The US Treasury Department announced, Tuesday, on two Syrian money service businesses and allies of Hezbollah and the Islamic Revolution Guard Corps-Qods Force (IRGC-QF) for secretly helping the regime under Bashar Al-Assad maintain access to the international financial system in violation of international sanctions, Reuters reports. The Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) designated Al-Fadel Exchange, headquartered in Damascus, which has facilitated millions of dollars in transfers since 2021 to accounts at the US-designated Central Bank of Syria that benefit the Syrian government and Al-Assad, according to a statement by the Agency. Covid:Top Chinese scientist says don't rule

LONDON (Agencies): The possibility the Covid virus leaked from a laboratory should not be ruled out, a former top Chinese government scientist has told BBC News. As head of China's Centre for Disease Control (CDC), Prof George Gao played a key role in the pandemic response and efforts to trace its origins. China's government dismisses any suggestion the disease may have originated in a Wuhan laboratory. But Prof Gao is less forthright. In an interview for the BBC Radio 4 podcast Fever: The Hunt for Covid's Origin, Prof Gao says: "You can always suspect anything. That's science. Don't rule out anything." A world-leading virologist and immunologist, Prof Gao is now vice-president of the National Natural Science Foundation of China after retiring from the CDC last year. In a possible sign that the Chinese government may have taken the lab leak theory more seriouslv than its official statements suggest, Prof Gao also tells the BBC some kind of formal investigation into the Wuhan Institute of Virology (WIV) was carried out. "The government organised something," he says, but adds that it did not involve his own department, the China CDC. We asked him to clarify whether that meant another branch of government carried out a formal search of the WIV - one of China's top national laboratories, known to have spent years studying coronaviruses.

Teen girl in India stabbed to death in public, reigniting outrage over violence against women

NEW DELHI (Agencies): A 16 yearold girl was brutally stabbed and bludgeoned to death in a busy public allevway in India's capital on Sunday, sparking renewed outrage over the safety of women in the country and violence perpetrated by men. Video of the incident, which lasted for more than a minute and was captured on security camera, shows multiple people walking close by as the attacker repeatedly strikes the victim. Only one man is shown attempting to intervene, trying to pull the attacker off the victim before quickly retreating. The body of the victim, who has not been identified, was found Sunday evening in the Shahbad Dairy area of the northern Delhi neighborhood of Rohini, where the incident took place. On Monday afternoon, Indian police said they had arrested a male suspect named Sahil in connection with the murder.

China declined high-profile meeting – Pentagon

WASHINGTON (Agencies): China has rejected Washington's proposal that their defense chiefs meet this week, the Pentagon said on Monday. The news comes amid a renewed diplomatic spat between the two counties. "Overnight, the PRC informed the US that they have declined our early May invitation for Secretary [Lloyd] Austin to meet with PRC Minister of National Defense Li Shangfu in Singapore," the Pentagon said in a statement to the Wall Street Journal, referring to the People's Republic of China. "The Department believes strongly in the importance of maintaining open lines of military-to-military communication between Washington and Beijing to ensure that competition does not veer into conflict," the statement read. The WSJ cited an unnamed US defense official as saying that China's dismissal was "an unusually blunt message."



According to the report, the Pentagon had wanted the meeting to take place on the sidelines of the annual Shangri-La Dialogue security forum. Li will speak at the event as part of his trip to Singapore from May 31 to June 4, the Chinese Defense Ministry said. The Pentagon said last week that attempts to establish contacts with their Chinese counterparts in recent months have failed. The Financial Times reported this month that Beijing told Washington that there was "little chance" for a meeting between Li and Austin because of the sanctions placed on the Chinese defense minister over his alleged role in the purchase of Russian weapons.

Ukraine Parliament adopts 50-year Iran sanctions Bill

Shanghai records its highest May temperature in more than 100 years

Shanghai recorded its highest May temperature in more than 100 years on Monday, hitting a record 36.1 degrees Celsius (nearly 97 degrees Fahrenheit). The previous record of 35.7 degrees Celsius (96.3 degrees Fahrenheit) was first recorded in May 1876 and has been reached just three other times since including 1903, 1915 and 2018, state media reported. It is unknown when the city began keeping temperature records. Monday's record-breaking heat wave for May was recorded in the city's Xuhui district, state media CCTV reported, citing the Shanghai Meteorological Depart-Meteorological Department issued its Celsius in the coming 24 hours.

Shanghai (CNN): The Chinese city of first high temperature alert of the year as temperatures in the city surpassed 35 degrees Celsius (95 degrees Fahrenheit) for three consecutive days. This comes after a heat wave swept through China in July, with residents resorting to air raid shelters and public fountains to stay cool. China sends first civilian astronaut to space as Shenzhou-16 blasts off



Yasin Malik Death Sentence

On Friday, India's top anti-terrorism investigation agency once again sought the death sentence for Muhammad Yasin Malik, the chief of Jammu Kashmir Liberation Front (JKLF). Considering that the court has in the past turned down the plea for capital punishment, the Indian establishment seems determined to send the veteran Kashmiri leader to the gallows. Yasin Malik was convicted under the dreaded Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA) and sentenced by a trial court last year for allegedly raising funds to finance terrorism, and waging war against India. These were trumped up charges to get rid of the leader, but the court thankfully disagreed and argued that the charges did not merit capital punishment. However, not satisfied with Mr Malik serving a life term, the National Investigation Agency is approaching the Delhi High Court again seeking the death penalty. Mr Malik's conviction reeks of political vengeance, and the calls for his hanging reflect a desire by India's rulers to send a chilling message to all those raising a voice for occupied Kashmir. The charges being brought forth are laughable as they include pelting stones at security forces, burning of schools, and damage to public property. It must be pointed out that Mr Malik gave up the armed struggle in the mid-1990s, and since then has been leading a non-violent struggle for the liberation of his homeland. Leading human rights groups have termed UAPA a "draconian" law, with Amnesty International pointing out that parts of the legislation "do not meet international human rights standards". Sentencing someone to death over such farcical charges, under a problematic law, would be a travesty of justice. In fact, even Kashmir politicians with proximity to the state have opposed the death sentence for Mr Malik. One can only hope that better sense prevails and that the judiciary throws out this questionable case.

Washington's obsession with crushing Russia has dismantled its Middle East agenda

Once the undisputed hegemonic power in the Middle East, thought to be indispensable for the security and success of a range of regional leaderships, the US has been fading into the background to the benefit of its adversaries. As armed conflict erupted between NA-TO-backed Ukraine and Russia in February of 2022, the Joe Biden administration in Washington decided to throw its weight behind Kiev and focus on a project to bog down Moscow, while unleashing wave after wave of sanctions. Despite spending at least \$75 billion dollars on assistance to Ukraine and making Russia the most sanctioned nation on earth, the US has failed to bring Moscow to its knees. In fact, one could say that it is the US that has been cut down to size in the global arena, especially in the Middle East, an area it once considered ington's agenda, the Syrian Arab Republic was readmitted to the Arab League following a 12-year hiatus, paving the way to end the crisis in Syria, which the US seeks to prolong. China has also entered Middle East politics in a dramatic way, brokering an Iranian-Saudi rapprochement back in March, and this then spurred a wider normalization wave. Although the US attempted to play off the Saudi Arabia-Iran agreement as an acceptable and welcomed move, this has now clearly worked to collapse Washington's long-term effort towards regional supremacy, which was based on feeding a proxy conflict between the two powers. After having illegally invaded Iraq, inflicting around a million deaths, over a concoction of factually-challenged conspiracy theories about weapons of mass destruction, it comes off as laughable that the US is now claiming to oppose illegal invasions. Former Bush administration officials, such as Condolezza Rice, have even appeared on national television shows in the US to condemn illegal invasions of foreign countries. Even former US President George W. Bush seemingly condemned the "holy unjustified and brutal invasion of Iraq...I mean of Ukraine" in a Freudian slip.

The United Arab Emirates has be-ownership of goods, only transports global commodities house Glencore, come a key trade hub for Russian gold since Western sanctions over Ukraine cut Russia's more traditional export routes, Russian customs records show. The records, which contain details of nearly a thousand gold shipments between Feb. 24, 2022 and March 3 this year, reveal the names of over 100 non-Russian companies that have handled Russian gold since Western markets banned imports from Moscow. The shipments in the records, supplied to Reuters by a commercial provider, may not cover all exports in the period. In many cases, the records show only shippers or traders involved in the transaction, not the end buyer, which could be a refiner, jeweller or investor. Following are details of some of the companies that have been involved:

According to the customs records, a handful of Russian shipments arrived in London after the Ukraine war started, but before Western import bans kicked in. U.S. bank JPMorgan was sent 72.4 kg of gold worth \$4.5 million in shipments in March and April last year while Swedish security firm Loomis was sent of 97.4 kg worth \$5.9 million during March, May and June. Both companies operate precious metals vaults in London. The customs records for the shipments to JPMorgan and some of those to Loomis named French bank Societe Generale as the recipient. A source close to Societe Generale said while the bank cannot comment on specific client matters, any transactions of such a nature were debt settlements arranged prior to the war in Ukraine and would contain gold bars made before March 7, 2022, when the London Bullion Market Association banned Russian gold. A spokesperson for JPMorgan declined to comment. Loomis said it does not conduct business with any sanctioned parties or sanctioned

them for clients. The firm declined to comment on specific shipments but said it seemed the customs records referenced by Reuters contained incorrect information, without specifying what.

The records show the biggest handler of Russian gold exports to the UAE was Temis Luxury Middle East, a Dubai subsidiary of French logistics provider Temis Luxury, which participated in the import of 15.6 tonnes valued at \$863 million between Feb. 24, 2022 and March 3 this year. It was followed by Transguard, which is part of the Emirates Group, the airline-to-hotels conglomerate owned by the Gulf state's wealth fund, with 14.6 tonnes worth \$820 million. Temis Luxury said it fully complied with the laws and regulations of the UAE for freight forwarder activity. Emirates said Transguard had not bought any Russian gold and had now stopped transporting Russian bullion. The next largest handlers of gold shipped to the UAE in the year to March 3, 2023 were Shams Gold Trading with 8 tonnes, Privilege Group DMCC with 7.5 tonnes, Al Aseel Jewellery LLC with 5.3 tonnes and Paloma Precious DMCC with 5.1 tonnes, the customs documents showed. Privilege did not respond to an email seeking comment, a lawyer representing Paloma said it had not committed any wrongdoing and Reuters was unable to reach Shams or Al Aseel for comment. Another 17 non-Russian companies were each involved in transporting more than a tonne of Russian bullion to the UAE between Feb. 24, 2022 and March 3, 2023. The other companies that helped shipped Russian gold to the UAE each handled fewer than 5 tonnes, in most cases far less. Some large importers were, like Temis, subsidiaries of European firms. Open Mineral, a metals trader in Switgoods and does not buy or take zerland set up by former traders at

shipped 3 tonnes of Russian gold worth \$167 million to the UAE, some before Swiss sanctions came in, and some afterwards. All the deals after Swiss sanctions came into force involved Open Mineral's subsidiary in Abu Dhabi, not the Swiss company. "Open Mineral was in full compliance with the relevant sanctions' regime in place at the time of these trades," the company said. HONG KONG

Almost all the Russian gold shipments to Hong Kong and mainland China were handled by Vpower Finance Security Hong Kong Ltd, a Chinese logistics company. It was involved in the shipment of 20.5 tonnes of gold worth \$1.2 billion between May 2022 and March, the records showed. Vpower Finance Security did not respond to requests for comment. Five other non-Russian companies handled more than a tonne of gold imports from Russia. Most of these shipments also involved Vpow-

No individual non-Russian company shipped more than a few tonnes of gold to Turkey. Eight took part in the import of more than one tonne of Russian gold in the year to March 3, 2023.

At least two of the companies named in the customs records are members of the London Bullion Market Association (LBMA). Vpower Finance Security is a full member and Transguard an affiliate member. The LBMA said members and accredited refiners must comply with its rules, which include complying with U.S., UK and EU sanctions against Russia. It said it would investigate any allegations that LBMA members handled Russian gold and could rescind the membership of any companies that had done so.

Prison expressions – By Huma Yusuf

ON a hill in Johannesburg, in the remnants of what used to be a prison block for detainees awaiting trial, a flame of democracy now burns perpetually. This is Constitution Hill, the site of the country's supreme constitutional court, which was established in 1993 as part of South Africa's first post-apartheid constitution. Standing before that flame last week while receiving news from home, I enjoyed a glimmer of hope. This is not, of course, to compare PTI's defecting leadership and spurned supporters with the leaders of the passive resistance and anti-apartheid movements. But it is to say that democracy, however flawed, is always preferable to authoritarianism. And that strong-arm tactics are, in the long inspect communal cells in the prison, run, often galvanising. Constitution Hill rests on the site of Johannesburg's oldest prison, where both Nelson Mandela and Gandhi were incarcerated. In the 1950s and 1960s, the facility overflowed with political prisoners, Asians and black Africans thrown in detention for defying pass laws (the requirement for non-white South Africans to carry appropriate documentation to enter white-only areas). The prison is now a museum. Visitors can tour the old prison, hearing harrowing accounts — including from previous

ease-ridden cells. The museum's narratives do not shy away from detailed descriptions of the daily humiliations that prisoners endured, including being stripped and monitored in toilets. Nor do they censor the accounts of torture — the lashings, sexual abuse and indefinite detention in isolation cells, airless containers just over an arm-span long. My response was visceral - nausea, dizziness. One of the museum's final rooms took my breath away, however. Instead of artefacts recalling prison horrors, one cell resembles a modern art museum; it is replete with figurines, sculptures and abstract imaginings. The annotation explained that on Sundays, prison officials would and that inmates would prepare for these visits by fashioning decorations and curios out of the few objects they could claim: their blankets, shreds of toilet paper, leftover soap bars. The prisoners with the most imaginative creations would win privileges for the week — an extra slice of bread, a taste of dry cake. Although motivated by the transactional, the prison art is a celebration of the enduring humanity of inmates. Two former prisoners created the objects on display, recalling the creations of their peers. There are blankets reshaped into blooming

flowers and bouncing rabbits, improvised papier mâché figures in gentle embraces but also in the throes of despair, and charming cattle carved from soap. Incarcerated, abused, dehumanised, the inmates of Number Four jail managed to reclaim beauty and free expression, and survive. The objects I saw reminded me of the recourse to art sought by Ahmed Rabbani, a former prisoner at Guantánamo Bay, whose prison artwork recently inspired an exhibition at Karachi's Indus Valley School of Art and Architecture. Rabbani was mistakenly identified by the US as a terrorist, and remained in detention for 20 years without facing formal charges. A story about him in these pages described how he made paintings to cope with the humiliations and torture that defined his incarceration — images that were seized by the US military on the basis that they threatened national security. Why dwell on prison art at this political juncture in Pakistan? It is clear that a crackdown is upon us. A political party is being systematically dismantled, its former leadership silenced, its supporters hounded with the threat of military trials, their treatment a chilling warning to all those who may critique the security establishment too openly. No dialogue with PTI after it lost majority of party leadership: MNAs

ISLAMABAD (APP): The members MNA, Mehnaz Akbar Aziz of Pakistan of the National Assembly (MNAs) on Tuesday clearly rejected the probability of dialogue with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) after its chairman extended an offer of talks to the coalition government and claimed that his party had lost majority of its party leadership after the members tendered resignations publicly in the news conferences. Asia snaps up Europe's unwanted coal as heat builds

HONG KONG (Agencies): Coal cargoes unwanted in Europe are heading to Asia, where utilities are stockpiling the fuel amid sweltering temperatures heading into the summer. Shipments of about 7 million tonnes of Colombian coal will be exported to Asian countries in the next quarter, instead of ports in Europe, according to James Marshall, chief executive officer of Berge Bulk Ltd, whose fleet of ships ply those routes. Destinations for fuel used by pow-



er plants and steelmakers include China and India, he said. European customers raised their imports of Colombian coal last year by 23% to

about 30 million tons, according to data from shipbroker BRS Group, after the continent was plunged into an energy crisis following Russia's invasion of Ukraine. However, with natural gas prices dropping more than 90% since August, more power plants are switching back to the alternative fuel. More coal is also heading to Asia from South Africa, Carl Tyler, a head of chartering at Noble Resources Group, told a conference in Singapore last week.

Australia's building approvals slump to 11-year low

SYDNEY (Agencies): Australian approvals to build new homes tumbled to the lowest level in 11 years, driven by fewer permits for apartment buildings, suggesting weak residential property investment will continue to drag on the economy. Total dwelling approvals slid 8.1% in April from a month earlier as permits for apartments plunged 16.5%, Australian Bureau of Statistics data showed Tuesday. While the monthly series can be volatile, the trend has



been weak for an extended period, with total approvals falling 24.1% from a year ago. "Total dwellings approved fell to the lowest level since

April 2012," Daniel Rossi, ABS head of construction statistics, said in a statement. "Private sector house approvals also continued to decline." Australia's residential construction industry is reeling from a combination of shortages of materials and labour, falling property prices, and the unwinding of government subsidies that drove demand during the pandemic. High-interest rates are also crimping demand and driving up financing costs.

Building up the battery industry is at the heart of President Emmanuel Macron's "reindustrialisation" plan for France, with a clutch of factories set to emerge in the north of the country over the next three years. The "gigafactory" opening in Billy-Ber-



clau is owned by Automotive Cells Company, a partnership between French energy giant TotalEnergies, Germany's Mercedes-Benz, and US-European automaker Stellantis,

which produces a range of brands including Peugeot, Fiat, and Chrysler. French economy minister Bruno Le Maire and the country's energy transition and industry ministers will attend the inauguration, along with German and Italian officials. The heads of Mercedes. Stellantis. and TotalEnergies will also be at the event. The factory is the length of six football pitches. Production is due to begin this summer.

Crisis-hit Sri Lanka gets US\$350mil ADB loan boost

COLOMBO (Agencies): The Asian Development Bank (ADB) on Monday approved a US\$350 million special policy-based loan to provide budget support to Sri Lanka for economic stabilisation, the regional lender said in a statement. The programme is part of a broader package of financial assistance anchored by the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) Extended Fund Facility for the debt-ridden South Asian coun-

The tape ball is a tennis ball covered in electrical tape, which makes it easier to grip and swing similar to a traditional cricket ball. It is a popular choice for informal games played on streets, in parks, and other open spaces. Meanwhile, a small group of spectators had gathered on the sidelines, eager to watch the game unfold. They chatted amongst themselves, discussing the players' skills, and making



Truce extended in Sudan as UN warns 1 million could flee

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia and the US have announced on Monday a fiveday extension of a truce agreed between Sudan's warring sides, the Saudi Press agency reported, as the UN warned a million could flee the country by October. Mediators said the truce between Sudan's army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces aims to allow humanitarian activities to continue. Originally signed on May 20 and due to expire on Monday, the ceasefire has not been perfectly observed, with low intensity fighting continuing in the capital Khartoum and elsewhere. On Sunday, mediators criticized the repeated violations of the truce by both sides, warning hostilities posed a threat to humanitarian work. Meanwhile, the UN said that more than a

UN objects to Ugandan anti-LGBTQ law

- The global body called for an end to the "criminalization of consensual same-sex relations'

NEW YORK (Agencies): The United Nations has urged Uganda to rethink its new Anti-Homosexuality Act, which imposes harsh penalties for citizens who "promote" gay lifestyles, as well as capital punishment for certain offenses. The UN secretary-general pointed out that the measure conflicts with key international treaties and violates the rights of Ugandan citizens. Asked about the recently signed legislation at a press conference on Tuesday, the chief spokesman for Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, Stephane Dujarric, said the UN is "very concerned" about the anti-LGBTQ law. "The secretary-general has been very clear and continues to call on all member states to uphold the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, in particular the adherence to the fundamental rights of and principles of non-discrimination and respect for personal privacy," Dujarric said. He added that Guterres "again calls on all countries to decriminalize consensual samesex relationships and transgender people everywhere. To put it clearly, no one should be penalized, jailed, criminalized for whom they love.' Signed into law on Monday, the Anti-Homosexuality Act proposes 20year prison sentences for anyone found "promoting" homosexuality, and even mandates the death penalty for "aggravated homosexuality," which includes sex crimes against children, having sex while HIV positive, and incest. Uganda had already banned same-sex relationships, but the new law imposes much stiffer punishments.

Kidnapped Saudi citizen found and freed by Lebanese Army

BEIRUT: The Lebanese Army's intelligence directorate has found and freed Saudi citizen Mashari Al-Mutairi, who had been kidnapped, after a security operation on the border with Syria. RIYADH: The Saudi Armed Forces launched a joint exercise on Sunday with the participation of forces from the Gulf Cooperation Council countries and the US, the Kingdom's defense ministry announced on Monday. The "Eagle Resolve 23" drill, which was launched at the Air Warfare Center in the Eastern Province, aims to enhance military cooperation, exchange expertise in the field of missile air defense and unify planning and implementation of procedures. Putin confirms strike on Ukrainian military intelligence HQ

Ukrainian military's Main Intelligence Directorate (GUR) in Kiev, President Vladimir Putin confirmed on Tuesday. "We've been talking about the possibility of striking the 'decision-making centers.' Naturally, Ukraine's military intelligence headquarters falls into such a category, and it was hit two or three days ago," Putin stated. The Russian president also acknowledged a Ukrainian drone attack on Moscow, which occurred earlier in the day. The main goal of such strikes is attempting to "intimidate" Russian citizens, which is a "clear sign" of "terrorist activity" on Kiev's part, he said. Unlike Ukraine, which has been targeting "residential buildings" in Russia, Moscow is striking only military targets, such as ammunition dumps or fuel depots, with "high-precision" weaponry, he added. Moscow's anti-aircraft defense fared "okay" in repelling the latest



ment. Kiev's ultimate goal of indiscriminately striking Moscow and other Russian cities is provoking a "mirror response" from Russia, the president stated. "They are provoking us into taking mirror actions. We'll se what we can do about it. Yet, Ukrainian citizens, who of course have no say about anything now, since Ukraine has unleashed a total terror against its civilian population, must realize what the incumbent authorities are pushing for," Putin said. He went on to say that the most grave threats include the continuous effort by Kiev to "disrupt" the work of the Zaporozhye Nuclear Power attack, Putin noted, admitting that Plant, as well as potential attempts there still was room for improve- to use a "dirty" nuclear device.

Yunnan protest: Mosque closure sees clashes with security forces

BEIJING (Agencies): Protesters have a number of minarets. However, a clashed with large numbers of police over the planned demolition of a mosque's dome in a largely-Muslim town in Yunnan, China. Social media videos showed crowds outside the 13th-century Najiaying Mosque in Nagu town on Saturday. Scuffles broke out between police and locals, who were hemmed in by hundreds of armed officers. Yunnan, an ethnically-diverse province in southern China, has a significant Muslim population. China is officially atheist and the government says it allows religious freedom. But observers say there has been an increased crackdown on organised religion in recent years - with Beijing seeking greater control. In Nagu, the Najiaying Mosque had been a key landmark and in recent years had expanded with a new domed roof, as well as

Videos of Saturday's protests, verified by the BBC, showed lines of police blocking entry to the mosque, and group of men attempting to force their way in with some throwing rocks at police. Police in Tonghai County, where Nagu is located, issued a statement on Sunday calling for protesters to surrender to police by 6 June. Dozens have been arrested so far. "Those who voluntarily turn themselves in and truthfully confess the facts of violations and crimes may be given a lighter or mitigated punishment," said the notice. Calling

Afghanistan calls for 'diplomatic' resolution with Iran after border skirmishes

Iran to resolve bilateral issues "through diplomatic channels," an Afghan official told Arab News on Monday, as tension at their border eased following skirmishes over the weekend. At least one Taliban officer and two Iranian border guards were killed on Saturday after shooting broke out near a border post between Afghanistan and Iran, with officials from the two countries accusing each other of opening fire first. The incident came amid a dispute over water rights to the Helmand River, which flows from Afghanistan into Iran's arid eastern regions, as the neighbors face worsening drought exacerbated by climate change. "We don't want relations with our neighboring countries to deteriorate. Our request to all neighboring countries, including Iran, is to resolve these issues

The Taliban government has called on through diplomatic channels," Hafiz Zia Ahmad, deputy spokesman of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, told Arab News. "The current situation is normal. The Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan is never in favor of escalation." Officials have yet to provide details on what provoked the incident, in which several people on both sides were also injured. It occurred after Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi warned the Taliban earlier this month not to violate Iran's water rights over their shared Helmand River, as laid out in a bilateral treaty signed in 1973. Water rights are among other issues the two countries faced since the Taliban took control of Afghanistan in 2021, including previous skirmishes at the border and reports of mistreatment against Afghan refugees in Iran, which has for decades hosted millions of them.

Foxconn: iPhone maker hikes pay ahead of new model launch



NEW YORK (Agencies): Apple supplier Foxconn is ramping up efforts to recruit more workers for the world's largest iPhone factory, ahead of the launch of a new model. Foxconn says new workers at its plant in Zhengzhou, China will get bonuses of up to 3,000 yuan (\$424; £343) if they stay in the job for at least 90 days. Current employees who successfully refer a friend or family member will also qualify for an award, it says. The iPhone 15 is expected to be launched in September. Foxconn employees who refer a new recruit will now receive 500 yuan if the person stays at the company for a month, a post seen by the BBC on the popular Chinese messaging app WeChat said. It marks the latest move by the Taiwan-based manufacturer to improve benefits for its workers at the huge plant – known as iPhone City. A Foxconn spokesperson declined to comment when approached by the BBC. Last year, hundreds of workers protested at the Zhengzhou plant over Covid restrictions and claims of overdue pay. Videos, which were shared online in October, also showed people jumping a fence outside the Foxconn factory after it was locked down due to a coronavirus outbreak. In November, Apple warned that shipments of the iPhone 14 would be delayed after Chinese officials locked down a district of Zhengzhou, where iPhone City is located. The iPhone maker then recruited new workers with promises of higher bonuses. However, one worker told the BBC that the contracts were changed so they "could not get the subsidy promised", adding that they had been quarantined without food. Foxconn said in response that "a technical error occurred during the onboarding process", adding that the pay of new recruits was "the same as agreed (in the) official recruitment posters". The Zhengzhou plant employs more than 200,000 people, making Apple devices including the iPhone 14 Pro and Pro Max.


