

Xi: China willing to help foster Palestine peace-making with Israel

BELJING (Agencies): China is willing to play a positive role to help the Palestinians achieve internal reconciliation and promote peace talks with Israel, Chinese President Xi Jinping told his Palestinian counterpart in Beijing on Wednesday, Reuters reports. "The fundamental solution to the Palestinian issue lies in the establishment of an independent Palestinian state based on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital," Xi said, according to Chinese state media. Palestinians seek statehood in the West Bank, Gaza and East Jerusalem, territories occupied by Israel in the 1967 Middle East war. Israel withdrew soldiers and settlers from Gaza in 2005, but continues to expand settlements in the West Bank and calls Jerusalem its eternal, indivisible capital. Peace talks that were brokered by the United States collapsed in 2014, with no revival on the horizon. "We have always firmly supported the just cause of the Palestinian people to restore their legitimate national rights," Xi told

Abbas at a welcoming ceremony at Beijing's Great Hall of the People. China has had historically good ties with the Palestinians and, since Abbas' last visit in 2017, has consistently talked up its capabilities in mediation, although with little to show in this regard until it brokered a surprise deal between Iran and Saudi Arabia to restore diplomatic relations in March. Abbas is in Beijing on a three-day visit in which he hoped to demonstrate Chinese sup-

Xi reiterated Chinese support for the Palestinian Authority becoming a full member of the United Nations and said Beijing would continue to stand up for the Palestinian side in multilateral forums, state media reported. The United States opposes full Palestinian UN membership barring a peace deal with Israel, a step requiring a vote in the Security Council port for a Palestinian state, after failing to where the US, like China, holds a veto.

New impeachment motion brought against Biden



WASHINGTON (Agencies): A US law- and Vice President Kamala Harris in maker filed articles of impeachment 2021 over the administration's hanagainst President Joe Biden on Tuesday alleging that his southern border policies make him unfit for office. The motion, filed by Rep. Lauren Boebert, a Republican from Colorado, charges Biden with abuse of power and dereliction of duty in "presiding over an executive branch that has continually, overtly, and consistently refused to enforce the Nation's immigration laws and secure the southern border." Boebert told Fox News that she encouraged her party, which currently has a majority in the House of Representatives, to act on the allegations but that she was willing to move forward on her own. "If the committees and/or leadership does not step up and actually do something about the president's failure ... then I will call my legislation, my articles of impeachment for a privileged motion," Boebert told the network. The lawmaker sought to impeach Biden family from public scrutiny.

Israel Rafael developing hypersonic missile interceptor



TEL AVIV (Agencies): The Israeli state-owned defence contractor behind the Iron Dome and David's Sling air shields announced, on Wednesday, the development of a new system to counter hypersonic missiles, a week after Iran said it had produced its first such weapon, Reuters reports. The Sky-Sonic interceptor will "enable us to intercept all kinds of hypersonic threats - hypersonic ballistic missiles, hypersonic cruise missiles," Yuval Steinitz, Chairman of Rafael Advanced Defence Systems Ltd., told Reuters at a media event. The Pentagon was briefed on the development, Rafael said. It declined to say if or when the Israeli military might deploy SkySonic. Israel's Defence Ministry had no immediate comment.

Egypt applies to join **BRICS**

CAIRO (Agencies): Egypt has officially applied to join BRICS, Russia's ambassador in Cairo told reporters on Wednesday. The Arab Republic of nearly 100 million people would be a significant addition to the bloc of the his state visit to the US on June 21. largest developing economies that includes Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa. Egypt is "very interested" in one of BRICS' current initiatives, namely the bloc's push to switch to alternative currencies in trade, be it one of the bloc's national currencies or a new joint one, ambassador Georgy Borisenko told TASS news agency. Egypt first voiced its intention to join BRICS last July, according to Purnima Anand, the President of the BRICS International Forum. In February, the country sent official letters to the bloc's members expressing its interest in joining, something that Russia supports, according to ambassador Borisenko. Also in February, Egypt joined the New Development Bank, established by the group to fund infrastructure and sustainable development projects in emerging markets and developing countries. About a dozen countries have so far applied to join BRICS, including Iran and Argentina. The bloc hopes to introduce a framework for admitting new members before the August summit in South Africa.

CPJ calls on US to press India's Modi



NEW YORK (Agencies): The Commit-violations: tee to Protect Journalists, a New Yorkbased international watchdog body, Wednesday called on the United States to press India to end its media crackdown and release the six journalists arbitrarily detained in retaliation for their work, as Prime Minister Narendra Modi prepares for his upcoming visit to the U.S. "Since Prime Minister Modi came to power in 2014, there has been an increasing crackdown on India's media," CPJ President Jodie Ginsberg said in a statement released on Wednesday. "Journalists critical of the government and the BJP party have been jailed, harassed, and surveilled in retaliation for their work. India is the world's largest democracy, and it needs to live up to that by ensuring a free and independent media-and we expect the United States to make this a core element of discus-On Wednesday, June 14, CPJ convened

an online panel, "India's Press Freedom Crisis," with opening remarks and moderation by Ginsberg alongside panelists Geeta Seshu, founding editor of the Free Speech Collective watchdog group; Anuradha Bhasin, executive editor of the Kashmir Times newspaper; and Shahina K.K., senior editor for Outlook magazine. The panelists discussed the deterioration of press freedom over the last decade, with Seshu detailing the rise in censorship and "vicious" attacks on the media, while Shahina shared her ongoing battle to fight terrorism charges filed nearly 13 years ago by the Karnataka state government, then led by Modi's BJP party, in retaliation for her investigative reporting. Bhasin spoke about the "effective silence" that Kashmiri journalists have dealt with since the Modi government unilaterally revoked Jammu and Kashmir's special autonomy status in 2019, with multiple cases of reporters being detained and interrogated. CPJ called on President Joe Biden, who is hosting Modi's visit, to urge India to act on the following press freedom

The British Medical Association's Junior Doctors Committee says medics have seen a 26 percent pay cut in real terms in the last 15 years, as salaries have failed to keep pace with soaring inflation. They want pay restored to 2008-2009 levels but the government says that would mean an average pay award of about 35 per-

cent this year and is too costly. Instead, it has offered an extra five percent. The BMA has warned that while it was open to further talks, it would stage further strikes in the coming months if the government sticks to its offer. At government's offer was "frankly disrespectful and disgraceful" and would not cover this year's inflation "let alone years of pay erosion", she said. On Tuesday, NHS England's national medical director, Stephen Powis, warned that most routine or pre-planned care could be affected. A similar walk-out in April saw 196,000 hospital appointments and operations rescheduled.

Macron demands French AI'champions'

Macron made a pitch on Wednesday for France to become a leader in artificial intelligence (AI) as he spoke at VivaTech in Paris, one of Europe's biggest technology trade shows. He announced 500 million euros (\$543 million) in new funding to "create champions" in AI and praised projects targeting French speakers, as concern grows about Silicon Valley firms fuelling English-language domination of AI systems. Twitter and Tesla boss Elon Musk is scheduled to appear at VivaTech on Friday when he is likely to talk about his company

Paris (AFP/APP): President Emmanuel Neuralink, which recently won US approval for human testing of technology that uses implants to link brains with computers. More than 2,000 firms are displaying at VivaTech, which runs from Wednesday to Saturday, with products ranging from augmented-reality ski masks to an AI-animated bot that allows you to "chat" with Dutch master Vincent Van Gogh. Tens of thousands are expected to visit the event, with Saturday open to the public. Macron is a regular visitor and this year his intervention promises to ramp up the competition for primacy in AI technology in Europe,

Oil Import

The much-anticipated first shipment of Russian oil arrived on Pakistani shores on Sunday, marking a new era of bilateral trade between the two countries. This deal has been in the pipeline since the previous PTI government, when the idea was first considered. But naturally, our diplomatic considerations, alongside the specifics of the deal, kept it from being finalised.

While the more populist statements on the import of oil from Moscow have touted it to be more than it might be, there were several issues to resolve to make this deal a feasible one, compared to other oil-importing avenues we are currently employing. One of the major ones was quality—there were questions raised on the standard of crude oil coming from Russia and how it would compare to existing supply routes. These issues have not yet been sufficiently addressed and processing this first shipment will perhaps clarify the quality and whether this import is feasible in the long run.

Another issue was the price and whether the final refined products manufactured from this crude oil would lead to decreased costs for the final consumer. At the moment, there is no guarantee this will be possible. The oil has indeed been purchased at a discounted rate, but this first shipment of 100,000 tonnes will determine this deal's profit or loss situation.

In terms of the energy mix, Pakistan's recent shift toward more LNG has led to a greater focus on energy production through LNG, while oil and thermal plants were thought to be on the way out.

Ultimately, Pakistan has to look at its own economic and diplomatic objectives, and this deal with Moscow is one that is positive in improving bilateral ties and building the connection further. A lot of politics has been based on the import of Russian oil—from former PM Imran Khan claiming that he was ousted for suggesting this, to the current government having dismissed the deal as impossible when it was in opposition last year. Both these claims were false, as was the needless optimism regarding this being the only solution to Pakistan's energy woes. It is a potentially good deal, but these first two tranches will determine the actual benefit in the days to come.

Is the party over? — By Umair Javed

WHAT is the PTI's electoral future after and downs as far as electoral prospects recent events? The answer in the short term, unfortunately for its remaining party leaders, depends more on the military leadership than on any other factor. A recent ISPR press release laden with words such as 'noose' and 'inimical' suggests that more pain is around the corner, especially for Imran Khan. The campaign of hounding party cadres at all levels is also continuing unabated, resulting in an exodus of various ticket-holders and some high-profile leaders. Is this a sign that the party is over? Surviving a concerted campaign seeking to dismantle the party is not straightforward. A draconian step such as banning the party outright still seems to be on the cards. Short of that, however, the impact of this ongoing campaign on the party's election chances rests on at least two factors. These include internal cohesion in the party and the continued ability to speak to concerns of different sections of the electorate. As far as internal cohesion is concerned, the first stage of splintering has already taken place with a coterie of infamous 'electables' from rural Punjab congregating in a new king's party. Regardless of what is said, the aim of this new party is not to win an election. It is to act as a spoiler: reducing depart, others may scramble for a bigthe candidate-centric vote for the PTI in some constituencies, aligning that vote with the PDM parties, and wherever successful, acting as a pressure group or a coalition-maker in the post-election dispensation. As the establishment's target is to keep PTI below 133 directly elected seats whenever elections are held, this remains the first plank of that strategy. Losing strong candidates is a blow to the party's chances because they command a reasonable following in their constituencies and have the ability to finance their own election cam-

are concerned, each constituency has four to five contenders who can be on the lookout for a party ticket. In many constituencies some of these contenders are probably already aligned with the PTI given the gradual entrenchment of a two-party model, especially in Punjab since 2013. Additionally, constituencies also have genuine party workers (such as at the UC nazim level) who are looking for their chance at a national or provincial seat. This is more true for peri-urban and urban constituencies than for outright rural ones, but even in the latter, increasing affinity with parties and better party identification can open space for newer entrants. Somewhat ironically, a dismantling campaign can actually help reveal the true strength of a party's political capacity, as both the PPP and PML-N learnt in the 1980s and the 2000s respectively. Whether the PTI has that capacity in seats where incumbents are departing remains to be seen. The internal cohesion challenge also has one other aspect: in periods of duress and defection, parties also run the risk of infighting over strategy and a share of the limelight. With positions opening up at the top as some leaders ger share or for more proximity with the leader. The second factor shaping the party's immediate electoral future is its ability to speak to people's concerns. Here the PTI seems to be in much better shape. Khan's narrative of a conspiracy and injustice still seems to resonate with core voters, even if some of the initial enthusiasm has tapered down in the aftermath of May 9. PTI voters — ie, those who simply identify with the leader and the party — will come out to cast their votes regardless of who is on the ballot. Simultaneously, presiding over an economy in its worst shape in decades will induce greater apathy among voters of

the other parties. A closer analysis of by-election results shows that the difference between PTI and the rest had less to do with voters switching sides, and more to do with one set of voters coming out enthusiastically and the other set staying home. With inflation showing no signs of easing up, and levels of public scepticism at establishment meddling in political affairs remaining extremely high, the PTI is still in a better position than its competitors to capitalise on these concerns. This is partly why despite the crackdown in the preceding few months, the general impression is still that the party will be in a strong position if and when elections are held. The ongoing period of upheaval also opens up new ways of speaking to the voter in different parts of the country. We can see this already in KP, where the PTI's rhetoric is now bringing in some aspects of ethnic identity as well. The crisis is partly being framed as an injustice against the most popular party in the province, which implies that the political rights of Pakhtuns are being violated. In the coming months, it is possible that the PTI moves in more aggressively to fill the gap left since the decline of the ANP and the continued targeting of the PTM. In an election that's even moderately free, voters can have an outsized impact regardless of what the establishment may be planning. We have seen this time and again in the past that the best laid plans can be waylaid if some sanctity of the ballot is maintained. The anger of the electorate is what the PTI is likely counting on as well. Yet there is one major vulnerability - this anger and its direct appeal is largely channelled by the party leader around whom the entire party is built. 

UK GDP reaches pre-pandemic level with April rise

LONDON (Agencies): British economic output inched higher as expected in April, driven by the retail sector and the filming industry, while manufacturing and construction contracted, official data showed on Wednesday. Britain's economy grew by 0.2% month-on-month in April, the Office for National Statistics said, matching the consensus in a Reuters poll of economists. Financial markets showed little immediate reaction to the figures – in contrast to



recent labour market and inflation data which boosted expectations for higher interest rates from the Bank of England. "High growth needs low inflation, so we must stick relentlessly to our plan to halve the rate

this year to protect family budgets," finance minister Jeremy Hunt said in response to Wednesday's figures. The ONS said the economy in April stood 0.3% above its pre-pandemic level of February 2020. Services output rose 0.3% on the month, with growth driven by the retail, information and communications, and the filming industry. But manufacturing output dropped 0.3% and the construction sector contracted unexpectedly by 0.6, the figures showed.

Shell boosts dividend 15% in oil, gas refocus

LONDON (Agencies): Shell Plc will increase its dividend 15% and boost natural gas production as new CEO Wael Sawan refocuses on the fossil fuels that drove record profits last year. It's part of a pivot by the European oil major to expand the most profitable parts of its business, even if they are carbon-intensive while scaling back ventures that don't make high enough returns. The company reiterated its pledge to achieve net-zero emissions by 2050. "We will invest in the models that work — those with the high-



est returns that play to our strengths," Sawan said in a statement. The CEO and his management team will lay out more details of the plan to shareholders at a presentation in New York later on Wednesday. As well as the dividend increase, which will take effect this

quarter, Shell committed to buying back at least US\$5 billion of shares in the second half. The company will reduce capital spending from US\$22 billion to US\$25 billion a year for 2024 and 2025. Key to achieving higher returns will be the oil and gas business that drives the majority of Shell's profits. The company will no longer seek to cut oil production by 1% to 2% annually, having achieved its initial output-reduction plan — announced in 2021 amid a focus on cutting carbon emissions — faster than anticipated.

TOKYO (Agencies): Toyota faces an unprecedented challenge at its annual shareholder meeting on Wednesday, with some pension funds voting against Chairman Akio Toyoda on governance issues, while seeking more disclosures on the Japanese automaker's climate lobbying. The world's top car maker has become a target in recent years for activists and green investors, who say it has been slow to roll out battery electric vehicles (EVs). US bill may end China's e-commerce tariff exemption

NEW YORK (Agencies): A bipartisan group of US lawmakers planned to introduce a bill on Wednesday to eliminate a tariff exemption widely used by e-commerce sellers to send orders from China to US shoppers, one of the sponsors said. The exception, known as the de minimis rule, as China-founded, Singapore-based exempts imports valued at US\$800 or less from tariffs if the items are shipped to individual consumers. The bill would ban such shipments from China immediately upon enactment, A federal brief in April said the comsponsor Republican Senator Bill Caspanies "exploit" de minimis to avoid 2022 compared with 410.5 million in

Dollar falls to 3-week low on Fed pause bets

TOKYO (Agencies): The dollar fell to near a three-week low to the euro and a one-month low versus sterling on Wednesday, after unexpectedly soft US inflation data cemented the view that the Federal Reserve will skip an interest rate hike later in the day. EU lawmakers to back world's first AI rules

STRASBOURG (Agencies): European Parliament lawmakers will vote Wednesday to kickstart talks to approve the world's first sweeping rules on artificial intelligence systems like ChatGPT, aiming to curb potential harms while nurturing innovation. Although the EU's plans date back to 2021, the draft rules took on greater urgency when ChatGPT exploded onto the scene last year, showing off AI's dizzying development and the possible risks. There is also growing clamour to regulate AI across the Atlantic, as pressure grows on Western governments to act fast in what some describe as a battle to protect humanity. While AI proponents hail the



technology for how it will transform society, including work, healthcare, and creative pursuits, others are terrified by its potential to undermine democracy. Once adopted by the EU parliament, officials say negotiations for a final law with the bloc's 27 member states will begin almost immediately, starting later Wednesday. The race is on to strike an agreement on final legislation by the end of the year.

Big clients key to AMD-Nvidia AI chip battle

NEW YORK (Agencies): Advanced Micro Devices Inc on Tuesday gave new details about an artificial intelligence chip that will challenge market leader Nvidia Corp, but the company left out what Wall Street wanted to know - who plans to buy it. Santa Clara, California-based AMD said the forthcoming chip, which will start trickling out in the third quarter followed by mass production beginning in the fourth quarter, will have 192 gigabytes of memory. That could help tech companies get a handle on the spiralling cost of delivering services similar to ChatGPT, AMD chief executive Lisa Su told Reuters in an interview. She spoke following a keynote presentation in San Francisco during which Su showed an AI system on the MI300X chip writing bolster its sales.



From 'sirens and bomb shelters' to NBA glory: The legend of Nikola Jokic

NEW YORK (Agencies): Nikola Jokic completed one of the most improbable journeys in NBA history after guiding the Denver Nuggets past the Miami Heat 94 - 89 in a thrilling Game 5 victory, securing a gritty series win and a first-ever championship. The Serbian was named Finals MVP, joining New York Knicks legend Willis Reid as the only other second-round pick to win the award. Jokic averaged 30.0 points, 13.5 rebounds and 9.5 assists in 20 games in the 2023 playoffs. He is now one of eleven players who've secured two regular-season MVPs and at least one Finals MVP, joining legends such as Michael Jordon, Tim Duncan, Stephen Curry, Giannis Antetokounmpo, Moses Malone, Magic Johnson, Larry Bird, LeBron James, Wilt Chamberlain, and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Denver went 16-4 during its playoff run, and Jokic led the playoffs in all points, rebounds, and assists. No player in NBA history has ever achieved this during the playoffs. Jokic is unique. "It puts him in the legendary category for what he's done statistically in the Finals," Isiah Thomas, the former Detroit Pistons star, told ESPN. "I don't know if there's anyone who's ever had a statistical run in the NBA Finals as a center as he had in these categories." "The job is done, and we can go home now," said an earnest Jokic. Having grown up in a cramped two-bedroom apartment that he shared with his parents, two brothers and grandmother in northern Serbia, his basketball abilities were honed playing with his two older brothers, Strahinja and Nemanja. His father worked as an agricultural engineer to help provide for the

"I remember things like sirens, bomb shelters, always turning off the lights," Jokic recalled in 2017 in a conversation with Bleacher Report. "We practically lived in the dark. By his third year, he was named league MVP, a sign of things to

Nicknamed "the Joker", Jokic was selected by the Nuggets with the 41st pick in the second round of the 2014 NBA draft. His moment was slightly overshadowed when his name was called during a Taco Bell commercial, and the 6 ft 11in star opted to remain in Eastern Europe for an extra season and finally arrived in Denver in 2015. During the draft, Jokic was fast asleep in Serbia when he received a call in the middle of the night from his older brother, Nemanja. Nemanja informed his younger brother that he had been family. When he was four years old, drafted into the NBA while popping a play with the dynamic duo.

Aston Martin had been the No. 2 team thanks to Fernando Alonso's excellence, but Alonso had his slowest race of the season in his home country. The Spanish Grand Prix looked like validation for Mercedes' upgrades that debuted at Monaco and showed that Ferrari still had some work to do. Charles Leclerc struggled after starting at the back of the field and Carlos Sainz didn't have any speed to match the Red Bull or Mercedes cars. Aston Martin looks poised to bring updates to the Canadian Grand Prix as Alonso is chasing his first F1 win since 2013. Alonso has scored five podium finishes over the first seven races of 2023 after getting just three podium



KYIV/MOSCOW (Agencies): Ukraine drew Grimes, a former commander the 1,200km (745-mile) front. EU says Google abused dominant positions in online ads, face digital ad business break up



BRUSSELS: The European Commission accused Google on Wednesday of abusing its dominance of the online ad market and recommended the US company sell part of its ad services to ensure fair competition. The EU executive invited Google to now respond to this preliminary finding, made after a two-year anti-trust probe, before a definitive finding was made. If the commission maintains its view after that, it could levy a fine of up to 10 percent of Google's annual global revenues. Google issued an immediate statement with its vice president for global ads, Dan Taylor, saying "we disagree" with the commission's announcement "and we will respond accordingly." He stressed Google was determined to "creating value" for advertisers in a "highly competitive" market and said "the commission's investigation focuses on a narrow aspect of our advertising business." Google is a subsidiary of US tech giant Alphabet, which reported worldwide revenues of \$76 billion in the last three months of 2022. Commission Vice President Margrethe Vestager, who spearheads the EU's anti-trust activities, said: "We are concerned that Google may have illegally distorted competition in the online advertising industry, also known as adtech." She said the commission had not yet made a final conclusion in the case, and was awaiting Google's response.

"It is quite rare that we ask for a divestiture, and we have not asked for it yet," Vestager said.

New Zealand, Fiji sign defence agreement



SUVA (Agencies): New Zealand and Fiji have signed a Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA) to strengthen defence ties. The agreement is seen as a response to rising tension in the South Pacific. The SOFA was signed in Fiji by New Zealand Defence Minister Andrew Little and Fiji's Minister for Home Affairs and Immigration Pio Tikoduadua. An accompanying statement of intent said defence co-operation would focus on areas including military training, maritime security, and humanitarian assistance and disaster relief (HADR). Little said the agreement will allow the two countries' armed forces to co-operate on each other's territories as they seek to partner on addressing regional security threats including climate change. "The SOFA is a legal framework for the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) and the Republic of Fiji Military Forces (RFMF) for closer co-operation within each other's territories," Little said.

Harvard morgue manager charged with theft, sale of body parts

LONDON (Agencies): The former morgue manager at Harvard Medical School was among five people indicted by a grand jury over allegations they stole and sold body parts from cadavers donated to the school, federal prosecutors said. Cedric Lodge, 55, who was fired from his job on May 6, and the other defendants were accused of carrying out a black market body parts scheme from roughly 2018 to 2022, the United States Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Pennsylvania said in a statement on Wednesday. Prosecutors said Lodge, who was hired by Harvard in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1995, would at times let potential buyers into the school's morgue to examine cadavers and select what

parts to buy. The buyers mostly resold the body parts, prosecutors said. Lodge would also sometimes take body parts - which included heads. brains, skin and bones - back to his home where he lived with his wife, Denise, 63, and some remains were sent to buyers through the mail, authorities said. Bodies donated to Harvard Medical School are used for education, teaching or research purposes. Once they are no longer needed, the cadavers are usually cremated and the ashes are returned to the donor's family or buried in a cemetery. A sixth person was previously charged in Arkansas in the same investigation on suspicion of stealing body parts from a mortuary she worked for, prosecutors said.

Saudi Cabinet approves Civil Transactions Law

Riyadh: The Saudi Cabinet has approved the Civil Transactions Law, the third of four laws announced as part of legal reforms in 2021. Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman announced the approval of the law following its review by the Shoura Council. The remaining law is the penal code for discretionary sanctions. The crown prince said that the Civil Transactions Law represents a "remarkable transformation" within the system of specialized legislations. "The law was prepared in a way taking advantage of the latest legal trends and the best international judicial practices, in light of the provisions of the Islamic Shariah and its purposes. It also comes in harmony with Saudi Arabia's international obligations in light of the agreements that have been ratified by it so as to keep pace with the the crown prince said.

Compromise talks were launched soon after Netanyahu suspended in March his government's contentious drive to overhaul the judiciary which had sparked unprecedented protests as critics dubbed being displayed at the museum, acit a threat to Israel's democracy. Environment activists smear paint on Monet work in Stockholm

activists on Wednesday smeared red paint and glued their hands to the protective glass on a Monet painting at Stockholm's National Museum, police and the museum said. "Two women around the ages of 25 and 30 were arrested," police said, as the organisation Aterstall Vatmarker (Restore Wetlands) claimed responsibility in an interview with AFP. The museum told AFP it was "not yet known" if the painting itself had been damaged. The artwork was "The Artist's Garden at Giverny", painted by French impressionist Claude Monet in 1900. The painting "is being examined by the museum's curators to see if there has been any damage", the museum said in a statement, while spokeswoman Hanna Tottmar said they hoped to "have more information" on Thursday. Aterstall Vatmarker posted a video on

Stockholm (Agencies): Environment Facebook where the two women, one a nurse and the other a nursing student, could be seen smearing the paint and gluing their hands to the glass.

The two then shout: "The (climate) situation is acute" and "our health is threatened". In an interview with AFP, Aterstall Vatmarker spokesperson Helen Wahlgren said a climate catastrophe "is also a health crisis" with "millions of people already dying from the climate disaster". The organisation said "gorgeous gardens like those in Monet's painting will soon be a distant memory." Wahlgren accused the Swedish government of not respecting its international climate commitments. "We should lower our emissions by 31 percent. But our emissions are still increasing. It's outrageous." The museum said it was "naturally" opposed to actions that risk damaging works of art.

Red Cross: 90% of Syrians live below poverty line

NEW YORK (Agencies): The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) estimates that about 90 per cent of Syrians live below the poverty line, Anadolu Agency reports. "Nearly 90 per cent of Syrians live below the poverty line, with more than 15 million needing humanitarian assistance, a trend that has been sustained over the past years," the ICRC said in a statement. "The risk of collapse of Syria's critical infrastructure is a pressing concern," it added. Syria has been mired in a vicious civil war since early 2011 when the Bashar Al-Assad regime cracked down on pro-democracy protests with unexpected ferocity. "The international community must confront the harsh reality that the current situation in Syria is untenable," Fabrizio Carboni, the ICRC's Regional Director for the Near and Middle East, said."Failure to act will have dire consequences for all those involved and hinder any prospects for sustainable recovery," he added. The ICRC appealed to donor states for "an immediate international commitment to safeguard critical infrastructure and essential

Egypt to mummify shark that killed Russia tourist

CAIRO (Agencies): Egypt is working to mummify the shark that devoured a Russian tourist in the Red Sea city of Hurghada last week, Anadolu Agency reports. A 28-yearold tourist was attacked and dragged under the water by a tiger shark in Hurghada on Thursday. The shark was later caught and dragged to land. Some of the victim's body parts were recovered from inside the shark's stomach, while the rest were recovered by fishermen from the sea. The shark was handed to researchers at the Institute of Marine Sciences for mummification before cording to the local Shorouk newspaper. "Tiger sharks are the second most dangerous to humans, after the white sharks," Ashraf Seddik, a specialist in marine fisheries at the Institute of Marine Sciences, said.

Australia to stop Russia from building new embassy – PM

SYDNEY (Agencies): Anthony Albanese said he wants to terminate the lease agreement for the plot of land where the proposed embassy would be Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said on Thursday that he would introduce a bill to terminate the lease agreement for a plot of land in Canberra where Russia plans to build a new embassy building. "The government has received very clear security advice as to the risk presented by a new Russian presence so close to Parliament House," Albanese said. "We are acting quickly to ensure the lease site does not become a formal diplomatic presence." The PM added that he expected the legislation to pass both houses of the country's parliament, the House of Representatives and the Senate, later on Thursday. Home Affairs Minister Clare O'Neil also argued that "the principal problem" with the proposed building was its location. In 2022,



Australia's National Capital Authority (NCA) decided to revoke Russia's lease on a plot in the suburb of Yarralumla, which sits 500 meters from Parliament House. However, the Federal Court of Australia ruled late last month that the move was "invalid and of no effect," barring the government from stopping the Russian government's "quiet enjoyment of the land." The Russian Embas-

sy in Australia described the decision to terminate the lease at the time as "an unprecedented and very unfriendly move." Several Western countries have expelled Russian diplomats or moved to seize buildings used by Russian missions abroad in response to Moscow's military operation in Ukraine that was launched in February 2022. Russia has argued that such practice was illegal.
