Macron opposes NATO plans in Asia – FT

PARIS (Agencies): French President Emmanuel Macron has refused to approve a scheme to open a NATO liaison office in Japan, arguing the organization should not extend itself beyond the North Atlantic, the Financial Times reported. Macron's opposition to the new facility planned for Tokyo, which would be NATO's first such office in Asia, has resulted in a monthslong deadlock within the bloc, eight sources familiar with the talks told FT on Monday. Opening a liaison center in Japan would require unanimous consent from NATO's North Atlantic Council, meaning Paris has the ability to scuttle the proposal. According to one of the sources reached by the Financial Times, Macron believes the body's charter imposes geographic limitations which bar NATO from expanding into Asia. At a conference last week, the president reportedly warned that pushing NATO



to enlarge its "spectrum and the geography" would be "a big mistake." Another unnamed source told the outlet that Paris is unwilling to support any policy that "contributes to NATO-China tension," as Beijing has already made its misgivings known about the proposed liaison office. Last month, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said NATO should remain within its own sphere of influence and not seek to grow its presence in Asia, arguing the region attend a NATO summit last year.

Protests in Morocco over 'massacre' of stray animals

RABAT (Agencies): Animal rights activists in Morocco staged a protest in the capital Rabat yesterday calling for an end to the culling of stray cats and dogs by the authorities. The demonstration came a day after the interior ministry informed local media that it had already taken measures to encourage municipalities to avoid using firearms and poisons to kill stray dogs. One demonstrator from Casablanca was quoted by AFP as saying he was against "the pitiless extermination of cats and dogs in Morocco". "Dogs are maltreated and put in cages with nothing to eat or drink, they are massacred — poisoned or burned alive - and their young are drowned," the activist said. The protest was held outside parliament in Rabat and was organized by the North African country's Society for the Protection of Animals (SPAM) amid a wider international campaign. "We want an immediate end to the killing of street dogs," SPAM chief Ali Izzidine said. "We also want parliament to pass a law protecting animals." SPAM has also urged the government to adopt the application of a TNVR programme (Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate, Return). Despite Morocco signing an agreement "to sterilise, vaccinate and identify stray dogs" in 2019, activists claim it has yet to be implemented.

At least 12 dead in Venezuelan gold mine disaster

EL CALLAO (Agencies): At least 12 illegal miners were killed in a shuttered gold mine in the Venezuelan town of El Callao, local officials told AFP on Saturday. Heavy rain filled the mine with water and trapped the prospectors inside, where they were asphyxiated. The group "entered a mine that had been closed a long time," local security secretary. General Edgar Colina Reves. told AFP. Reyes said that "the mine was flooded from rains" on Wednesday, which collapsed the mine and made escape impossible. Five bodies were recovered on Friday and another seven on Saturday, he added. Reyes told Reuters that 112 people survived the collapse, and that authorities returned to the site on Sunday to check for additional casualties or survivors. The 12 bodies have already been returned to their families, he stated. Located in southeastern Venezuela, El Callao has been a gold-mining center since the precious metal was first discovered there in 1853.

Qatar, Egypt agree to launch initiative to support Sudan humanitarian aid

CAIRO (Agencies): Qatar and Egypt have agreed to launch an initiative supporting Sudanese people, as the conflict in Sudan continues to rage almost two months on. In a phone call yesterday between Qatari Emir Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani and Egyptian president Abdel Fattah El-Sisi, the two leaders discussed a number of regional issues and ways to strengthen bilateral ties in various fields, including helping to alleviate suffering in Sudan. According to Egyptian presidential spokesperson Ahmed Fahmy, cited by media reports, the leaders emphasised the importance of working to "contain the humanitarian situation in Sudan, facilitate the flow of relief aid, and spare civilians the impact of the clashes." Al Thani and El-Sisi also agreed to launch "a joint initiative to support and provide relief to Sudanese

civilians with an aim to mitigate the repercussions of the crisis on the Sudanese population. ." That initiative will be "carried out through the provision of humanitarian and relief services. provided that the concerned authorities in the two countries will develop the relevant executive framework and mechanisms." The discussions on the planned initiative were confirmed by the Amiri Diwan of Qatar - the Emir's administrative office - which issued a similar statement and agreed to intensify their "joint coordination to provide support and assistance to Sudan and ease the consequences of the conflict." Since 15 April, the Sudanese army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) have been battling for control of the country following a disagreement regarding the integration of the RSF into the military.





Barter trade

In what could be termed as a strategic approach and a step in the right direction, the government has opened up barter trade with Afghanistan, Iran and Russia for certain items including petroleum, LNG, coal, wheat, pulses, minerals, metals and several food items. The Ministry of Commerce has issued an SRO in this regard stating that several rounds of meetings were held with high level delegations of various countries to make the barter trade system possible. At present, Pakistan is faced with an unprecedented economic crisis as the IMF apparently, at least for the moment, has closed its doors to release the next tranche under the Extended Fund Facility. And the reserves position is stated to be barely enough to meet one month's imports. In this backdrop, we understand that the government has taken a very wise decision to reduce pressure on the foreign exchange reserves and stabilize the economy. Barter trade would help overcome banking transactions because, in the case of Iran, there was no possibility of transactions through official channels because of the economic sanction imposed by the US. Pakistan could gain particularly from oil and energy imports from Russia and Iran without adding to dollar demand. Then it will also help address other major issues such as discouraging smuggling of goods from Iran, such as diesel, and Afghanistan which is hurting the economy. We believe this innovative approach will create opportunities for greater trade and economic relations, enhanced people-to-people connections and increased mutual understanding. Though this approach will not be without challenges yet we hope that these will be overcome through meticulous planning, coordination and sustained efforts. With a commitment to mutual benefit, the barter trade initiative could be a stepping stone towards a brighter, more interconnected future for Pakistan and its neighbouring countries. But at the same time, Pakistan will also have to focus on increasing its basket of valuable exports to take full benefit from this initiative. We will also suggest the government to also include other regional countries in this barter trade after negotiations with them. Then the idea of doing trade in local currencies can also be explored to reduce reliance on dollar. Though this may annoy the US, yet we have to make decisions that suit our interests.

U.S. Army Special Operations Command already operates a variety of smaller drones, most prominently the Switchblade suicide drone. The wider Army, however, only operates the Skydio X2D unarmed reconnaissance drone at the small-unit level, according to the early-May posting by the Army Applications Laboratory. The Army Applications Laboratory did not respond to questions about "ATEK" by publication time, but it may be a reference to ATAK, an Air Force-designed Android app used for live video feeds and geospatial mapping, among other things. Who Will Compete With China In Central Asia? – By James Durso

- Central Asia is growing in economic lion in deals. The official agreements importance on a global level.

- China's strategy for Central Asia is to secure economic gains and to build an alternate trade corridor in the event of a U.S.-led naval blockade of China's maritime trade routes.

- Both the U.S. and Gulf Nations are vying for influence in the region through a whole host of cooperation programs.

Instead of being "Being Fustest with the Mostest" in Central Asia, an area of intense interest to China and Russia, the U.S. and Europe may be "too little, too late." The dwindling relevance of Washington and Brussels to Central Asia was on display when Chinese leader Xi Jinping hosted the leaders of the five Central Asia republics at the China-Central Asia Summit in Xi'an, the terminus of the ancient Silk Road. (In the future, the meetings will alternate between China and a Central Asian capital; the next meeting will be in Astana, Kazakhstan in 2025.) Xi unveiled his vision for Central Asia that was, like most top-level political documents, laden with vague declarations like "helping each other," "common development," "universal security," "shared future," and that old Beijing favorite, "win-win." China's strategy for Central Asia is to secure economic gains and help alleviate the high youth unemployment rate, create prosperity in the Xinjiang region to calm separatist tensions, and to build an alternate trade corridor in the event of a U.S.-led naval blockade of China's maritime trade routes. Kazakhstan's president, Kassym-Jomart Tokavev, responded "We consistently assert that Central Asia is a creation place. We oppose turning the region into a place of geopolitical confrontation" and Turkmenistan's president, Serdar Berdimuhamedov, added, "As emphasized, the peoples of our countries have centuries-old friendly relations, a vast experience of interaction and good neighborliness.'

But despite all the official bonhomie and group pictures – the leaders put pen to paper and, according to Silk Road Briefing, "...approved US\$3.72 billion in regional grants, signed 54 major multilateral agreements, created 19 new regional platforms and signed a further 9 multilateral cooperation documents." Among the agreed points were to coordinate China's Belt and Road Initiative with the republics' national development strategies, upgrade border checkpoints, expand agricultural exports to China, award scholarships to Central Asian students to study in China, and develop cooperation in the fields of irrigation and green energy. Kazakhstan and China signed 47 agreements worth \$22 billion which should increase trade, a record \$31 billion in 2022, and investment. China is one of the five biggest investors in Kazakhstan with a total investment exceeding \$23 billion. Kazakhstan's exports to Russia increased 15% in 2022, and trade turnover by September 2022 was \$18.4 billion, but Astana would be more comfortable if Moscow adopted the philosophy "When you're only No. 2, you try harder" in its dealings with its now-wary Central Asian neighbor. Uzbekistan and China adopted a "comprehensive strategic partnership" and inked 41 official documents, and Chinese and

addressed joint efforts in higher education, alternative energy, agricultural innovation, hydroelectric power, and logistics. A "comprehensive strategic partnership" is just below a "comprehensive strategic co-operative partnership," which is generally regarded as the highest level of bilateral relations for China. Uzbekistan now joins Kazakhstan and Turkmenistan as the third Central Asian republic at this level of engagement with China, giving China privileged access to the two biggest economies in Central Asia, and the country with 10% of the world's natural gas reserves, that all sit astride Eurasia's East-West transport links. So where were America and Europe when all this was going on? Their leaders were at the G-7 meeting in Tokyo where they castigated China for "economic coercion" which probably caused some confusion in Beijing as Washington is the source of economic sanctions "that currently cover 29 percent of the global economy and 40 percent of global oil reserves," according to the Quincy Institute. But even if it was momentary bemused by the G-7 outburst, Beijing probably welcomed the opportunity to contrast threats from the G-7 with what it could highlight as practical steps to grow mutually beneficial partnerships. The U.S. announced its strategy for Central Asia in 2019 with an emphasis on the republics' "sovereignty, independence, and territorial integrity," but it was in reference to the U.S. occupation of Afghanistan. After the hasty U.S./NATO retreat from Afghanistan in 2021, the republics know their utility to the Americans in limited and they must find partners that will help them increase economic opportunity for their mostly under-30 populations. The U.S. hasn't helped with relatively small projects like the Economic Resilience in Central Asia Initiative that trumpeted a \$50 million effort to "diversify trade routes, expand investment in the region, and increase employment opportunities" - which is what China intends to do at industrial scale. (The U.S. did, however, provide significant economic assistance to the republics in the immediate post-Soviet period.) The American actor Woody Allen said, "80 percent of success is showing up" and that is something an American president has never done in Central Asia. The presidents of Russia, Vladimir Putin, and China, Xi Jinping, leave nothing to chance: Xi has visited every one of the republics and has been to Kazakhstan four times and Uzbekistan three times; Putin has visited Kazakhstan twenty-seven times (the countries share a 7,644-kilometre border), and has been to Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan at least a dozen times each. China's Belt and Road Initiative has pumped about \$40 billion into the region, but recent surveys by the Central Asia Barometer showed a decrease in public sentiment towards China, even as China increases local investment. (Positive sentiment was down in Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan since 2017, but held steady in Kyrgyzstan.) If Russia has a weak presence in future years this is an opportunity for the U.S., Europe, and India, Japan, Turkey, South Korea, Singapore, and the Persian Gulf petrostates to build grass roots support. The Persian Gulf

their falcons. The government-led development of the Gulf states appeals to the leaders of the republics and can offer a counter-weight to China's projects. The Gulf states have invested in traditional projects, such as coal and chemicals, power generation and distribution, cargo handling, and oil pipelines, and ACWA Power of Saudi Arabia recently committed over \$2 billion for a wind farm in Uzbekistan's Karakalpakstan region, part of a \$12 billion commitment to the country. Aside from all that cash, the Gulf states can create good will by helping the republics rediscover and preserve their history and heritage by assisting the restoration of local Islamic heritage sites, such as the Bibi Khanum Mosque in Samarkand, Uzbekistan. And it gives the local leaders the opportunity to not be beholden to one primary creditor - China. Investing in Central Asia also gives Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates the opportunity to establish a foothold to the North of their competitor Iran. Relations between the Arabs and the Islamic Republic are improving lately, but it is prudent for the petrostates to diversity their political portfolio at the same time they are diversifying their foreign direct investment. And allying with the republics gives the Gulf Arabs allies in multilateral organizations such as the United Nations and the Organization of Islamic Cooperation. The U.S. can also make gains even though it can't match China's investments in the region. It can deploy the expertise of organizations like the U.S. International Development Finance Corporation to address areas of concern to Central Asia, such as the impact on the cotton crop caused by reduction in the flow of the Amu Darya river due to the Afghan Taliban's irrigation canal project. Washington can also help the region though mechanisms such as the C5+1 Regional Border Security Program, and by helping local participants in the Global Methane Pledge (Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan) achieve their goals, and lobbying Turkmenistan, whose methane leaks exceed the carbon emissions of the United Kingdom, to join the pledge. One element of China's progress has been its readiness to transfer technology, which it has done in Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, and Tajikistan. Local leaders may argue that China can advance regional connectivity if it transfers the technology to help the region develop a high-speed rail network, as it recently did in Thailand. The good news for Central Asia is that it has China's undivided attention; the bad news is that it has China's undivided attention. But the region can pursue its development objectives and not be in thrall to creditor China or the social engineers in the U.S. and Europe. The region used China to balance the U.S., Europe, and Russia, and can now deepen its relations with the Gulf states, Turkey, India, Japan, South Korea, and Singapore to offset the China influence. One result of the China focus may be more local coordination by the republics. Uzbekistan's president Shavkat Mirziyoyev started this trend by resolving outstanding border demarcation issues after he assumed office in 2016.



Under the licensing system, teachers have to continuously improve their qualifications and teaching ability because the teaching license will be for five years and not for a lifetime and it will be renewed every five years. As a first step, the Sindh government has released 700 new teacher vacancies in the elementary schools of the province. Those teachers who are qualified to teach from Grades I to VIII will be given jobs on a scale of 16. ISLAMABAD (APP): The Indus River System Authority (IRSA) on Monday released 160,000 cusecs of water from various rim stations with an inflow of 181,500 cusecs. According to the data released by IRSA, the water level in River Indus at Tarbela Dam was 1426.15 feet and was 28.15 feet higher than its dead level of 1.398 feet. Water inflow and outflow in the dam were recorded as 58,700 cusecs and 57,300 cusecs respectively. The water level in River Jhelum at Mangla Dam was 1132.90 feet, 82.90 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet. The inflow and outflow of water were recorded as 55,500 cusecs and 35,400 cusecs respectively. The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa, Guddu and Sukkur was recorded as 74,800, 80,900, 62,300 and 21,600 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 36,400 cusecs of water was released at Nowshera while 12,000 cusecs were released from River Chenab at Marala.

After the addition of the reserved seats the total number of elected and reserved seats in the HMC has increased from 160 to 241.

Inaugural Flight to Makkah carrying 340 Pakistani pilgrims touches down in Jeddah safely

JEDDAH (APP): The first direct flight to Makkah Mukarma, Saudi Arabian Airline SV 3727, carrying 340 intending pilgrims of the Government Hajj Scheme, safely landed at Jeddah Airport on Monday morning. 
Business community grateful to Chairman CDA for starting construction, repair work in markets: Bakhtawari

Russian carmaker to start production at former Nissan plant

MOSCOW (Agencies): Car production at a St. Petersburg plant that formerly belonged to Nissan will resume this month, the CEO of Russia's biggest automaker AvtoVAZ has announced. The Japanese manufacturer left the Russian market last year, transferring all its assets in the country to the state-owned research and development firm NAMI for a token sum of €1. Indian imports of Russia oil hit a new record in May

NEW DELHI (Agencies): India imported nearly 2 million barrels of crude oil per day from Russia in May, notching a new record, Bloomberg reported on Thursday, citing ship-tracking data. Flows of Russian oil to New Delhi surged by 15% last month compared to April, reaching 1.96 million barrels per day (bpd) and putting a dent in the share of im-

ports from OPEC's major oil producer, Saudi Arabia, data from Vortexa showed. Saudi crude exports to India have plunged to their lowest levels since 2021, according to Bloomberg. Analysts have cited discounts as the key reason for the rise in imports from Russia. The average cost of oil from the sanctioned country was \$68.21 a barrel in April, accord-

ing to data from India's Ministry of Commerce."Indian refiners continue to show a voracious appetite for Russian crude given their discounts relative to Middle Eastern supplies," Vortexa analyst Serena Huang said. She added that imports of Urals and Sokol grades saw their biggest gains last month, and overall volumes are likely to grow in June and July.

UAE's non-oil outlook positive despite slight PMI dip in May

RIYADH (Agencies): The UAE's nonoil private sector growth outlook remained positive in May, even as the seasonally adjusted S&P Global Purchasing Managers' Index fell to 55.5 compared to 56.6 in April. The S&P Global report noted that improved operating conditions drove business confidence to its strongest levels since October 2021. According to the index, PMI readings above 50 show non-oil private sector growth, while those below 50 signal contraction. "The UAE PMI pointed to another strong performance across the non-oil sector midway through



the second quarter of 2023. Despite slipping from April's six-month high of 56.6, the latest headline reading of 55.5 signaled a robust improvement in business conditions, driven by marked upturns in activity and new work," said David Owen, senior economist at S&P Global Market Intelligence.


'Don't give a damn' Heat pull level against Nuggets in NBA Finals



Here Comes the AI: Fans rejoice in 'new' Beatles music

WASHINGTON (Agencies): When the Beatles broke up more than 50 years ago, devastated fans were left yearning for more. Now, artificial intelligence is offering just that. From "re-uniting" the Fab Four on songs from their solo careers, to re-imagining surviving superstar Paul Mc-Cartney's later works with his voice restored to its youthful peak, the new creations show off how far this technology has come - and raise a host of ethical and legal questions. "I'm sobbing! This is so beautiful!!!" wrote a listener in a typical YouTube comment for a fan-created AI cover of McCartnev's 2013 single, "New," which features de-aged vocals and a bridge part "sung" by his great songwriting partner and friend, the late John Lennon. Equally impressive is a version of "Grow Old With Me," one of the last songs penned by Lennon, which was posthumously released after his 1980 murder and recently remade by an AI creator who goes by "Dae Lims." Sonic boom rattles Washington as fighter jets chase Cessna

WASHINGTON (Agencies): A sonic boom that echoed over Washington Sunday was caused by two fighter jets scrambling to intercept an unresponsive aircraft that later crashed in rural Virginia, officials told AFP. Residents of the city and its suburbs reported hearing the thundering noise, which rattled windows and shook walls for miles and caused social media to light up with people asking what had happened. The F-16 fighter jets "responded to an unresponsive Cessna 560 Citation V aircraft over Washington, DC, and northern Virginia," the North American Aerospace Defense Command said in a statement. The two iets were scrambled from Joint Base Andrews, a Pentagon official told AFP, and they followed the aircraft that subsequently crashed in a mountainous area of southwest Virginia, one of the states bordering Washington. President Joe Biden, who was at the White House and also played golf Sunday, was briefed on the incident, an official told journalists without specifying whether any emergency precautions were implemented due to the incident. Public records showed the plane was registered to Florida-based company Encore Motors of Melbourne, whose owner John Rumpel told The Washington Post his "entire family" was onboard, including his daughter, a grandchild and her nanny. "We know nothing about the crash," he said. "We are talking to the FAA now... I've got to keep the line clear." The civilian plane had taken off from Elizabethton, Tennessee and was bound for Long Island, New York, the FAA said. However, flight tracking website Flightradar24 indicated that it had turned around after flying over Long Island and headed back south over Washington and into Virginia. Multiple US media reported the crash wreckage still had not been located, with the Post stating that investigators hoped to reach the site Monday. Supersonic speeds' "The NORAD

aircraft were authorized to travel at supersonic speeds and a sonic boom may have been heard by residents of the region," the command said, adding that it also used flares to try to draw the pilot's attention. While the results can be astonishing, getting there isn't simple and requires skilled human operators combining new AI tools with extensive knowledge of traditional music processing software, Zohaib Ahmed, the CEO of Resemble AI, a Toronto-based voice cloning company, told AFP. "I think we're still seeing a very small percentage of the population that can even access these tools," he said. They need to "jump through hoops, read documentation, have the right computer, and then put it all together."

Apple mixed-reality headset to take aim at the metaverse

SAN FRANCISCO (Agencies): Apple Reality Pro will come with many apps on Monday is expected to show off pricy mixed-reality headgear at its annual Worldwide Developers Conference, challenging Facebook-owner Meta in a market that has yet to sizzle. Expectations are high that Apple will use the WWDC stage to spotlight a "Reality Pro" headset priced around \$3,000, along with custom-made software for the gear, Wedbush analyst Dan Ives said in a note to investors. "We believe Apple's

Two weeks before Khalistan Referendum voting in Sydney, PM Modi was in Australia where he met the Australian govt authorities and urged them to stop Sikhs from going ahead with voting but the Australian

Shortly after polling stations closed at 0000 GMT, both Gomez and Del Moral said they had won. Preliminary results were expected late Sunday. Gomez said she was proud of the men and women of her state. "They are the ones who made this victory possible," she said. Gomez is boosted by the popularity of President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, in office since December

Snowden leaks at 10 years: more data more controls

WASHINGTON (Agencies): In 2013 US intelligence contractor Edward Snowden stunned the world with revelations that the massive US spy apparatus was secretly sucking up communications and private data on people around the world, from the lowest social media poster to the phone calls of German chancellor Angela Merkel. Snowden showed no one was safe from electronic prying by the National Security Agency, least of all Americans, whose private communications were supposedly constitutionally protected. Ten years later, Snowden sits in exile in Moscow and US intelligence still collects huge amounts of private electronically stored and transmitted information. But his revelations had lasting im-



pact, advancing privacy protections in Europe and America and accelerating use of encryption. After Snowden's leaks, "in almost every Western democracy, there was a historic debate about the relationship of citizens and the state mass surveillance programs, whether oversight of those programs was adequate," said Ben Wizner of the American Civil Liberties Union and an attorney for Snowden.

World must 'work as one' to end plastic pollution: UN chief

ternational negotiators committed to hammering out a draft treaty by November on ending plastic pollution, the UN chief stressed in his message for World Environment Day on Monday, the importance of curbing the "catastrophic" consequences of waste plastics. "Every year, over 400 million tons of plastic is produced worldwide one-third of which is used just once", said Secretary-General Antonio Guterres. "Every day, the equivalent of over 2,000 garbage trucks full of plastic is dumped into our oceans, rivers, and lakes." He noted that microplastics

we eat, the water we drink, and even the air we breathe. "Plastic is made from fossil fuels the more plastic we produce, the more fossil fuel we burn, and the worse we make the climate crisis", the UN chief said. But solutions are at hand: including the legally binding agreement that remains on course, following five days of negotiations involving more than 130 nations last week. "This is a promising first step, but we need all hands on deck", he said, stressing that a new report from the UN Environment Programme (UNEP) shows that plastic pollution can be reduced

Kathleen Folbigg was dubbed "Australia's worst female serial killer" after she was convicted in 2003 of murdering three of her children and the manslaughter of a fourth. Prosecutors argued she suffocated the children, who died between the ages

Swiss capital votes for legal cocaine

BERN: The municipal council of the Swiss capital Bern voted on Thursday to extend the trial sale of cannabis to cocaine. The drug will not be immediately legalized, however, without the federal government's permission. The motion, which was introduced by the Alternative Left party, passed by 43 votes to 18, Swiss news outlet SRF reported on Friday. The motion was opposed by center-right and religious councilors, but supported by leftists and some members of the center-left Social Democratic Party. Bern voted last year to test the controlled sale of cannabis, and was granted permission by the federal government last month. Cannabis sales are expected to begin in Bern this fall, and have already started in Basel, Zurich, and Lausanne. Noting that the federal government only agreed to allow cannabis sales after significant pressure from multiple cities, Bern Social Director Franziska Teuscher said her city would not push the government to act on cocaine, and that Thursday's vote instead sent a signal that the city would be open to the idea in future. A similar motion was rejected by the council in 2019, with the Social Democrat majority arguing that they wanted to gain experience with legal cannabis sales before moving on to harder drugs. Switzerland is a cocaine hotspot, with Addiction Switzerland estimating that five tons of the powder enters the country every year. According to EU data, four Swiss cities - Zurich, Basel, Geneva - rank in the top ten in Europe for cocaine consumption. Consumption all across Europe has risen in the last decade, with residents of Bern consuming more than twice as much of the substance last year as they did in 2012.

Germany to deploy warships to Indo-Pacific

BERLIN: Germany will send two warships to the Indo-Pacific in 2024, Defence Minister Boris Pistorius said on Sunday, amid rising tensions between China and Taiwan and over the disputed South China Sea. Speaking at the Shangri-La Dialogue in Singapore, Asia's most important security conference, Pistorius said countries needed to stand up for the rules-based international order and the protection of major maritime passages. "To this end, the German Federal Government sent a frigate to the Indo-Pacific in 2021, and will again, in 2024, deploy maritime assets – this time a frigate and a supply ship - to the region," he said, according to a script of his speech distributed by the defence ministry in Berlin. He added the deployments were not directed against any nation, a remark apparently addressed at China. "To the contrary: They are dedicated to the protection of the rules-based international order that we all signed up to and which we all should benefit from be it in the Mediterranean, in the Bay of Bengal or in the South China Sea."

Folbigg has steadfastly maintained each death was due to natural causes. Russia announces major naval drills



MOSCOW (Agencies): Russia's Pacific Fleet has launched large-scale naval exercises in the Far East, which are scheduled to last two weeks, the Defense Ministry announced on Monday. In a statement, the ministry said more than 60 warships and support vessels, 35 naval aircraft, coastal defense troops, and more than 11,000 military personnel would be involved in the drills, which are taking place in the Sea of Japan and Sea of Okhotsk. The fleet's tactical groups and naval aviation are set to perform combat training, as well as practice tracking submarines and work on improving naval air defense organization and logistics support, according to the ministry. The drills are scheduled to last from June 5 to 20 and will be overseen by the Pacific Fleet's commander, Admiral Viktor Liina. The ministry released a video showing Russian warships in formation passing under a bridge, with several others then heading to the open sea. The major new exercises come after Russia switched its Pacific Fleet to full combat readiness in April as part of a surprise check. Russian Defense Minister Sergey Shoigu reported to President Vladimir Putin that the effort involved more than 25,000 service members, 167 ships, 12 submarines, and 89 aircraft. Putin later commented that the surprise check had been conducted "at a high level," while pointing out that despite the conflict with Ukraine, "nobody has aborted the task of developing the navy." The exercises also come amid tensions in the Asia-Pacific region, most notably on the Korean peninsula, which has seen repeated North Korean missile launches and joint US-South Korean military drills. The regional situation has also been exacerbated by a standoff between China and the US over Taiwan.


