



#### Microsoft says it hasn't been able to shake Russian state hackers

BOSTON (Agencies): Microsoft said Friday it's still trying to evict the elite Russian government hackers who broke into the email accounts of senior company executives in November and who it said have been trying to breach customer networks with stolen access data. The hackers from Russia's SVR foreign intelligence service used data obtained in the intrusion, which it disclosed in mid-January, to compromise some source-code repositories and internal systems, the software giant said in a blog and a regulatory filing. A company spokesman would not characterize what source code was accessed and what capability the hackers gained to further compromise customer and Microsoft systems. Microsoft said Friday that the hackers stole "secrets" from email communications between the company and unspecified customers cryptographic secrets such as passwords, certificates and authentication keys — and that it was reaching out to them "to assist in taking mitigating measures." Cloud-computing company Hewlett Packard Enterprise disclosed on Jan. 24 that it, too, was an SVR



hacking victim and that it had been informed of the breach — by whom it would not say — two weeks earlier, coinciding with Microsoft's discovery it had been hacked. "The threat actor's ongoing attack is characterized by a sustained, significant commitment of the threat actor's resources, coordination, and focus," Microsoft said Friday, adding that it could be using obtained data "to accumulate a picture of areas to attack and enhance its ability to do so." Cybersecurity experts said Microsoft's admission that the SVR hack had not been contained exposes the perils of the heavy reliance by government and business on the Redmond, Washington, company's software monoculture — and the fact that so many of its customers are linked through its global cloud network.

### Climate change: Preserving Animal Biodiversity in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa: Challenges and Solutions

Pakistan, a country blessed with diverse ecosystems and rich wildlife, stands at a crossroads in the conservation of its natural heritage. In particular, the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) province is home to a myriad of flora and fauna, including endangered species like the snow leopard and the brown bear. However, the region faces significant challenges in preserving its animal biodiversity, ranging from the impacts of climate change to ineffective management of protected areas. The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province has a broad range of severe weather conditions. The northern part of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa are very cold and snowy seasons. Moreover, it experiences substantial rainfall and lovely summer. Furthermore, the part which is situated on the south side of KP observe winter for a very short period and summer usually hotter. Moreover, precipitation and temperature has a key role to affect the environment, and due to this, it provide home for several birds living in jungles, mammals and insects creatures. Many plant kinds are not able to adjust to speedy Climate Changes. The same is real for mammals. Additionally, changes in ecologies can trigger modifications in animal nursing patterns, weakening them and ultimately leading to extinction (IPCC, 2021).In Pakistan, total 100 species were identified as endemic, then 90% species are living in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. The Himalayan range and subhumid jungles of KP are home to 7 bird species and 12 internationally endangered endemic species. Mountainous areas are therefore more vulnerable to the damage of biodiversity carried on by climate change. - Understanding the Context:

The biodiversity of KP Province is intricately linked to its geographical diversity, which spans from the towering Himalayan peaks in the north to the fertile plains in the south. This varied landscape supports a wide range of habitats and species, making it a hotspot for biological diversity. However, this richness is under threat

from various factors, including climate

change, habitat loss, and unsustain-

-Khyber Pakhtunkhwa biodiversity and Threats:

The biodiversity of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) Province is seriously threatened by several issues which includes, hunting, non-sustainable farming practices, soil erosion, salinity, and water logging, deforestation and overgrazing. Though, it is predicted that, after changes in land use, climate change will be the main reason of biodiversity loss in the future. Several endangered species are identified in the province. Lion eared bat, ibex, the snow leopard and the brown bear are found the endangered species. Moreover, there is 456 birds species, 56 reptiles species and more than 4500 types of plants are present in this province. (EPA, Govt. of KP). The biodiversity of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa comprises a vast variety of habitats and species and provide a multitude of ecosystem services, including the facility of fresh water, regulating the climate, constraining soil attrition, controlling surface overflow and offering bio-resources. Different steps has been taken to combat the issues of climate change and threats to biodiversity but only in relation of administration of safeguarded parts or the conservation of fauna and flora in

their natural state. Status of protected areas:

KP Province contains two wildlife refuges, 8 wildlife parks, 38 game reserves, 22 private game reserves, 90 community game reserves, 3 wildlife sanctuaries, and six national parks

Variation in rainfall patterns, natural disasters and uprising temperature creating changes in both native and migratory fauna and flora. Land degradation transported on by extreme weather actions, natural hazards, and soil erosion that shrinks soil fertility and agricultural efficiency, Water quality and quantity changes in inland freshwaters, vegetation degradation in watersheds are included.

The protected areas, every year, a wide range of migratory species visit zones such as game reserves and wildlife sanctuaries concealing more than 1.05 million hectares. These areas oppose similar risks to migratory species' existence, such as climate change.

A strategic online outreach and the launch of the "Salam Pakistan" tourism brand in 2023 played a pivotal role in attracting a diverse range of visitors from across the globe. The success of the recovery in tourism sector can also be attributed to private organizations like the College of Tourism and Hotel Management COTHM for educating, training, and preparing professionals in tourism and hospitality sector. Expressing optimism for a stronger performance in 2024, acknowledgement is due to the efforts of Pakistan Tourism and Development Corporation PTDC. The optimism exudes from the collaborative efforts of PTDC, provincial tourist departments, and private sector operators, emphasizing the role of global events in expanding international partnerships. According to the World Tourism Organization Tourism Barometer, Pakistan stood out among leading destinations such as Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Serbia, Turkey, and Romania. Key findings from the barometer revealed that international tourism had recovered 87 % of pre-pandemic levels. The Middle East continued to lead the recovery in relative terms, with arrivals 20 % above pre-pandemic levels. Europe, as the world's largest destination region, reached 94 % of pre-pandemic levels, driven by robust intra-regional demand. Africa and the Americas recovered 92 % and 88 % of pre-crisis visitors, respectively, during the ninemonth period, while Asia and the Pacific saw arrivals climb to 62 % of pre-pandemic levels. Noteworthy were the sub-regions of North Africa (+5 %), Central America (+4%), and Southern Mediterranean Europe (+1 %), which continued to exceed pre-pandemic levels. Despite economic challenges and uncertainties arising from geopolitical tensions and conflicts, the WTO asserts that international tourism is on track to fully recover pre-pandemic levels in 2024. Within this global context, Pakistan's Travel & Tourism market is expected to reach a revenue of US\$3,402.00 million in 2024, with an annual growth rate of 3.59% from 2024 to 2028. The market & #39;s largest segment is the Package Holidays market, projected to have a volume of US\$1,443.00 million in 2024. By 2028, the number of users in this market is expected to reach 16,400.00k users, with a user penetration of 10.1% in 2024 that is expected to rise to 10.5% by 2028. The average revenue per user (ARPU) is anticipated to be US\$137.40, and Pakistan's Travel & amp; Tourism market is estimated to generate 66% of total revenue through online sales by 2028. Comparatively, in the global landscape, the United States is predicted to generate the most revenue in this market, with an estimated value of US\$199 billion in 2024. 

Dr. Afzal advocated for the use of laser land levelers to ensure

(Agencies): Director uniformity in land surface as the laser levelers facilitate easy water flow and provide consistent irrigation to all crops in the field. This approach not only conserves water up to 15-20% but also leads to a 10-15% increase in yield, he added. He advised farmers to prepare the land thoroughly by deep ploughing to enable roots to penetrate deeper and sustain moisture for longer durations. Instead of burning residues from previous crops, Dr. Afzal recommended incorporating these into the soil to enhance its fertility. Dr Afzal suggested using rotary tillers, disk harrows, or moldboard plows to ensure proper incorporation without any difficulty.

#### Saudi bank loans surge to \$700bn, fueled by real estate, corporate expansion

RIYADH (Agencies): Saudi banks extended loans totaling SR2.62 trillion (\$700 billion) in January, marking an 11 percent rise from the same month in 2023, according to official data. Figures released by the Kingdom's central bank showed an increase in personal loans accounted for 33 percent of this growth, while the remaining 67 percent was attributed to the expansion of corporate lending, particularly for real estate activities, as well as electricity, gas, and water supplies. The surge in real estate loans within corporate activities can be credited to Saudi Arabia's expansive giga-proj-

ects, which have mitigated the impact of rising borrowing rates associated with high interest rates. Personal loans, which include all types of credit provided to individuals, amounted to SR1.25 trillion in January, showing an annual rise of 7 percent. The personal loan market in Saudi Arabia has been on a significant growth trajectory, as reported by market research company SPER. This expansion is propelled by various key factors, including the demand for residential properties from expatriates entering the Kingdom, as well as government initiatives focused on modernizing the finan-

cial system. The rapid advancement of digitization, resulting in swift lending and approval processes, is also a significant contributor to the market's growth. Furthermore, the growing number of new entrants in the personal finance sector in Saudi Arabia is poised to create lucrative opportunities for further expansion in the near future. Advisory and consulting firm Ken Research highlighted that the rising number of working women in Saudi Arabia is on a steady incline, a trend that is forecasted to propel growth in the market and yield positive outcomes for the Saudi personal finance market.

#### Egypt's sees trade deficit rise 17.8% amid export decline, import fluctuations

CAIRO (Agencies): Egypt's annual trade deficit rose by 17.8 percent in December due to a decline in the value of key commodities such as fertilizers and petroleum products. According to the report from the Central Agency for Public Mobilization and Statistics, the North African nation registered a trade deficit of \$3.03 billion in the final month of 2023, up from \$2.57 billion in December 2022. The report indicated a 23 percent year-on-year decline is primarily attributed to the reduced



in export value, totaling \$3.48 billion. Imports also decreased by 8.2 percent over the same period, reaching a total of \$6.51 billion. The decline in exports

value of certain commodities, including a 48.8 percent reduction in fertilizers, a 46.8 percent decrease in petroleum products, and an 88.1 percent drop in natural and liquefied gas. Additionally, plastics in their primary forms also experienced a 35.5 percent fall in export value during the period. However, despite these declines, the export revenue of specific commodities increased during the same month compared to the previous year.

#### EU to start sending Russian money to Ukraine this summer

NEW YORK (Agencies): The European Commission is pressing ahead with its plan to give Kiev up to €3 billion (\$3.2 billion) from profits generated by frozen Russian assets amid waning financial support from the US, the Financial Times reported on Tuesday. Brussels is fast-tracking the decision to seize the interest earned from the assets held at clearinghouse Euroclear, starting from February onwards, the article stated. A first tranche of money could be sent to Kiev as early as July if Brussels



can secure the approval of all bloc members, the outlet said, citing EU officials. The proposal is reportedly expected before a summit of EU leaders next week. The West has frozen roughly \$300 billion in holdings belonging to the Russian central bank

since the start of the Ukraine conflict two years ago. Brussels-based clearing house Euroclear holds around €191 billion (\$205 billion) of them and has accrued nearly €4.4 billion in interest over the past year. According to the report, Brussels would disburse between €2 and €3 billion in revenue generated by frozen assets this year, depending on interest rates. EU officials estimate that overall profits derived from Russian funds held by Euroclear could reach €20 billion by 2027, the FT said.

#### Lexus beats Tesla, Mercedes in driver-assisted safety ratings

VIRGINIA (Agencies): One of the auto industry's most closely watched evaluators of safety has put carmakers' driver-assistance systems to the test, and the results aren't pretty. A system Toyota Motor Corp offers on the Lexus LS sedan is the only one of 14 that the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety tested and deemed "acceptable," the independent nonprofit said Tuesday. Tesla Inc, Mercedes-Benz Group AG and Volvo Car AB systems were among the 11 that IIHS rates "poor." The IIHS



evaluated how systems perform tasks including monitoring drivers and reminding them that they need to pay attention. The group also graded systems on the procedures they follow in

emergencies, including when alerts intended to reengage drivers are ignored. Most systems lack adequate measures to prevent misuse and keep drivers focused, IIHS President David Harkey said. "Some drivers may feel that partial automation makes long drives easier, but there is little evidence it makes driving safer," Harkey said in a statement. "As many high-profile crashes have illustrated, it can introduce new risks when systems lack the appropriate safeguards."

However, people have complained on social media about finding seemingly hidden cameras in Airbnb lodgings, cameras and other devices and to

Nord Stream names Lloyd's Insurance Company and Arch Insurance (EU) as defendants in its lawsuit, which was filed at London's Nord Stream's lawsuit also says one High Court last month. 
#### Klopp and Guardiola serve up another Premier League classic but Arsenal are the big winners

### Boeing whistleblower found dead amid legal case

WASHINGTON (Agencies): A former Boeing employee was found dead in the US when he was scheduled to give evidence in a whistleblower lawsuit against his former employer, the BBC reported on Tuesday. The US aerospace giant's production standards in the US and worldwide have come under increased scrutiny recently following a mid-air door blowout on one of their planes in January. The 62-yearold former Boeing quality manager was found dead in his car in a hotel parking lot - seven years after his retirement from a 32-year career with Boeing. In the days prior to his death, he had been giving a formal deposition in a lawsuit against the company.

#### Poland: the Biggest Army in the EU And the Biggest Risks in the Making



WARSAW (Agencies): The Polish ministers love surprises. This week, Polish Foreign Minister Radoslaw Sikorski stunned the public when he said "several NATO countries already have their troops in Ukraine." Sikorski represents the pro-EU "liberal" party Civic Platform, which recently replaced the "anti-European" nationalists from the Law and Justice (PiS) party. By voicing the shocking remark, Sikorski was effectively attempting to outdo the media star of the previous cabinet formed by the PiS. That media star was Mariusz Blaszczak, the former minister of defense who promised Poland would have "the strongest army in Europe" in two vears. In fact, Sikorski's statement about NATO troops in Ukraine was not much of a secret for Russia. Even Sikorski's attempt to create intrigue by saying he would not reveal the troops' countries of origin was a failure. Maria Zakharova, the official representative of Russia's Foreign Ministry, acknowledged that Russia knew about the presence of Western servicemen and which countries they came from. She said: "It does not make sense for NATO to deny it's sending soldiers to Ukraine any more." However, German Defense Minister Boris Pistorius again denied the presence of NATO troops in Ukraine recently, in this way one more time exposing himself or Sikorski as a liar. Sikorski made his revelation about NATO troops at a celebration devoted to the 25th anniversary of Poland joining the NATO alliance alongside Hungary and the Czech Republic in 1999.

#### CAA: India to enforce migrant law that excludes Muslims



DELHI (Agencies): India's government has announced plans to enact a controversial citizenship law that has been criticised for being anti-Muslim. The Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) will allow non-Muslim religious minorities from Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan to seek citizenship. The authorities say it will help those facing persecution. The law was passed in 2019 - sparking mass protests in which scores of people died and many more were arrested. Rules for it were not drawn up in the wake of the unrest but have now been, according to the country's home affairs minister Amit Shah. He made the announcement on Monday, writing on social media that Prime Minister Narendra Modi had "delivered on another commitment and realised the promise of the makers of our constitution to the Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians living in those countries". India's home ministry in a statement said that those eligible can now apply online for Indian citizenship. An online portal for receiving applications has already been set up.

#### Pilots fell asleep mid-flight with 157 people onboard – report

JAKARTA (Agencies): Both pilots of a domestic Indonesian flight from Kendari to the capital Jakarta on January 25 were asleep for almost half an hour during the two-hour and 35-minute-long flight, a preliminary investigation has found. The plane veered off its designated course during the 28 minutes that both the pilot and co-pilot were asleep, according to the report. The country's National Transportation Safety Committee (KNKT) probe into the Batik Air flight, which carried 157 people, acknowledged that the plane eventually landed safely at its destination. The KNKT report did not identify the pilots, only describing the captain as a 32-year-old and second-in-command as a 28-year-old. Both are Indonesian citizens and both had reportedly passed health checks



and tested negative for alcohol. However, according to media reports, the co-pilot had notified the captain earlier in the day that he had not had "proper rest." The KNKT report highlighted that the man had one-month-old twins and had moved residences the day before the flight and was thus struggling with a lack of sleep. According to the report, about 30 minutes after takeoff the captain asked his co-pilot for permission to rest and woke up just under an hour later.

#### US, UK Carry Out 15 Strikes on Yemen Over Past 24 Hours - Reports



DOHA (Agencies): The United States and the United Kingdom carried out at least 15 airstrikes on Yemen as a response to Houthi attacks on ships in the Red Sea, Yemeni media reported. US and UK aircraft carried out five raids on the Sa'dah province in northern Yemen, Al-Masirah broadcaster reported. In cial vessels.

#### FAB-1500: The Russian Air-Dropped Bomb 'Tilting the Balance' Against Ukraine



WASHINGTON (Agencies): The past three months have seen a seforces against heavily reinforced Ukrainian positions in free-falling FAB series bombs into Donbass, with troops cracking fortifications and entrenchments which munitions with an extended range. Ukraine's NATO-backed army spent a decade creating. Russia's secret? A modernized take on a Soviet-made super-heavy aerial bomb. Western legacy media have discovered a "new" Russian super weapon that threatens to crack virtually any fortification. In a piece on Sunday, CNN warned that Russia has "begun using a powerful aerial bomb that has decimated Ukrainian defenses and tilted the balance on the front lines," using "a basic Soviet-era weapon" converted "into a gliding bomb that can cause a crater fifteen meters wide." The munition, which Ukrainian media had previously characterized as a "monster bomb" "more powerful than the Iskander" missile, is the FAB-1500 - a air-launched, 1,525 kg aerial bomb developed during the Cold War, and designed to blast through hard targets. The FAB-1500 was first introduced into service with the Soviet military in 1954, and comes packed with 675 kg of TNT - enough to level a fortification or bunker and leave a crater up to 20 meters deep, smash through up to

The UMPK While the FAB-1500 is powerful, its status as an unguided, free-fall munition limited its utility against near-peer or peer adversaries, particularly as anti-aircraft air defense became more sophisticated through the second half of the 20th century. Russia's military engineers were able to get around this weak spot using a UMPK - Russian acries of surprise breakthroughs by ronym for "Unified Planning and Correction Module" - transforming laser and satellite-guided controlled UMPK-equipped FABs feature foldout wing and rudder components and a computer targeting system improving the bombs' accuracy to within five meters of their target. The closest US analog is the JDAM-ER smart bomb kit. Equipped with the UMPK, FAB-1500s can reportedly be launched by their carriers distances up to 50 km from the target and up to 10 km up, and be carried both by strategic bombers, like the Tupolev Tu-95 and the Tupolev Tu-160, and by tactical strike jets like the Sukhoi Su-27 and Sukhoi Su-34. Envoys from the militaries of Azerbaijan, India, Kazakhstan, Oman, Pakistan, and South Africa are in attendance as observers. #### Ukrainian drones strike several Russian oil facilities – officials



MOSCOW (Agencies): The Russian military intercepted at least 25 hostile targets over seven regions overnight, but at least one Ukrainian drone crashed into an oil facility in the western city of Oryol early Tuesday morning. Several more UAVs targeted a refinery on the outskirts of Nizhny Novgorod. The attack in Oryol targeted a "fuel and energy complex facility" in the city around 350km south of Moscow, Governor Andrey Klychkov announced in a statement at 3:30am

local time. There were no casualties or injuries on the ground, according to the official. One oil tank caught fire as a result of the strike, an emergency services source told RIA Novosti. Photos and videos circulating on social media show fire and smoke rising from the facility, apparently visible from several kilometers away. Klychkov said firefighters are working to contain the blaze, adding that the situation is under control and urging residents to remain calm. Several hours later, yet another attack by unmanned aerial vehicles targeted a fuel and energy complex in the Kstovskaya industrial zone outside Nizhny Novgorod, around 400km east of Moscow, according to Governor Gleb Nikitin.

#### Haiti's Prime Minister Ariel Henry resigns as law and order collapse



Port-au-Prince (Agencies): Haiti's Prime Minister Ariel Henry has agreed to resign following weeks of mounting pressure and increasing violence in the country. It comes after regional leaders met in Jamaica on Monday to discuss a political transition in Haiti. Mr Henry is currently stranded in Puerto Rico after being prevented by armed gangs from returning home. In a video address announcing his resignation. Mr Henry urged Haitians to remain calm. "The government that I am leading will resign immediately after the installation of [a transition] council," Mr Henry said. "I want to thank the Haitian people for the opportunity I had been granted. I'm asking all Haitians to remain calm and do everything they can for peace and stability to come back as fast as possible." Mr Henry, who had led the country supposedly on an interim basis since July 2021 following former President Jovenel Moïse's assassination, had repeatedly postponed elections, saying security must be restored first.

#### Banana prices to go up as temperatures rise, says expert

LONDON (Agencies): Bananas are set to get more expensive as climate change hits a much-loved fruit, one of the world's top experts from the industry tells BBC News. Pascal Liu, senior economist at the World Banana Forum, says climate impacts pose an "enormous threat" to supply, compounding the impacts of fast-spreading diseases. The forum meets in Rome on Tuesday to tackle challenges facing the fruit. Some UK shops have recently experienced banana shortages due to sea storms. The UK alone imports around 5 billion bananas ever year, with around 90% sold through the major supermarkets. Last week saw shortages of bananas in several UK supermarkets, which retailers said were down to storms at sea, delaying supplies. Most consumers won't have noticed, according to Prof Dan Bebber from the University of Exeter, who has studied efforts to make bananas more sustainable.

### China technology giant Xiaomi starts



BEIJING (Agencies): Chinese technology giant Xiaomi says it will start deliveries of its first electric vehicle (EV) this month - its first ever foray into the competitive automotive industry. The car's price is expected to be announced on 28 March. China's fifth-largest smartphone maker says it has 59 stores in 29 cities around the country to take orders. It comes as a price war intensifies between firms like BYD and Tesla in China, the world's biggest car market. At the unveiling of the Speed Ultra 7 (SU7) last year, Xiaomi's chief executive Lei Jun said the company aims to become one of the top five car makers in the world. The smartphone giant has said it will invest \$10bn (£7.8bn) in its vehicles business over the next 10 years. Mr Lei said the SU7 was "super electric motor" technology which is capable of accelerating faster than Tesla and Porsche EVs. Xiaomi is also hoping that the car's shared operating system with its phones and other devices will appeal to existing customers. It is one of the few new prospective entrants to the China's electric car market to gain approval from authorities as officials try to curb a flood of new players. The SU7 will be made by a unit of stateowned car manufacturer BAIC Group at a plant in Beijing that can produce as many as 200,000 vehicles a year.
