Attacks on Quran continue in Denmark

Attacks against the Holy Ouran persist in Denmark's capital, Copenhagen, as members of the marginalised group, Danish Patriots, known for their anti-Islamic and ultra-nationalist stance, burned two copies of the Quran on Monday, Anadolu Agency reports. The incidents took place in front of the Iranian Embassy and, later, in front of the Iraqi Embassy in Copenhagen. The group's members chanted slogans insulting Islam and showed disrespect by stepping on the Iranian flag and the Quran, which they threw on the ground before setting them on fire. They live-streamed the offensive moments on their social media accounts. The Danish Patriots claimed that their actions were a response to Iran's announcement of arresting and prosecuting members of their group and supporters. The

Ford launches 'hands-free' driving on UK motorways

London (AFP/APP): In a scene Ford hopes to see across Europe "soon", the first hands-free car model allowed on the UK's fastest roads zoomed down a motorway before slowing down as the back of a truck appeared. Travelling at 60 miles per hour (100 kilometres per hour), the small SUV remained within its lane as an AFP journalist took a ride in the driver's seat along the M11 motorway north of London. Ford activated the "BlueCruise" selfdrive option on its electric flagship, the Mustang Mach-E, in the UK in April. After debuting in the United States in 2021, the option is now available on 6,000 kilometres (3,700 miles) of UK "blue zones" motorways -equipped with four lanes and central dividers -- from Dover to Scotland. While the driver's hands are free, the car ensures that there is no fiddling with phones -- and that eyes are fixed on the road -- thanks to several cameras and infrared sensors. The on-board computer offers to take over driving duties when it enters the motorway, but when it detects that the driver has looked away for 10 seconds, a voice says: "Look at the road. Resume control". If the warning is not heeded, the car will slam on the brakes and sound warnings. Some 500 early adopters have joined the trial in Britain, paying £17.99 (21 euros) per month. In North America, the option is also available on the F-150 pickup truck and the Expedition SUV. Ford claims that 200,000 drivers use it, with no accidents. Competitor General Motors also offers hands-free driving, as does Mercedes on the German autobahn, but only in traffic jams with a maximum speed of 60 kmh imposed.

Poland Considering Sending Troops to Western Ukraine – Russian Foreign Intel Head

MOSCOW (Agencies): Poland is considering establishing control over the western part of Ukraine through the deployment of its troops there, Russian Foreign Intelligence Service (SVR) Director Sergei Naryshkin said. The SVR head believes that Warsaw is coming to realize that the defeat of Ukraine is a matter of time. "The Polish leadership is intensifying the mindset to introduce control in the western territories of Ukraine, the western regions by deploying their troops there," Naryshkin said at a meeting held by President Vladimir Putin with the permanent members of the Security Council. In this regard. Putin instructed the Russian foreign intelligence head to monitor Poland's plans for Ukraine.

New tensions in France after policeman jailed over violence

Paris (Agencies) :The remanding in custody of a French policeman in the city of Marseille sparked new controversy Monday weeks after violent riots, with a call from police chiefs for the officer to be freed prompting fury on the left and concern within the judiciary. France was rocked by over a week of riots that began last month over the killing of 17-year-old Nahel M. by a policeman during a traffic check outside Paris. The officer has been charged and jailed ahead of trial. In the incident in Marseille, a man named as Hedi, 21, says he was beaten by four or five men he identified as police during unrest in the city over the death of Nahel M. earlier this month. He says he was also hit in the head by a blast ball fired by police. He underwent operations and has now returned home but risks losing the sight in one eye, according to his lawyer. Four police were charged last week over the incident, one of whom was remanded

in custody ahead of trial. "Knowing that he is in prison is stopping me from sleeping," said France's national police chief Frederic Veaux in an interview with Le Parisien newspaper published on Monday. "In general, I believe that ahead of a possible trial, a police officer should not be in prison, even if he may have committed serious faults or errors in the course of his work," he added. Paris police chief Laurent Nunez tweeted that he shared the stance of Veaux. In an interview with French television, President Emmanuel Macron said on Monday that he understood the "emotion" of the police after the recent riots, while emphasising that "no one in the Republic is above the law".

Lausanne Treaty: International recognition of Turkiye's independence marks 100 years

ANKARA (Agencies): A century ago, on July 24, countries around the world acknowledged Turkiye as an independent and sovereign nation with the historic signing of the Lausanne Peace Treaty at the Rumine Palace in the lakeside Swiss city, Anadolu Agency reports. Months of intense negotiations had led up to the momentous event under the Lausanne Peace Conference, held at the Beau-Rivage Palace Hotel, situated on the picturesque shores of Lake Leman in Lausanne. In a book commemorating the hotel's 150 years of history, numerous details about the momentous conference are revealed, shedding light on why Switzerland was chosen as the venue, the intricacies of the negotiations, and the ultimate international recognition of a new nation. The Lausanne Peace Conference commenced in November 1922. The book, released by the hotel, explains that Lausanne was selected as the venue through a process of elimination. "The Turks wanted the conference to take place in Smyrna (Izmir), which they had just liberat-France have widely diverging views on the issues to be discussed. Venice was ruled out as it would have given Italy's new dictator Mussolini a golden opportunity to act as chair," it explained. Geneva, despite being home to the League of Nations, the predecessor of the UN, was vetoed by the US and Soviet Union, "powerful political observers of the negotiations," according to the book. 



'Underground climate change' is deforming the ground beneath buildings, study finds

A phenomenon that scientists have continuously develop," he said. "Over called "underground climate change" is deforming the ground beneath cities, a study conducted in Chicago has found. This shifting of land under urban areas could pose a problem for buildings and infrastructure, threatening long-term performance and durability, according to the research. Technically known as "subsurface heat islands," underground climate change is the warming of the ground under our feet, caused by heat released by buildings and subterranean transportation such as subway systems. "The denser the city, the more intense is underground climate change," said lead study author Alessandro Rotta Loria, an assistant professor of civil and environmental engineering at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. Soil, rocks and construction materials deform when subjected to temperature variations. For example, the ground underneath buildings can contract when heated, causing unwanted settlement, Rotta Loria said. "Deformations caused by underground climate change are relatively small in magnitude, but they

time, they can become very significant for the operational performance of civil infrastructure like building foundations, water retaining walls, tunnels and so on." But underground climate change is not the same as what we think of as climate change in the atmosphere, which is largely driven by greenhouse gases and has far-reaching effects, said David Archer, a professor of geophysical sciences at the University of Chicago. "Calling it climate change seems like a bit of a coattail thing," Archer, who was not involved with the study, said. The United States faces a fundamental deterrence problem in Taiwan. In a recent poll of more than 2,500 U.S. adults, fewer than half said they would support a direct U.S. military intervention if China invades the self-governing island. Yet to be successful, deterrence requires one's adversary to perceive that one has both the capability and the will to carry out their threats. There are already questions about whether U.S. forces are equipped to defend and, if necessary, take back Taiwan. Recent well-publicized wargames have found that a U.S. victory would cost tens of lost ships, hundreds of lost aircraft, and thousands of lost U.S. servicemember lives in a matter of weeks. This may give Chinese President Xi Jinping reason to believe that America's will to come to Taiwan's defense may be lacking—if not during the tenure of President Joe Biden, who has on multiple occasions said the U.S. would intervene militarily on Taiwan's behalf, then perhaps as soon as his successor comes to office. The U.S. has a variety of instruments of power available for deterrence, including expansive diplomatic connections, alliance networks, and economic and financial carrots and sticks. As such, the apparent solution to the U.S. credibility problem is the Defense Department-led concept of integrated deterrence: "the seamless combination of capabilities to convince potential adversaries that the costs of their hostile activities outweigh their benefits" via integration of efforts "across domains," "across regions," "across the spectrum of conflict," "across the U.S. government," and "with allies and partners." But if deterrence requires coordination across the governments of allies and partners-many of which are not interested in a fight with China-then placing the organization tasked primarily with preparing for a fight with China in the lead sends the wrong message. It also casts U.S.-China competition in a more antagonistic light than may be necessary and underemphasizes critical non-military in-

struments of power. Hammer time

That the Defense Department is in the lead of the U.S. integrated deterrence mission is no surprise. Modern deterrence theory originated as a martial concept. Even if it didn't, in recent years many traditionally nonmilitary activities have become martial ones as "the military became everything"—a recent Pardee Center

mula. This militarization of traditionally nonmilitary activities has consequences. As the saying goes, if all you have is a hammer, everything looks like a nail. For strategic deterrence, military threats alone appear to have worked quite well. Happily, few leaders seem to be keen on global thermonuclear war. But strategic deterrence successes do not always translate well to the local, conventional level. U.S. military threats across great distances in defense of non-allied states often lack the credibility required for effective deterrence. The phrase "integrated deterrence" provides a useful cognitive distance from earlier notions of deterrence. It makes clear that to be most effective, deterrence requires the purposeful use of non-U.S. and nonmilitary resources. Unfortunately, the Defense Department's lead role in integrated deterrence illustrates that this cognitive distance hasn't translated from U.S. minds to U.S. actions.

U(S) can't touch this

For Xi Jinping, the stakes for Taiwan involve his legacy and his party's promise of national rejuvenation. Meanwhile, the U.S. commitment to Taiwan, as communicated to Xi, is ostensibly about democracy-except that Taipei enjoyed Washington's support for four decades before it shook off authoritarianism with its first fully free parliamentary elections in 1992. Less idealistically, others have made the case for defending Taiwan based on the importance of free and open shipping lanes and air routes-except that, once in control of the island, China would have ample reasons to allowing shipping and air travel to resume as normal given its economy's heavy reliance on trade for growth. Control of microchip manufacturing is a more well-founded concern, at least in the short term. But the United States and its European allies are investing heavily in the development of more robust microchip industries to reduce their reliance on the Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company. What happens to Taiwan's TSMC-comprised "silicon shield" when these U.S. and European efforts are successful? China has also been working to wean itself off its dependence on Taiwanese microchips since at least 2020, when TSMC was banned from shipping semiconductors to Chinese telecom giant Huawei. Sooner or later, Taiwan's "silicon shield" will begin to show cracks. Meanwhile, Xi has other options beyond invasion. What of a blockade? To be sure, any deterrence strategy must include the hammer that the Defense Department can wield. But, beyond questions of its effectiveness in deterring a Chinese invasion of Taiwan, over-reliance on the military and securitization generally is likely to have broader deleterious effects on U.S. relations in the Indo-Pacific. Americans risk becoming the "Hessians of Asia" by taking a security-first approach in the region. To prevent this, integrated deterrence must give more equal weight to nonmilitary and non-U.S. components. In a recent report, my colleagues and I proposed that this be done by tying integrated deterrence to our notion of formal bilateral influence capacity, whereby the U.S. capacity to compel and deter others is the product of an array of economic, political, and security-based policymaking instruments that can be leveraged bilaterally as well as through a network of allies and partners. If successful, such an approach would provide the United States and its partners a "collective resilience." Even if a U.S. deterrence-by-denial strategy with respect to Taiwan is not convincing to Xi, the U.S. and partner capacity for deterrence by resilience ought to be, especially given China's heavy dependence on the U.S. and several of its allies for hundreds of key goods. Relatedly, substantial, sustained decreases in imports from China to the U.S. and Europe would force Chinese leadership to make hard choices: "a further increase in infrastructure investment (and in the country's debt burden) or it will have to allow unemployment to rise.' China's debt is already quite high, and many of the major debt holders-local governments wrapped up in real estate—have little ability to repay their debts. China is also in the middle of a youth unemployment crisis. As such, neither an increase in debt nor an increase in unemployment is a good option for Chinese leadership, which could face a legitimacy crisis-and even threaten Xi's survival—if it were to face major post-invasion economic blowback. Convincing partners and allies to join the U.S. in a coordinated response to deter an invasion of Taiwan will be difficult.

The WUENIC is a rulebased logical framework developed by WHO and UNICEF for estimating children's immunization coverage in all countries and territories across the globe. Saudi Arabia issues 99 new industrial licenses in May

RIYADH (Agencies): Saudi Arabia's industrial sector is fast picking up steam, with the government issuing 99 new licenses in May to set up new factories, the latest official data showed. According to the Ministr0y of Industrial and Mineral Resources, the top economic activities receiving the licenses included food production at 16, carpentry at 10, and non-metallic mineral production at nine. It also issued nine new licenses for chemical production units,



as well as rubber production units, received eight licenses each. The report indicated that the volume of investments these new licensees committed to make was SR20.1 bilwhile formed metal manufacturing, lion (\$5.35 billion). The small en-

terprises acquired most of the new industrial licenses at 88.89. It was followed by medium enterprises which bagged 10.10 percent of licenses, alongside micro-enterprises which had a share of 1.01 percent. Saudi national factories recorded the largest share by acquiring 73.74 percent of the total licenses issued in terms of the type of investment. This was followed by foreign enterprises with 15.15 percent, while joint investment enterprises accounted for 11.11 percent.

LONDON (Agencies): Irish nofrills airline Ryanair on Monday announced surging profits for its first quarter, recovering from disruption to traffic one year earlier in the wake of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The US State Department in November approved the potential sale of the aircraft, manufactured by Lockheed Martin, and related equipment to Australia.



Algeria fires fanned by winds, extreme heat kill 34

Algiers (AFP/APP): Wildfires raging across Algeria during a blistering heat wave have killed more than 30 people and forced mass evacuations, the government said on Monday. As temperatures hit 48 degrees Celsius (118 Fahrenheit) in parts of the North African country, it recorded 97 blazes across 16 provinces, fanned by strong winds, said the interior ministry. The fires killed at least 34 people, including 10 soldiers, as they raged through residential areas, the interior ministry said, revising an earlier toll of 15 dead. According to that initial toll, at least 26 people

Musk rebrands Twitter, replacing bird logo



San Francisco (AFP/APP): Elon Musk killed off the Twitter logo on Monday, replacing the world-recognized blue bird with a white X as the tycoon accelerates his efforts to transform the floundering social media giant. Musk and the US company's new chief executive Linda Yaccarino announced the rebranding Sunday, scrapping one of technology's most iconic brands in the latest shock move since the tycoon took over Twitter nine months ago. Musk's connection to the letter X goes back nearly 24 years when he founded X.com, which later was renamed PayPal, despite his objections. His space company is called SpaceX and the parent company of Twitter was changed to X earlier this year. He described the logo as "minimalist art deco," and updated his Twitter bio to "X.com," which now redirects to twitter.com. The Tesla CEO also tweeted that under the site's new identity, a post would be called "an X." Musk has said his takeover of the social media giant was "an accelerant to creating X, the everything app" — an app inspired by China's WeChat that functions as a social media platform and also messaging and payments. "You basically live on WeChat in China because it's so usable and helpful to daily life, and I think if we can achieve that, or even get close to that at Twitter, it would be an immense success," he told a company town hall meeting in June last year. The new logo was projected onto the facade of Twitter's San Francisco headquarters on Sunday night. "Powered by AI, X will connect us in ways we're just beginning to imagine," Yaccarino tweeted earlier.

Israel MPs approve key judicial reform clause as protests flare

JERUSALEM: Israel's hard-right government on Monday pushed through parliament a key clause of its controversial judicial reform package despite months of mass protests and concerns voiced by foreign allies. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his coalition allies approved the bill in a Knesset vote boycotted by opposition lawmakers, some of whom shouted "shame, shame". Critics charge the judicial revamp will undermine Israel's liberal democracy by removing checks and balances on the executive, while the government argues it needs to curb judicial overreach. The bill, passed with 64 votes in the 120-seat chamber, aims to limit the powers of the Supreme Court in striking down government decisions which the judges deem "unreasonable". The reform package has triggered one of the biggest protest movements in Israel's history since it was unveiled by the government in January. The bill was passed hours after Netanyahu, 73, returned to the Knesset — only a day after undergoing surgery to have a pacemaker fitted — as police outside the legislature used water cannon and mounted officers were deployed against a crowd of demonstrators. President Isaac Herzog - who had tried but failed to broker a compromise after half a year of mass street protests — earlier warned that Israel faced a "national emergency".

Global food systems 'broken', UN chief says, as more people go hungry

UNITED NATIONS (APP):UN Secrethe highest price," he added, emphatary-General Antonio Guterres Monday highlighted the need to address global hunger, promote cooperation between businesses and governments, and mitigate the damaging impact of continuing climate change on food production. Addressing the 'UN Food Systems Summit +2 Stocktaking Moment', in Rome, the UN chief said that in a world of plenty, "it is outrageous that people continue to suffer and die from hunger." "Global food systems are broken - and billions of people are paying the price," he added. According to UN estimates, over 780 million people experience hunger, almost one-third of all food produced globally is lost or wasted and nearly three billion people cannot afford healthy diets. Developing countries face additional challenges, as limited resources and debt burdens prevent them from investing fully in food systems which can produce nutritious food across the social spectrum. Unsustainable food production, packaging and consumption are also contributing to the climate crisis, accounting for a third of all greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, 70 per cent of the world's freshwater usage, and driving biodiversity loss. The recent termination of the Black Sea Initiative by Russia has further exacerbated the situation, Guterres said. It enabled the export of millions of metric tons of food from Ukrainian ports, and together with the UN's parallel accord with Russia on the export of food and fertilizer, had been vital for global food security and price stability. With the termination of the Black Sea

sizing that both Russia and Ukraine are crucial to global food security, urging Moscow to reverse course. The UN chief said he remains committed to enabling unimpeded access to global markets for food and fertilizers from both countries, "and to deliver the food security that every person deserves." In his address, the UN chief cited three key areas for action, starting with a "massive" investment in sustainable food systems. "Starving food systems of investment means, quite literally, starving people," he said, calling on governments to respond to UN's call for an SDG Stimulus, amounting to at least \$500 billion annually to support long-term financing for all countries in need.Second, Guterres called on governments and businesses to collaborate and "put people over profit" in building food systems. This involves exploring new ways to increase the availability of fresh, healthy food for all individuals, keeping food markets open, and removing trade barriers and export restrictions, he said. With food systems playing a key role in reducing carbon emissions and limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius, the Secretary-General called for food systems that reduce the carbon footprint of food processing, packaging, and transportation. Harnessing new technologies to reduce the unsustainable use of land, water, and other resources in food production and agriculture is vital, he said, urging "stronger and faster action" to tackle the climate crisis and commit to reaching net-zero emissions by 2040 for developed countries Initiative, the most vulnerable will pay and 2050 for emerging economies.

Death toll rises to 37 in Cameroon building collapse

Yaoundé (AFP/APP): The death toll from a building collapse in Cameroon's business hub Douala rose to 37 on Monday, as neighbours recalled the structure's "failings" and "cracks", fearing more bodies lie under the ruins. The four-storey block of flats collapsed onto another residential building in the north of the city overnight on Saturday. One of the worst such tragedies in the country's history, it left 37 people dead and 21 injured, five in critical condition, a senior fire officer and the regional governor told AFP on Monday, warning that the toll could rise. Cameroon's urban development minister Celestine Ketcha-Courtes, who visited the scene of the tragedy on Monday, told reporters that the ill-fated building "did not have planning permission". Rescuers were still trying to clear the rubble with a dig-

ger after seeking survivors throughout Sunday and Monday, a resident told AFP. Douala's Laquintinie hospital on Sunday said it had taken in 13 patients, two of whom -- a three-yearold girl and a woman aged 19 -- had died. "The toll could still go up," said computer scientist Prosper Tchinda, who was one of the first on the scene on Sunday. "There was one survivor who got out with just scratches and we found a baby safe and sound," he told AFP by telephone. The 42-yearold lives a few minutes' walk from the block and said there had been "some sort of event with music going on when it happened". Nathalie, who also lives in the area but did not want to give her full name, said the building had "failings" and was in a poor state. "There were cracks in the wall and we felt it could collapse at any time," she said.

N.Korea fires possible ballistic missile: Japan defence ministry



Seoul: North Korea launched a possible ballistic missile, Japan's defence ministry said on Monday. The projectile is believed to have fallen outside Japan's exclusive economic zone, according to public broadcaster NHK citing government officials. South Korea's military also said Pyongyang fired a ballistic missile toward the Sea of Japan, Kyodo news agency reported. Pyongyang routinely conducts weapons tests, and the incident comes days after leader Kim Jong Un personally oversaw the firing of the country's newest intercontinental ballistic missile, the solid-fuel Hwasong-18. Relations between the two Koreas are currently at one of their lowest historical points, as diplomacy between Pyongyang and Seoul has stalled and Kim has called for ramping up weapons development, including tactical nukes. In response, Seoul and Washington have staged joint military exercises with advanced stealth jets and US strategic assets. The launch also comes ahead of celebrations in North Korea this week marking the 70th anniversary of the end of the Korean War. A Chinese delegation will travel to the North in what is the first known visit by a foreign delegation since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic, the state-run Korean Central News Agency reported.

At least 20,000 people drown in Europe each year: WHO official

UNITED NATIONS (APP): The World Health Organization (WHO), a Geneva-based UN agency, has said that 20,000 drowning deaths every year in the European region are "entirely preventable" Most recently, the catastrophic loss of hundreds of lives, including Pakistanis, in the capsizing of a fishing vessel off the Greek coast has brought this into sharp focus, it was pointed out. "In that one single catastrophe, more than 600 people huddled in desperation and drowned together: most bodies will never be recovered." Dr. Hans Henri P. Kluge, WHO's regional European director, said in a statement issued in Copenhagen on Monday. "Most of us rarely, if ever, think about drowning as a public health hazard with significant impact," he said. According to the WHO, the majority of victims tragically drown alone in varied circumstances, from unsupervised pools to deadly rip currents. Europe is home to the world's heaviest alcohol drinkers per capita, and this also adds to the crisis. "Alcohol is causally associated with 26 percent of all drowning deaths in the European region," Kluge said. The migration crisis further aggravates the issue. "According to the International Organization for Migration, about 34,000 people have drowned in the course of migration since 2014," Kluge said, underscoring the urgency to act. "This represents 60 percent of all migration-associated deaths recorded, and of these, almost four out of five --have occurred in the Mediterranean and the English Channel, both within the WHO European Region," the director
