
PM calls on int'l community to ensure fair, judicious distribution of resources

PARIS (APP): Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has called upon the international community to collaborate and devise a comprehensive plan to ensure a fair, equitable, and judicious distribution of resources, aiming to foster sustainable peace and harmony worldwide. Speaking at the "New Global Financing Pact" summit held in Paris, he emphasized the importance of learning from the experiences of developed nations, particularly the progress made by countries in the North, in order to implement similar successful strategies in Pakistan. Sharif highlighted the interconnectedness of nations, stating that if one part of the world is in distress, it affects the entire global community. Drawing attention to the devastating impact of climate change, he recounted Pakistan's experience with catastrophic floods last year, which affected 33 million people, resulted in the loss of millions of acres of crops, claimed the



lives of 1,700 individuals, and led to the drowning of half a million animals. Sharif commended the resilience of the Pakistani people in the face of these challenges and expressed gratitude for the assistance provided by friendly countries around the world. While international financial institutions offered loans to aid the affected population, Sharif cautioned against

further burdening Pakistan's already fragile financial situation. He recounted how he personally took the United Nations Secretary-General to witness the aftermath of the floods, highlighting the immense devastation faced by cities and the dire circumstances experienced by displaced communities. The government established temporary camps to provide essentials such as food, medicine, water, and education, and Sharif expressed confidence that Pakistan would overcome the adverse effects of the floods with resilience. He urged the global community to generously extend support and assistance through a mechanism that prioritizes the most vulnerable and ensures the fulfillment of their basic needs, fostering economic justice and fairness. Sharif lauded French President Emmanuel Macron for organizing the summit to address these critical financing issues that affect humanity as a whole.

All five on Titanic sub dead after 'catastrophic' implosion

No breakthrough at EU talks to ease Serbia,

Kosovo tensions

Boston (AFP/APP): All five aboard a submersible missing near the wreck of the Titanic died after the vessel suffered a "catastrophic implosion" in the ocean depths, the US Coast Guard said Thursday. The somber announcement ended a multinational search-and-rescue operation that captivated the world since the small tourist craft went missing in the North Atlantic on Sunday. Rear Admiral John Mauger told reporters in Boston that analysis showed that debris, found on the seafloor 1,600 feet (500 meters) from the bow of the Titanic, was consistent with the implosion of the sub's pressure chamber. "On behalf of the United States Coast Guard and the entire unified command, I offer my deepest condolences to the families, Mauger said. On board were British explorer Hamish Harding, French expert Paul-Henri Nargeolet, Pakistani-British tycoon Shahzada Dawood and his son Suleman, and Stockton Rush, CEO of the sub's operator OceanGate Expeditions. OceanGate said its "hearts are with these five souls and every member of their families during this tragic time." "These men were true explorers who shared a distinct spirit of adventure, and a deep passion for exploring and protecting the world's oceans," it said in a statement. "We grieve the loss of life and joy they brought to everyone they



earlier on Thursday that an underwater robot had discovered a "debris field." Mauger said that it turned out to be the sub's tail cone as well as additional debris. He declined to be drawn on whether remains of the men would be retrieved and said the process of demobilizing personnel and vessels from the scene would soon begin. Mauger added that unmanned robots would continue operations on the seafloor for now. "We'll collect as much information as we can," he said, adding that he hoped the discovery might provide "some solace during this difficult time" to families. The small sub named Titan disappeared on Sunday as it descended to the Titanic, which sits more than two miles (nearly four kilometers) below the ocean's surface and 400 miles off the coast of Newfoundland, Canada. OceanGate Expeditions charges \$250,000 for a seat on the sub. Harding was a billionaire and keen explorer with three Guinness Records to his name. Nargeolet was nicknamed "Mr Titanic" knew." US approves lab-grown chicken for sale

Washington (AFP/APP): The United States has granted its first ever approvals to two companies to sell chicken grown directly from animal cells, becoming only the second country to allow lab-grown meat to be offered to consumers. The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) approved food safety systems at facilities of Upside Foods and Good Meat, a spokesperson for the agency told AFP Wednesday, with the companies adding the products would be available soon at select restaurants. Both Upside Foods and Good Meat were cleared on safety grounds by the Food and Drug Administration in November, and the USDA last week reviewed and approved their product labels to ensure they were not misleading. "This approval will fundamentally change how meat makes it to our table," said Uma Valeti, CEO and founder of Upside Foods, in a statement. "It's a giant step forward towards a more sustainable future one that preserves choice and life." Josh Tetrick, CEO of Good Meat, the cell-cultured food division of Eat Just, added its "cultivated meat" was now "approved to sell to consumers in the world's largest economy." Producing the meat in large, high-quality volumes is expensive. But, following approval. Upside processed its first order, placed by three-Michelin-star Chef Dominique Crenn's restaurant Bar Crenn in San Francisco. Good Meat, meanwhile, started production of its first batch that will be sold to celebrity chef and philanthropist Jose Andres. Andres will sell the product at a yet-to-be-revealed restaurant in the capital Washington. Several start-ups are aiming to produce the so-called lab-grown meat, which would allow humans to consume animal protein without the associated environmental harms of farming or animal suffering. The products differ from plant-based substitutes such as soy burgers that mimic the texture and flavor of meat but do not contain any animal protein. Eat Just was the first to receive authorization to make artificial meat, in Singapore in 2020. While succeeding in the general lab-meat market has proven complicated, some companies have set their sights on pet food, whose consumers are less picky. Bond Pet Foods, a Colorado start-up, is creating animal protein from a microbial

UNITED NATIONS (Agencies): With a large group of people protesting outside, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Wednesday led the International Yoga Day celebrations with UN diplomats, officials and members of the Indian diaspora at the world body's headquarters lawns in New York. The event created a Guinnesse World Record for participation of most nationalisties at the event. This year's observance organized by the Permanent Mission of India to the UN in collaboration with the Secretariat, took place under the theme, Yoga for Vasudhaiv Kutumbakam (the world is one family). Protesters outside the UN building accused him of pursuing anti-minority policies to marginalize them and make India Hindu State. They raised anti-Modi slogns, calling him "butcher of Gujarat." PM Modi's critics have accused him of using yoga to distract from his poor human rights record and pursuit tionalist Bharatiya Janata Party.

Restaurant explosion kills 31 in northwest China

Beijing (AFP/APP): At least 31 people were killed when an explosion caused by a gas leak ripped through a restaurant in the northwestern Chinese city of Yinchuan, state media said Thursday. The blast occurred on the eve of the three-day Dragon Boat Festival holiday, when many in China go out and socialise with friends. Footage on state broadcaster CCTV showed more than a dozen firefighters working at the site as smoke poured out of a gaping hole in the restaurant's facade. Fresh rescues off Spain after fatal migrant shipwreck







Extravagant Perks for Chairman Senate: A Betrayal of Public Trust

The recent passage of 'The Chairman Senate (Salaries, Allowances and Privileges) Act, 2023' by Parliament has raised eyebrows and invited justified criticism from the public. At a time when the country is grappling with severe economic and financial challenges, bordering on the brink of virtual default, it is disheartening to witness the adoption of a law that bestows unprecedented perks and privileges upon serving, future, and retired Senate Chairmen. This move only serves to further entrench the already privileged class, making them the epitome of entitlement. The magnitude of the perks and privileges outlined in the act is astonishing, requiring nine pages to exhaustively enumerate them. It is even more disconcerting to consider that additional details regarding the privileges granted to members of the upper house are yet to be disclosed in another bill. The act grants lifelong entitlements to every chairman, including a staff of 12 employees and six guards, VVIP security wherever they go, access to requisition aircraft for personal, familial, and domestic or international travel, discretionary grants of significant sums annually, and unlimited medical facilities for both themselves and their family members. In addition to their salaries, they are entitled to free telephone services at their residences, furnished official residences at the expense of the public, official vehicles for themselves and their families, free petrol, sumptuary allowance, allowances upon taking up and relinquishing office, equipment allowance, and travel allowances, among numerous other benefits as stipulated in the bill. While it is reasonable to provide a respectable salary and necessary perks and privileges, such extravagant and unwarranted benefits cannot be justified, particularly when the national treasury is nearly depleted. The fact that the bill was hurriedly adopted in a discreet manner, without sufficient public scrutiny, highlights the guilty conscience of its proponents and supporters. It is ironic that this legislation was unanimously passed by both houses of Parliament, even in the presence of individuals considered to be principled and seasoned politicians. Given the recent trend of the President returning bills to Parliament for further review, it is hoped that this ill-conceived legislation will also be sent back for a comprehensive reassessment. The burden placed on the already strained national finances is unjustifiable, especially when the common citizens continue to suffer from economic hardships. It is imperative for our elected representatives to prioritize the public interest above personal gains and exercise fiscal responsibility. The passage of this act has deeply undermined the public trust in our democratic institutions. It is a betrayal of the faith reposed in the parliamentarians by the people who elected them to serve as custodians of their interests. It is high time for a serious reevaluation of the legislative process, ensuring transparency, accountability, and the ethical use of public resources. Only then can we restore faith in our democratic system and uphold the principles of governance that prioritize the welfare of the nation over personal privileges.

Are we seeing Saudi Arabia taking steps to lead the region in world affairs? — By Dr Abdullah Khalifa Al-Shayji

Antony Blinken made his second official visit to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, his first since the success of Chinese mediation between Saudi Arabia and Iran, and the end of the cold war between the two countries. The US was surprised by China's success. Blinken met with Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman during his trip. Despite their disagreements over accusations related to the events of 9/11, for example; energy production; the Justice Against Sponsors of Terrorism Act (JASTA); energy security; Gulf security; Iran's nuclear programme; the Yemen war; the Houthis; Saudi Arabia's nuclear programme; and the murder of the Gulf Cooperation Council foreign journalist Jamal Khashoggi — there is ministers and the GCC Secretary General much that unites Saudi Arabia and the US. Even though President Joe Biden administration's encouragement of normalisation between Saudi Arabia and Israel is unrealistic, given that Israel is working to make sure that the two-state solution is a failure, Saudi Foreign Minister Faisal Bin Farhan confirmed in a joint press conference with Blinken that, "We believe that normalisation [with Israel] is in the interest of the region, that it would bring significant benefits to all." However, he also noted that, "Without finding a pathway to peace for the Palestinian people, without addressing that challenge, any normalisation will have limited benefits." Blinken merely reiterated that, "The United States will continue to play an integral role in deepening and expanding normalisation." The Biden administration's insistence on integrating Israel in the region and promoting normalisation between the occupation state and Arab countries is a hopeless process, not least because of the extremism of the Netanyahu government, the oppression and abuse of the Palestinians, and the continued expansion and construction of cancerous and illegal settlements that undermine the two-state solution, which remains Washington's stated objective. Despite the latter, Biden is unable to force Israel to stop its violations in order to achieve that goal. Saudi

Two weeks ago, US Secretary of State Biden administration to get its backing for the development of its own its nuclear programme — "for peaceful purposes" without restrictions. Developing bilateral relations with the US through economic, security and energy cooperation, are pillars of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 to reduce dependence on oil and energy revenues and boost other sectors to diversify its income sources. Saudi Arabia and the US are partners in the efforts to get a truce in Sudan, which the warlords have been violating. Moreover, the Saudis want the US to play an effective role in ending the war in Yemen. Furthermore, the joint final statement after Blinken's meeting with stressed Washington's permanent commitment to the security of the Gulf, support for the two-state solution in Palestine, the establishment of a Palestinian state using Security Council resolutions as references, the Arab Initiative, and the right of Palestinians to return to their land. The fact that normalisation with Israel was not mentioned in the closing statement is proof of the Biden administration's failed efforts and its inability to rein-in Israel. The statement welcomed and supported the restoration of diplomatic relations and the exchange of ambassadors between Saudi Arabia and Iran. It did not address Russia's war on Ukraine; instead, it emphasised respect for the sovereignty of national borders and a rejection of violence and violations of such borders. It seems clear that the GCC countries are now thinking outside the box and seeking to diversify alliances and involve allies from the major powers (China, Russia and even European countries) in Gulf security arrangements. However, everyone — the leaders of the GCC states, Russia, Europe and China - knows the limitations of China's security and defence capabilities, along with those of Russia, and their inability or will to compete with the US in the foreseeable future in the latter's traditional area of influence and fill the void left by its decline.

In response to a question, Arsalan suggested that cardio exercises are most effective when performed in the morning on an empty stomach. Arsalan also stressed the importance of warming up before engaging in any physical activity. He highlighted that warming up helps prevent injuries, strains, and muscle pulls.

WMC seminar in Geneva decries India's ruthless suppression of dissent in IIOJK

MIRPUR (Agencies): World Muslim raids on media houses, journalists and Congress (WMC) organised a seminar on the sidelines of the 53rd session of the United Nations Human Rights Council at Geneva late Wednesday, said a message released to the media here on Thursday. The seminar titled, "Why Freedom of Speech is Important", was attended and addressed by rights activists, law experts, journalists and academicians hailing from different parts of the world. Whereas the seminar was chaired and moderated by Altaf Hussain Wani the chairman KIIR and permanent representative World Muslim Congress to UN Geneva. Speakers, while referring to the ruthless suppression of towards the dire human rights situation dissent in the Indian-occupied Kashmir, in the region, the speakers said that it said that the freedom of expression, a fundamental human right guaranteed take notice of the draconian policies of under various international covenants including the UDHR, remained critically suppressed in the region. "The right to freedom of speech and expression no longer existed in Kashmir", they said, adding that the level of suppression in Kashmir could be gauged by the fact that no one in Kashmir dares to express his/her convictions and opinions freely. They said that since 5th August 2019, crackdown on independent journalists in Kashmir rapidly increased. "Journalists who reported critically against the Modi government's muscular policies towards Kashmiris have faced intimidation, harassment and long investigations". They pointed out that activities of local and foreign journalists were not allowed to perform their duties, because of fear of coverage focusing on inhuman siege, crackdowns on Kashmiris and human rights violations taking place in the region. In order to enable complete silence in Kashmir, they said that thousands of Kashmiris including politicians, human rights defenders, traders and intelligentsia and members of the civil society were booked under notorious laws and thrown behind bars. They said that a special media policy was introduced to clip the wings of free media and curtail the right to freedom of opinion and expression. They said that

human rights activists were yet another tactic to create an environment of fear so that nobody dares to speak against the government policies. "In democratic societies, the right to freedom of expression is considered the fundamental right of individuals but in Kashmir, this basic human right has been trampled down under the jackboots", the speakers further said. They said that it has been a hallmark of the BJP's policy to suppress any and every dissenting voice that raises a finger against New Delhi's brutal policies towards Kashmir and its people. Yellen urges disaster clauses in World Bank's debt deals

PARIS (Agencies): US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said on Thursday the World Bank should add disaster clauses to debt agreements with poorer countries, speaking ahead of a summit in Paris that will discuss how to boost crisis financing for low-income nations. Such clauses could be part of a broader reform of the World Bank to free up more funds, Yellen told journalists in the French capital. "We would also like to see the World Bank



offer borrowers the option to add climate resilient debt clauses to their loan agreements. These clauses would help ease pressures on countries if a natural disaster strikes," she said. Yellen, whose country is the World Bank's biggest shareholder, added multilateral development banks should be reformed to become more efficient before shareholders think of injecting more money into them. "Even with the capital that the World Bank and the MDBs have there is clearly potential ...to increase financing capacity," she said, adding an additional 200 billion dollars could be unlocked over a de-

Netflix's US\$2.5bil Korean bet on K-Drama mania

SEOUL (Agencies): Netflix Inc promised to back and cultivate the Korean showrunners and studios behind viral shows like Squid Game, outlining how it plans to spend some of the US\$2.5 billion it's earmarked for K-drama. Co-chief executive officer Ted Sarandos said Thursday his company will bankroll training programmes for the next generation of auteurs and entertainers, both in front of and be-



hind the camera. Netflix will work with local organisations to identify and groom young talent, he added. Those initiatives underscore how Korean programmes like The Glory

have in the past years emerged as a surprise catalyst for Netflix, which needs hot original content to differentiate it from rivals such as Walt Disney Co and Apple Inc. About three-fifths of Netflix's users have watched a Korean show, and viewing time for those programmes has grown sixfold in just four years, he said. About 90% of the viewers for Korean romance-genre content hail from abroad, Sarandos said.

Singapore fines DBS, Citi for Wirecard scandal breaches

SINGAPORE (Agencies): Singapore's financial regulator imposed penalties amounting to a total of S\$3.8 million (US\$2.8 million) on four financial institutions for breaches related to the Wirecard AG scandal. DBS Group Holdings Ltd, Oversea-Chinese Banking Corp as well as the local entities of Citigroup Inc and Swiss Life Holding AG were found to have inadequate money laundering and terrorism financing



controls in place when they dealt with parties linked to Wirecard, the Monetary Authority of Singapore said in a statement on Wednesday. The penalties amount to S\$400,000

on Citibank, Singapore Branch, S\$600,000 on OCBC Singapore, S\$200,000 on Swiss Life (Singapore) Pte., with the heftiest fine of S\$2.6 million imposed on DBS Bank, according to the statement. Among its breaches between July 2015 and February 2020, DBS failed to adequately establish the source of wealth of higher-risk customers and maintain up-to-date client due diligence and risk ratings.

Australia gives Twitter 28 days to clean up 'toxicity and hate'

SYDNEY (Agencies): Australia's internet safety watchdog today threatened to fine Twitter for failing to tackle online abuse, saying Elon Musk's takeover had coincided with a spike in "toxicity and hate". E-safety commissioner Julie Inman Grant – a former Twitter employee – said the platform was now responsible for one-in-three complaints about online hate speech reported in Australia. Inman Grant said Twitter had 28 days to show it was



serious about tackling the problem or face fines of A\$700,000 (US\$475,000) for every day it missed the deadline. Since Musk bought the platform in October 2022, he has slashed more than 80% of the global workforce, including many of the content moderators responsible for stamping out abuse. "Twitter appears to have dropped the ball on tackling hate," said Inman Grant, who worked on cyber safety at the company after 17 years at Microsoft. She said the watchdog was "far from being alone in its concern about increasing levels of toxicity and hate on Twitter, particularly targeting marginalised communities".

Amazon duped consumers into enrolling in Prime, says US FTC

WASHINGTON (Agencies): US Federal Trade Commission on Wednesday accused Amazon.com of enrolling millions of consumers into its paid subscription Amazon Prime service without their consent and making it hard for them to cancel, the agency's latest action against the ecommerce giant in recent weeks. The FTC sued Amazon in federal court in Seattle, alleging that the company has

Saudi Arabia's merchandise imports drop 16.1% in April to \$15.4bn

RIYADH (Agencies): Saudi Arabia's merchandise imports decreased 16.1 percent to SR57.9 billion (\$15.4 billion) in April 2023 compared to SR69 billion in March 2023, according to the latest data released by the General Authority for Statistics. However, the Kingdom's merchandise imports increased by 1 percent in April 2023 compared to SR57.3 million in April 2022. According to the report, over-



all merchandise exports decreased 25.2 percent to SR103 billion in April 2023 compared to SR137.7 billion in the same month last year.

SNB calls for new measures after Credit Suisse crash

ZURICH (Agencies): The Swiss National Bank (SNB) on Thursday said it was crucial to draw lessons from the Credit Suisse crisis that led to the bank's downfall and forced rescue by rival UBS and consider measures that would prevent such events in the future. "These measures need to strengthen banks' resilience in order to prevent a loss of confidence wherever possible, and ensure a broad range of effective options to stabilise, recover or wind down a systemically important bank in the event of a crisis," the central bank said in its 2023 financial stability report. It also



called for banks to be required in the future to prepare a minimum amount of assets that could be pledged for central banks. Sterling was up 0.1% on the day against the dollar at US\$1.281, having traded as high as US\$1.2803 right after the data. Against the euro, the pound was up 0.2% at 85.35 pence, compared with 85.50 pence right before the numbers. Official data showed consumer inflation rose by 8.7% year on year in May, showing no change from April's 8.7% rate, but above expectations for an increase of 8.4%. But the core rate, which excludes food, energy, alcohol and tobacco, rose by 7.1%. above expectations for a reading of



6.8%, keeping the BoE under pressure to deliver a big rate rise when it meets later this week, but not so large it tilts the economy into recession. "If you look at this in context, with the labour market and average earnings increasing 7.2% in April when core CPI was 6.8%, you've now got core CPI in at 7.1% - you're only going to see earnings increase further still and that's when you start to get those second- and third-round effects and that really gets embedded in the economy," TraderX strategist Michael Brown said.

Jamaica eye US ambush as Gold Cup kicks off

Los Angeles (AFP/APP): Jamaica coach Heimir Hallgrimsson is plotting an unlikely upset as the Reggae Boyz prepare to kick off their CONCACAF Gold Cup campaign against the United States on Saturday. The 16-team biennial championship for North America, Central America and the Caribbean gets under way at Soldier Field this weekend, with the defending champion US taking on Jamaica in Group A. Hallgrimsson, who was part of the Iceland coaching set-up that masterminded a stunning defeat of England at Euro 2016, took over as Jamaica coach last September. But so far the 56-year-old qualified dentist has struggled to reverse Jamaica's dismal international form, with the Reggae Boyz winless in seven games



since Hallgrimsson took over. The Icelandic coach though is bullish that the Gold Cup can mark the beginning of an upturn in Jamaica's footballing fortunes. "We don't fear them, we know they have a good squad and they are playing at home in front of their own fans," Hallgrimsson said of the United States. "The most important thing in a

tournament like this is not to lose the first game. A draw is always a good point from the first game so you are alive until the end of the group phase." Jamaica has a solid record in the Gold Cup but has struggled in games against the US in the tournament. The US beat Jamaica in the knockout rounds in 2021 and 2019, and also defeated the Reggae Boyz in the 2017 final. Jamaica though upset the US en route to the 2015 final, where they lost to Mexico. However with a team bolstered by Premier League attacking talent in the shape of Leon Bailey (Aston Villa), Michail Antonio (West Ham) and Demarai Gray (Everton), Hallgrimsson says Jamaica are ready to end their long

LAUSANNE (Agencies): Jose Mourinho has been suspended for four European matches for insulting referee Anthony Taylor after Roma's Europa League final defeat by Sevilla, UEFA announced on Wednesday. The Portuguese confronted Taylor in a car park following Roma's penalty shoot-out loss after a 1-1 draw in Budapest. Mourinho has been banned from "the next four UEFA club compe-

tition matches in which he would otherwise participate, for directing abusive language at a match official," European football's governing body said. Roma have also been fined 50,000 euros (\$54,744) and banned from taking away fans to their next European match "for the lighting of fireworks, throwing of objects, acts of damage and

crowd disturbances." The Italian club were also fined 5,000 euros over the "improper conduct of their team" and ordered to "contact the Hungarian Football Federation within 30 days" to agree a settlement regarding damages caused by their supporters in the stadium. Taylor was harassed by Roma fans at Budapest airport with his family the day after the controversial final.

Sabalenka, Gauff crash out in Berlin

Berlin (AFP/APP): Top seed Aryna Sabalenka and US star Coco Gauff suffered setbacks in their Wimbledon build-ups on Thursday when they slumped to second-round losses at the Berlin WTA tournament. World number two Sabalenka was defeated 6-2, 7-6 (7/2) by Veronika Kudermetova whose Russian compatriot Ekaterina Alexandrova saw off seventh-ranked Gauff 6-4, 6-0. Alexandrova and Kudermetova will meet in Friday's quarter-finals, just five days after they fought out the final in 's-Hertogenbosch. Kudermetova had also defeated Sabalenka at the same stage in Berlin 12 months ago in three sets. On Thursday, world number 13 Kudermetova broke her Belarusian opponent three times in her 99-minute victory. Alexandrova, ranked at 22, successfully defended her 's-Hertogenbosch title in a dramatic three-set triumph over Kudermetova on Sunday. 
Pogacar makes winning return in Slovenian time-trial



Red Cross federation chief stepping down



Geneva (AFP/APP): The head of the Red Cross federation, the world's largest humanitarian network, is stepping down, a spokesman confirmed Thursday, following a row in Italy surrounding the Rome Pride event. Francesco Rocca is leaving his post as the head of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) after the controversy in Italy, where since March he has led the right-wing government of the Lazio region, encompassing Rome. Earlier this month, the Lazio government withdrew its sponsorship of Rome Pride, saying the June 10 event was too political. Rocca said he decided to resign to avoid the possibility that his decisions taken as president of the Lazio region might be instrumentalised in a way that affects the reputation of the IFRC. In a letter to the 191 national societies and the IFRC secretariat, he said "with great sadness" that his decision to resign was a "very difficult one" reached after "some careful and painful reflections driven by my desire to protect our organisation and people we serve". Recent events related to Rome Pride have made him think "how every single decision or action taken by me, despite always being in line with our fundamental principles and values, could be instrumentalised in good or bad faith and risk to jeopardise the reputation of our beloved IFRC". He also said his growing engagements in Lazio were making it difficult to juggle the two jobs. The IFRC presidency is an unpaid, voluntary role, so presidents have typically had other careers or positions while serving in the post. Rocca will remain in charge at the Geneva-based IFRC until a successor is chosen. An IFRC spokesman told AFP: "He called for an extraordinary session of the general assembly, and at the end of this session he will resign." The date of the assembly should be decided within the coming weeks, he added. His resignation was first reported by Switzerland's ATS news agency.

Punjab cabinet rejects agri tax on small land owners

LAHORE (Agencies): The 18th provincial cabinet meeting, presided over by Caretaker Chief Minister Punjab Mohsin Naqvi, rejected proposal to impose agricultural income tax on owners of 5-acre land. The cabinet decided to maintain the stamp duty rate at one percent and approved amendments to the First Schedule of the Stamp Act 1899. Amendments to the Sales Tax on Services Act, 2012 were also approved, abolishing all taxes and duties on IT business, education, and training in Punjab. The cabinet approved the extension of contracts for employees of the hepatitis and infection control program, as well as the provincial TB control program. A significant decision was made to restore historical buildings and ancient gates across Punjab, including Lahore. The restoration of the 12 ancient gates of Lahore to their original grandeur was entrusted to the Director-General of the Walled City of Lahore Authority, by the CM. DG WCLA provided a briefing on the restoration of historical buildings.

European airlines hit by 'greenwashing' complaint

have been hit by a consumer complaint filed with the EU's executive arm accusing the 17 companies of greenwashing, the practice of making misleading climate-related claims. The European Consumer Organisation, or BEUC, said Thursday the claims made by the airlines breach EU rules on unfair commercial practices. The BEUC called for a Europe-wide investigation and for airlines to "stop making claims that give consumers the impression that flying is sustainable". "We urge authorities to take the matter into their hands and crack down on this greenwashing practice seriously misleading consumers," BEUC deputy director general Ursula Pachl said in a statement. "Airlines must stop giving consumers the false impression that they are choosing a sustainable transport mode," Pachl said. The BEUC said 23 of its member organisations from 19 countries had joined the complaint to the European Commission. Greenwashing is when companies use deceptive claims to convince the public that its products or operations are environmentally friendly. The complaint targets Air Baltic, Air Dolomiti, Air France, Austrian, Brussels Airlines, Eurowings, Finnair, KLM, Lufthansa, Norwegian, Ryanair, SAS, SWISS, TAP, Volotea, Vueling and Wizz Air. The BEUC said airlines are misleading consumers by charging them more to contribute to the development of sustainable aviation fuels (SAF), which are "not market-ready" and will only represent a minor share of a plane's fuel mix once they finally become widely avail-



able. The group also denounced claims that paying extra credits can "offset" or "compensate" for a flight's CO2 emissions. The BEUC said consumer protection authorities should ask airlines to reimburse customers who paid such extra "green" fees. Airlines for Europe (A4E), an industry association, said in a statement that companies "fully recognise the importance of transparent communications on sustainability". A4E said that while offsets currently play a role, "their significance will diminish as the industry bring in more fuel-efficient aircraft and invests in more SAF" to meet a target to of net-zero emissions by 2050. "We continuously learn and improve our sustainability communication, carefully reviewing all messaging to enhance transparency," A4E said. "We are dedicated to assessing what can be improved and made even more transparent to effectively communicate our efforts and progress in sustainability." An Air France-KLM spokesman said the Franco-Dutch group was "paying increased attention to the precision of these messages" and that it was the world's biggest buyer of sustainable aviation fuels last year. Germany's Lufthansa said it plans to slash its net emissions by half by 2030 compared to 2019 levels and has a "constant dialogue" with customers.

Britain celebrates 'Windrush' anniversary after deportation scandal



London, June 22 (AFP/APP): Britain June 22, 1948. Three-quarters of a cenon Thursday celebrated the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the Empire Windrush ship bringing workers from the West Indies, but with the bitter legacy of a wrongful deportation scandal still fresh. Known as the "Windrush generation", thousands of people came to the UK at the invitation of the British government between 1948 and the early 1970s to fill shortages of key workers following World War II. Mostly from Jamaica or Trinidad and Tobago, they received indefinite leave to remain, but many who did not apply for passports later found themselves targeted by immigration laws intended to create a "hostile environment" for illegal immigrants. Many lost jobs, homes, health care, pensions and benefits because they could not produce paperwork, while others were taken into custody or forced to return to the Caribbean. Five years after the scandal sparked outrage, many of those affected are still waiting for the promised compensation. - 'Immeasurable contribution' -

Pakistanis will never forget how the Secretary General came forward to plead the case of flood victims at the global forums after devastating floods in Pakistan," he added.

Iran top diplomat rounds out Gulf tour with UAE visit



Dubai (AFP/APP): Iran's foreign minister on Thursday concluded a three-day tour of Gulf Arab neighbours with a visit to the United Arab Emirates, where he held talks with the country's president. Hossein Amir-Abdollahian's visit to the UAE followed stops in Qatar, Kuwait and Oman -- the latest in a flurry of diplomatic moves by Tehran as it seeks to reduce its isolation, improve its economy and project strength. On Thursday, he discussed "bilateral relations and ways to enhance cooperation" in a meeting with UAE President Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan in Abu Dhabi, the official WAM news agency reported. Amir-Abdollahian extended an invitation from President Ebrahim Raisi for Sheikh Mohammed to visit, Iran's foreign ministry said. He later met with his Emirati counterpart, Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed, who emphasised "the significance of establishing an international approach to multilateral action based on cooperation and partnership," WAM said. During the visit, Iran and the UAE also signed an agreement to expand air transport services between the two countries and increase trade and tourism opportunities, it added. Gulf Arab countries are seeking to ease tensions with Iran, fuelled in recent years by the conflicts in Yemen and Svria. In a dramatic shift, China brokered an agreement between Iran and Saudi Arabia in March to restore ties after a years-long rupture. Iran's nuclear activities are also an issue of mutual concern, as Tehran seeks to revive a 2015 deal with major powers granting it sanctions relief in return for restrictions aimed at preventing it from acquiring a weapons capability - an ambition it has always denied. Iran said last week it had been engaged in indirect negotiations with the United States through Oman, with nuclear issues, US sanctions and a possible prisoner swap on the agenda. The following day, Iran's top nuclear ne-

gotiator, Ali Bagheri Kani, said he had met with diplomats from three European countries in Abu Dhabi to discuss a number of issues, including his country's nuclear activities. In 2018, the United States under then-president Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew from the nuclear accord, prompting Iran to begin backing away from its own commitments a year later, including by stepping up its enrichment of uranium. The administration of US President Joe Biden launched talks to revive the deal in 2021, but the process has stalled amid on-off negotiations.

Biden, Modi salute 'defining partnership'

Washington (Agencies): US President Joe Biden on Thursday hailed a "defining partnership" with India as he rolled out the red carpet for Prime Minister Narendra Modi, sealing major defense and technology deals as Washington bets big on New Delhi as a counterweight to China. Modi is being feted with the pomp of a state visit, only the third of Biden's presidency, in a calculated show of full-throated US support, despite quiet unease over India's refusal to break with Russia
