RIYADH (Agencies): Saudi Arabia's total merchandise exports rise by 4.4 percent in March to SR106.1 billion (\$28.29 billion), compared to SR101.1 billion in the previous month, according to the latest report released by the Kingdom's General Authority for Statistics. The report, however, noted that the Kingdom's overall merchandise exports fell 25.3 percent year-on-year in March, as the value of exports amounted to SR142 million in the same month of 2022.



GASTAT, in its report, pointed out that this year-on-year fall in exports was primarily driven by a decrease in oil exports which fell by 26.5 percent in March to SR83.1 billion.

TOKYO (Agencies): The dollar pushed to a two-month high against the euro and a six-month peak versus the yen on Thursday, as a resilient US economy led traders to pare their bets on rate cuts this year. ## Argentina to visit Indonesia for football friendly

JAKARTA (Agencies): World Cup winners Argentina will visit Indonesia next month for a friendly against its national team, a top football official said today, in a boost for a country that has suffered a succession of recent football setbacks. The visit will be part of an Asian tour by the South American side that also includes a June 15 stop in Beijing for a friendly against Australia. The announcement comes at a time when Argentina is hosting the Under-20 World Cup as a replacement for Muslim-majority Indonesia, which



in March was stripped of the tournament over domestic resistance to the participation of Israel. The friendly will take place eight months after Indone-

sia suffered one of the world's deadliest stadium stampedes, with 135 people killed in a scramble to flee as police fired tear gas into the stands in Malang in East Java. Though football is huge in the country of 270 million people, Indonesia has struggled to make its mark in the international game since a single World Cup appearance back in 1938 as the Dutch East Indies. Its fans are, however, currently on a high from last week winning the gold medal at the South East Asian Games for the first time since 1991.



Super Kings in the final on Sunday. "It's nice that it's going well at the moment," Green said, "Our batting's been really good. Madhwal has been the game changer for us; five today, and got four-for the other day." Green, who was the second-most expensive player bought in the auction at \$2.11 million, added: "Gujarat are the best team. It's going to be a tough challenge, especially on their home turf." 
## Real Madrid's Vinicius Jr has red card rescinded

MADRID (Agencies): Real Madrid forward Vinicius Jr's red card in Sunday's LaLiga match at Valencia, in which he was also racially abused, has been rescinded, the Spanish Football Federation (RFEF) said on Tuesday. The Brazilian winger was sent off in stoppage time by referee Ricardo de Burgos Bengoetxea for striking an opponent following a scuffle with Valencia players in which Vinicius appeared to be grabbed around the neck. Vinicius had earlier been racially abused by fans at the Mestalla Stadium, which led to the game being halted for 10 minutes as the player pointed out people who were abusing him in the stands. "The RFEF Competition Committee considers that the referee's assessment was determined by the omission of the entirety of



the play that took place, which affected the refereeing decision," the federation said. "The fact that he (the referee) was deprived of a decisive part of the facts led him to adopt an arbitrary decision. And this is because it was impossible for him to properly assess what happened." Seven people accused of different hate crimes against Vinicius were detained by the Spanish police earlier on Tuesday.

## Iran says it has successfully test-launched ballistic missile

TEHRAN (Agencies): Iran successfully test-launched a ballistic missile with a potential 2,000-km range on Thursday, state media said, two days after the chief of Israel's Armed Forces raised the prospect of "action" against Tehran over its nuclear programme, Reuters reports. Iran, which has one of the biggest missile programmes in the Middle East, says its weapons are capable of reaching the bases of archfoes, Israel and the United States, in the region. Despite US and European opposition, the Islamic Republic has said it will further develop its "defensive" missile programme. "Our message to Iran's enemies is that we will defend the country and its achievements. Our message to our friends is that we want to help regional stability," Iranian Defence Minister, Mohammadreza Ashtiani, said. State TV broadcast a few seconds of footage of what it said was the launch of an upgraded version of Iran's Khoramshahr 4 ballistic missile with a range of 2,000 km (1,243 miles) and able to carry a 1,500-kg (3,300-pound) warhead. The

#### Libya government says it conducted air strikes in western areas

TRIPOLI (Agencies): Libya's Government of National Unity (GNU) said it had conducted air strikes against smuggling networks on Thursday, with blasts hitting a western city that is home to armed factions that have backed a rival administration, Reuters reports. Three residents of Zawiya, just west of Tripoli, said they had heard explosions on Thursday, with one also hearing gunfire. The city has been the site of sporadic clashes this year between factions that back and oppose the GNU. While the Tripoli-based government has no known air power of its own, allied Turkish military forces have previously deployed drones in western Libya. The GNU said "our national air force" had targeted what it called criminal gangs involved in trafficking fuel, drugs and people in western coastal areas. Libya has had little stability since the 2011 NATO-backed uprising against Muammar Gaddafi, and it split in 2014 between rival eastern and western factions though there has been no major warfare since a 2020 ceasefire. The GNU was created through a UNbacked process in 2021 to unify Libya's divided institutions and oversee an election planned for that year. However, the vote was never held, amid disputes over the rules and the eastern-based Parliament said the GNU's term had expired and appointed an alternative government. Most western armed factions continued to back the GNU, as did Turkiye which had helped the Tripoli government fight off an eastern assault in early 2020. However, some factions in the west oppose the GNU and, last summer, there were clashes in Tripoli between the two sides as the Prime Minister designated by the Parliament in eastern Libya attempted to enter the capital. ## Bahrain to resume diplomatic representation with Lebanon



Bahrain's foreign ministry will resume diplomatic representation with Lebanon by exchanging ambassadors, the state news agency said on Saturday. Reuters reports. Bahrain. On Tuesday, the top Israeli General mooted possible military action against Iran as efforts by six world powers to revive Tehran's 2015 nuclear deal have stalled since last September, amid growing Western fears about Tehran's accelerating nuclear advances. The deal, which Washington ditched in 2018 under then President Donald Trump, had imposed curbs on Iran's nuclear activities that extended the time Tehran would need to produce enough fissile material for a nuclear bomb, if it chose to do so. Iran denies seeking nuclear weapons.

maintaining a ban it imposed on issuing visas for workers from the Philippines amid an ongoing labour row between the two countries which talks have failed to resolve.

After Filipino authorities alleged failure to comply with a labour agreement it previously reached with Kuwait, the Gulf nation suspended the issuance of all visas for Filipino workers earlier this

According to Kuwait, the ban was imposed in response to "wrong practices" made by the Philippines' embassy in the country and the alleged crimes committed by some members of the Filipino community against Kuwaitis. Amongst the reported violations listed by Kuwait's Public Authority of Manpower (PAM) were attempts to get domestic labour recruitment offices to withdraw Filipino house workers from Kuwaitis' households on the pretext that their employment contracts were completed, putting pressure on employers to renew contracts with undesirable conditions, and circumventing competent agencies in Kuwait by directly contacting Kuwaiti citizens and recruitment offices to check on matters with the Philippines' embassy. In addition, PAM cited the "inappropriate treatment" of Kuwaiti citizens who were checking with the Philippines' embassy upon its request, and the embassy was also accused of sheltering Filipino workers who violated Kuwait's residency law or were registered as absentees. From the Philippines' side, however, it has for years insisted that its workers in the small Gulf nation

KUWAIT CITY (Agencies): Kuwait is face abuse and poor treatment, forcing Manila to demand greater rights for their citizens. In a statement by PAM Kuwait's First Deputy Prime Minister and Interior Minister, Talal Al Khalid, asserted that "Kuwait's sovereignty and its people's dignity are a red line". The statement added that Kuwait is committed to international accords signed with the Philippines and the renewal of Filipinos' valid residency permits.

In talks this month, requested by the Filipino government, Kuwait set a number of conditions for resolving the dispute, including the embassy's acknowledgment of having committed violations and infringing Kuwaiti laws, and for it to make an official pledge to not repeat them in the future. Kuwait also requested that it notify the Philippine government of the acknowledgment and the pledge, and to have them published in official media

Only after then, Kuwait said, would its Interior Ministry evaluate the situation, as well as follow up on the embassy's abidance by security regulations for at least three months before deciding what it sees fit to do.

The Filipino delegation asked for 72 hours to check with its government on the conditions set by the Kuwaiti side, which were rejected by Manila.

As a result, Kuwait has said that its decision to suspend the issuance of all visas for Filipinos will continue "until further notice", with First Deputy Prime Minister, Al Khalid, directing PAM to coordinate with the Foreign Ministry to reach agreements with other countries for the provision of skilled workers to

## Egypt defers payments for wheat imports amid dollar crunch

ferred payments for its large wheat purchases, in some cases by months, according to a government official and traders, as the country grapples with a shortage of hard currency, Reuters reports.Egypt is one of the world's biggest wheat importers and uses the purchases to make heavily subsidised bread, a politically sensitive benefit available to tens of millions of people. Most deferred payment cargoes have been shipped and unloaded without interruption, so far, and Egypt's state wheat reserves used to make subsi-

Following the war in Ukraine, Egypt now depends mostly on Russia for its wheat. Egypt's Supply Minister told Reuters the country's state grains buyer has deferred opening letters of credit to pay for wheat imports to alleviate financial pressures caused by a foreign currency shortage. Four grain traders told Reuters, on condition of anonymity, that delays in payments for state-purchased wheat - considered a top priority commodity - were unprecedented as they were stretching to months.

## Algeria: Channel permanently shut down after showing explicit scenes

judiciary ruled to permanently shut down a private television channel and sentenced the channel director to three years in prison on charges of broadcasting a sexually explicit scene last November. The Algerian newspaper Ennahar reported that the misdemeanour court in the Algerian city of Sidi M'hamed issued a threeyear prison sentence against the director of Al-Ajwaa TV channel, Zubiri Boushaqour, after broadcasting "offensive" content. The same court also issued a one-year prison sentence for

ALGIERS (Agencies): The Algerian the channel's editor-in-chief and one of the channel's female journalists involved in the case. The Audiovisual Regulatory Authority (ARAV) decided to shut down the channel permanently following the incident that agitated public opinion in the country. The government body explained that its decision came after the channel broadcasted scenes that were: "Offensive and contrary to the values of our society and our religion." The channel's management expressed regret and apologised to the Algerian people for the "terrible mistake".

## Israel shoots down drone from Lebanon, military says

from Lebanon on Thursday, its military said in a statement, Reuters reports. "A short while ago, IDF (Israel Defence Forces) soldiers identified and downed a drone crossing from Lebanese territory into Israeli territory towards the town of Zar'it," the military said. It did not immediately identify who had sent the drone from Lebanon and released a photo of a UAV lying in a thicket of thorns. "The IDF

TEL AVIV (Agencies): Israel shot will continue to prevent any attempt down a drone that had crossed over to violate Israeli sovereignty," the military said. Last month, Israel said Lebanese armed group, Hezbollah, was behind a rare roadside bomb attack that wounded a motorist in northern Israel in March, and in the past has said it shot down the group's drones. Iran-backed Hezbollah and Israel fought a month-long war in 2006 and have traded fire on several occasions since, but have avoided a large-scale confrontation.

UN, Africa Bank work to ease Russia grain, fertiliser exports - UN official

The United Nations is working with the African Export-Import Bank (Afreximbank) to create a platform to help process transactions for Russian exports of grain and fertiliser to Africa, the top UN trade official told Reuters on Wednesday. An agreement struck in July last year requires the UN to help Russia overcome any obstacles to its grain and fertiliser exports for three years. It was reached at the same time as a deal allowing the safe Black Sea export of food and fertiliser from Ukraine following Russia's February 2022 invasion. The deals were intended to ease a global food crisis that the United Nations said was worsened by the war because both countries produce grain and fertiliser for world markets, particularly in Africa and the Middle East. "We have not turned the corner on this," Rebeca Grynspan, who leads the implementation of the UN deal with Russia, said in an interview, describing the Black Sea accord and pact between the UN and Russia as continuing to "be a life line for food security" around the world. The Black Sea deal was extended last week for the third time after Russia agreed to a further two months. But Moscow has been threatening to quit unless a list of demands to improve its own food and fertiliser exports is met.

Russia's agricultural exports are not subject to Western sanctions imposed over the invasion of Ukraine, but Moscow says there are restrictions on payments, logistics and insurance and a wider chilling effect from the measures. The United States and others

have dismissed Russia's complaints. Grynspan said she was working with Afreximbank to try to help small and medium-sized countries in Africa combat disrupted trading and access Russian grain and fertiliser through "more agile transactions." "We are working with them (Afreximbank) and making a platform that will allow for a more agile due diligence with the clients to comply with the sanctions, but allow for the transactions of food and fertilisers with Africa," she said. Cairo-based Afreximbank was not immediately available for comment. Grynspan did not share any further details as discussions continue. Russia's agricultural bank, known as Rosselkhozbank, was cut off from the SWIFT international payment network by the European Union in June. Russia wants it reconnected, but the EU has said it was not considering reinstatement of Russian banks.

#### COVID-19 ranks as most prevalent virus in Beijing for four weeks:

BELJING (Agencies): COVID-19 infections have ranked as the most prevalent virus in Beijing for four weeks after overtaking the city's influenza cases in late April, according to the COVID-19 weekly reports released by the Beijing Center for Disease Prevention and Control on Wednesday. According to the Beijing Center for Disease Prevention and Control, the number of cases involving 16 kinds of notifiable infectious diseases across Beijing has risen to 25,544 from May 15 to May 21, a four-fold increase compared with the number from April 24 to April 30. Respiratory infectious diseases accounted for 96.5 percent of the 25,544 cases.




